This Saturday, Texans will be asked to spend five minutes in selecting their United States Senator who will serve them for the next 2,911,680 minutes—five and a half years.

Those are pretty good odds. You get more than a year of service for each minute of voting

time you invest. If, for no other reason, that is sufficient incentive for you to vote.

But their are more important things to consider. The man selected by Texans Saturday will represent our state in some of the most crucial years facing our nation. This is a highly important

election. The choice should be made by all Texans so that there will be no mistake as to who the victorious candidate represents.

There are more than 2,000,000 Texans qualified to vote. The ballot is short; only two names appear on it. It is probably the

shortest ballot ever used in a statewide election. And one of the most important.

This paper joins with the Governor of Texas and all our Congressmen in urging you to exercise your right to vote Saturday. Never had you had such an opportunity to spend a few minutes so wisely.

Vote as you see fit—but, please, see fit to vote.

Voters over the entire State of Texas will go to the polls Saturday, May 27 to cast votes in the second special Senatorial election.

Each of Lamb County's 16 polls

will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The election became necessary when none of the 70 candidates received a majority of the votes cast in the first special election.

The two candidates on the ticket are John Tower and William Blakely.

The election in Earth will be

held in the usual polling place which is the Earth Community Building.

O. B. Whitford will be the election judge assisted by L. T. Smith.

The election in Springlake will be held in the Community Building with J. L. Hinson as election judge.

### Why Have An Emergency Food Grain Program?

Why do we have an Emergency Food Grain Program for 1961? What can be expected in the future in the way of programs governing agricultural output? These and many more questions are now being asked. We know that the Secretary of Agriculture, the President and Congress will probably attempt to enact additional legislation aimed to give fair and reasonable prices to producers in relationship to other segments of our economy.

First, let's start off with just what has happened in Food Grain Storage over the past two years.

**WHEAT:**  
Stocks in all storage positions as of April, 1961, were a record for a third consecutive year. Holdings were slightly over 5 per cent last year and 66 per cent above average. Disappearance of wheat from all positions during the first quarter of this year (January-March) was a record of 362 million bushels, up sharply from the same quarter in 1960, reflecting heavy export movement. Twenty eight million of the United States stocks were government owned or under price support.

#### NORWHEIM GRAIN:

Stocks in all positions were up almost 25 per cent above a year earlier and record high for April 1. Farm holdings were 2 per cent less than the amount stored on farms last April. About 34 per cent of the off-farm stocks were

owned by or under loan to C. C. C. Off-farm were up 16 per cent from April, 1960.

#### CORN:

Storage in all positions on April 1 reached a new high of 2,649 million bushels, which was 284 million bushels more than the

previous record in April, 1960. Stocks in off-farm positions were 20 per cent higher and on farm storage 3 per cent higher than last year. Corn owned by or under loan to the government comprised 31 per cent of the off-farm stocks. Thirty-four per cent of farm stocks were under loan, as compared

with 25 per cent for April 1 of last year. Disappearance from all storage positions during first quarter of this year was a record, 2 per cent higher than during the same period last year (1,662 million bushels.)  
**CATTLE:**  
Storage in all positions totaled

558 million bushels, almost 15 per cent above the small holdings last April, and about equal to the average. Farm stocks were up 14 per cent last year, and off-farm storage was nearly 25 per cent larger than a year ago. Oats under loan to or owned by C. C. C. accounted for less than 10 per cent of the total stocks. Disappearance during the first quarter of 1961, was 7 million bushels greater than the same period a year ago, but otherwise the lowest for this quarter since records were started in 1944.

**BARLEY:**  
Stocks in all positions were nearly the same as last year, but a third above average. Farm stocks were estimated at 5 per cent larger than a year ago, but off-farm storage was 5 per cent below that

of last April. About 44 per cent of April 1 stocks were owned by or under loan to C. C. C. as compared with 44 per cent a year ago. Disappearance from all storage positions during the first quarter of 1961, was second only to the record of 116 million bushels for this quarter last year.

**SUMMARY**  
You see that in every case, except oats, the amount of feed grain storage is the highest on record. Storage costs on these grains have been high. The main objective under present farm programs are (1) reduce storage costs, (2) reduce carry-over stocks, (3) increase net farm income, (4) reduce production, and (5) assure both farmers and consumers fair and stable prices on major commodities produced and consumed.
