### City Commission Begins New Year In Right Way

The first City Commission meeting of the year was held Monday night with the Jaycee and Chamber of Commerce Swimming Pool Committee and other guests present.

Mayor Marcus Messer gave the 1958 financial statement.

Clarence Hamilton and E. G. Gaston met with the Commission in regards to piping water to the FFA livestock pens, north of the Rodeo Grounds.

A financial report on the Swimming Pool Fund was given by Golden Ferguson. The Commission voted unanimously to take over the construction of the decking, bathhouse, concession stand lighting and fencing of the swimming pool.

The Commission also voted to open south 3rd St., three blocks east of South Amherst Road.

### Soil Fertility Committee to Meet In Lubbock

LUBBOCK — The first annual meeting of the South Plains Soil Fertility committee will be held from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. February 10, in the Caprock Hotel at which time a report on fertilizer tests on 1958 crops will be made.

The South Plains Soil Fertility committee is a group of fertilizer manufacturers, chemical dealers, farmers, businessmen, the Plains Cotton Growers Inc. and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. It was organized to foster and promote more efficient and profitable use of fertilizer material in a sound soil and water management program by support of research, education, legislation and a high standard of ethics.

With the financial support obtained by this group, it has been possible for the Experiment Station personnel to expand fertilizer research at the Lubbock and Brownfield locations and also to conduct cooperative tests on cotton and grain sorghum in Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Crosby, Lubbock, Terry, and Dawson and Gaines counties. Results of these tests will be announced at this February 10 meeting. Charles Fisher, Experiment Station superintendent, said.

New officers will be elected at the February 10 meeting.

### Pool Fund Drive Ends January 12

The Jaycees announced that the Swimming Pool Fund Drive would close Monday night, January 12, at the regular meeting of the Earth Jaycees Monday.

Golden Ferguson, fund chairman said that all workers must turn in their cards by this date, whether you have worked the cards or not, but he pointed out that workers still have one week to contact the remaining people for which they have cards.

Also donations may be left at the Chamber of Commerce office by any citizen who has a card or has not been contacted.

Plans were made to meet with the City Commission, Monday night.

Fifteen members and two guests, Ted Borum and Keith Parish were present at the meeting.

### Friends Extinguish Fire at Farm Home

An overheated bathroom wall heater, was believed to be the origin of the fire at 12:30 p.m. Monday at the Clarence Hamilton farm, located five miles north and one mile east of Earth.

Neighbors and friends quickly extinguished the flames by the time Earth Volunteer Fire Department arrived.

Two neighbors, Floyd Burgess and Mrs. E. G. Gaston were first to discover smoke coming from the Hamilton home and rushed over to offer aid. Mrs. Hamilton was at the school as a substitute teacher that day.

The wall heater was located in a three quarter bath in the garage, with very little damage according to Hamilton.

### Farmers Sign Up For Conservation Practices Aid

Early Friday morning over 500 Lamb County farmers were in Littlefield to sign up for \$125,000 worth of Government Conservation Practice Aid at the ASC office in the courthouse.

The \$125,000 ran out before all had signed up. ASC office manager, Lamar Aten, said that all farmers present were signed up, in case some farmer failed to use the allotment in the first quarter, as this is the time period for this amount of money for the county to be used.

The assistance is available under the ACP program for practice such as underground tile, deep plowing, terracing, strip cropping, listing and chiseling (dryland only) waterways and land leveling. Aten said.

The Federal government will share 50 percent of the cost on these practices and 70 percent on grass practices, the ASC manager said.

The maximum amount of money provided by the government for each farm is \$500 this year. Aten said, in the past the maximum has been \$300 per farm.

However, farmers with more than one farm may receive up to \$1500 on assistance (\$500 for each farm) the limit set by the Federal government.

Amherst pulled ahead to lead 25 to 31 at the third quarter, but the Wolverines pulled even in the fourth quarter, but couldn't quite pull it out. Sandy Sanders and Joe Ellis tied for high point honors for Springlake with 14 points, followed by Dick Evans with 6, Gene Stephens 3 and Hal Hudson 3.

The girls' game wasn't quite as exciting, as Amherst pulled ahead to a 23 to 16 halftime lead and coasted on to victory. Minnie Wheat again led Springlake scoring, with 15 points, followed by Linda Lewis with 10, Jo Ann Oden 7, Eleanor Riley 2.

Springlake opens district play against Anton at Anton tomorrow, Friday night, with the girls playing about 6:45 p.m. and the boys playing the last game, Springlake's next home game will be Friday, January 16, against Sudan.

### DWI Charges Filed Wednesday In Littlefield

Lloyd Ervin Spies, plead guilty to DWI charges Wednesday in Littlefield and was fined \$175 and court costs, making a total of \$215.

Spies was taken into custody Tuesday afternoon about seven miles West of Earth on Highway 70 by Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith, Jr. Spies later set fire to his bed in the Earth City Jail and destroyed a mattress, quilt and blanket before the fire could be extinguished by Smith and City Marshal Camp.

Spies escaped while the officers were putting out the flames, but was picked up a short time later and was placed in the Littlefield jail where he spent the night.

### County Officials Sworn Into Office January 1st

Three Earth citizens were sworn in as new county officials at the Lamb County Courthouse New Year's Day.

Those sworn into their new offices were Clyde Goodwin, new commissioner of precinct two; Bill Corzine, new Justice of Peace of precinct two and Pete Mitchell as new constable in Earth.

Other County officials taking office were Mrs. Lucy Moreland of Amherst, new County Treasurer; Dave Black of Amherst, new Justice of the Peace for precinct 7 and G. W. Davis of Sudan is new Justice of Peace for precinct 5.

Installation ceremonies were presided over by District Judge E. A. Bills and County Judge Pat Boone, Jr.

This report was given to the Earth News-Sun reporter early Tuesday morning. The Swimming Pool committee met with City officials Monday night. At this time the City Commission took definite action to have the Swimming Pool constructed in Earth this year, according to Golden Ferguson, fund chairman.

#### GOAL SHORT \$3000

Ferguson said the fund is running approximately \$3000 short of goal, which may mean we will have to eliminate a diving board, heater and various accessories and might possibly have to construct a smaller pool if more donations are not received before the drive closes.

#### \$9000 ON DEPOSIT

At noon Tuesday, a report of over \$9000 was received as being on deposit in the swimming pool fund, plus pledges and approximately \$1100. (30 cards) unreported, Ferguson said, this is a final appeal to the Earth and Springlake citizens to bring their contributions to the Chamber of Commerce office and those who offered to give an extra donation to do so now, that the pool will be constructed as proposed.

DRIVE TO CLOSE AT 7:30 P. M. MONDAY, JANUARY 12 DONATIONS ARE TAX DEDUCTIBLE.

Members of the City Commission composed of C. P. Parish, Pat McCord, R. H. Belew, John Welch and Dutch Been took immediate action and voted unanimously to take over construction of the decking, bathhouse, concession stand, fencing and lighting at a cost of approximately \$4000 to \$5000.

Ferguson stated that this will not in any way raise the City taxes, but the money used will be repaid from the Swimming pool profits.

#### CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT TO BE LET WITHIN 60 DAYS

Ferguson said, that a contract for construction would have to be let within the next 60 days in order that the pool would be in readiness for the coming swimming season. Ferguson also stated that the Seahorse Swimming Pool Corp. of Lubbock would likely do the construction work on the pool.

Construction of decking, bathhouse, concession stand, fencing and lighting would be done by local contractors, under supervision of the City Commission and would be up to strict specifications.

#### POOL TO BE LOCATED IN NORTHWEST CORNER OF PARK

Ferguson disclosed, the location and arrangement of the construction of pool, bathhouse, decking and fencing as follows:

Swimming pool - 35' wide (deep end) to south, 50' wide shallow end and 75' in length.

West fence, 6 ft. high pumice blocks.

North side, approximately 15' x 60' boys and girls dressing rooms, concession stand, basket checks and small storage room.

East and south fence will probably be storm fence, Ferguson said.

Everyone is urged to get their donation in by Monday, January 12.
