


A called school board meeting was held Tuesday night with the Insurance Adjuster Leland Schulze of the Insurance Adjustment Company of Lubbock present.

Reed Quilliam, Jr., stating, "Thereby certify that I have delivered a true and correct copy of the above and foregoing No-tice of Appeal to Kirby and Rat-liff, attorneys for Contestees, on the 19th day of September,

Wilkinson said if the contestants follow through on the notice to appeal, they must order a transcript in which the court reporter will transcribe "everything that took place in the courtroom" and copies must be provided of all papers, such as swers, etc., constituting all aspects and evidence of the case.

The material then will be sent to a three-judge court in Amarillo for examination. This court may uphold, reverse or modify the ruling of 154th Dis-trict Court. Each attorney may provide a brief, the contestants showing points where they con-sider the district judge in error in his ruling, the contestees

requests a Zip Code for an address in Earth fills out the form and drops it in the mail. 

When a customer heats water electrically, after 200 kilowatt hours have been used for regular service, a 500 kilowatt-hour blockat the 0.97¢ (97/100ths of a cent) rate will be offered.

The average residential consumption is 350 kilowatt-hours a month. For a customer using this number of kilowatt-hours, the increase in his monthly bill will range from 77¢ to \$1.16, depending on which rate of the four residential rates now in effect he is being billed. The largest increase will be in Amarillo, which will still be served under the lowest of the two proposed residential rates, although the gap is being closed between the rates charged in Amarillo and those in other cities. The lowest increase will be on the North Plains, where the rates have been slightly higher. A fuel cost adjustment is included in the residential rates and accounts for 3¢ of the

monthly increase for the aver-

age customer.
All residential customers whose monthly bill is \$15 or more will be offered the level
