Mrs. Bird Skipper has pneumonia again but is being treated in the Rest Home instead of being admitted to the hospital at the present time.



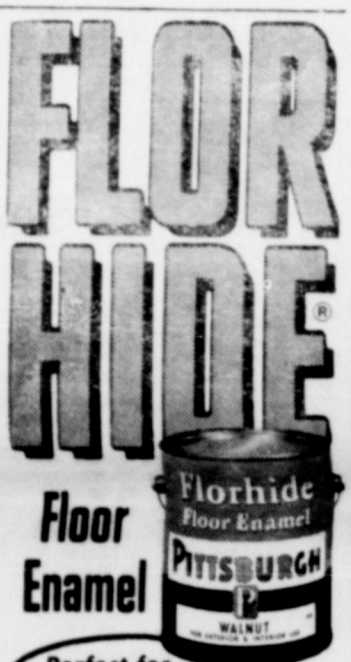
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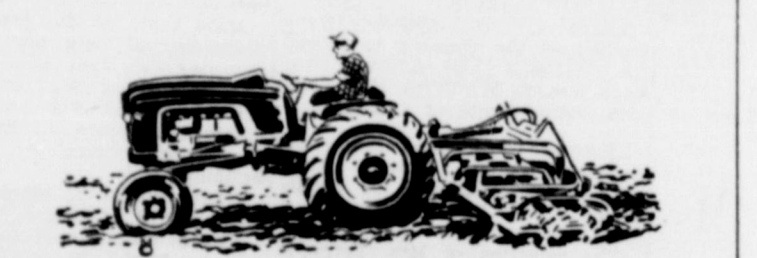


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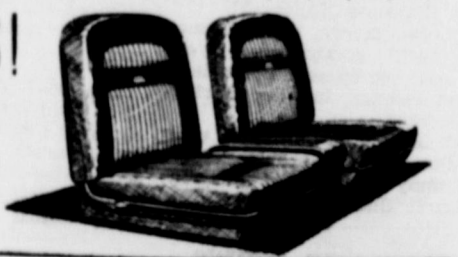
