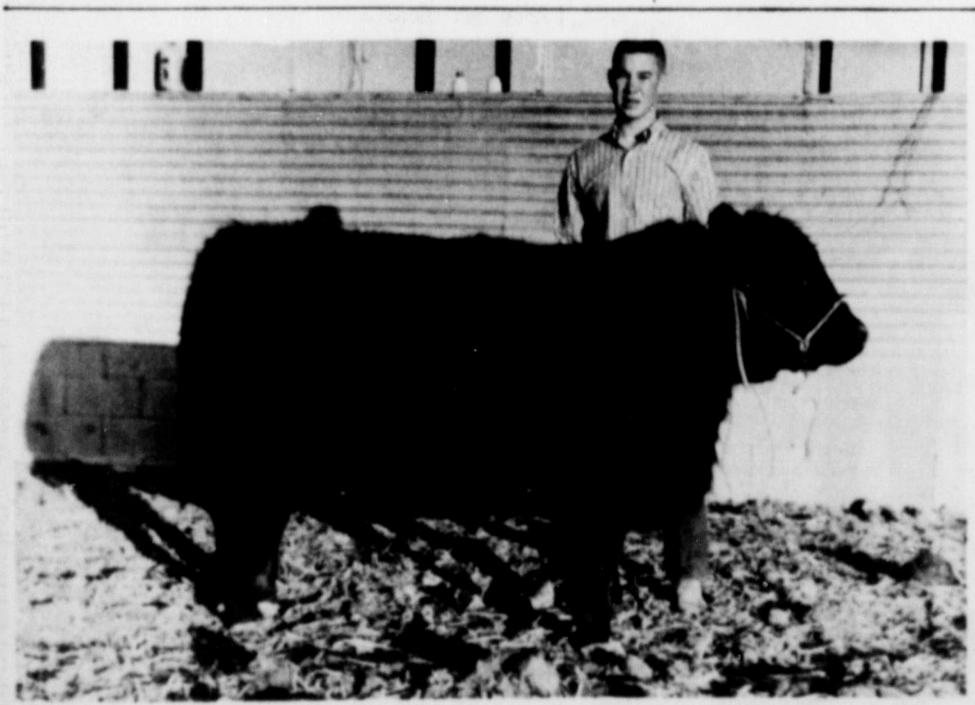
## Lions' Ladies, Honorees At Tonight's Dinner

## Water District Election Held Tuesday

The annual election for the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 was held Tuesday, January 12. Voters elected new representatives to serve on committees for their county.

In Earth, two committee-men from Precinct 2 were Roger Haberer, Earth, who received 15 votes; and George Laing, Earth, who received 2 votes; for committee-man-at-large, K.B. Parish, Springlake received 17 votes.

## Rep. Bill Clayton Outlines Problems in Legislative Session

Problems faced by the State Legislature when it convenes January 12, were outlined Thursday at the Littlefield Rotary Club, by Bill Clayton, Representative of the 91st Legislative District of Texas.

Clayton stated the first order of business would be a discussion of state finances. He said the state is in need of additional revenue, but didn't think it would mean an increase in taxes, stating there has been discussion of dropping some of the current sales tax exemptions in order to pick up needed money. Clayton said, that currently the tax means over \$200,000,000 income to the state.

Rep. Clayton said the biggest debate in the session is expected to ensue when the House begins the discussion of redistricting and re-apportionment. He remarked that he had seen three plans which could effect Lamb County in the re-districting proposal. One plan is for leaving the county in the 19th Congressional District, and taking some of the eastern portion of the 19th and putting it in the 18th district of Walter Rogers; a second plan, which is under consideration, is for Lamb and Swisher Counties to go into the 18th district; a third plan is to move Lamb and Hale Counties into the 19th district. No one knows what the final outcome will be.

Clayton remarked, "It appears that most of the Lamb County people would like to remain in the 19th district where the economic conditions are very similar."

"This area seems to be in good shape on the State Level," Clayton stated, "but it, too, could be shaken up if the Legislature follows the strict ruling of the law. If we re-district statewide, the State governing body could be controlled by the metropolitan areas." Other topics to receive consideration are higher education, water, and soil conservation.

Rep. Clayton expected a full session and had no idea when it would be concluded.

## 1964 Postal Receipts Reach All-Time High

Harold Miller, Postmaster, states the Earth Post office has increased and grown in receipts at the rate of approximately 10% each year since 1957, when he started to work there.

Employees of the local post office are one postmaster and two postal clerks. There are two star routes out of Earth. "Our Post Office," according to Miller, "has handled the redoubling volume of mail, helped mainly by the new system of transportation, coupled with complete cooperation of our fine patrons."

The receipts for 1964 were \$20,968.43, which does not include money orders or money order fees. This figure only includes stamp sales, box rent, and 2nd and 3rd class mail postage.

## Bank Deposits Dip At Years End, Rise In January

Deposits in the County Banks reached an all time record high on December 31, 1963 when reported deposits totaled \$38,109,138. This year on December 31, 1964, deposits showed \$35,964,585, marking a total decrease in deposits of \$2,154,553 as compared to the all time record set the same time in 1963.

However, with the beginning of the new year, deposits in the county begin to rise at a swift and steady pace and by January 6 deposits in the county's six banks had swelled to a total of \$40,780,734, immensely higher than either the 1963 or 1964 totals.

Olton State Bank was the only bank in the county at the end of December, to show an increase over 1963. It rose to an all-time record high with deposits totaling \$8,506,368, on December 31. This placed Olton State as the second largest depository in the county, the place that has in the past been held by the First National Bank in Littlefield. The bumper cotton crop in the Northern part of Lamb County was the prime reason for the all time high recorded by the Olton Bank. However, Earth's Citizen State Bank, located in North Lamb County in the midst of a bumper cotton crop, showed no gain.

This low deposit does not describe the true picture of the Earth area, as many people in the immediate trade territory do their banking in other Lamb County Banks, as well as in Dimmitt and Muleshoe.

## Poll Tax Sales Slow In County, Deadline January 31

The sale of poll tax is described as slower than slow, according to Herbert Dunn, County Tax Assessor/Collector, who reported Tuesday that only 1204 receipts had been issued since they went on sale in October of '64. Dunn credits the noted slump in poll tax payments as being an off-year for state and national elections. He said it followed the same trend each non-voting year.

In Earth, City Secretary, Mrs. Ruby Anderson reported only 63 poll tax receipts had been issued to date with only 17 days remaining before the deadline.

The only elections scheduled for '65 in Earth is the City election and the School Board election.

In the City election, voters will elect three Aldermen, each for two year terms.

The School Board election in April will include the election of two new board members.

Dunn said people still do not understand it is necessary to have a poll tax to vote. They are confused since the election of 1964, when voters turned down the proposed amendment to do away with the tax, as a voting qualification.

In the last "off" year the county recorded 4,150 receipts, which was under last year's 5,000 plus total.

The only persons not required to furnish a poll tax when voting are people who were 60 before January 1, and anyone who becomes 21, after January 1, 1965. These can vote in 1965 without a poll tax.

Deadline for the purchase of the 1965 receipts is January 31. The fee is \$1.75 per voter.

Dear Earth-News Dear Friends,

Voices from Texas heard in Germany! Can you imagine this, a talk from Texas to Germany over the phone just like a call from Earth to Dimmitt? Well, I hardly could't and so I was very excited when I heard that my family, Troy E. Blackburn was going to call me about Christmas. 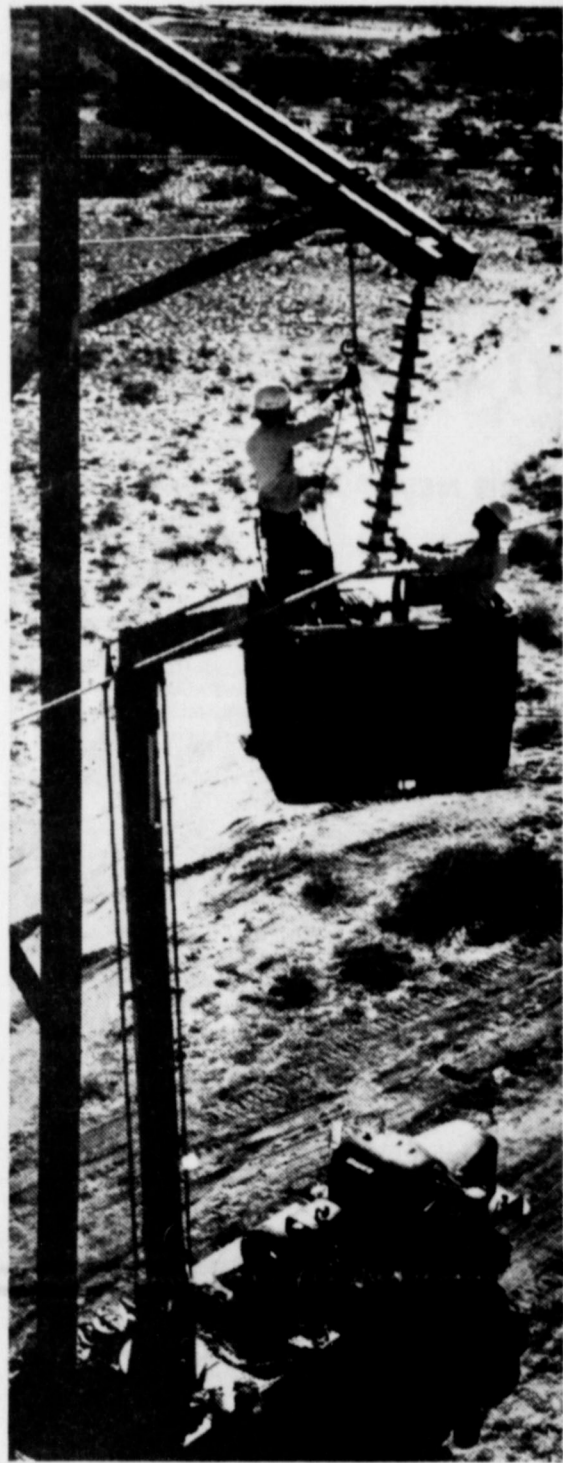

## West Texas Farm Labor Assn. Ignore Farm Labor Law

Approximately 25 members of the Western Texas Farm Labor Association of Muleshoe, attended the larger meeting of farmers from across the South Plains in Lubbock, Thursday, January 7, 1965.

Henry LeBlanc, Chief of Farm Placement, of the Texas Employment Commission was the main speaker. LeBlanc went into lengthy explanation of the new farm labor law. The most significant point that was brought out, was the fact that the \$1.15 per hour rate, which is to come into effect April 1, 1965, applies only to persons wishing to secure foreign workers. The \$1.15 is part of the criteria prescribed by the Secretary of Labor, this is not a minimum wage in agriculture. A farmer or his association, may secure any domestic labor at any rate that is agreeable between the two parties.

Upon return to Muleshoe, the Board of Directors of the Western Texas Farm Labor Assn. which includes, Virgil Nowell, Harold Allison, Charles Hough, J.R. Smithson, and Cameron Gault, met and this decision and statement was adopted to be made public.

The Board of Directors of the Western Texas Farm Labor Association after due debate and consideration and in compliance with most farmers across the nation, feel that in order to prove a need for supplementary labor in our area, that we must place all our needs with the local employment offices. Considering the economical factor involved we cannot comply with the criteria set out by the Secretary of Labor, demanding the \$1.15 per hour, plus all benefits. This Association will be placing order for the usual amount of workers as were needed in the past. We will request single male, list the job requirements, at a rate of pay that we can live with, at this time 70¢ per hour. This group urges all users of farm labor to do same.

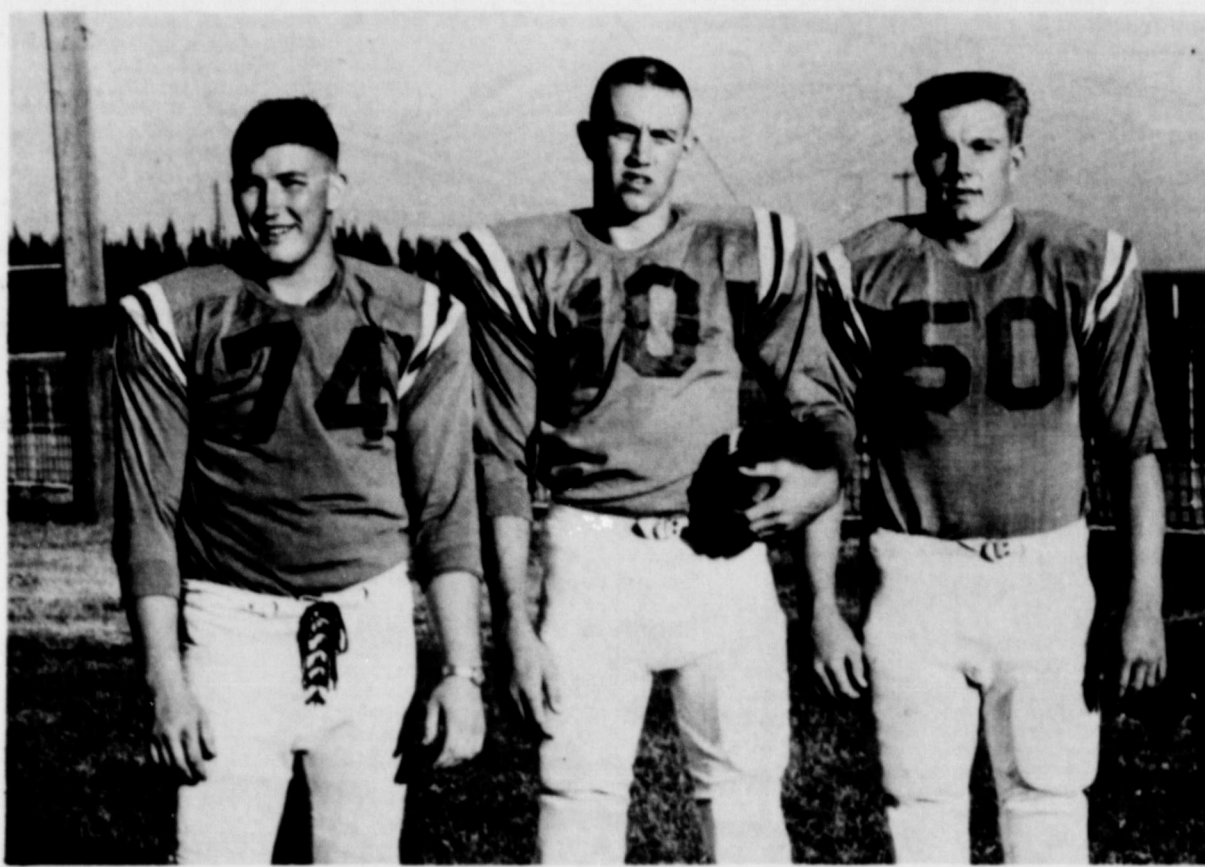
