

Break-In Reported At Earth Ford Sales

A break-in at the Earth Ford Sales Saturday morning between the hours of 2 and 4 a.m. resulted in the gathering up of tools valued at from \$300.00 to \$400.00 and piling them outside the door. Investigating officers Deputy Sheriff W. A. Hatfield and City Marshal Alvin Pittman said the thieves apparently were scared away before they could load the loot they had stashed outside the back door and apparently had to leave empty handed.

Hatfield and Pittman said the prowlers broke a window to gain entrance, then unlocked the back door to stack tools outside, where an automobile was parked in readiness to carry away the loot.

Hatfield said Monday no charges had been filed and the investigation was incomplete pending charges.

County 4-H Club Steer Show Saturday in Littlefield

A 4-H Club early roundup steer show for Lamb County members to exhibit steers of feed in the county, will be held Saturday, September 30 in the county show barn in Littlefield. This event was planned in conjunction with National 4-H Club Week, September 30 to October 7. The steers should arrive at the show barn at 9:30 a.m. and be weighed and classed at 10 a.m. Fitting and showing demonstrations will be held from 11 a.m. until noon. At 1 p.m. steers will be exhibited after having been classed.

All calves will receive ribbons. Blue ribbons indicate (fancy steer) with red as (choice steer) and white ribbons as (good steer). These will be determined by judges from other counties.

School Damage Estimated At \$27,818

A called school board meeting was held Tuesday night with the Insurance Adjuster Leland Schulze of the Insurance Adjustment Company of Lubbock present.

The amount of damage from the recent storm to be paid by the Insurance Company was discussed. The school board and the adjuster agreed on the suitable figure of \$27,818.00. Breaking this figure down, the old gymnasium damage was \$15,000; the Junior High School building, \$1,868.00; the old lunchroom building, \$3,000.00; the elementary building, \$3,997.00; the cafeteria, \$1,927.00; the High School building, \$1,568.00; three apartment buildings (dwellings), \$857.00, making a total of \$27,818.00.

Deductible insurance of \$100, on each building made a total of \$700.00 on the seven buildings involved.

This left a total figure of \$27,118.00. Superintendent Bill Mann said this should be sufficient for repairs, but will take time. Work will begin right away. The old gym is being cleaned in preparation for repairs, which will be sub-contracted.

Superintendent Mann and the School Board are pretty well pleased with the adjustment figure.

Contestants File Notice of Appeal in Hospital District Case

W. Reed Quilliam, Jr., attorney for the Contestants in the Earth-Springlake Hospital District Controversy filed a notice of appeal in the district clerk's office early last week.

The notice was filed, following a decision on September 7 by Judge Pat Boone, Jr., in the 154th District Court, to uphold the May 27 election that created the Hospital District.

The case titled Robert Akin, et al, Contestants, VS, O.J. Mensung, et al, Contestees, was brought to court after Contestants alleged "grave irregularities" took place in the election that should cause the election to be voided and another election called.

District Judge Boone heard the trial, and in summarizing the allegation, he overruled point after point on reason ranging from failure to present a sufficient number of illegal or disfranchised voters to affect the May election, to incorrect interpretation of Texas Constitution Provisions concerning such elections as Hospital Districts.

During the trial Contestants had attacked many election procedures. Included in these were the name Springlake-Earth Hospital District in which they claimed the name had a tendency to lead them to believe that only the two communities were in the proposed Hospital District, also the one voting box set up at Springlake School confused them, as the area concerned, the appointment of the County Clerk as absentee election judge, the time ele-

ment in setting election date, and the failure of the County Tax Assessor-Collector to provide a list of property owners as qualified voters. They further attempted to establish that a clause in the Texas Constitution states such a district must be created by a majority of qualified voters within the district, using the interpretation that the word "majority" refers to eligible voters. The court ruled that a person must present himself at the polls to vote before he is a voter.

The notice of appeal filed Monday is not a definite act of appeal but a statement of "desire to appeal." It is addressed to Judge Boone, as follows: Now come Robert Akin, Et Al, Contestants in the above entitled and numbered cause, and give notice that they desire to appeal to the Seventh Supreme Judicial District of Texas from the judgment of the 154th District Court rendered in said cause on the 7th day of September, 1967.

Also filed with the notice is a "Certificate," signed by W. Reed Quilliam, Jr., stating, "I hereby certify that I have delivered a true and correct copy of the above and foregoing Notice of Appeal to Kirby and Ratliff, attorneys for Contestees, on the 17th day of September, 1967."

Wilkinson said if the contestants follow through on the notice to appeal, they must order a transcript in which the court reporter will transcribe "everything that took place in the courtroom" and copies must be provided of all papers, such as petitions, amendments, answers, etc., constituting all aspects and evidence of the case.

The material then will be sent to a three-judge court in Amarillo for examination. This court may uphold, reverse or modify the ruling of 154th District Court. Each attorney may provide a brief, the contestants showing points where they consider the district judge in error in his ruling, the contestees stressing rulings to be upheld.

Wilkinson said whichever side should win in appeal, the loser could file for a re-hearing at Amarillo and, in turn, the loser of that bout can file for a hearing at the Supreme Court of Texas which would be the final decision.

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Jill McCord Makes Deans Honor Roll At Baylor

Jill McCord, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pat McCord of Earth was among the 350 Baylor University students who were honored for academic performance during the 1967 spring semester. Dean of Instruction George M. Smith recently issued a list of students scoring high in scholastic averages.

To make the Dean's List, students averaged more than 3.60 of a possible 4.0 during a semester. On the Baylor system four points per hour credit are given for each A, three for B's, two for C's and one for D's.

Averages are derived by dividing the total points by the number of hours taken. The Dean's List includes 180 students with averages from 3.60 to 3.79. Miss McCord averaged 3.60. The Dean's Distinguished List, with average ranging from 3.80 to 4.00 lists 178 students.

Geographically, Dean's List students are from more than 20 states, three U. S. territories and six foreign countries.



Earth Votes To Study Proposed Rate Hike

At a recent city meeting, Earth voted to study the proposed electric rate hike before accepting it. A general discussion is given below by Southwestern Public Service Company. The first general increase in electric rates in 16 years is part of a rate simplification and adjustment program submitted to municipal governments for approval in the Texas communities served by Southwestern Public Service Company. An average increase of 7.62% for residential and commercial customers in the Texas portion of the company's service area will take effect upon approval of the proposal. The new rates have already been approved for communities the company serves in New Mexico by the rate-making authority in that state, the New Mexico Public Service Commission, following thorough study of company's books and records by the Commission and the Commission staff.

The 1951 rate increase, which added 10% across the board to electric rates, is the only general rate increase the company has ever requested. There have been some 25 reductions in rates by Southwestern Public Service Company, or predecessor electric companies in the area. 14 of them having gone into effect since the company took its present form in 1942. The company proposes, under the rate simplification phase of the program, to reduce the number of rates applicable to residential service from 4 to 2. At the same time it will switch to single meter billing for all residential customers. Presently, those customers who heat their homes electrically or heat water with electricity are billed on two meters.

Single meter billing offers a number of advantages to the residential customer. There is a single minimum bill charge in the event of a long vacation or extended absence from the home. The customer has a smaller investment in the wiring needed to bring the service into his home. During the winter season, in electrically heated homes, all usage after 300 kwh per month will be billed at a rate of less than one cent per kilowatt-hour.

For residential service in homes which are not electrically heated or do not heat water electrically, the new rate schedule is as follows: 6.50¢ per kwh for the first 50 kwh used each month; 4.30¢ per kwh for the next 50 kwh used each month; 2.15¢ per kwh for the next 300 kwh used each month; and 1.70¢ per kwh for all additional kwh used each month.

The 1.70¢ bottom step on the rate schedule for regular residential service is the lowest rate for this type of service the company has ever offered. This additional block recognizes the trend toward increased use of

electric service in modern day living and offers to the customer the benefits accruing to the company when it is able to utilize larger, more efficient equipment. In homes where all of the heating is done electrically, with the space heating having an aggregate rated capacity of 3 kilowatts (3000 watts) or more, excluding bathroom heaters, billing during the winter months (November through May, inclusive) will be at the regular rates for the first 300 kwh with all the rest at 0.97¢ (97/100ths of a cent) per kwh. In homes which have supplemental electric heating and the aggregate rated capacity

is 3 kilowatts or more, again excluding bathroom heaters, the winter rate will be the first 200 kwh at the regular rate, 100 kilowatt-hours per each kilowatt of rated capacity of heating equipment at 0.97¢ (97/100ths of a cent) per kwh and all additional kilowatt-hours at the regular rate. Under this rate, if the supplemental heating (net the minimum requirement of 3 kilowatts capacity, 300 kilowatt-hours) would be the number billed at the 97/100ths of a cent rate. The less than one-cent per kilowatt-hour rate for electric heating, the addition of supplemental heating at the lower rate, and the extension of

the heating season, when the lower rates apply, to seven months, are offered because, due to air conditioning and irrigation, the peak demands for electric service in this area fall into a three to four month period covering the hot weather season. As a result, it is necessary for Southwestern Public Service Company to have a heavy investment, particularly in generating equipment, which is fully utilized for a relatively short period of time. Because other electric companies in the surrounding area also have heavy summer loads, no practical means of interconnection to share generating equipment has proven feasible.

As more customers heat their homes, or additions to their homes, electrically, the additional utilization of the generating equipment through the winter months will make possible economies beneficial to all customers. The potential for this heating market is high. A nation-wide survey recently indicated that electric home heating is the only method of heating showing a gain when people are asked for a preference on the way they would like to heat their home.

When a customer heats water electrically, after 200 kilowatt hours have been used for regular service, a 500 kilowatt-hour block at the 0.97¢ (97/100ths of a cent) rate will be offered.

The average residential consumption is 350 kilowatt-hours a month. For a customer using this number of kilowatt-hours, the increase in his monthly bill will range from 7¢ to \$1.16, depending on which rate of the four residential rates now in effect he is being billed. The largest increase will be in Amarillo, which will still be served under the lowest of the two proposed residential rates, although the gap is being closed between the rates charged in Amarillo and those in other cities. The lowest increase will be in the North Plains, where the rates have been slightly higher. A fuel cost adjustment is included in the residential rates and accounts for 3¢ of the

monthly increase for the average customer.

All residential customers whose monthly bill is \$15 or more will be offered the level payment program without the obligation of signing a contract.

Under this procedure, the customer's annual bill is estimated and he is billed 1/12th of that amount each month, with any adjustments, if necessary, being made the last month of the year. Total electric homes will automatically be billed on the level payment plan unless the customer requests a regular monthly billing.

The new commercial rates call for the following schedule: 6.50¢ per kwh for the first 100 kwh used each month; 4.20¢ per kwh for the next 300 kwh used per month; 2.15¢ per kwh for the next 600 kwh used each month; 1.30¢ per kwh for the next 600 kwh used each month; .80¢ (eight-tenths of one cent) per kwh for all additional kwh used each month.

When the commercial customer's demand (the number of kilowatts the company must have available to serve his load) exceeds 10 kw, then the 4.20¢ block of the rate will be extended 38 kwh for each kw of demand above 10 kw. The demand feature of the rate affects only a small percentage of the commercial customers.

The company projects that the rate increase will produce additional annual revenues in Texas, where it serves the great majority of its customers of \$1,874,000, with the company-wide increase being just over \$2,400,000. Of this amount, \$1,179,229.49 will go for additional taxes.

The new rates do not take into account an increase in Federal Income Taxes, a subject now being considered by the Congress. Should the proposed tax increases become law they would have a detrimental impact on the company's earnings which would not be compensated for by the additional revenues the new rates are expected to provide.

The new rates will raise the company's rate of return on its investment from 5.65% to 5.98%. 6.5 to 7% is generally

regarded as a fair rate of return and Texas law allows as much as 8%.

Through the years, the company has introduced every possible economy in its operations. The most efficient generating equipment available has been installed and an automatic load dispatching system which utilizes the most economical equipment under all load conditions has been placed in operation.

An annual payroll saving of more than \$1 million has resulted from not replacing employees who have terminated and through redeployment of existing employees.

While these efforts have had some effect on rising costs, continuing price escalation of materials and supplies has made some rate relief necessary.

Gas for making electricity, for example, has increased in price from 7.25¢ per mcf to 13.2¢ in the 16 years since the last general rate increase. Steel for substations is 27¢ a pound today, compared to 15¢ in 1951. Copper wire has gone from 38¢ a pound to 57¢. Hourly wage scales have increased more than 90% meters are 20% higher and taxes have increased by almost 200%.

We have fought the battle of spiraling costs with efficiencies and internal economies for as long as we can and still offer to our customers the dependable service they deserve.

Although we are asking for a rate increase, there are phases for our customers in this new rate structure if they will utilize them by living better electrically. No other source of energy available has held the price line for as long as the electric industry. Total electric living is practical now, as the growing preference for it indicates. Ours is a service which costs less for each unit, the more units that you use, and this type of economy is still available in these new rates. Roy Tolk, president of southwestern Public Service Company, said.



Going up a mid three defenders, O'Hair snagged the pigskin for the six points.

The try for EP, which was a pass, was incomplete, and the score stood at 15 for Dimmitt and six for Springlake-Earth. Again defense, the name of the game that night, as the Wolverines kicked off to the Bobcats. Springlake-Earth was still not out of the fight, however, as they recovered a Bobcat fumble, and marched down inside the Dimmitt 20 yard line. Bad breaks again as the Wolverines received a penalty for offside, and this time Dimmitt was able to capitalize on the break as the Wolverine drive was stopped.

Dimmitt, in the fading minutes of the final quarter, was once again held by the Wolverine defense, and with only moments remaining, the Wolverines began passing in an effort to cross the pay line once again. Then, with only seconds remaining, the Wolverines fumbled, with the ball rolling into the Dimmitt end zone. The Bobcats proved equal to the situation and recovered in their home grounds for the last TD of the evening, as the game ended. The score was then 21 for Dimmitt and six for Springlake-Earth.

The try for extra point was kicked after the game had ended, which was good, and the final score once again was 22 for Dimmitt and six for Springlake-Earth.

With each ensuing game, the Wolverines have shown marked improvement. Their spirit and hustle cannot be denied, and the fans are supporting them all the way. Next game is against Hart, which will be in Wolverine Stadium Friday night at 8:30 p. m.

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



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
