A school board election will be

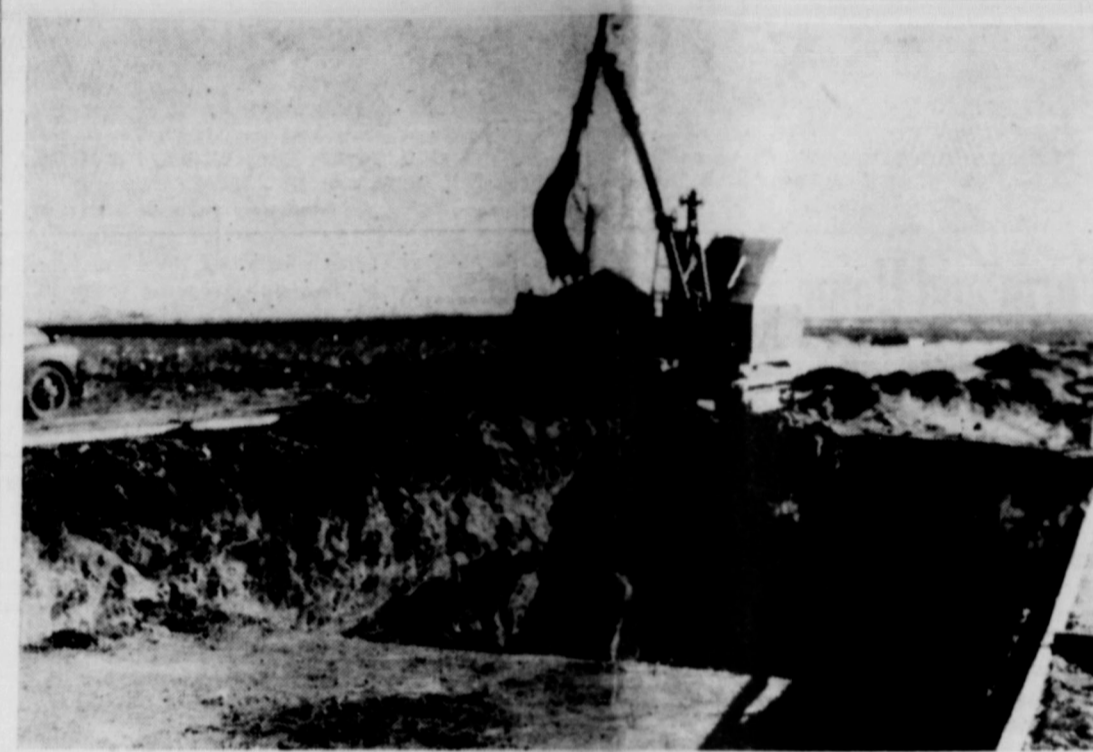
held April 4 to elect two trustees to fill the vacancies created by expiration of the terms of Guy F. Kelley and Mrs. Beattie Welch.

## 'Whatsit', Shook Earth Tuesday

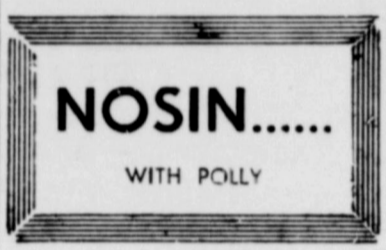
What on Earth shook Earth at 2:06 p.m. Tuesday?

ORDINANCE NO. 18  
AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF SPRINGLAKE, TEXAS, GOVERNING THE LOCATION OF CESS POOLS AND SEPTIC TANKS WITHIN THE TOWN OF SPRINGLAKE, TEXAS, PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF ITS PROVISIONS, AND PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF SPRINGLAKE, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: From and after the passage of this Ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to locate, dig, place, install, or cause to be located, placed or installed, any cess pool or septic tank in the town of Springlake, Texas, within one hundred (100) feet of any existing water well and within one hundred fifty (150) feet of any water well owned and used by the Town of Springlake, Texas, for or in connection with its municipal water system.

SECTION 2 PENALTY. Any person, firm, or corporation, violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). If such violation is committed or permitted to continue it shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such.

SECTION 3. ENFORCEMENT. In addition to the penalties above provided, any person, firm or corporation within the town of Springlake, Texas, and any of its officers or employees is hereby given the right, power or authority to enforce this Ordinance by any and all legal and equitable means and remedies.

SECTION 4. SEPARABILITY. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

SECTION 5. EMERGENCY. The fact that some persons, firms, or corporations may be contemplating digging, installing, or placing cess pools or septic tanks closer than one hundred feet to existing water wells within the Town of Springlake, Texas, thereby possibly causing the pollution and contamination of said wells which would seriously affect the health and welfare of the inhabit-

ants of the Town of Springlake, Texas, creates an emergency necessitating the elimination of the requirement of this Ordinance being read more than one time prior to its taking effect and it is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, which shall be in full force and effect immediately from and after the date of its passage.

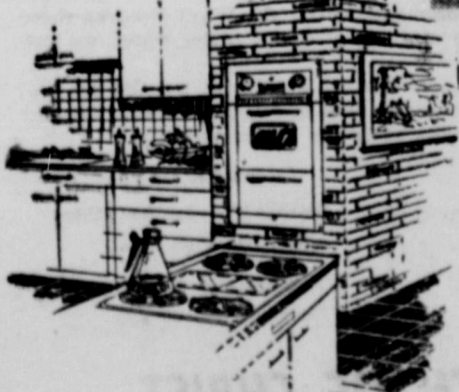

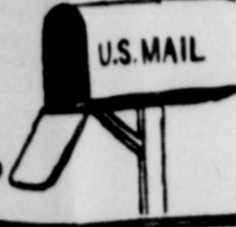

## Cotton Farmers To Make Choice By March 16 Deadline

The next important date for upland cotton producers is the March 16 deadline for making a choice between the (A) allotment and the (B) allotment for their farms, according to D. C. Terrell, chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee. All cotton farm operators have been sent a notice of the price support levels and a reminder of the (A) and (B) allotments for their farms.

D. C. Terrell urged all cotton farmers to make their choice of cotton allotment by the deadline on March 16. After that date all farms on which the operator has not made that choice will have the (A) allotment in effect for 1959. This is a requirement of the law and cannot be changed by the County ASC Committee.

Choice (A) farm allotments are the regular allotments. Choice (B) farm allotments are 40 per cent larger than the Choice (A) allotments.

Another requirement is that a farm operator who has more than one farm must choose either the (A) cotton allotment for all the farms he operates or the (B) allotment for all his farms. Mr. Terrell suggests that an operator who has an interest in other farms because of leasing, operating, partnership estate, or other operating arrangements should check with the County ASC office to determine his status on all the farms.

## CDEC Offers Best Pre-Emergence Weed Control In Onions

COLLEGE STATION — Among ten herbicides evaluated for pre-emergence weed control in onions, CDEC gave the best results and neither damaged the crop nor reduced yield, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reports.

Satisfactory control of pigweed and watergrass without damage to the crop was obtained by using three pounds of CDEC in 40 gallons of water per acre. Weeds were effectively controlled by six pounds of CDEC in 40 gallons of water per acre, but while this treatment did not damage the onions or reduce yields on the basis of weight, the stand was somewhat decreased.

Planting experiments were conducted in Laredo silty clay loam and Victoria fine sandy loam at Weslaco, Texas, in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Experiments indicated that practical weed control treatment at 6 to 8 weeks after planting fall-seeded onions is the best way to reduce the expense of handweeding the Texas crop, produced each year on about 50,000 acres.

The research showed that substituted-urea compounds - monuron, diuron and neburon - were not practical for controlling weeds in onions. Monuron and diuron greatly reduced yields when applied at rates required for effective weed control and neburon was extremely toxic to onions.

Applications of CIPC, EPIC or CDAA failed to control pigweed, the predominate weed in all these experiments. Little injury to onions was caused by CIPC, which has effectively controlled annual grasses in other experiments. A combination of CIPC and CDEC could be a valuable pre-emergence treatment when pigweed and annual grasses infest onion plantings. Little promise from pre-emergence weed control in onions was shown by 3Y9, CDT or 3,4-DMB because they reduced yields.

## Cotton Root Rot Poses Threat To Ornamentals

COLLEGE STATION — Ornamentals are a favorite of cotton root rot and the disease troubled many Texas homeowners last year. Now is the time to begin planning a control program to combat the disease and reduce damage this year, advises Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist.

It is one of the most common plant diseases in Texas and is found in all areas except the Panhandle and High Plains, points out Smith. It is most common in heavy, alkaline soils.

"People building or buying new homes seem to be troubled most by the disease," Smith said. "This is due to two factors. First, they often build on an old cotton field where the disease fungus is present. Secondly, people move from other states onto infested soil and plant species that were their favorite in the other state. These species often susceptible to root rot."

Ornamental plants affected by the disease die suddenly. Small plants often die within a few days after the first wilting while larger trees may die more slowly. The root system of affected plants decays and small plants can be pulled from the soil with little effort. The bark on the roots is decayed and brownish, woolly strands of fungus frequently can be seen on root surfaces.

Under moist conditions, spore mats sometimes appear on the soil surfaces. These mats may range from 2 to 12 inches in diameter and first are white and cottony. They later become tan and powdery.

The disease seldom can be cured after it attacks, says Smith. It is combatted by growing resistant or immune plants, drying - out and acidifying the soil and by certain cultural practices. For a list of resistant plants as well as advice on cultural practices, he suggests that a copy of L-390, "Cotton Root Rot," be obtained from local county agents or the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

## FARM TERRACING TO TOTAL APPROXIMATELY 100 MILES

Terracing construction under the Great Plains Conservation Program is getting underway in a big way in Lamb County this spring. L. C. Grissom whose farm is five miles southwest of Littlefield recently completed 54,522 feet of terraces. A terrace system has recently been completed on the Robert Coen farm west of Littlefield. Other land owner and operators who plan to construct terraces this year are as follows: Anton Demel, Leonard and Fred Albus, A. H. and J. G. Jungman, Jim Golding and J.

R. Silham, who farm near Pep; Johnnie Haberer of Earth; Clois Foust, Frank Lehman, Edwin Coffman, L. C. Hewitt, E. A. Fowler, and W. H. Cunningham, who live or farm near Littlefield; Paul Matthews, Ves Terry, Chester Harvey and A. A. Pinkerton of Sudan and B. L. Greener of Amherst. Terracing planned this year on the above farms total about 100 miles.

Terracing has proven to be one of the primary conservation tools for soil and water conservation and increased production. Level closed in terraces are designed to hold water on the land where it

falls and prevent runoff, washing and gulling. Not only does this practice conserve valuable topsoil, but makes more effective use of rainfall and in turn increase in crop production. Landowners and operators in the area who are interested in developing a good sound conservation plan on their farms with Federal Cost Share provided under the Great Plains Conservation program are urged to contact the local soil conservation service assisting the Lamb County Soil Conservation District Offices located in the basement of the Court House in Littlefield.



# Adventures in ADVERTISING

## THE FANTASTIC STORY of MUSA-SHIYA THE SHIRTMAKER

(Also Sometimes Drygoods Selling)



If the shipping department of a factory had not made an error, the world would never have known of Musa-shiya the Shirtmaker and the most astounding advertising campaign in history would never have been launched.

Following World War I an English textile factory was getting back on a peacetime basis. In error it sent a full five year backorder of shirting material to Musa-shiya, a Japanese shirtmaker who operated a small shop in Honolulu. Business was poor and Musa-shiya was near bankruptcy, when the customs office informed him that certain bales of cloth and a fat bill for duties awaited his pleasure at the port of Honolulu.

When the little shirtmaker realized what had descended upon him, he asked for time and went into the silence for purpose of mental refreshment. Remembering a friend in a big mercantile establishment, he hid himself there and sought counsel. How in the name of the horned prophet of evil was he ever to get rid of all that English shirting? And in the meantime where was he to put it? His little box of a shop wouldn't hold one bale.

"You'll have to advertise," advised his friend. "Leave it to me. I'll have our advertising agents help you out."

This merely compounded the little Japanese shirtmaker's troubles. Advertising to him was an uncharted sea. The advertising agent called on Musa-shiya and suggested \$300 as a modest starter. "Too-o-o much. Maybe I think thirty dollar plenty," said the shirtmaker. He was told that wouldn't even get him in print. The agent explained the costs of various advertisements and finally Musa-shiya agreed to say the plot and what was destined to be the most astounding and far reaching campaign in the history of advertising was launched.

Two column by five inch ads then started appearing regularly in the Saturday Honolulu Star-Bulletin. The ads were written just the way Musa-shiya talked—in colorful pidgen English which is used throughout the Orient. Here is an example of one of Musa-shiya's ads:

"Well here come storek again—but Musa-shiya, the shirtmaker, is able prepare. Wonderful accumulation of baby things in dry goods selling corner of Musa shop. Everything for the baby—especially diaper, pensive of storek, which find most easily, many persons not finding little shop of Musa-shiya the shirtmaker in King Street, Makai side, between fish market and river."

Tourists started sending copies of Musa-shiya's ads to their friends in many countries. Soon Musa-shiya was receiving orders from all over the world as well as doing a thriving business in Hawaii.

And that is the story of how a well planned, small advertising campaign made an unknown Japanese shirtmaker not only wealthy but world famous.

Your local newspaper doesn't promise to duplicate this story for its advertisers, but it does take your sales message into the homes of your customers whose full and careful consideration is given your suggestions. Who knows, perhaps you too can be a Musa-shiya.

Any person, natural or artificial, who installs, erects, constructs or builds a butane or gasoline storage facility or facilities above ground or additional butane or gasoline storage facility or facilities, within the City Limits of the City of Earth, Lamb County, Texas, in violation of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00 for each offense, and each and every day of failure or refusal to comply with this ordinance shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

No such work or construction for which a building permit is hereinabove required, shall be commenced or continued by any person or persons, natural or artificial, within the City Limits of the City of Earth, Lamb County, Texas, without first obtaining said building permit, and any person or persons who shall start or continue work or construction of any description for which a building permit is required herein, without first obtaining such building permit as required by this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and punished by a fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00 for each offense, and each and every day of failure or refusal to comply with this ordinance shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

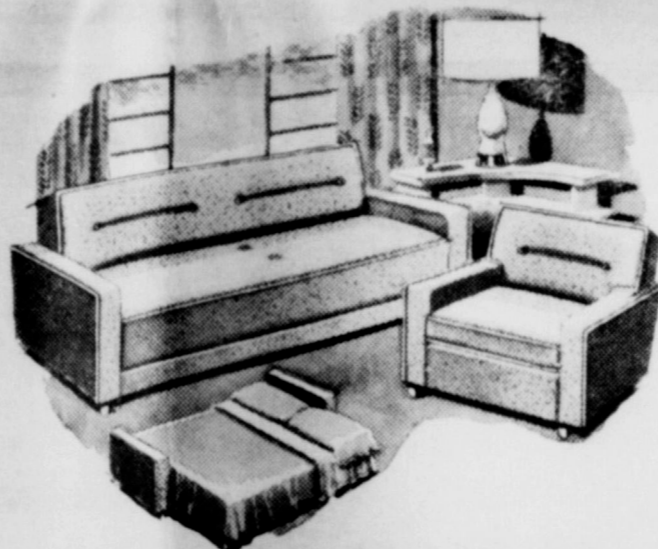

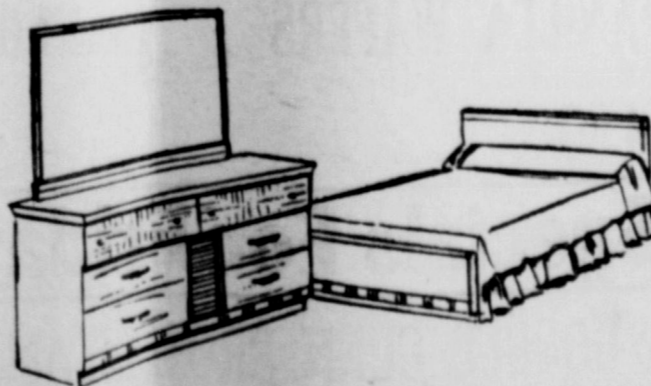

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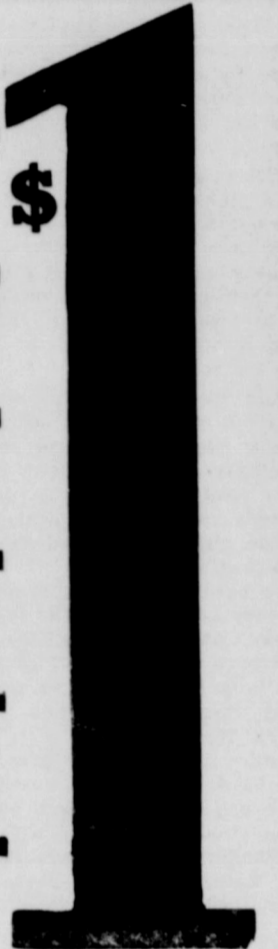
