At the end of Public School as most of we parents visited school, we were reminded anew of the many demands placed on the lives of our teachers and in behalf of our teachers we print this "What Are Teachers."

WHAT IS A TEACHER

Teachers may be male or female and come in all sizes and shapes, but are always described as being slightly wizened, with thick glasses, and absent-minded.

A teacher has probably spent as many hours learning as teaching, is thought of as working short hours and correcting papers and making lesson plans for enjoyment during his off hours. He is never a man without a tie or a woman without stockings. His private life is the concern of a whole community.

A teacher is patient — gentle sternness — a pusher and producer — an always present member of the PTA — a father or mother to other peoples' children — even young of heart — is always logical — wield a jump rope, baseball bat, banded on a skinned knee, and can, consequently, locate the place God provided for it.

He is the greatest entertainer of all time, keeping the interested attention of a room full of wigglers, five days a week, nine months a year with competition from the great outdoors through an open window, a fly buzzing hysterically, mttaches on textbook pictures, daydreams, inkwells, and leaving the room.

A teacher's instruments of work are: chalk, gold stars, blackboards, red pencils, ruled paper, modeling clay, crayons, bulletin boards, bells, maps, questions and answers, fractions, puppets, May Queens and Christmas Angels, a ruler that doesn't measure inches, libraries, punctuation marks, desks, — and he has sharp ears and eyes in the back of his head.

Teachers like enough money to last through the summer, Saturdays and Sundays, old clothes, vacation time, pigtailed patches, rocess, freckles and dimples, the truth, an evening with nothing to do — and each class is the best they ever had.

The also dislike whispering, thumbtacks, sassiness, dirty fingernails, cheating, stuffy rooms, apple polishers, scribbling, "I Forgot," the first hour after lunch, gum, tardiness, the smell of worn-out tennis shoes and spit-wads.

A teacher has pledged the flag and sung the Star Spangled Banner more often than anyone — has an intimate knowledge of measles and dotting mothers — knows the cure for giggling and snuffing — believes that corners were made for standing in — never had a juvenile delinquent — and has a full and immediate understanding of the mere raising of one hand.

A teacher's New Year is September first and Christmas comes in June. He suffers a heartbreaking farewell at the end of each school year for the Johnnies and marns whose problems kept him awake nights. Then a bright new September dawns with rows of shining, confident faces that wait for the pilot to guide their lives through another year.

## Local Farm Couple Returns Home From Washington Trip

Mr. and Mrs. Ed Dawson of Rt. 1, Dimmitt, returned Sunday evening, March 12, from Washington, D. C., where they discussed farm legislation with Texas Senators and Congressmen and U. S. D. A. officials. They were sent as delegates from the Earth Farmers Union and accompanied 32 other Texans from many sections of the State on the 10-day bus trip. Their four day stay in Washington was about equally divided between sight-seeing and farm conferences.

Making similar bus trips the same week were delegates from Arkansas, Illinois and North Dakota. This gave each farm group good opportunity to learn the others' problems and enabled them to present a united appeal to the Department of Agriculture when all 130 delegates met with Under-Secretary True D. Morse and seven other department officials in a morning-long session last Tuesday. During the week that these delegates appealed to Agriculture officials for positive action to relieve the farm cost-price squeeze, 30 midwest Republican Congressmen unsuccessfully appealed to President Eisenhower, demanding the resignation of Secretary Benson.

The Texas delegates were cordially received the following two days by their Congressmen and Senators, Congressman George Mahon, 19th district, Walter Rogers, 18th district, the downstate congressman, and Senator Ralph Yarborough were especially anxious to hear the views of their constituents on pending farm legislation. Sam Rayburn, Speaker of the House, and Lyndon Johnson, Senate Majority Leader, assured the farm delegates they would make every effort to get the best possible farm bill through Congress, even though faced with a very probable presidential veto.

A number of proposals for cotton, grain sorghum, wheat, and milk legislation, both short-term and long-range programs, held the spotlight in agriculture committee hearings on Capitol Hill the week preceding the Texans visit. Other matters receiving support from Farmers Union representatives during the week were: endorsed proposals to raise the wheat support back to \$2.90 per

What is the biggest factor in juvenile delinquency?

Every person, adult or child, needs most of all a sense of his own significance, his own individuality. An adult wants to be recognized in his home, his church, or his club, or he loses interest.

#### Most Important in Youth

It is even more important for boys and girls to have a sense of their own significance. Failing to get it starts many on the road to delinquency—doing things to be considered "smart" — to be recognized by someone.

I have had many cases where I thought the main reason the boy was there was that he had been given no recognition as an individual. There had been a failure in the home to make him feel that he "belonged," was valued.

#### Always Something Good

There is always something to praise a child for — to make him feel important and wanted — even if he's unusually faulty ... always the chance to listen to him with interest and affection, to make him feel that he belongs, to give him the RIGHT KIND of attention, of affection, of KINDLY but FIRM DISCIPLINE and guidance.

That is what these youngsters need — to be wanted by somebody, to be important to their friends and parents, to have guide-posts in a puzzling world.



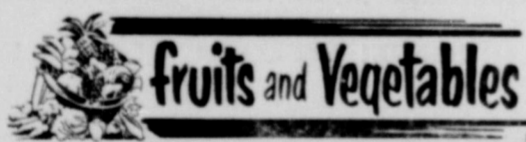
