Several girls of the Springlake High School graduating class of 1945 met Wednesday, July 27, for a reunion.

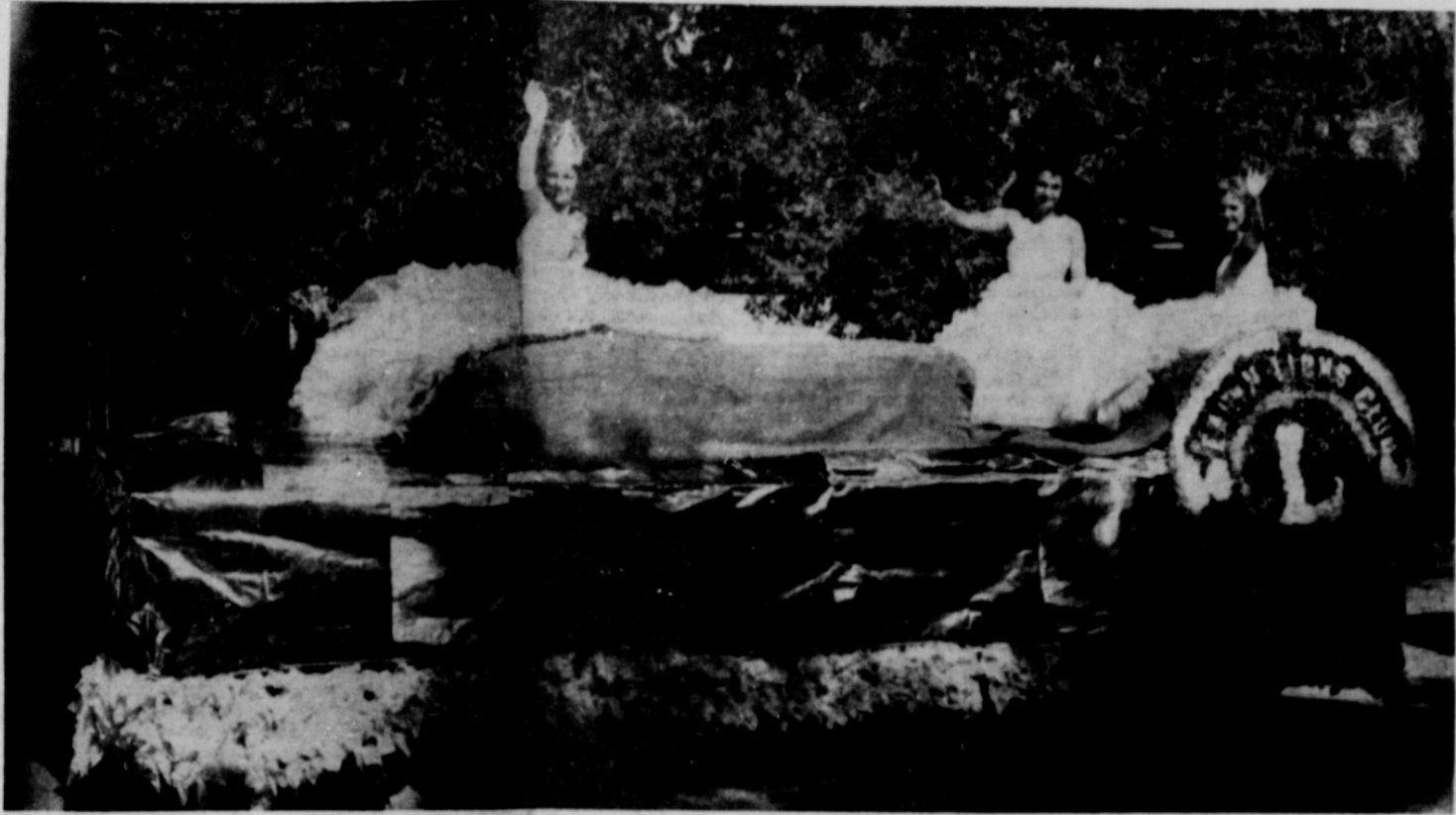
The reunion was held in the Hilton Hotel Coffee Shop in Plainview with seven members of the class present.

## Billy Welu To Be At Olton Bowling Center Thursday, August 11

Billy Welu, T. V. Bowling Champion will be in Olton all day on Thursday, August 11, at the Olton Bowling Center.

Welu, who won the Covered BPPA All-Star Individual Match Game Championship at Buffalo, N. Y., in 1959 is a member of the Bowling Promotion Staff of American Machine and Foundry Company.

Welu, a native of Houston, but now residing in St. Louis, led by only nine Peterson points entering the final game, and as a nationwide TV audience watched, rallied from two early splits to string five strikes and secure his first All-Star crown. He won 26 of his final 43 All-Star games by striking out in the final frames.

Earlier in the 1958-59 campaign, Welu annexed the First Annual Invitational TV Singles Championship at the storied Fetz-Nissen Bowl in Chicago. In a field of 69 hand-picked stars of top-notch caliber, Welu emerged the victor, averaging 232 for the tourney.

Welu also owns an outstanding ABC Tournament record. Through the 1959 tournament, Big Bill (he stands six four and one-half) was the leader in the four-year bracket with 213 (he also holds the all-time four-year mark of 231-35) and for the past five years, leads with a 212-41 average.

In addition to his achievements as an individual bowler, Welu helped spark his team, the Falstaffs of St. Louis, to the unprecedented "grand slam" of the team championships during the 1957-58 season. They won the ABC Team Championship for 1958, setting an all-time all-events record enroute, plus the BPAA All-Star Team Eliminations and National Team Match Game crown for 1957-58. He carried a 219 average with the Falstaffs in the traditionally rugged St. Louis Masters League for the 1957-58 season.

He was a member of the famed Bedweiser squad of St. Louis, when they took the 1955-56 BPAA Team title. He has been named to Mort Laby's Bowlers Journal All-American first teams for the 1955-56, 1957-58 and 1958-59 seasons. Bowling Magazine also placed him on their 1958-59 All-American squad.

The 27-year old Texan, who has won every major bowling tournament in the Southwest, first came to national prominence during the 1953-54 season when he won the ABC Doubles title in Seattle, teaming with Don McClaren.

He is one of the youngest bowlers ever to compete in the All-Star. In December 1951, when he was eighteen, he took part in the twelfth edition of the tournament, a victory in the Texas All-Star Eliminations earning him the qualifying spot.

On four occasions Welu was a member of teams that copped Texas State Championship; twice he was a member of Southwest championship teams.

An injury to his right hand some years ago forced Billy to develop a bowling grip all his own. The middle finger hole of

his bowling ball is drilled for a fingertip grip while the ring finger is drilled semi-fingertip. The holes are drilled very close to each other with almost no bridge and Welu's middle finger (the longer one) overlaps the ring finger (shorter) so that the two fingers are virtually employed as one big finger. This type grip allows Billy to obtain additional lift on the ball with a minimum of exertion.

There will be exhibition bowling all day and free bowling instructions for the youngsters at 4 p.m.

### OIL IN THE NEW DECADE

The year 1960 finds oil stocks as laggard performers in the market and the industry fraught with intense competition and unsatisfactory earnings. Further compounding the difficulty is the failure of demand to maintain the previous rate of increase. During the first ten or eleven postwar years, free world consumption grew at an annual rate of 8 percent. For the present and the near future, a rate of growth equal to 5 percent world-wide is anticipated, reflecting an annual increase of 1 1/2 percent in the United States and 3 1/2 percent in the free foreign world.

The oil industry abroad, hitherto the most favorably situated has not escaped the developing problems even though the demand curve is much steeper. The problem here is production. New petroleum areas have been opened up in Venezuela, Libya, Algeria, and the Middle East and the supplies from these new prolific sources are already pressing into established markets and the pressure will intensify in the coming five years.

In the United States competition in product prices has been bitter ever since early 1958 when several oil companies caused refineries to overproduce and build up excess inventory. However, in the last two months refined product prices have risen 4 percent and are at the highest level in over a year. Stocks have also improved and during the first six months of 1960 there was a reduction of 24 million barrels. But the situation continues somewhat dubious inasmuch as inventories are still 7 percent higher than necessary and refinery runs are beginning to trend upward again.

It will remain to be seen whether current sense will finally prevail or volume for volume's sake will be the rule. ## Recent Rains Interfere in Insect Control Programs

Scattered showers in the north and western portions of Texas have interfered with insect control programs in some areas. As a general rule, cotton plantings have had excellent growing and fruiting weather during the past week. Cotton is loading up well in nearly all areas.

A combination of rapid plant growth and reduced thrips populations have resulted in little concern with this pest. Only Jones and Glasscock counties reported noticeable thrips populations.

Fleahoppers continue to cause damage in late planted cotton and plantings which lost the early fruit set. Where the fleahopper damage was negligible during early fruiting, allowing the cotton to set a good bottom crop, this cotton is continuing to fruit well. Older cotton, with a good bottom crop, often does not show the heavy shedding of small forms seen in younger or poorly fruited plantings. Larger fleahopper populations are required to cause the same damage that is seen earlier in the fruiting period. Heavy fleahopper populations were reported in Lynn, Motley, Dawson, Fisher, and Jones counties. Medium infestations were reported in Hale, Wilbarger, Terry, Jones, Glasscock and Lubbock. Cochran, Wichita, Hockley, Knox, Lamb, and Briscoe counties.

Bollworms are posing a critical problem in many counties in this area. It is extremely important to watch cotton closely for the eggs and small worms; because control measures are most effective in the early stages of this pest. After the bollworms begin feeding on the larger bolls control is extremely difficult. Bollworms and damage was reported heavy in Terry, Glasscock, Dawson, Jones, and Fisher counties. Medium infestations were found in Lynn, Wilbarger, Reagan, Hardeman, Wichita, Midland, Yoakum and Knox counties. Bollworm eggs were not as numerous this week as in the past two weeks but with irrigation beginning again cotton fields should be observed closely.

Boll weevils continue to ravage cotton plantings in Wilbarger,

Hardeman, Glasscock, Wichita, and Jones counties. The emergence of the second generation should be carefully watched and control measures begun early enough to prevent heavy feeding and oviposition damage.

Cabbage loopers are very common over most of the area. Populations should be closely watched to prevent extreme ragging of the cotton plants. It should be remembered that these insects are extremely hard to control when the worm becomes large. Cabbage loopers were found in Lynn, Motley, Wilbarger, Cochran, Glasscock, Dawson, Fisher, Midland, Jones, Yoakum and Terry counties.

## Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Section 14 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days of each Regular Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature; limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days; and prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 14 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows: "Section 14. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days of each Regular Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days."

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two

Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established, no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of a Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 3d day of November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ALLOWING AN ANNUAL SALARY OF NOT TO EXCEED FOUR THOUSAND, EIGHT HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$4,800) PER YEAR AND A PER DIEM ALLOWANCE OF NOT TO EXCEED TWELVE DOLLARS (\$12) PER DAY FOR THE FIRST ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY (120) DAYS ONLY OF EACH SESSION OF THE LEGISLATURE AS THE MAXIMUM COMPENSATION FOR MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND LIMITING THE REGULAR SESSION TO ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY (140) DAYS."

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ALLOWING AN ANNUAL SALARY OF NOT TO EXCEED FOUR THOUSAND, EIGHT HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$4,800) PER YEAR AND A PER DIEM ALLOWANCE OF NOT TO EXCEED TWELVE DOLLARS (\$12) PER DAY FOR THE FIRST ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY (120) DAYS ONLY OF EACH SESSION OF THE LEGISLATURE AS THE MAXIMUM COMPENSATION FOR MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND LIMITING THE REGULAR SESSION TO ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY (140) DAYS."

Sec. 3. The Government of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

## South Plains Soil Building Week August 7 - 14

Lubbock — The eighth annual South Plains Soil Building Week, which is held annually to call attention to the benefits of planting cover crops and using other conservation methods to maintain soil fertility, will be observed August 7-14.

**Conrad L. Lohoefer**, Director of Public Relations for the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., is chairman of the Soil Building Week this year.

Promotional activities this year are planned to call attention to the importance of soil conservation, with particular emphasis to be placed on the overall integration of soil building practices into the agricultural picture on the Texas High Plains.

**Gene Linn**, Agricultural Manager of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, is co-chairman of the Soil Building Week program this year.

Working in cooperation with the Lubbock Soil Conservation District, **Lohoefer** and **Linn** have planned a newspaper, radio and television campaign to focus attention on soil building and conservation during the second week of August.

In addition to special stories in newspapers, including all weeklies in the 23 county area on the High Plains, special programs for both radio and television are planned.

Sunday, August 7 will see the kickoff of the program with special feature stories on soil building practices. These will be followed by similar articles staggered throughout the week. For the radio coverage, **Farm Director Bob Stephens** and **Farm Reporter Bob Ettridge** have prepared a series of programs on soil building which will be played over Lubbock and ten other area radio stations for use during Soil Building Week.

**John Key**, Lubbock Banker, is chairman of the Board of Supervisors of the Lubbock Soil Conservation District. Other supervisors include **Cecil Brashear**, **Idalou**, Secretary-Treasurer; **John Griffiths**, Lubbock, Vice Chairman; **Edwin Forrest**, Lubbock; and **E. O. Ramsey**, Shallowater.

Observance of Soil Building Week originated in 1953 and has become an annual observance not only in Lubbock County, but has spread throughout the Texas High Plains area.

In commenting about observance of Soil Building Week on the High Plains, **Chairman Key** said: "We who depend on the soil for most of our livelihood, are likely to become complacent toward our main resource. We should remind ourselves constantly that the soil is a 'living' thing; it responds to good treatment to bring forth more abundant crops, better animals and more full living. If not treated properly, it will even more quickly become unproductive and exert a depressing effect that becomes readily apparent in every phase of not only farm life, but city life as well."

Soil is defined as that portion

of the earth which is both alive and supports life. It is composed of both organic and inorganic matter. The organic matter consists of living plants and animals & the dead remains of these, from which humus is produced. Soil bacteria convert dead plant and animal residues into humus, which is so vital to good crop production.

Inorganic material is disintegrated mineral material coming from some parent rock. This inorganic or mineral portion is made up of particles of various sizes, ranging from the coarsest to the finest, sand, silt and clay. It is the intimate mixture of the clay fraction and the humus which gives the soil the life and enables it to supply most of the nutrients needed by growing plants.

Farmers on the Texas High Plains have made much progress during the past few years in soil conservation and soil building. However, there remains much that can be done to further protect our soil and improve farm production, not only in yield, but in quality as well. **Key** concluded.

**W. O. Fortenberry**, President of the High Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. and a long-time farmer-ginner on the High Plains, commenting on soil building, said: "The Plains Cotton Growers are firmly convinced of the need for more and better soil building practices. This is the main reason we have invested money in various phases of research on the High Plains so as to try and learn some of the answers to improve the over-all agriculture picture for our farmers. This is why we appropriated \$5,000 to help establish a soils testing laboratory at the new site of the Lubbock Agricultural Experiment Station. Such a laboratory will be of immense value in helping farmers test and determine proper soil conditions on our land."

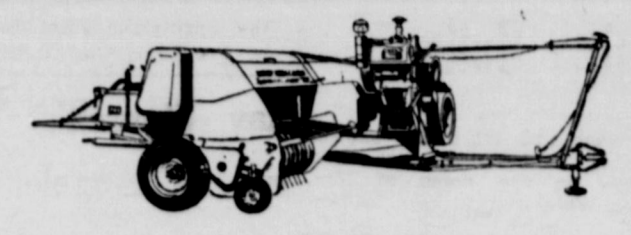

## Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Favor Continuing Present Program

Lubbock, Texas. — Continuation of the 1960 two-choice cotton Legislative Program into 1961 was favored here Monday night July 25 by Directors of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

The vote to favor — "in Lieu of a Better Program" — the retention next year of the same cotton legislative program that is in effect this year came as somewhat of a surprise move, but in view of the fact that cotton leaders fear "Hasty" action when Congress reconvenes in August might wreck the entire cotton program.

Present Legislation calls for the two-choice program to end in 1961 with a minimum national allotment of 16.3 million acres and price supports of not less than 70 percent of parity.

In addition, the standard grade for purposes of price support would go into "average of the crop" instead of the present middling 7-8 inch. Some observers figure cotton would bring about \$17 a bale next year under such a program.

The 1960 cotton program provides farmers operating under the "A" plan with their "regular" farm acreage allotment and price supports of not less than 75 percent of parity. It enables growers who selected the "B" program to expand acreage by 40 percent in exchange for lower price supports of not less than 60 percent of parity.

Growers also voiced opposition to reports that an effort may be made in the future to put production controls on a poundage, bushelage or baleage basis.

In essence, the vote to continue the 1960 program into the next year apparently was aimed at voicing dissatisfaction with the lower acreage allotments and a cut in price supports that are looming for 1961.

At the same time, however, it seemed likely that the Plains Growers would oppose any effort to raise price supports to unrealistic levels at the expense of greatly curtailed acreage allotments.

"It's my guess that any sizable ever had," one leading cotton grower accompanied by the most stringent production controls we've increase in price supports would over-serve said.

Action on the Legislative situation was taken prior to a meeting scheduled July 29 in Memphis of the American Cotton Producers Associates, where some Legislative action is contemplated.
