Nathan Hale didn't sign the Declaration of Independence but he was a 21-year old Connecticut school-teacher, commissioned in the Continental Army who volunteered for an espionage mission behind British lines in 1776.

Disguised as a Dutch school-teacher, he was captured attempting to return to the American side, and condemned to death. As he stood on the gallows, his reputed last words were, "I only regret that I have only one life to lose for my country." (See reader's Digest 1970 Almanac and Yearbook, page, 115.)

This is a far cry from some 21-year olds today who have fled to Canada to avoid the military draft. Nations are not built with the strength of cowards. Neither do they endure.

The last sentence in the Declaration of Independence says: "And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the Protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other

Our Lives, our Fortunes and Our sacred Honor."

These men depended upon God in new venture of freedom and liberty.

This 4th of July let us renew this dependence upon God to see us through these troubled times. Let us realize that our existence as a nation is threatened. There are forces at work in our country dedicated to our destruction. If we turn coward and run they will win.

With our feet firm in God let us courageously stand and fight for this country on all fronts. The American form of government is not perfect. However, I don't know any other form in existence today that I am ready to trade for it.

July 4th is indeed a time of celebration. Let us not get caught up in the noise of things and forget what we are celebrating.

A new business in Olton, C & S Cleaning is owned by Ben Cates and Andy Stroebel. They clean all types of surfaced floors and wax them to a beautiful shine.

Carpets are also cleaned and look like new when they finish their last step of cleaning on them.

First step of really clean floors is removing all old wax. This is done with a heavy duty machine that dispenses cleaner and water mixture and brushes that rotate to lift the old wax and dirt from the surface of the floor. Coming behind the scrubbing machine is a vacuum cleaner which "sucks up" all the dirty water leaving the floor almost completely dry.

Then the old cotton mop is next on the scene. Clear water rinse with the mop is the last step before the wax goes on. Cates and Stroebel use a non-scut self-polishing wax that shines like a "new dollar."

In cleaning, there is not a piece of furniture that is not moved from its original place and the floors are completely cleaned EVERYWHERE then the furniture is restored to its natural position.

Carpet cleaning is just as thorough, with all furniture being moved; then the carpet is vacuumed; a machine with a different type brush is used on the carpet, rather than the rotary type. The carpet cleaner brushes roll forward brushing up the pile and at the same time putting a layer of foam on the carpet which is designed to lift the dirt from the carpet.

Then the vacuum is brought in for the final touch, lifting all the dirty foam from the rug and leaving it almost completely dry. After a few hours, a regular vacuum is run over the carpets and the furniture is replaced.

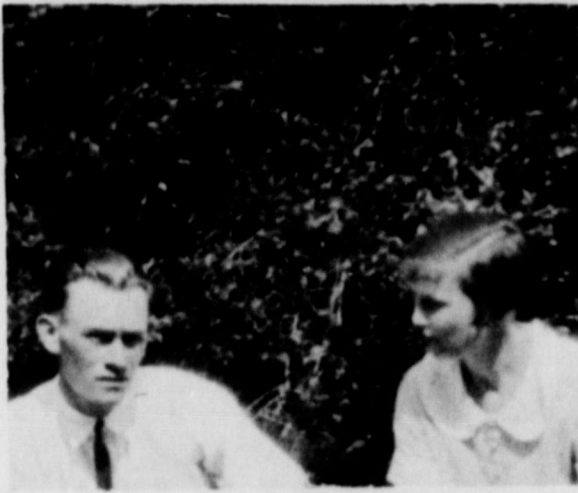
Anglins Observe 50th Anniversary

FLAG ETIQUETTE

FLY IT PROUDLY JULY 4TH

When flag is flown from window sill, the Union should go to the peak unless the flag is at half staff.
