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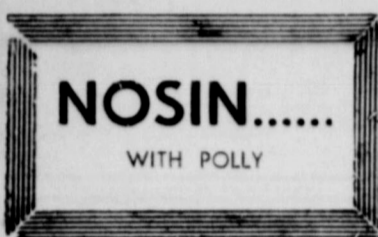

Registration for swimming lessons will begin Monday for all classes. There will be five courses taught, insuring each youth a course that may be of interest. The course consists of of creative intermediates, Junior Life Saving, Senior Life Saving and Diving.

These lessons will be given free of charge. The only cost to the swimming student will be the admission price into the pool. All swimming classes will be given in the mornings. No evening classes will be scheduled.

The Seahorse Swimming Pool Corp of Lubbock begin the final coating of marble dust on the interior of the pool Wednesday afternoon.

Work will continue for several weeks on final construction work.

The fan shaped Landon Pool is 35'x50'x75', constructed of concrete concrete shell, steel reinforced poured floor, gunite walls and marble dust plastered interior, with a 6 inch ribbon of blue frostproof ceramic tile at water-line.

The pool is equipped with a filter and a chlorinator with a 50 lb. capacity. The pool is equipped with a 14 ft. springboard, a 2 ft. diving board, a galvanized steel ladder, a brush type vacuum cleaner with 30 ft. hose, 3 floats with 16 ft. handle. Also a water test set, to test the amount of chlorine in water.

The concession stand, girls and boys dressing rooms were near completion, Wednesday, also fencing. The north and east fences are constructed of tile and the south of cyclone fencing.

Mr. and Mrs. Norman Hemphill are general co-managers of the swimming pool. Mrs. Hemphill will be in charge of the concession stand and Hemphill will serve as Life Guard.

Swimming pool admission will be 50 cents for adults, 35 cents for high school students (1959 graduates included) and 25 cents for all children (includes 8th graders who graduated into High School). There will be no season tickets sold this year.

Regular or Premium?

You're the lady of the house driving the family car into a service station for gasoline, and the attendant asks, "Regular or premium?" What do you answer — and why?

If you've never given it a thought, here are some things you should know.



Don't confuse high octane with "high test" — an old-fashioned term. Today, all brand name gasolines are "high test" — meaning volatile enough to start a car on a cold morning. Octane rating measures anti-knock quality.

High octane gasoline burns at a slower rate, counteracting the tendency of the fuel-air mixture in the cylinder to explode too early. This is especially important under load — when accelerating or climbing a hill.

Premium gasoline costs more because it utilizes a smaller fraction of the crude oil, needs more refining, often contains special additives.

Car designers take advantage of improved premium gasoline by building high-compression engines. With such an engine you definitely gain in power and economy by using premium gasoline.

However, if the compression ratio is set for regular gasoline, your car should run well on that. A Shell dealer will be glad to check this for you.

In an old car, premium gasoline can sometimes improve performance. Carbon deposits and engine maladjustments increase the need for high octane. Also, an engine with borderline octane needs may run well on regular in one part of the country, but need premium in another. It's a matter of experimenting.

New Spray Rig Effect Insect Control

College Station — Conventional low-gallage, boom-type nozzles that most farmers are now using will probably give better insect control and higher yield of seed cotton than the new types of wide-swath or boomless nozzles which will cover 6 or 12 rows per nozzle.

These findings come from experiments conducted in 1958 on the A & M Plantation near College Station. The tests were conducted by the Departments of Agricultural Engineering and Entomology to determine the effectiveness of spray nozzles. Two arrangements of boom-type nozzles producing a cone pattern and three boomless nozzles were used on irrigated cotton with an average height of 5.5 feet.

The same amount of active ingredient was applied at rates of 6 and 10 gallons of spray material per acre with the boomless nozzles and 6 gallons per acre with the conventional boom-type nozzles. The effectiveness of insect control was measured by yields and insect infestation records.

This information comes from a Progress Report released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station entitled, "Effect of Spray Nozzle Types on Cotton Insect Control."

The insect infestation records obtained during the test period are given in the report along with the total yields, expressed in pounds of seed per acre, obtained from the nozzle tests. The report also gives the kinds of chemicals used for insect control.

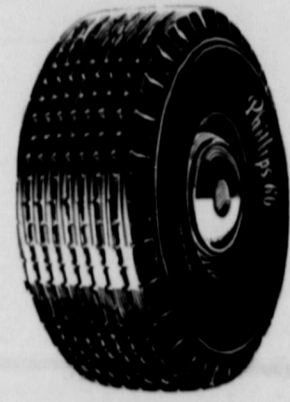

Annual Report of Lamb County Red Cross Chapter

Four swimming classes were taught in the county and 44 certificates awarded. Miss Linda Franks taught 3 classes at Onda and awarded 1 life saving certificates. 4 intermediate swimming certificates and 26 to beginners. Landon Roberts taught a class at Littlefield and awarded 10 certificates.

Mr. and Mrs. Norman R. Hemphill were sent to the Aquatic School at Palestine, Texas, May 27 through June 6, 1959 and will teach at the new Earth swimming pool this summer.

A bloodfile is kept in the Red Cross office and the names and blood types of donors are given in

cases of emergency need for blood. 10 aliens were assisted with completing immigration forms for citizenship papers through the Red Cross office. This is a long time process and several cases are still pending.

Volunteers such as Executive Board members, Disaster workers, First Aid Instructors, Water Safety Instructors and Home Service workers contributed approximately 3000 hours during the past year.

European Tour Group Holds Reunion Sunday

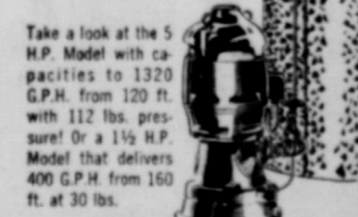

The Earth Boy Scouts attended the Annual Boy Scout Camp at Camp Post, near Post, Texas last week.

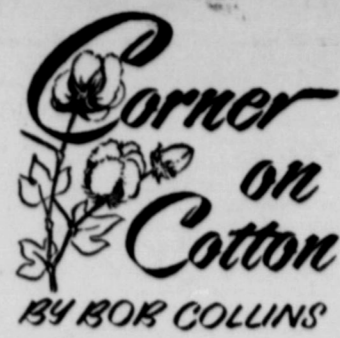

Control Weeds And Grass In Cotton

College Station — Favorable moisture for cotton production also calls for a close look at good mechanical and chemical weed and grass control practices to reduce or eliminate costly hand hoeing. Of the numerous weed control choices available, three are outstanding, says Fred Elliott, extension cotton specialist.

These include the rotary hoe, lateral oiling of grass and weeds in young cotton and spot spraying with oils and fortified oils or spot spraying of grass with sodium dalapon if water.

The rotary hoe has been and still is the key weed control practice. In 1952, 44,967 rotary hoe equipped tractors were operated in 147 counties resulting in a saving of over \$10 million. The pull-behind or broadcast types proved very popular and easy to operate at the required high speeds. Rotary hoeing alone, not in combination with sweep cultivation, permits fast coverage and getting into fields quicker after repeated rains, Elliott said.

If continued rains prevent getting into the field with the rotary hoe and cause heavy growth of annual grasses and weeds, lateral oiling or post emergence oiling with unfortified naphtha is an excellent way to get out of the grass for about \$1.00 to \$1.50 for the five gallons of oil needed per acre. This practice was carried out in 47 counties in 1952.

The naphtha is applied with parallel action oiling shoes at 1 to 25 pounds pressure, with 2 fan-type, horizontal nozzles, staggered and placed 10 inches apart—one nozzle on each side of the row. Direct the spray pattern at the lower 1 to 1 and 1.2 inches of the cotton stem, below the leaves, advises Elliott. Natural wax on young cotton stalks shed the naphtha without injury to the cotton until bark roughens and cracks. Annual grasses up to 3 to 5 inches tall can be controlled, he said.

Spot-spraying established Johnsongrass is faster, easier and cheaper than hand hoeing and Johnsongrass can be eradicated in one year. Use the jet-gun sprayer. Apply the oils in small amounts to be the stem of the grass at the ground line. Kerosene fortified with 0-56, 1-2 gallons oil, does an excellent job, Elliott said.

Sodium daapon in water is a systemic foliage spray and the leaves of the grass must be wet. Again the jet-gun sprayer is ideal equipment for the job. The specialist suggests that you ask your county agent for Bulletin 902, "Spot Spray in Johnsongrass", and for other information on how to fight weeds and grass with machines and chemicals.

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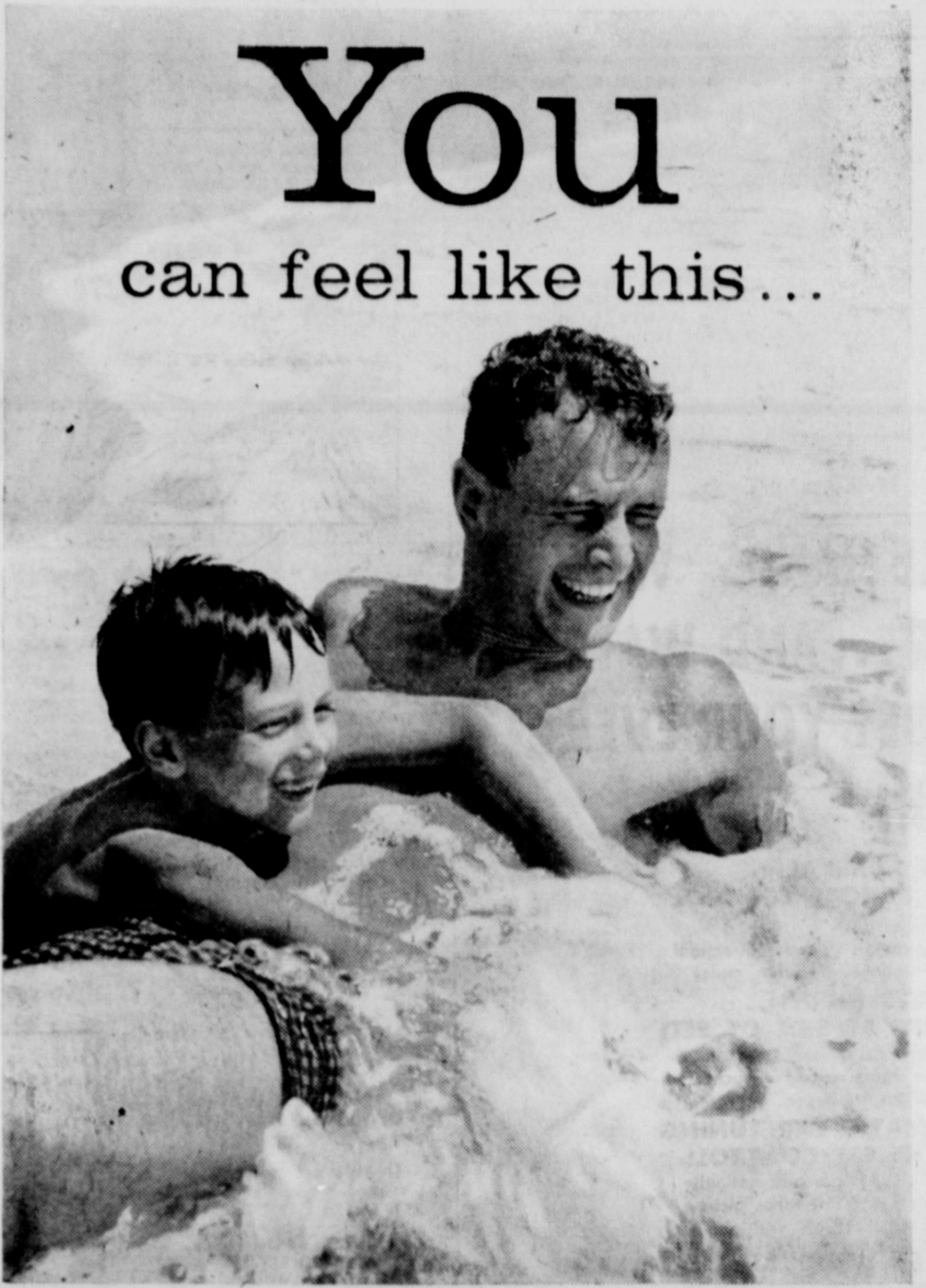
