Democratic Primary Election Slated For Saturday, May 7

With campaigns nearing an end and keen interest show in politics, Earth and Lamb County residents will go to the polls Saturday, May 7 to cast their votes in the Democratic Primary Election. Residents are qualified to vote by virtue of having paid their poll taxes or by reason of exemption from poll taxes.

A new law has been passed requiring voters to have their poll tax receipt, or exemption receipt with them at the polls before they are eligible to vote in the Democratic Primary Election. The

precinct judge will stamp the receipt in order that the holder will be eligible to vote in the precinct convention and County Convention.

The polling place in Earth will be at the Community Building, with polls opening at 7 a.m. and closing at 7 p.m.

O. B. Whitford will be election judge, assisted by L. T. Smith, L. Z. Anglin and Guy Kelley.

Springlake election will be held in the Community Building.

Election judge will be Jack Hinson, Clerks will be L. W. Watson, A. A. Parish and W. T. Clayton.

Pleasant Valley Community Building will be the voting place for those in that community.

North Sudan polling place will be the Jinx Denthome with Jinx Dent, election judge assisted by Mrs. Edna Dent.

City Voters Approve Water-Sewer Bonds

In the city election held Saturday, April 30, Earth voters approved by a margin of 19 votes a \$20,000 bond issue on water works and sewer system improvements.

A total of 123 votes were cast with seventy one votes favoring the passage of the bond issue and fifty two opposed.

The proposal included plans for \$15,000 in bonds for extension and improvement of the city's water system and an additional \$5,000 for sewer extension and improvement.

The election was called in a recent meeting of the City Council and approved a contract to L. J. Vaughn of Shallowater, in the amount of \$34,000 subject to the approval of the bond issue.

Work on the extension and improvements is scheduled to begin within the next two weeks, with approximately thirty working days required to complete the project.

At the regular monthly meeting of the City Council Monday night the votes cast in Saturday's bond election were canvassed.

The councilmen also gave the park committee, composed of Aris Barton, Bill Bryant and Dutch Been the authority to have soil put on the east side of the City Park and also to plant grass.

Present at the meeting were Mayor Marcus Messer, Weldon Barton, Pat McCord, Shorty Kelly, Abe Griffin, Dutch Been and City Secretary, Rubye Anderson, also Dunk Williamson City water superintendent.

Look Out Water Wasters, You'll Be Held Responsible

Lubbock — In a recent meeting of the Board of Directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District it was decided that a procedure would be adopted to strictly enforce the district's rules against waste of irrigation water.

The district has in the past approached the problems of waste from an educational standpoint preferring to present facts about the underground water and its efficient use rather than invoking more harsh and drastic methods. However, the willful and habitual waste of water by a minority of irrigators has become increasingly more serious. With the continued decline of the underground water level in the southern High Plains area coupled with increased public opinion against willful waste, the water district has come to the conclusion that the time is now upon us to supplement education with strict enforcement.

In the future, violators of the district's rules concerning waste will be notified that they have 24 hours in which to correct the situation and stop the waste. This does not mean that the district would want any farmer to stop irrigating, but only to put a halt to continued waste.

The notice will be delivered to the farm operator by a deputy sheriff, constable or by some other official person in the county where the waste has been observed.

At the end of the twenty-four-hour period, district personnel will check to see that the irrigation water is under control and is being retained and used on the land where it is produced.

Should the waste continue beyond the twenty-four-hour period granted to the violator by the district, then legal action will be taken through the courts to stop any further waste.

By far the large majority of area irrigators recognize that their underground water is one of the most precious of all resources, and they care for it as best they can; however a minority continue to promiscuously run water off their land into roadways, creating not only a situation described as waste in the rules of the water district but also a definite public nuisance and a hazard to human life.

The multitude of reasons why underground water should not be wasted have all been discussed in much detail through the newspapers and over the radio and television stations. All who are even remotely interested in conservation can explain why waste is detrimental to continued prosperity in our area. Even the school boy knows that waste is a bad practice. All are aware that water should not be wasted, but rather it should be put to beneficial uses.

Put an end to any waste that originates from your land — do it today.

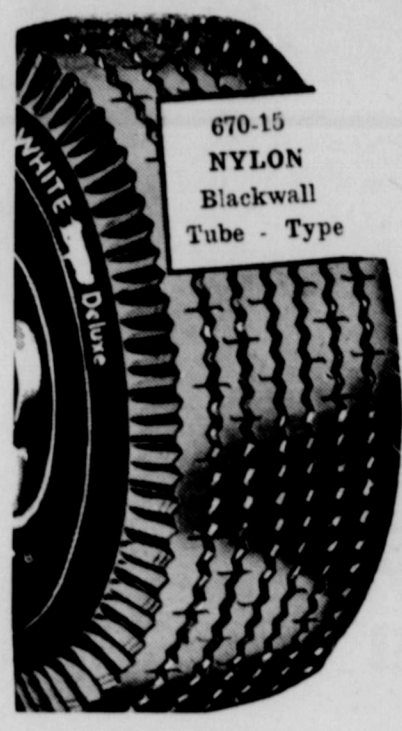

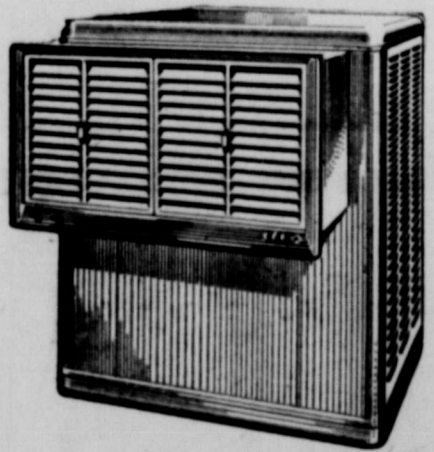

Insurance Board Disapproves Crop-Hail Filings Covering Cotton Plantings

Austin — It was announced here Monday that the State Insurance Board disapproved new Crop-Hail Insurance Filings, covering insured cotton planting, by a number of insurance companies which would have reduced premiums by 6 percent but lowered insurance company liability more than 25 percent.

The new filing would also have carried an optional escalator clause which did not pay full damages until hail storm of July 1, and would have forced farmers to replant in order to be eligible for the replanting destroyed crops clause in a policy which most farmers prefer.

This action by the Board follows hearing in Austin on April 18, requested by the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. To review previous approval of these filings as announced April 4.

J. Morris Thomas, farmer from Cotton Center, and George W. Pfeifferberger, Executive Vice President of the PCG attended the hearings and testified that such new policies would not have provided adequate insurance coverage. Also that Finance Agencies would insist on better coverage before granting production loans. Cotton producers and finance agencies from Pecos also testified in line with PCG views at the hearing.

The Board action leaves the older policies unchanged except that the storm date has been advanced forward by five (5) days in all ones. This means that it is considered feasible to replant cotton after damage by hail occurring prior to noon on June 5 in zone 2, rather than June 16 as was formerly the case. This change was obtained at hearings last November at which Thomas and a PCG staff member also testified.

Records Needed By Today's AG Producer

Coltge Station—Profitable farm and ranch operations are developed through alert, aggressive management. Adequate business records are an essential part of this management, points out C. M. Bates, extension farm manager in specialist.

Business records can serve as the compass for charting the course but constant review and analysis are needed to make them more effective. Over-all record keeping is fine, says Bates, but enterprise records really show where the profits and losses are originating and why.

In most cases, points out the specialist, the over-all farm or ranch business is made up of several segments or enterprises. A complete summary of the business usually does not reveal the relative profitability of the different enterprises or parts of the whole business. Enterprise records call for a more understanding of accounting since they involve some additional breakdown of cash account items.

Work now underway by the extension farm management specialists and field personnel is aimed at assisting a limited number of farm and ranch operators with enterprise records in each county. As resources permit, this work will be expanded, according to Bates.

He adds that farmers and ranchmen, like other businessmen, must use every available means to maintain satisfactory returns on their investment labor and managerial ability. If enterprise records will improve the efficiency of the business, and Bates believes they will, then they should be kept.

He says that local county extension agents can supply additional information on enterprise record keeping and assistance if it is desired.

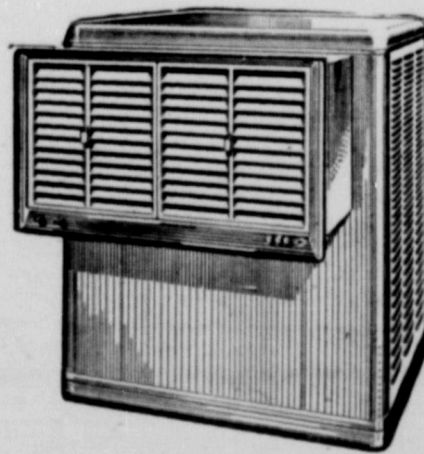

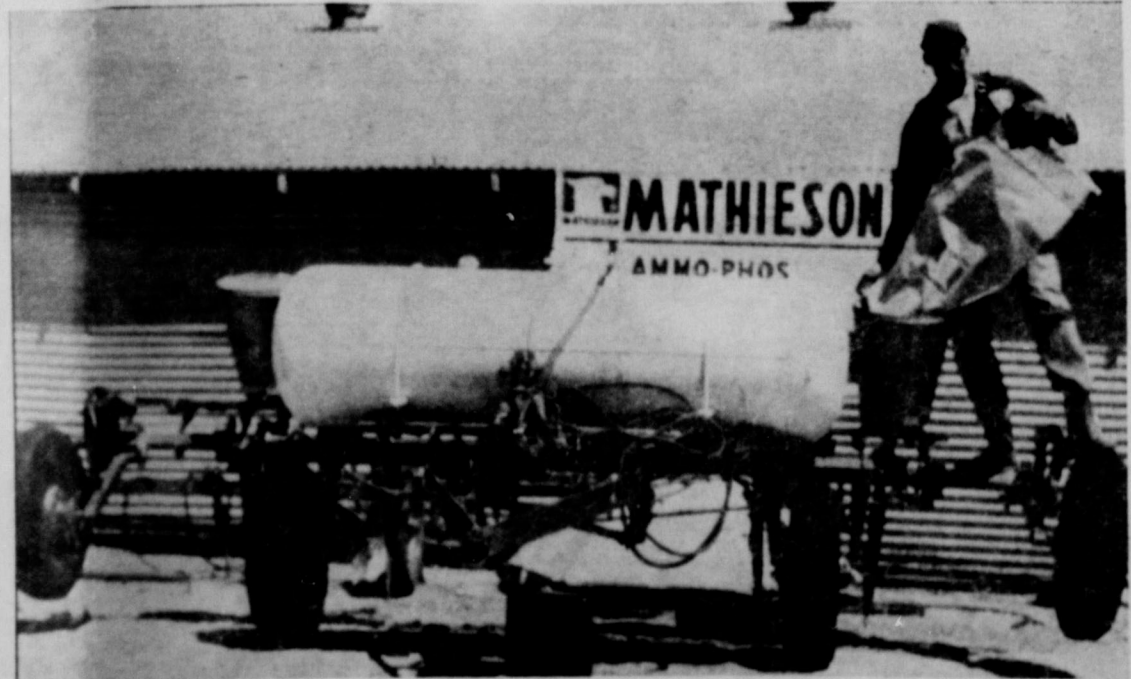

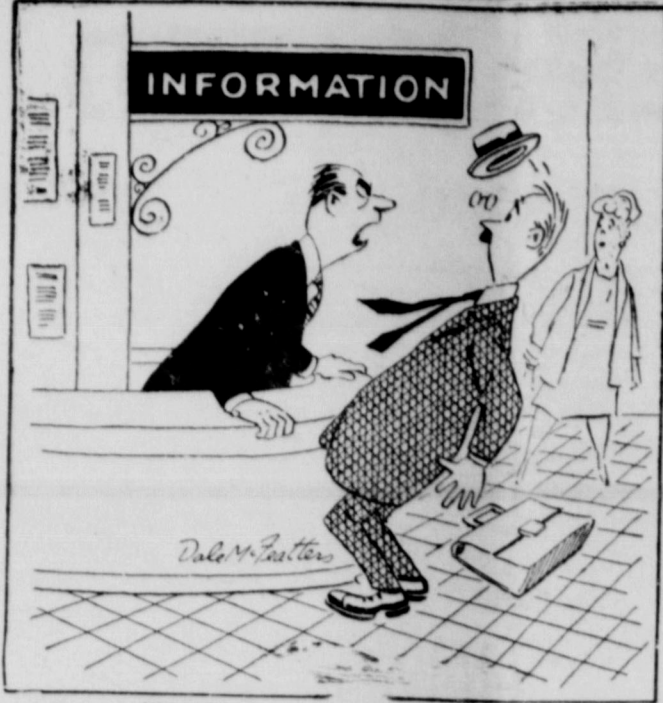

Water Conservation Commemorative Stamp Issued

College Station. — No other resource so directly affects the welfare, comfort and happiness of all the people as does water. Our national and personal need for water for domestic use, for sanitation, for manufacture, and for agriculture is multiplied each year by our expanding population, says Lynn Pittard, assistant extension soil and water conservation specialist.

In view of this great role water plays in our lives, the first water conservation stamp in history was released April 18 in Washington, D. C. The four-cent stamp is the series of conservation commemorative postage stamps.

This stamp should impress on every American the value of water conservation. We know there is only so much water on the earth, and this supply remains constant. The only way we can meet the vital and rising demands for water is by reducing needless waste and pollution, by protecting the watershed upon which our water falls as rain and snow, and by finding more efficient methods for its use, Pittard said.

The unique two-panel stamp portrays a close-up view of a drop of water falling from a leaf, symbolizing watershed influences upon water supply. This design leads the eye to a right-hand panel depicting an actual watershed panorama. A town and farm in the foreground are dependent on the upstream watershed with its well-managed farm and forest lands and small dams for flood prevention and storage.

The next time you need stamps make sure you get the new conservation issue. They are available at all local post offices.

What Does The Bible Say About What The Word Does

Any book of great influence must carry blessings for its readers. It is for this reason that the Bible is being read by more people every day. You are missing much if you are not a daily Bible reader.

Some of the blessings of the Word of God stand out more than others because they are concerned with the sinful condition of mankind. You can receive a lot of help from the grand old Book, but if you miss these you have missed the Bible's most valuable help.

1. Conviction of Sin

Everyone needs to know when he is in the wrong. No one is so deceived as the man who is blind to his own sins. The Bible will make us realize our sins. It is "a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart" (Heb. 4:12). The Bible specifically names and condemns all types of evil (see Gal. 5:19-21; 1 Cor. 6:9-11, etc.). It is for this reason that many don't like to read the Bible or hear Bible teaching. Did you ever wonder why one-half the population of America stays home on Sunday?

To the man who wants to make the best of his life, correction and instruction is useful. The Bible is inspired of God and profitable "for doctrine, for reproof for correction for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works" (Tim. 3:16-17).

2. How To Be Forgiveness

Just to know about our sins is not enough. We must find a way to have those sins removed so that we can have self-respect and a sense of usefulness in life. The Bible helps us again. It tells how to be forgiven.

Jesus Christ is "the Lamb of God" which taketh away the sin of the world" (John 1:29). "He is the propitiation for our sins: not for our only but also for the sins of the whole world" (1 John 2:2). Through the Bible we learn of His love for us, and that He willingly died for our sins (Eph. 5:2; 1 Cor. 5:21). Through Christ died for all men, not all men will be saved. We are

told that some will "be cast into a furnace of fire: there shall be wailing and gnashing of teeth" (Matt. 13:42). At the end of this world the Son of God will be revealed from heaven with his mighty angels, "in flaming fire taking vengeance on them that know not God, and that obey not the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ" (2 Thess. 1:7-8). There will be no escape for us if we neglect salvation in Christ (Heb. 2:1-3).

But you ask, "What does it mean to obey the gospel?" First, it means that you believe in Jesus Christ as the Son of God. "But these are written, that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through his name" (John 20:31).

In the second place, it means that you genuinely repent of your sins. "I tell you, Nay; but, except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish" (Luke 13:3). Also, you must confess your faith in Christ: "And Phillip said, if thou believest with all thine heart, thou mayest. And he answered and said, I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God" (Acts 8:37). Finally, you must be baptized in the name of Christ. "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" (Mark 16:16). "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38).

According to the Bible, this is obedience to the gospel. Without complete obedience to those commands, you cannot be saved. "What shall the end be of them that obey not the gospel of God?" (1 Pet. 4:17).

3. Strength for Your Soul

After your sins are forgiven in obedience to the gospel, the Word makes further provision for your soul by giving you spiritual strength. "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God" (Matt. 4:4). The word of God is able to "build you up, and to give you an inheritance among all them which are sanctified" (Acts 20:32). "Ye are strong, and the word of God abideth in you" (1 John 2:14). The Bible truly is a necessary part of the Christian life. No other book in the world will give him the strength he needs.

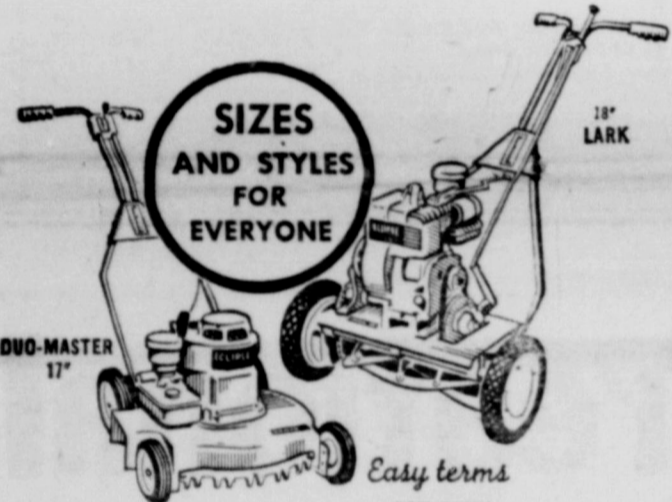

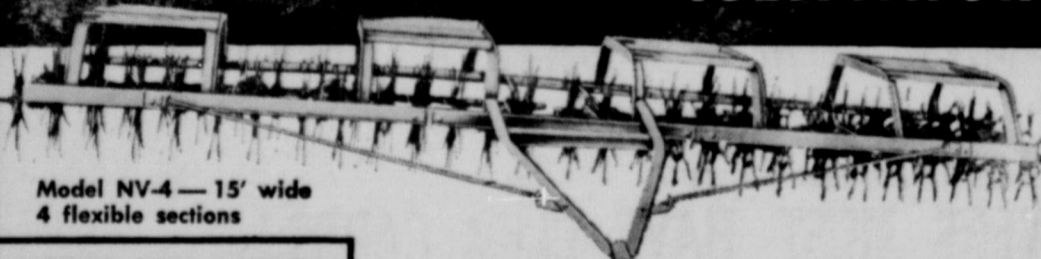

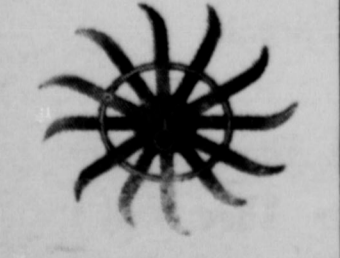
