Just lucky to have escaped the damaging hails, some other farmers we are sure have cotton blooms, also, but this was the first report to the newspaper.

Crop losses have run into thousands of dollars from hail and high winds in the Earth-Springlake area this summer. There will be a shortage in cotton production this coming fall due to the season being too late to re-plant cotton forcing farmers to plant feed on their cotton acreage.

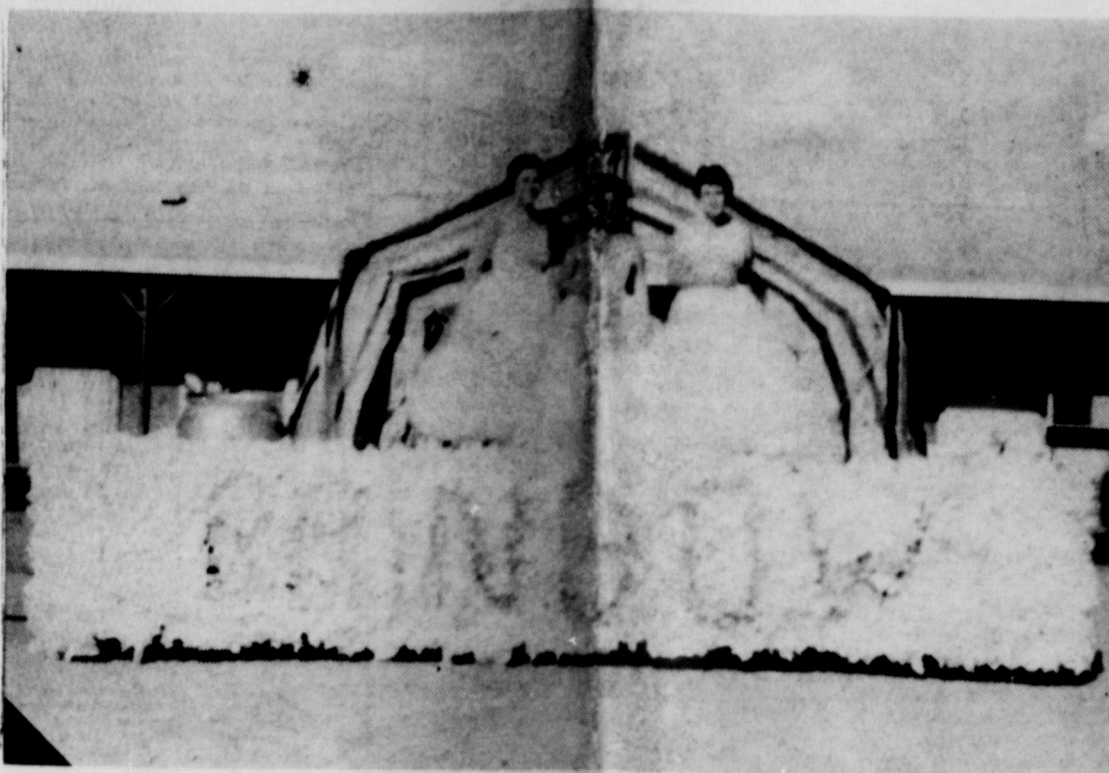

School Board of Directors Holds Meeting and Approves Teachers

The Springlake School Board of Directors met Monday night July 13 for a business meeting and approval of new teachers.

The School Calendar for the coming year was adopted and the opening date of the Springlake School has been set for Monday, August 31.

The date of August 17 at 8 p.m. has been set for a public hearing and adoption of the school budget.

Other business included an approval of the remodeling of the old school bus garage.

A bid on roofing repair was awarded to Lydell-Griffin Co. of Lubbock. Damages from recent hail storms to roofs of the school buildings was estimated to be approximately 5 or 6 thousand dollars.

Seven new Royal typewriters and 10 new typewriter tables were purchased for the commercial department.

Six new teachers were approved by the school board of directors. The Homemaking Department is the only vacancy that has not been filled at this time.

Farmers '60 Wheat Referendum Nears

Wheat growers of Lamb County will soon be making their annual decision on marketing quotas, Chairman D. C. Terrell of the Lamb County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee said recently.

On July 23, they will join with wheat farmers in 38 other states in a referendum to decide the type of marketing control program they will have for the 1960 crop of wheat. The referendum is held at this time so that farmers will know at winter wheat planting time in 1960.

The wheat program on which farmers will vote, Mr. Terrell said, is the same as that which has been in effect for the last several years. Marketing quotas have been proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture as required by the law when supplies are excessive. They will remain in effect only if approved by two-thirds of the farmers voting in the referendum.

When wheat marketing quotas are in effect, farmers who comply with their individual farm wheat acreage allotments may market their entire wheat crop without penalty and are eligible for price support at least 75 per cent of parity. A grower who exceeds his allotment will be subject to marketing quota penalties on his excess wheat except that any grower may produce up to 15 acres for harvest as grain without penalty.

If more than one-third of the voters for no quota controls, they do not take effect and there are no restrictions on wheat marketing. Price support is available at 50 per cent of parity to farmers who comply with their acreage allotments.

The marketing quota penalty rate will be announced later, Mr. Terrell said. It is \$1.07 per bushel for 1959 crop wheat.

Any farmer is eligible to vote who expects more than 15 acres of wheat as grain in 1960, except a grower who participate in the feed program in 1959.

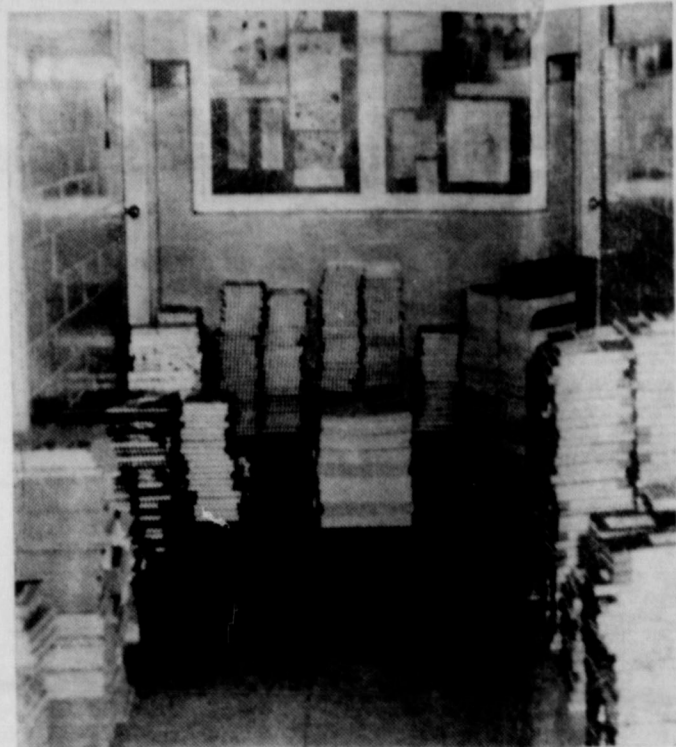

National Farm Safety Week Set For July 19-25

Man's spectacular advances in the field of medical research which increase life expectancy and reduce human suffering are being largely offset by his lethargy in applying simple antibiotics to some of the commonest causes of death and injury, the head of the state's largest farm organization declared recently.

Citing the tremendous farm accident toll which annually takes 1,000 lives and seriously injures another 100,000 in Texas alone, J. H. West, president of the Texas Farm Bureau, called for full cooperation on the part of farmers

and ranchers of the state in the Farm Safety Week observance set for July 19-25.

"We employ our best brains in conquering such killers as polio, tuberculosis and heart disease and fail to use the common sense God gave each of us for the preservation of our lives and prevention of injury to our bodies," West declared.

The farm leader said that the Farm Safety Week observance is "a concentrated effort to make the observance of safety precautions 'second nature' with all who work in agriculture." The nationwide observance was set by proclamation of President Eisenhower and in Texas by Governor Daniel.

The accidental death rate among farm people is higher than in any major industry, and Texas has one of the worst farm accident records in the nation, West said. "Farmers are naturally susceptible to work accidents because the farmer is a 'jack of all trades,' he declared. "He's a mechanic, blacksmith, electrician, plumber, carpenter, veterinarian and master of fancy other crafts rolled into one. All of these are hazardous jobs, and the farmer is less cognizant of their inherent dangers and less likely to take precautions than the skilled worker who is familiar with them and knows what can result from carelessness."

As expected, Congress passed price support limitations . . . not much doubt but that the President will sign the bill into law . . . limitations are set at \$50,000 per commodity . . . means that you can receive support of \$50,000 for your cotton and also an equal amount for your soybeans, if you grow both items . . . some exceptions, however; you may receive supports in excess of \$50,000 for one commodity if you agree to pay back the excess within a specified time (recourse loans) . . . or if you reduce your production in accordance with rules set up by the Secretary of Agriculture . . . law won't allow him to demand cuts of more than 20 per cent . . . while members of co-operatives are restricted to the \$50,000 maximum, the co-ops, themselves, are not placed under this restriction . . . all this applies to the 1960 crop . . . this year's crop doesn't come under the bill.

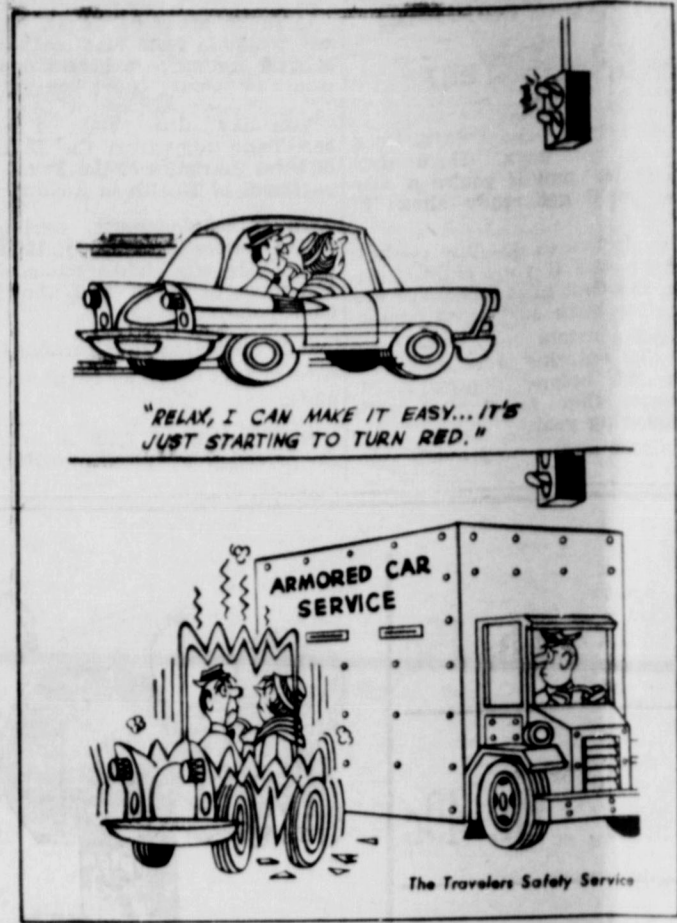

Farm Death Rate Still High Among Major Industries

Although the accidental death rate among farm people has been reduced, it's still higher than in any major industry, according to the president of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council.

Paul H. Walser of Temple said that in addition to the people who meet death as a result of farm accidents, a million more farm people suffer accidental injuries and the accompanying worry, misery, and financial trouble.

"The question of farm safety thus becomes one of major importance to us all," Walser said. "The theme of the 1959 National Farm Safety Week 'Safety Makes Sense' is a most appropriate slogan because it is a matter of good sense to protect not only our own individual welfare but the safety and welfare of those around us."

The safety leader pointed out that although accidental deaths among farm people have been reduced from 19,500 in 1947 to 12,000 in 1957, the death toll from farm work accidents is still about 3,500 per year. He added that while "it is true that the death rate has been reduced from 66 per 100,000 farm population in 1947 to 57 in 1957, such losses are still higher than any other major industry."

"Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council pledges its best efforts in the furtherance of National

Farm Safety Week in 1959," Walser said. "We hope that everyone, not only farmers and ranchers themselves, but all who have an opportunity to share in this important program, will do so."

National Farm Safety Week is July 19-25.

Although household uses consumed about 11,000 bales less in 1958 than in 1957, cotton's share of the market remained at 50 per cent in both years. Cotton consumption decreased more in industrial markets than in the other two major classifications, but its competitive share in industrial uses rose from 25 per cent to 26 per cent between the two years.

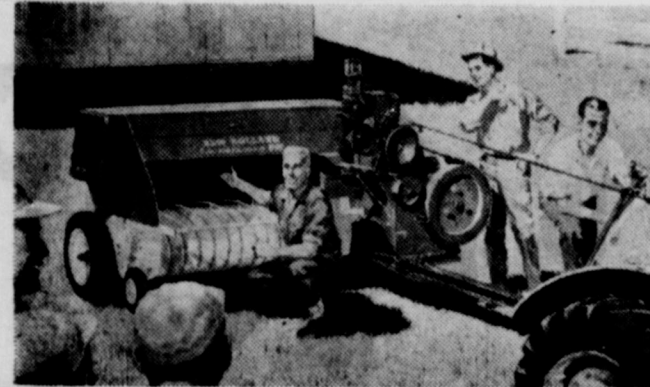

For the second year in a row, men's and boys' trousers occupied the number one spot among the largest end uses of cotton in 1958.

Preliminary consumption figures for 1958, compiled by the National Cotton Council's market research section, show the production of men's and boys' trousers consumed more cotton than any other end use, accounting for 723,000 bales.

The 1959 edition of "Cotton Counts Its Customers" reveals the next four largest end uses in order were: men's boys shirts, 620,000 bales; sheets, 485,000 bales; towels and towelings, 372,000 bales; and drapery and upholstery fabrics, 347,000 bales.

Cotton scored competitive gains during 1958 in apparel and industrial uses and maintained its pre-

Now Is The Time To Start Preparing For School Year

"School days, school days. Good ol' golden rule days." Here they come again, and if you're a wise parent you'll get ready ahead of time.

There is lots to do—buy clothes, fit shoes—and if your child is entering the first grade, chances are you need a birth certificate copy.

School districts in Texas require that entering students be six years old before September 1. Otherwise they must wait until the following year.

The best means of proving your

child's age and birth date is to have a certified copy of his birth certificate.

In many areas of Texas, copies are available from local registrars of vital statistics in health departments or county court houses.

You may also obtain a birth certificate copy from the Division of Vital Statistics of the Texas Department of Health in Austin.

To do so, you must send one dollar requesting a copy. Be sure to include the child's name, date and place of birth and the parent's name.

It is important that parents take care of this chore as early as possible.

During August and September the Division of Vital Statistics is

swamped with literally thousands of requests each week for birth certificate copies.

If you want to be sure your child has his birth certificate when school starts, request it now.

Rough estimates place the number of upcoming first graders at about 250,000. That makes for a lot of birth certificate copies.

In addition to birth certificates, it would be wise to check with your school district regarding any vaccinations that may be required.

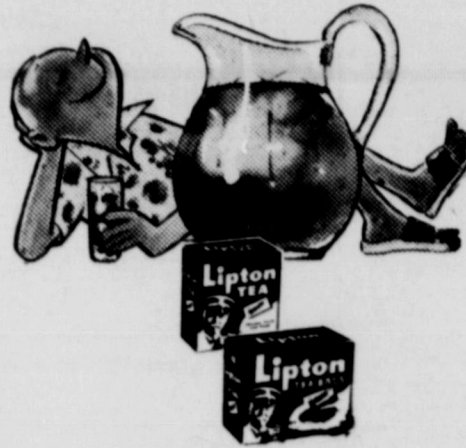
It would be a good idea—if you have not already done so—to get your child started on his series of three Salk polio shots before school starts.

Also, a fourth shot or "booster" is generally recommended for added protection a minimum of one year after the initial series.

Another smart idea that will pay off, is adjusting your child's schedule to approximate that of school time including bedtime, meals and especially waking time.

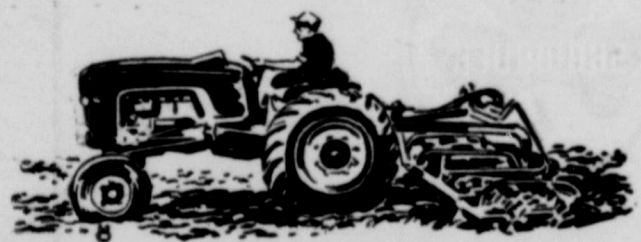
