

The Postmaster also emphasized the importance of using ZIP Codes and adding a return address to all Christmas mail. It only takes a couple extra seconds, but pays big dividends.

ZIP Codes enable postal employees to sort and handle the mail faster. A return address insures that mail that can't be delivered because of an illegible or incomplete address will be returned to the sender.

"A return address might not seem very important," Miller noted, "but last year over 32 billion pieces of mail went to postal dead letter branches because of the mailing address couldn't be read and there was no return address on the envelope. If you estimate the worth of each of these pieces at twenty-five cents, including postage, postal customers lost over \$7.5 million last year to dead letter offices. None of this would have happened if the envelopes had contained a re-

turn address.

# Pros, Cons Of **Fall Fertilization**

Applying fertilizer in the fall for spring crops has certain advantages as well as disadvantages, says Buddy C. Logsdon a county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"It doesn't make much difference whether potassium or phosphorous is applied in the spring or fall, " says Logsdon, "However, studies have shown that spring application of nitrogen gives slightly better results over a period of years.

Nitrogen applied in the fall must be from an ammonium source and should be used only on fine-textured or clay soils when the soil temperature is below 50 degrees F. If nitrogen is applied as a nitrate or on course-textured soils, it will leach out and be lost, Also, nitrates can become denitrified in wet clay soils.

"As far as advantages of fall fertilizer application are concerned, the practice saves time rolls round. It can also save money if fertilizer prices go up in the spring. Furthermore, it be based on the expected resprovides a tax advantage, "adds ponse from each plant nutrient
