#### Spanish Baptist **All-Electric Heating Has Arrived In Earth Mission Sponsoring**

Electric heating, the last link in the trend toward all - electric living has arrived - and right here in Earth, according to Carroll Mac-Do aid, manager for Southwestern Public Service Company.

Mr. MacDonald recently install ed electric heating at the company's office, not only for the pleasant comfort that electric heating gives, but also as a practical demonstration of the advantages of electric heating for residences and businesses.

Mr. MacDonald said, "Ours is the tenth company office to be modernized with electric heating, however, we have a "first" here in that the other nine offices have electric heat pumps, while our Earth office is using radiant glass panels for heating and a window heat pump for supplemental heating and for summertime cooling. He continues, We have a challenging test for heating in that our office building is of concrete block construction and is not insulated. Also, it has rather large window areas for a 20'x20' building. In addition, a constant flow of visitors naturally bring great amounts of cold air into the office Despite these 'heat losses', as the heating engineers call it, our electric heating has no difficulty in holding an 80 degree temperature even during the last cold speli when
