The need for re-evaluating property is a result of the Legislature revising the method for financing public schools, thus distributing a larger portion of the cost to local districts instead of the state. House Bill 1089 passed in the final day of the legislative session. The bill deals with weather modification and was sponsored by Rep. E. L. Short. It allows persons who object to cloud seeding to petition for a hearing before a permit is issued, allows the Texas Water Development Board freedom in granting or denying permits, and permits may be issued for a period of four years.

Section 4 of the bill reads: The importance of this legislation and the crowded condition of the calendars in both houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each house be suspended, and this rule is hereby suspended, and that this act take after its passage.

If signed by the governor the law would go into effect Januarv 1, 1976.



fication license; (2) pays the permit fee; (3) publishes a notice of intention and submits proof of publication as required; and (4) furnishes proof of financial

responsibility. The Board (TWDB) shall, if requested by at least 25 persons, hold at least one public hearing in the area where the operation is to be conducted prior to the issuance of a permit.

A separate permit is required for each operation. If an operation is to be conducted under contract, a permit is required for each separate contract. The board shall not issue a permit for a contracted operation unless it covers a continuous period not to exceed four years.

proportion of adolescents who have smoked marihuana 60 times or more jumps from 2 percent among those whose friends have never used marihuana to 48 percent among those whose friends also are 60-times-or-more users.

When both parents and friends use drugs, the result is the highest rate of adolescent marihuana use found in one extensive study: 67 percent.



Raw-Cooked Food

it is for harmful bacteria to grow in raw meat or poultry held for several hours at room tempera-

But equal concern should be given to being sure cooked food is properly refrigerated, also, one foods and nutrition specialist pointed out this week.

Sally Springer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, said that most bacteria in raw food are destroyed at cooking temperatures above 140 degrees F. But cooked foods can also be a haven for growing bacteria through recontamination or cross-contamination,

"Cooked foods may be recontaminated if kitchen utensils used for preparing the food before cooking aren't washed be-

Most consumers know how easy fore handling the same food cooked.

> "Foods can be cross-contaminated by handling uncooked meats, then fresh vegetables without washing kitchen utensils and hands, " the specialist said.

She suggested that a good rule to follow is to wash all utensils and hands in hot soapy water after handling raw food, since it may contain bacteria, and before touching cooked food. "Cooking food at proper temperatures will destroy bacteria that cause food poisoning, " she said.

"A series of exterior photographs can help record improvements, painting, landscaping, remodeling, since the house was purchased, " this specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, said. Photos can also be a guide for future maintenance if the record includes shots of critical construction points, plumbing and wiring, for example. Problem areas can be pinpointed without tearing down the whole wall, she said.

It it's time to sell the house, seasonal photographs can often help prospective buyers visualize the property as it looks throughout the year.

"A simple camera is sufficient, wide angle lens is better. Shoot from several angles, front and back, and be sure to include the background and parts of adjacent properties as well. Get some close-ups of especially attractive areas and fine details.

> "Due to the generally poor quality seed produced this past season, germination standards for certified seed have been reduced from 80 to 70 per cent germination," notes Metzer. "So, producers in some cases may not have a choice and must use lower quality seed than desired.

If low quality seed must be used, the specialist offers these suggestions to help obtain an adequate stand. Delay planting until soil has warmed. Avoid planting too deep, as low quality seed cannot tolerate too much covering soil. Increase seeding rates, but not more than 25 per cent. "Current high production costs

Moore, President of Independent Beef Producers of America advised the directors of the national organization during a meeting in Hugo, Oklahoma that the USDA grading service, with their unrealistic and inflationary charges for grading beef, is one of the hidden costs in our food baskets today.

The USDA grading service charge to a packer is \$14.60 per hour and if the packer is not located where the grader is stationed, he must pay the hourly charge to and from the plant plus mileage. These exorbitant charges are ultimately passed on to the consumer in higher prices for meat.







"Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz and his trained parrots are trying to make scapegoats out of the part-time ranchers of this nation, "says R. L. Moore, President of the Independent Beef Producers of America. Secretary Butz told a group of cattlemen in Dallas, "Weekend ranchers, out to get rich quick, have made it very hard for the legitimate cattlemen to operate. " Dr. Ed Uvacek of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, one of Butz's trained followers, repeated the same in a recent news release. They gave the impression that a great part of the cattlemen's troubles stemmed from the part time or weekend ranchers and

meat shortage in 1975. They have now changed their tune and the part-time rancher will be made the scapegoat for our over supply if Butz and company get by with their allegations. Butz and those who echo his words continue to try to convince the cattlemen and the consumers that imports are minimal and only used in manufactured products and that the imported meats don't compete with our beef. Today, foreign boneless beef is being quoted at 51. 5¢ per pound through out our land. This is the price with which our cow meat must compete. Butz said, "We will eat our way out of the situation. "







being mailed by the Bureau of the Census. In January, 323 thousand forms were mailed to Texas farmers and residents associated with agriculture and so far, 60 percent have been mailed back or otherwise accounted for.

Bureau officials say this is the last in the plann d series of follow-up letters, as collection of census data is sched led to be closed out June 30. In addition, telephone calls are being made to selected farmers who have not yet returned the forms in order to obtain information about their 1974 agricultural operations.

Everyone who received a form should return it, even those not actively engaged in farming, such as landlords or those no longer farming. That information can be noted on the form which should be mailed back in the envelope provided.

Response to the census is mandatory by law. By the same law, all information about individual farms is confidential and can be used only for statistical purposes. Farmers can refer to farm business records for many of the figures called for in the form. When records are not available, reasonable estimates are fully acceptable, Bureau officials say. Return of the completed forms is essential in order that published statistics on agriculture for each county and for the State will be accurate. Results of the census will affect farmers in many ways. Major agricultural suppliers and marketing organizations base their decisions on census statistics, Thus, they can affect the availability of goods and services in many farming communities. Any future allocation programs for such critical production inputs as fuel and fertilizer will bear a direct relationship to the crop acreages and animal units reported in the census.

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
