Lubbock ABC Rodeo
To Be Staged In
New Coliseum

A new era in South Plains Sports will be inaugurated June 20-23 with the unveiling of the annual ABC Rodeo in Lubbock's new \$2,000,000 Municipal Coliseum.

The Rodeo, featuring many of the nation's top rodeo hands, will be the first sports event to be held in the 16,000-seat oval shaped building on the Texas Tech Campus.

Kicking off the four day show on June 20 will be a 2:30 p. m. parade through the heart of Lubbock by several hundred riders, including members of South Plains area sheriffs' posses and other riding groups.

The rodeo itself will afford fans their first opportunity to see an indoor rodeo anywhere in this region.

Tickets for the show are on sale now at \$3. for reserved seats \$2 for general admission and \$1 for children. All prices are plus tax. Mail orders are being accepted at "ABC Rodeo, Caprock Hotel, Lubbock.

Besides all that a rodeo generally offers, the big South Plains show will include a nightly exhibition by three champion cutting horses owned by Phil Williams of Tokio, specialty acts by Clowns Gene and Bobby Clark and, for the first time, a wild horse race. In this event, six wild horses are turned loose and teams compete to see which can catch and saddle one of the horses, ride and then unsaddle it.

Also the Light Crust Doughboys and Organist Bernie Howell will entertain rodeo fans, as will State Sen. Clem McSpadden of Okla. who will be the announcer.

Regular rodeo events of bare back and saddle bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling and wild brama riding highlight the show.

Proceeds from the show will go into a fund for buildings and equipment for Lubbock's three Boys' Clubs, which are sponsored

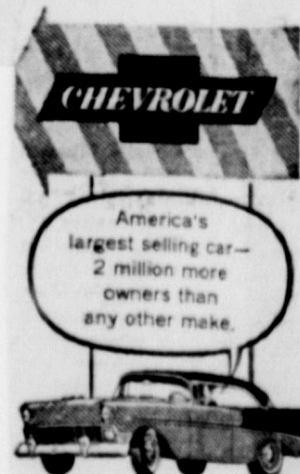

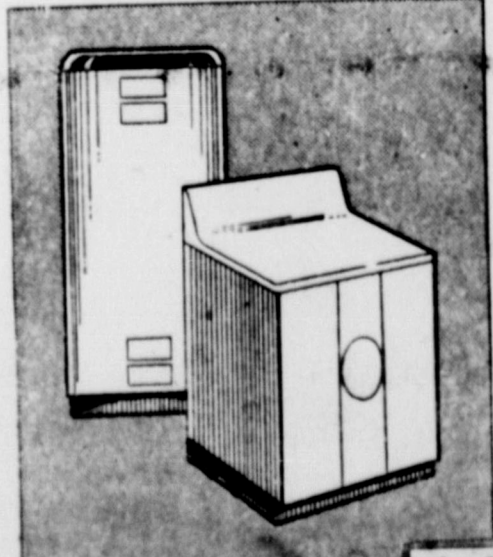

Social Security Man To Be In Muleshoe

A representative of the Lubbock social security office will be in Muleshoe on June 21, 1956 at 10:00 a. m. at the Courthouse in the Court Room and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to Social Security.

It is good business to check your social security account at least every three or four years. John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security district office, reminds all persons covered by the social security law. By checking your account you can be sure that all your earnings that count toward old-age and survivors insurance were reported and credited correctly. If you find that all wages of self-employment income that can be are not credited you should then notify the local social security office and necessary action will be taken to correct your account.

Since all survivor and retirement benefits are based on your covered earnings it is important that all wages and self-employment income are correctly credited through the years.

Hutton pointed out, however, that the earnings statements for the year 1955 are not available at this time since the postings of wages is not completed until six or nine months after the wages were paid. Therefore, a record of wages paid through the last week in December 1955 will not be available before July 1956.

Hutton stated that the local social security, located at 1616-19th Street, has available a post card form for those who wish to obtain a record of past earnings credited to their social security account.

Gives Every Baby Pig A Chance To Grow Up...

Every baby pig that cannot nurse or which doesn't get his proper share of "mama's" feed now has a chance to live out his early days at definite profit to the pig raiser. A relatively new artificial pig-feeder heated by a 330-watt thermostatically controlled electric heating element substitutes for the warm milk normally provided by nature.

This new feeding unit may put an additional \$40.00 per litter in the pockets of pig raisers by keeping alive pigs that are often lost during the nursing stage. When something goes wrong with the

mother sow, the entire litter is often lost.

Experience has shown that, under good management, the pig feeder makes an ideal "mother" for orphaned pigs, runt pigs, pigs from oversized litters and pigs from sows who just don't provide enough milk.

While the unit does an excellent job of imitating "mother," it has other advantages. Danger of the sow stepping or lying on a baby pig is eliminated. Baby pigs are

kept fully contented, healthy and clean. Many unexpected emergencies that take place at farrowing time are lessened in intensity.

One hog producer had a sow which farrowed 16 pigs. He placed eight of the litter on the artificial unit and eight with the sow. The sow rolled over on one, reducing her share to seven. At weaning time, the eight pigs on the artificial unit were heavier than the pigs which had been naturally fed by the sow... and all were still alive.

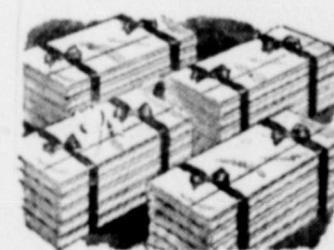

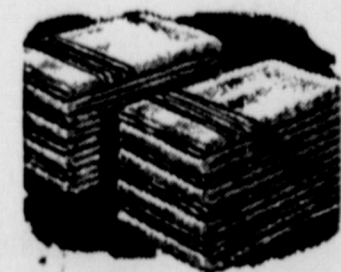

PLANNING FARM STORAGE

Profits received by farmers for providing their own grain storage vary considerably in different areas of the state. With some individuals, there is little likelihood that on-farm-storage would be profitable at all. In other cases, the extra investment and effort will pay well.

An analysis of each individual situation and a sound estimate of the potential from such a ven-

ture should be made before building any farm grain storage facilities.

Providing your own farm storage involves many factors, all of which may be resolved into an economic question — will it pay? All the factors of cost, such as the construction of a building, handling, insect control, maintaining condition and quality, and shrinkage should be considered in one's own operations.

The answers to these questions with valuable cost and building data for farm storage are included in a new publication, L-275,

released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The material was compiled by W. S. Allen, R. J. Hildreth, and J. W. Sorenson; agricultural engineers of the Texas A & M College System.

The publication lists advantages and disadvantages of building on-farm storage units. It also gives means of figuring space requirements for a farmer's particular needs.

In approved areas, the Commodity Stabilization of the US DA provides financial assistance in the form of loans on approved

structures. These loans include up to 80 percent of the structure including cost of conditioning equipment.

The public is available from local county agents or from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.
