Community Action Now Has Funds For Energy Bills

The South Plains Community Action Association, Inc. announced Friday morning the receipt of energy crisis program funds to assist the truly needy in Bailey County.

Wheat producers will be allowed to use the pesticide until May 31, 1990, Hightower said. TDA asked EPA for the special use of Lorsban on the Texas wheat crop on February 8.

Use of Lorsban, a trade name for the pesticide chlorpyrifos, is illegal on wheat in Texas without authorization from EPA.

EPA authorizes emergency pesticide exemptions when a state can prove that certain extraordinary conditions exist, such as if no other effective

Spinal Tests Scheduled For Students

The Legislature passed a law in 1985 that requires all sixth and ninth grade students to be screened for spinal deformities.

Early detection of abnormal spinal curvature can prevent serious health problems, say the Health Nurses for the Muleshoe Independent School District.

This is a problem that may begin during the early adolescent years, from 10-14 years of age. Curves that are detected early may only require periodic observation by a specialist. Moderate curves may require wearing of a vised by an orthopedic specialist. In most cases, the need for major

Spinal screening for Watson Junior High sixth grade has been scheduled for Thursday, March

Screening for Muleshoe High School ninth grade has been scheduled for Thursday, March

The school nurses say children will be screened for two types of spinal deformities: scoliosis and kyphosis. Scoliosis is a condition in which the spine is twisted, causing misalignment of the upper body or lower back. This condition can worsen and lead to complications of the heart and lungs. Kyphosis is a type of spinal deformity in which the upper spine shows a pronounced curve. This condition is also referred to as "round back" and can be corrected if detected

to growers.

"The Russian Wheat Aphid caused an estimated \$30 million in damage to the 1988 Texas wheat crop and more than \$100 million to wheat crops nationwide," Hightower said. "TDA worked with EPA to get a crisis exemption for the 1989 crop year, but because of an untimely drought followed by severe freezes, we can't really assess the impact of either the aphid or the pesticide on the most recent crop year.

"The best estimates for the 1990 crop year are that without the use of Lorsban, the Russian Wheat Aphid could cost the Texas economy in the neighborhood of \$140 million.

"Since the intiial outbreak of the Russian Wheat Aphid near Muleshoe in 1986, the pest has spread to more than a million acres in 84 counties in Texas," Hightower said.





southeast province of Spain on the Mediterranean Coast. After studying the Spanish model, the two men decided they could build a better one in Texas. The greenhouse will be built to

adapt to the climate of Muleshoe,

which is similar to that in

Almeria, Spain, but not as mild

and is much drier. Schmidt and Clikeman then modeled a greenhouse to test the data. In order to get a more accurate picture, they constructed a greenhouse with a computer model substituting ordinary produce for specialty produce. Schmidt said, "We will focus on growing off-season and hard-toget specialty produce, which brings a higher price." Schmidt also said they do not want to focus just on the Texas market, but on long distance markets. They hope to have their own fleet of trucks that will be able to haul the produce as quickly as possible to insure the best quality.

Both Clikeman and Schmidt stressed the fact that their company is not here to compete with farmers in open field crops.

"We want to have good relations and help from farmers, rather than be a competitor," said Schmidt. Schmidt also stated the need to find a place that would welcome them and their company, and Muleshoe fulfilled that need. As a result, Clikeman and Schmidt have already leased homes in Muleshoe and plan to call it home.

The greenhouse will be located just south of Muleshoe on the Sandarosa Water Field on an 80-acre tract of land. The greenhouse is expected to be completed in three phases. Phase One will cover a total of 20.98 acres, with five enclosed for growing areas. During this phase, the greenhouse must have a good production facility and satisfy the need for the product.

Phase Two will cover a total of 40.61 acres with 15 enclosed for growing, and Phase Three will cover a total of 72.73 acres with 30 enclosed areas used for growing. At this phase, there will be 36 units and two service areas. The three phases are expected to happen in one year intervals, with construction taking place March through May. The company is aiming for the month of June to begin planting.

The greenhouse itself, will not be just an ordinary one, but a highly sophisticated and controlled area. Fresh air will be continuously filtered through, with fans that will circulate the air. There will be a very strict screening of people entering, and workers must be very clean and organized in order to keep insects out and conditions sterile. The greenhouse must have a good concrete surface and be perfectly level in order for the technical drip irrigation system to operate correctly. The company will also be able to grow two types of simultaneously, vegetables which will create more variety.

Both Schmidt and Clikeman said they chose Muleshoe for a number of reasons, among them, the light. They stated that more sunshine reaches the surface of West Texas, and this, in turn, promotes growth. They also chose Muleshoe because of its

good water, sandy soil and relative low humidity.

'Another factor, especially for the people of Muleshoe, is the availability of a good labor force. Muleshoe has many skilled people that we can use and we won't be in competition with other major companies," said Schmidt.

The employees will require much ongoing training with many positions that will be self-managing. Schmidt said Almeria Inc. will offer workers above average base pay and a good health plan.

"Most of all, we just want our

workers to be happy," he said. When all three phases are completed, Almeria Inc. hopes to offer Muleshoe about 250 jobs with another 240 jobs directly influencing the company.

The greenhouse hopes to use all available light, thus promoting growth in the winter and on cloudy days. Schmidt also feels that West Texas' strong winds will not be a problem to the greenhouse.

"The winds will not tear the greenhouse because of it's lowness to the ground, and because of the type of panels that will be used," he said.

The company hopes to be in production year-round in order to get the highest profit from off-season produce. The soil temperature is expected to be kept about 70 degrees, and they don't expect it to change much during the various seasons.

Almeria Inc. expects to grow 15 to 20 different crops at the same time once all phases are completed, making the crop selection market oriented. Clikeman said, "In planting many different crops, we can test them to see how well they sell. By only planting a small amount of various crops, we won't be stuck with a huge volume if they do not sell."

When all three phases are completed and production started, Almeria Inc. hopes to bring economic growth and jobs to Muleshoe. Schmidt said that the Depts. of Commerce and Agriculture have expressed interest and support in this area and this, in turn, could result in many more advances for the Muleshoe

CRP Requires Weed Control In Contracts By: Rodney Duus, S.C.

Participants with land in the Conservation Reserve Program should be thinking about weed controls for their contracts. Those contracts with a good stand of grass, probably will not

need a weed control. Contracts that have a weak stand of grass or that had a weed problem last year will probably need weed controls this year to aid in the establishment of the grass.

Weeds compete with grass for nutrients and water, which retards the growth of the grass. Weeds not controlled during the growing season are killed by frost and can blow into adjoining fields

The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service also requested a number of restrictions, which EPA granted. The pesticide poses a potential danger to fish and birds and must not be used in proximity to water or roosting and foraging sites of wintering bald eagles.

Producers should contact their county Extension agent or the nearest TDA district office for specific restrictions.

The Russian Wheat Aphid primarily affects wheat crops in the High Plains, but crops in the Cross Timbers, Edwards Plateau and Trans-Pecos areas of Texas have also been affected.

The pesticide is available for use by certified or licensed applicators only.

causing economic damage to crops. Weeds increase the amount of time and labor required to harvest these crops, as well as, reducing the amount and quality of the crops harvested. Also, friendly relations with your neighbors could be lost if their crops are damaged by your lack of timely weed control,

Weed controls can be done by chemical or mechanical methods. Chemical control can be the most effective method, if the proper chemical is applied in accordance with label requirements under favorable climatic conditions. Producers are reminded that Bailey County is a regulated county. The best results with chemical control are achieved when weeds are two to four inches in height. This same principle applied to shredding also. If you shred when weeds are three to four feet tall, this is too late. Timing is of importance no matter which method of control is used.

Participants with land in the Conservation Reserve Program are responsible for controlling the weeds on their CRP acreage. When participants signed their contracts they agreed to maintain their CRP acreage (including needed weed controls) for the length of the contract. Participants should inspect their land and use good judgement in the

maintenance of the contract. If you have ony questions about weed control, come by the SCS office in Muleshoe at 105 F Ave. D or call 272-5124.

Ginners' Convention Focuses On Marketing

Ways cotton producers can achieve their goals of the '90s to gain higher yields, premium quality and greater profits will be outlined in a seminar April 5 during the annual trade show and convention of the Texas Cotton Ginners' Association in Lubbock. The convention annually draws more than 6,000 ginners, producers, officials and others in the industry.

The seminar will be conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service from 1:15 to 4:30 p.m. in the banquet hall of the Memorial Civic Center, site of the convention. It will conclude the 33rd annual meeting of Plains Cotton Growers, which is open to all interested persons.

The significance of marketing fiber quality will be explained in the opening presentation by Dr. Don Ethridge, professor of agricultural economics at Texas Tech University, Lubbock.

Beginning in 1991, the system for grading cotton will change and this will impact on the way cotton is marketed. Ethridge will show how producers can use the new rules to do a better job of marketing their crop.

The growth and development

of cotton, and how this relates to improved yield, quality and profit, will be reviewed by Stephanie Johnson Hake of Memphis, Tenn. A former county farm advisor for the California Cooperative Extension Service, she is a consultant to the University of California at Davis in development of a bulletin on cotton production.



In this part we will discuss credit histories and preventing credit problems.

YOUR CREDIT HISTORY Information on your credit worthiness is kept on file at a credit bureau. The credit bureau does not determine whether or not you will be granted credit. Its

Swine Producers Obtain Information On Insemination

Area swine producers can obtain practical information about artificial insemination of their herds at a seminar March 24 at the Texas Tech Livestock Arena.

The program, from 8 a.m. until 3 p.m., is being presented by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas University. The livestock arena is on Indiana Avenue just south of Brownfield Highway.

The use of artificial insemination in swine will be discussed by Gary Patterson, Parmer County extension agent. The detection of estrus in gilts and sows will be explained by Joe Tarter, Lazbuddie producer.

Stanley Harris, herdsman at the Tech farm, will cover the training of boars and collection of semen. Obtaining semen from boar studs for liquid or frozen storage will be the topic of Dr. James R. Clark, associate professor of animal science at

Techniques for inseminating gilts and sows with liquid or frozen semen will be shown. Evaluation of semen collected on the farm, and ways to extend semen collected on the farm, will be covered by Clark.

Additional information about the seminar may be obtained by telephoning Clark at (806) 742-2496, or from county agents of the Extension Service.

purpose is to collect information and provide it to creditors. It is the creditor's decision whether or not to give you credit. It is important that you keep your credit record in good standing and correct any misinformation. Because both good and bad information is recorded in your credit file, it is important for both partners to handle a joint account responsibly.

Don't apply for too many credit cards at once. Applications, as well as denials of credit, are kept in your credit file at a local credit bureau. If you are denied credit, find out why. You can attempt to

change the situation and reapply. Credit histories are important to have in both of your names. The Equal Credit Opportunity Act requires that information must be reported in both names when credit is joint. When you apply for credit, list both names on the application if you want joint credit. When filling out an application as a married couple, use first and last names. For example, use Carol Smith instead

of Mrs. John Smith. It is also a good idea to have credit in your own name. This will establish your credit worthiness using only the resources that you bring to the partnership. A woman who marries and changes her name needs to be sure that her credit file is updated. Provide updated information to both your creditors and the credit bureau.

CHECKING YOUR CREDIT FILE

The Fair Credit Reporting Act of 1971 allows you to see your credit file at no charge if you contact the credit bureau within 30 days of being denied credit. Even if you have not been denied credit, it is wise to occasionally check your credit file to be sure there are no errors. There will be a charge in this situation.

If you find an error and a creditor cannot verify the information, it must be delated from your file. If this misinformation has been reported to creditors within the last six months, they must be notified of the deletion. If you have a disagreement with information from a creditor, you can write a statement of 100 words or less that will be included in your file.

PREVENTING CREDIT PROBLEMS

Credit problems can occur due to a decrease in income, loss of income or going from two incomes to one. Problems can also come from taking on too much credit at once. To prevent problems, a general rule is to limit minimum monthly payments and installment payments to 20 percent of your monthly net income. It is even better to have no more than 15 to 17 percent as your target maximum.

If you own several credit cards, it can be easy to charge more than you can handle. There are danger signals of too much credit. They include:

-Total monthly payments keep

-You are at or near your credit limit

-You can only make minimum payments

-You extend payments -You use savings to pay bills -You work overtime to make

Before taking on new credit obligations, add up your current monthly payments to be sure that

you do not overextend yourself. There may be times when you cannot meet your credit obligations. If this happens contact the creditor, explain your situation and try to work out a new agreement. But don't ignore the problem. Think through your use of credit, control it and let it add



Walter Fronstin, district director of the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) office in Lubbock announced today that small business owners in several West Texas counties may be eligible to apply for Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDL).

"Small business concerns and small agricultural cooperatives located in Bailey, Cochran, Hockley, Lamb, Terry and Yoakum counties, and unable to secure credit from other sources, may qualify under SBA's EIDL program," Fronstin said. "Lea and Roosevelt Counties in New Mexico are also eligible for assistance because they are adjacent to the Texas declared counties."

The Secretary of Agriculture made a disaster designation for the Texas counties as a result of drought, hail, cool and wet weather, and freeze which occured January 1 through October 19, 1989. Businesses in these counties have until October 1, 1990 to submit applications to

The EIDL loan program is intended to assist agriculture-dependent businesses and small agriculture cooperatives who sustained a substantial decrease in sales (or other forms of economic injury) directly due to losses incurred by farmers and ranchers to whom the business usually sells. In some cases, this may include non-agriculture-related businesses which sustain a substantial economic loss directly due to the inability of the farmers affected by the disaster to purchase goods and services at their normal levels. Small businesses who suffered physical injuries due to the specified weather conditions are not eligible for SBA economic injury

This program is available only to businesses that are considered small by SBA size standards and do not have credit available elsewhere. The interest rate for eligible recipients of loans processed under this designation

is four percent. The loans are limited to the financial needs of the applicant based on the actual economic injury and may be made for up to \$500,000. A loan may extend to 30 years, depending on repayment ability.




