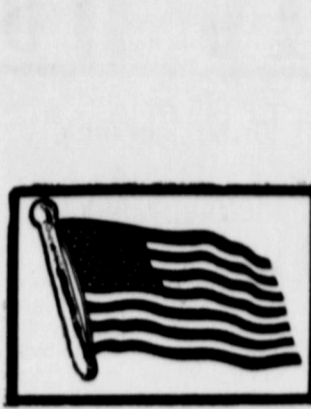

Why Can't We Get Results?

Last weeks cluttered back alley seemed to touch off a rambling within the city limits, with residents proclaiming, "We pay, why can't we get results?"

Residents declared the major reason the city alleys become cluttered in the first place was a direct result of the sluggish and neglectful way in which the city trash hauling has been done for the past year or so.

Residents throughout various parts of the city chimed their grievances against the poor city sanitation service and commending their trash was not hauled off, even though they were billed \$24 annually for this service.

Consensus of the opinions are "Residents would not resent the monthly \$2 added to their water bill, nearly as much IF THEY COULD GET WHAT THEY PAY FOR."

Comments such as "It has been months since my trash barrels have been completely emptied," were plentiful, coupled with, "No matter how neatly we pile rubbish beside our trash barrels, it is never hauled away, even if we leave it there month after month."

This poor sanitation situation is not by any means a new grievance, it has been sadly neglected for many months. These conditions must be cleaned up before the hot summer months ahead bring flies and mosquitoes galore.

SATURDAY IS ELECTION DAY



THESE COUNTY CANDIDATES spoke at the old fashioned candidate speaking and supper at the Pleasant Valley Community Building. Shown left to right are Bill Jefferies, Tax-assessor collector candidate, Loy Dalton, and V. L. Smith, Jr., seeking the sheriff's post, incumbent tax-assessor collector candidate, Herbert Dunn, and another sheriff candidate, W. D. "Dick" Ratliff. Incumbent Dick Dyer, who is a candidate for the re-election was unable to be present for the speaking, due to being out of town in the line of duty.

Earth-Springlake and the surrounding area will be visited by a number of candidates, within the next couple of days, in a last minute appeal for votes in Saturdays Democratic and Republican primaries.

Of Paramount interest in the county election is the four man race for sheriff with three opponents seeking incumbent Dick Dyer's post. Those seeking this post are V. L. Smith, Jr. of Earth, Loy Dalton and W. D. "Dick" Ratliff of Littlefield.

Tremendous interest has been shown in the county tax-assessor Collectors office with Bill Jefferies campaigning to upset his opponent, Herbert Dunn, who seeks re-election.

In the state races, the biggest of these on the Democratic ticket are for governor and United States Senator, followed closely by races in Railroad Commissioner, Land Commissioner and Commissioner of Agriculture and the U.S. Representative at large.

Republicans are witnessing their most active intraparty race in recent history, with four candidates on the U.S. Senate post. Also stirring up increased tempo on the Republican ticket is a vote on Texas preference for the GOP presidential nominee.

The lamb county ballot will have four choices including, Barry M. Goldwater, Nelson Rockefeller, Margaret Chase Smith and Harold Stassen.

The GOP primary, the party's first full scale one since the post Civil War period, is expected to draw many Texas voters who in recent years have voted in the Democratic primaries, but supported Republican candidates in the fall general election.

In Lamb County this may lighten the usual Democratic vote by several hundred.

Voters who participate in either primary will have the poll tax receipt stamped either Democrat or Republican, when their ballot is cast. This will identify them for the runoff election in June and prevent any possible cross over between parties in Primary voting.

The county has prospects for a second primary election in the 4 man race for Sheriff and a possible runoff in some of the state races.

Taking into Consideration, both the Democrats and Republicans have a full ticket, the voting is expected to run high in the Lamb county primaries.

In preparation for the big national show in September, the election for a president of the United States.

For United States Representative at large, Bob Looney, Joe Pool, Robert W. Baker, Bill Elkins, Dan Sullivan and republican Bill Hayes.

Incumbent George Mahan, U.S. Representative, 19th Congressional District has Republican opponent Joe B. Phillips.

For commissioner of Agriculture John C. White, Millard Shivers and Republican John B. Armstrong.

For commissioner of the general land office, Jarry Sadler, Fred H. Williams and Republican candidate John A. Matthews.

For Comptroller of Public accounts, Robert S. Calvert against republican Dallas Calmes Jr.

Incumbents State Treasurer Jesse James has republican opponent, Fred S. Neumann.

For railroad commissioner incumbent Ben Ramsey, Jim C. Langdon, unexpired term, Jesse Owens, and republican Don Flanagan.

'63 Sets Record For Highway Fatalities in Nation

Once again in 1963, young drivers had the worst safety record of any age group, according to a report by the Travelers Insurance Company. The report, issued annually since 1931 except during the war years, is compiled by the Travelers from information provided by state motor vehicle departments.

A Travelers spokesman pointed out that drivers under 25 years of age comprise only about 15 percent of all licensed drivers in the United States, in spite of which, 15,400 (or more than 29 percent) of the drivers involved in fatal accidents in 1963 were under 25 years of age. This represented no significant change in performance, since this same age group accounted for 28.9 percent of all highway deaths in 1962.

The Travelers report shows that young men and women under 25 were also involved in a great number of non-fatal highway mishaps. In 1963 the percentage was 26.1 as compared

with 27.3 percent in 1962.

Our senior citizens—drivers 65 years of age and over—also made a poor showing. In fact these older drivers were involved in 8.1 percent of the total number of fatal accidents in 1963 as against only 6 percent in 1962.

The performance record of the largest age-group (drivers from 25 to 64 years of age) improved slightly from involvement in 65.1 percent of the fatal accidents in 1962 to only 62.8 percent in 1963, thus contributing the only bright spot in an otherwise grim picture.

In 1963 the nation's highway carnage exceeded the grim figure of 39,969 persons killed in 1941—a record high which stood for twenty years—and even surpassed the new record of 40,500 deaths established in 1962, according to a report released by the Travelers Insurance Companies.

The number of people injured in traffic accidents also continued its relentless upward trend.

The authoritative report, first issued in 1931, is prepared annually by the Travelers and is based on information provided

by state motor vehicle departments. More than 3,500,000 copies are distributed every year. U.S. Highway deaths in 1963 totaled 42,700—an all-time high representing a 5 1/2 percent increase over 1962.

The report also reveals a 3 1/2 percent jump in the number of injured in 1963 as compared with 1962. In all, 3,460,000 men, women and children were hurt in auto accidents last year.

"Even though the exact figures vary from year to year, a Travelers spokesman commented, "the same tragic formula holds true in more than eight out of every ten auto casualties—too much carelessness behind the wheel, and too little regard for the safety of others."

Excessive speed again led other factors as the single greatest cause of street and highway accidents. More than 14,000 persons were killed and more than 1,223,000 were injured as a direct result of speeding violations. Other major causes of accidents included failure to yield the right-of-way and driving on the wrong side of the road.

Candidates Speak At P. V. Friday Night

An old fashioned candidate speaking and buffet dinner was held Friday night in the Pleasant Valley Community Building. Several county candidates and one state candidate were on hand and briefed the eager attendance on their capabilities and qualifications for the various sought after posts.

Bill Hayes, Republican candidate for Congressman-at-large was the first speaker of the evening. He closed his remarks by commenting on Communists, saying there was no such thing as a good communist, they were atheists.

Dick Ratliff followed by briefing the audience on his qualifications for Sheriff's post and saying he would work with every one elected, regardless of race, color or creed.

Loy Dalton, a second candidate for Sheriff asked for the vote in the forthcoming primary and said if elected, he would work with everyone, "fair and square."

V. L. Smith Jr., gave a brief review of his 7 years experience in law enforcement in Lamb County and assured the audience if elected he would enforce the law justly without partiality.

Representative Bill Clayton, gave the public a review of what the Texas legislature had accomplished in the past session. He distributed a pamphlet showing how the state attained its financing and how the money is used. The remainder of his time was used in a question and answer period. Other officials who spoke were Curtis Willkinson, County Attorney, Henry Lewis, County Commissioner, Pat Boone, district judge, J. B. Davis, county judge, Charley Jones, County Treasurer, and Mrs. Jean Lovelady candidate for tax-assessor of Bailey County.

A leading Lubbock department store executive stated, "The development is a major advance over competing wash and wear fabrics now on the market and we are highly pleased on both the sales potential of these trousers as well as its significance to our cotton based economy. In our own quality tests before purchasing these slacks, we were unable to remove the crease, even by holding it under a steam press."

H. L. King, Chairman of TFB Field Crops Committee said, "The man and boys pants market is cotton's largest in volume. Yet it has been under severe threat from synthetic fibers and losses have occurred in recent years. This gives us a new competitive advantage and means that we will be producing and selling many bales of cotton that would not have been possible otherwise."

Bank Call Issued For April 15

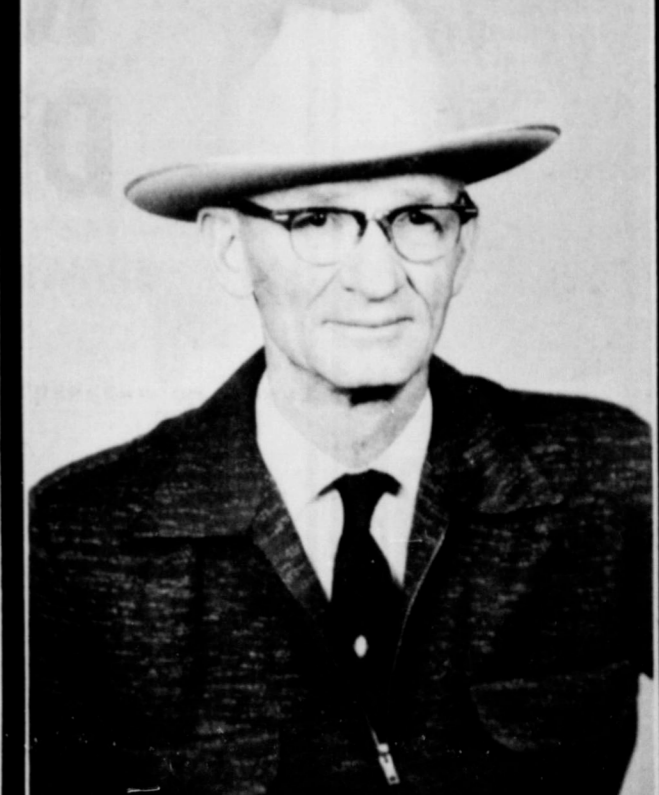

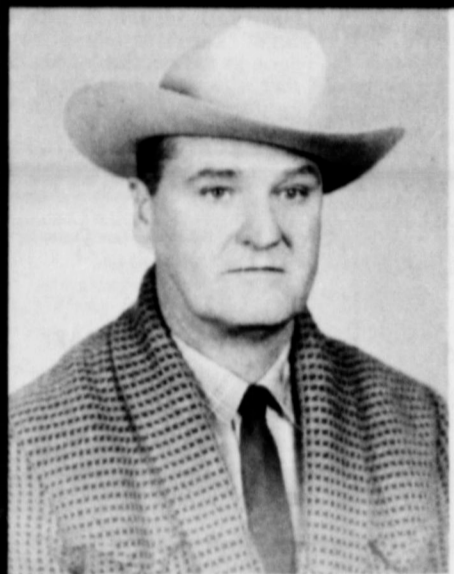
