Earth Chamber Steers Clear Of County Political Issue

The Earth Chamber of Commerce has made no such statement, or in any way joined forces with the Olton Chamber in an effort to terminate the County Superintendent's office, said L. K. Anderson, president of the local Chamber of Commerce, who was seemingly shocked Monday, when questioned by a reporter of the News-Sun, after reading a full report of the story in both the Olton Enterprise and the County Wide News, in Littlefield, as to when the action had taken place.

Anderson said, I am completely in the dark as to the origin of this information. He further related, "In the first place, I would not permit it to be brought up in the local Chamber, as it is the right of the people themselves to decide individually as to whether or not they want a county superintendent, without the C of C backing the movement. His closing statement was, "I personally don't care what the people decide to do or how many petitions they want to sign, that's not my business, that's up to each individual but I strenuously object to the Chamber taking a stand in a political issue such as this."

Anderson said he immediately called both papers and asked for retractions to the story that Earth's Chamber of Commerce was behind the move to oust the County Superintendent, and abolish the office.

This movement was touched off in the county several weeks ago, and efforts are being put forth to get petitions signed.

The signatures of more than 1,000 qualified Lamb County voters are needed to call the special election. About 300 were reported obtained by the Olton group, last Thursday. Plans are to circulate the election petitions in all parts of the county.

McReynolds, manager of the Olton C. of C., has been the leading spokesman for the move to eliminate the office which he terms a "rubber stamp position."

"We're gaining more support all along. This movement is within the realm of our responsibility to promote good efficient government in this area," McReynolds said.

If an election is called, it would seek to abolish the full time job of county superintendent. The county judge would then assume the duties of the office, as ex-officio county superintendent.

The change would effect a considerable saving in state school funds, its proponents say. The \$8,400 salary paid to County Superintendent C. Roy Stevens, would be reduced to not more than \$2,600 for the ex-officio job--probably less, McReynolds says--and other expenses of the office would be reduced.

Since all Lamb County school districts are now independent, and do not depend on the county office for aid as dependent districts did years ago, the office no longer has a full time purpose, McReynolds' group argues.

Residents are urged to read these forms carefully, fill them out and return them to the Jaycee club in a self-addressed envelope that is left with the forms.

Purpose of this project, sponsored by the local club, is to obtain information on how citizens in the community feel about various facilities in the area.

When the forms are returned the evaluating committee will complete the results and decide what is the major need of the residents in the community and begin to work toward that goal.

Mrs. Olds and her children are affiliated with the Church of Christ.

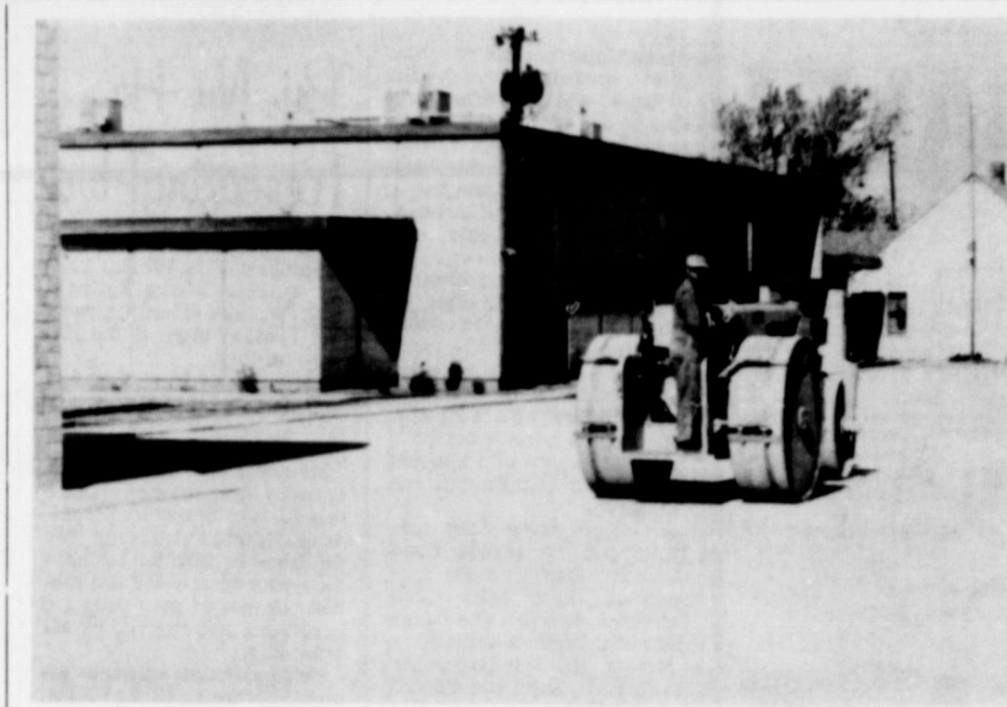
BAPTIST MUSIC CAMP JUNE 22-24

New Football Stadium To Be Constructed At Springlake School

Football fans will have the pleasure of viewing all home games in style, when the season opens this fall, as members of the Springlake School Board voted at Monday night's regular board meeting to construct a new football stadium with a seating capacity of 1066 persons.

Construction of this new \$6,600 stadium is scheduled to get underway in July. Sidney Rogers of Plainview will build the new stadium. Revenue derived from selling reserved seats will be used to finance the building of this new stadium. The Springlake Stadium will be erected identical to the new football stands at Kress and Lialou schools.

Blueprints call for a glassed in two story press box. The top will be used for news coverage and filming games, with the bottom floor to be used for reserved seating. The press box enclosure will have individual chairs, and will be

heated throughout. Price for these reserved seats will be \$25 per year, \$45 for two years, and \$60 for a three year period. Carroll McDonald and Fred Clayton were present at the meeting, representing the Wolverine Booster Club, donating the club's services for labor in the construction of the press box.

A total of 256 reserved seats will be available, this figure includes seats in the center section of the stadium, that will be reserved. These will be selling for \$10 per year with the holder having option for the next year, or if preferred, may be purchased for a three year period for \$25.

Tickets are scheduled to go on sale July 1st, at the City Drug Store in Earth and at Springlake Elevator.

The board members also heard a report from the Springlake School Tax-Assessor's office, on delinquent taxes. Tax records indicate that

property owners are responding well to the school's drive to collect these delinquent taxes which were well over \$11,000, when the drive began.

The school board indicated that it would probably be necessary to take additional action to collect a certain percentage of these taxes, but the members also realize in some cases errors exist in posting and recording taxes and urge all tax payers who have been notified of their delinquent taxes to visit the tax office and discuss their problem with the tax assessor, Mrs. Vernie Bearden. The board expresses their appreciation to those who have delinquent taxes and are making an effort to pay them.

Members of the board also voted to purchase rollaway portable bleachers for the gym. Several other smaller items of business were on the agenda before the board adjourned.

George Bush, 39 year old oil company executive living in Houston, won the Republican nomination in Saturday's primary run-off election over his opponent, Jack Cox, also of Houston.

Bush will try to unseat Texas senior Senator Ralph Yarborough in the general election in November.

A life long Republican, Bush is the son of Prescott Bush, Connecticut's senator from 1952 to 1962, however, this is the former Navy flier's first bid for public office.

Jack Cox beat out Bush in the County election, polling 61 votes to Bush's 46 with only three voting boxes held in the county.

In Earth box, at Winters Fertilizer Co, eleven votes were cast for Cox and Bush received seven. Jay Winders was election judge and clerks were Mrs. Wilson Lewis, Jr. and Billy Braden.

In Olton, Cox received 14 votes and seven votes were cast for Bush. In Littlefield, 36 ballots were cast for Cox and 27 for Bush. In absentee voting, only five votes were cast, all for Bush.

In Lamb County Democratic voting for Congressman at large, Joe Pool beat out Robert Baker by almost a three to one margin, polling 201 votes to Baker's 79. In the 280 votes cast in the county's 17 voting boxes, Cox won over Baker by a large margin over the state.

Only 34 voters turned out to cast ballots in Earth, with O. B. Whitford serving as election judge. Pool received 18 votes, to Bush's 16.

In Springlake's Precinct 15 box, 12 votes were cast, eight for Pool and four for Baker. Ed Dawson served as judge at this box.

In Precinct 17 at Springlake, 14 votes were cast with Pool

receiving 9 to Baker's 5.

Seven voters turned out to cast their ballots in the Pleasant Valley box, polling three for Pool and four for Baker.

In absentee balloting, Pool polled seven votes to Baker's three.

Four members in the Bills family received food poisoning, and were admitted to the South Plains Hospital in Amherst for treatment.

Receiving medical care for the food poisoning were Floyd Bills, his daughter-in-law Mrs. Clifford Bills, Lesia, 5, and Jeannette, 7, all three of Denver City, who were visiting in the Floyd Bills home, Sunday. It is presumed the illness was a result of eating ham.

Mr. Bills became extremely ill around 2 p.m. and was rushed to the hospital by his wife. Upon receiving a telephone call from Mrs. Bills, Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Bills rushed to the hospital to be with his father. Shortly following their arrival at the hospital, Mrs. Bills became ill and the attending physician diagnosed their illness as food poisoning.

The two young girls had been left with their grandparents, the R. S. Cofes, they became ill around 6:30 p.m. and were taken to the hospital, where all four were admitted for treatment. The two girls were released Monday morning and Mr. Bills and the girls' mother were released from the hospital Tuesday.

Melvin Lewis, Lamesa High School biology teacher, and an ex-graduate of Springlake High School, has been awarded a scholarship from the Petroleum Oil Company, in Midland, and is attending a petroleum school at the University of Houston, that began June 1 and ends June 19.

The special school will give Lewis three hours graduate credit toward his masters' degree, with sessions pertaining to the oil industry held each day from 9 a. m. to 12 noon.

Lewis is one of 22 male teachers in the surrounding territory of Lamesa selected for the school. His recommendation for the three hour course was submitted by the Lamesa High School Principal.

Lewis graduated in '63 from Abilene Christian College and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Lewis of Earth. He is married to the former Evelyn Clayton, of Earth, who teaches second grade in V. J. Rogers Elementary School in Lamesa.

While Mr. Lewis is attending the Petroleum school, Mrs. Lewis is visiting her parents Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Clayton, the 'Virgil Lewis' and other relatives in Earth.

Rodeo Arena To Have New Stadium

A complete new face lifting program has been underway for the past several weeks at Earth's Rodeo Arena, preparing for Earth's 20th Annual Rodeo, that will be staged July 9, 10 and 11.

Members of the Association are eagerly at work to make this one of the biggest and best rodeos to be held anywhere on the South Plains this year.

Preparations to handle an even larger crowd than ever before is in progress with the erection of an all steel stadium now underway, with a seating capacity of 1,000 persons. The old stands have been worn down on the west side to make way for this large new steel construction frame, to be erected by a firm in Clayton, New Mexico.

The Rodeo Association has recently completed a two story structure that will house the concession stand on the first floor, with the judges and speaker's area built above. All chutes have been completed, with the exception of painting. Steel posts and new fencing has also been erected around the arena.

With the Rodeo barely one month away, the Earth Rodeo and Roping Club members are donating their time and work in an all out effort to have the arena shining and ready for this big 20th annual event.

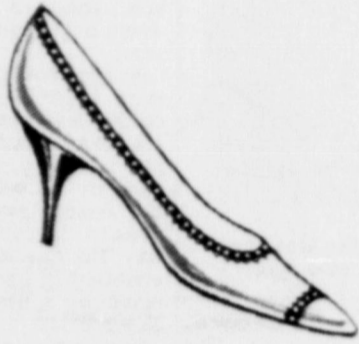

June Is National Dairy Month

June is Dairy Month, the time when we stop to remember that milk isn't meant just for babies, but as one of nature's most perfect foods, containing more than 200 nutrients, is a vital part of the entire family's diet.

This month the Texas Department of Agriculture will make extra efforts along with the National Dairy Council to focus the spotlight of attention on the health giving benefits of all milk products.

Approximately one million families are financially involved in the dairy business from the farm through processing and distribution.

Dairy foods supply over 3/4 of the nation's calcium requirements. One glass of milk, for instance, supplies the same quantity of calcium as ten eggs, or seven oranges, or 7 pounds of potatoes or 2 pounds of carrots. In fact, limitations in the capacity of the stomach make it virtually impossible for the human body to receive the recommended quantity of calcium unless dairy foods are regularly included in the diet.

Over a fourth of the nation's protein needs are furnished by dairy food. Protein is required for growth and repair of body tissue.

Action will take place at Houston's big coliseum and the swank Shamrock Hilton Hotel, convention headquarters.

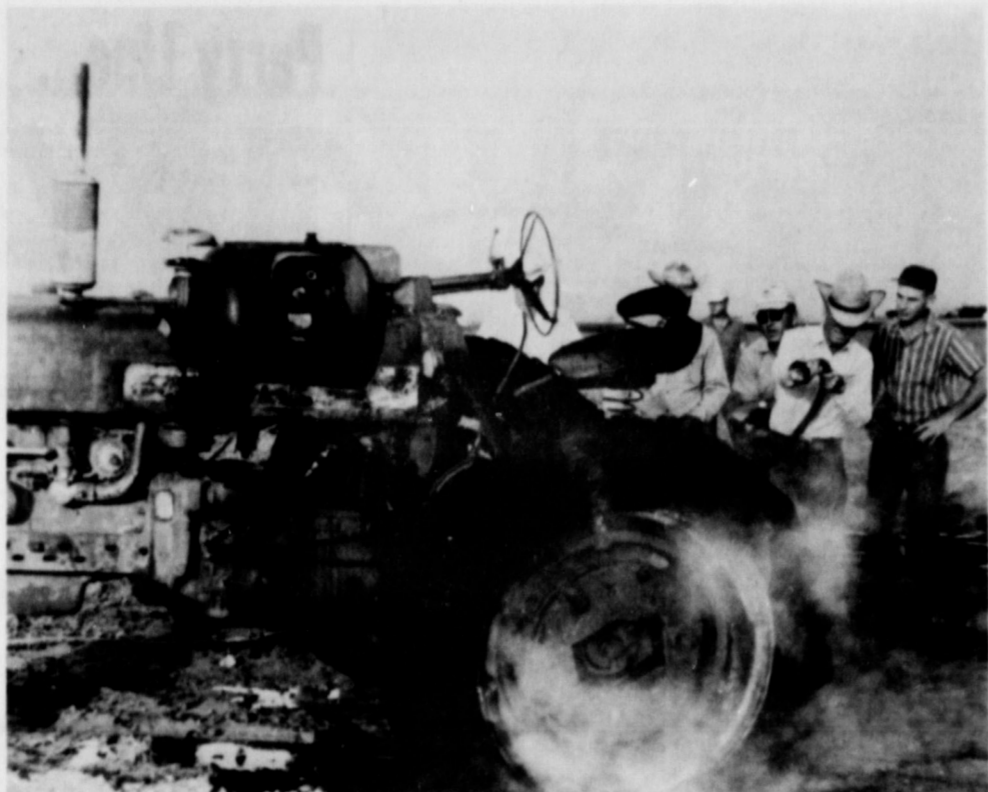
Delegates and alternate delegates who will cast the 2,834 authorized votes from counties are sending up to 15 times their authorized strength will be quartered in 27 hotels scat-

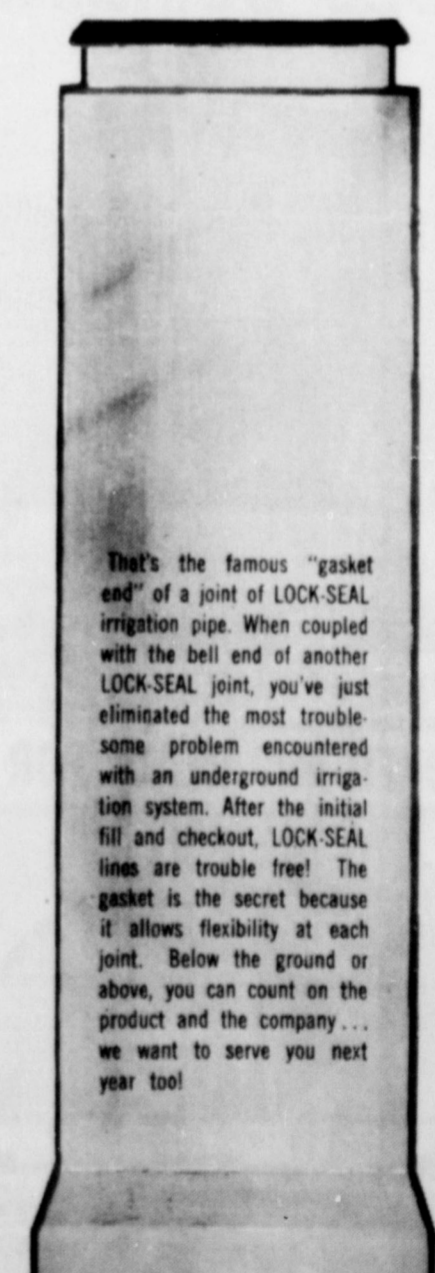

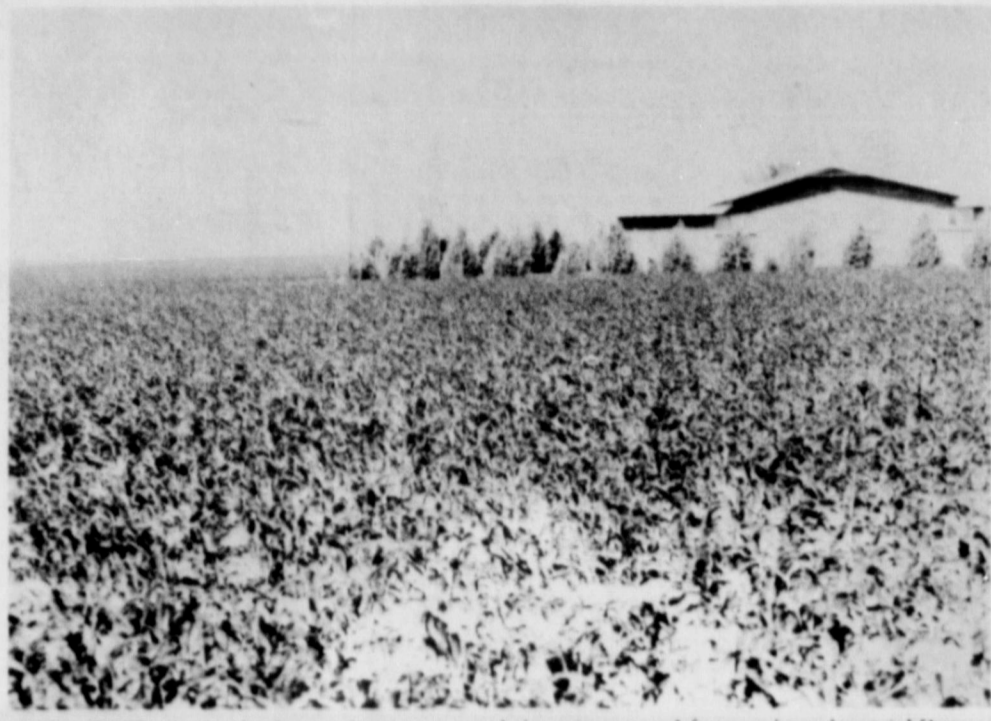

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS INC.

The boll weevil survey that is to be carried out this summer preparatory to entering the "diapause" weevil control program this fall got underway June 2.

By means of intensive surveying this summer the cooperating agencies will be able to tell exactly where it is necessary to spray in the fall. And also, through surveys, it is hoped that more effective in-season control can be achieved to reduce weevil migration, thereby reducing the acreage it will be necessary to spray in the "diapause" program.

Final plans for the survey were laid June 1 at a Lubbock meeting of representatives from the USDA Plant Pest Control, Texas Department of Agriculture, Plains Cotton Growers, the Extension Service and Farmers Home Administration. Some of the things agreed upon by the agencies at the meeting are:

1. The Federal Plant Pest Control and the Texas Department of Agriculture will be jointly responsible for carrying out surveys in counties above the Caprock.

2. The Extension Service will survey counties below the Caprock.

3. Mr. W. L. Owen, Extension Service Entomologist, Lubbock, will make identification of all weevils collected from above and below the Caprock.

4. The Extension Service and Plains Cotton Growers will have joint responsibility for publicity.

The Twenty Three High Plains Counties produced 2,077,750 bales of cotton (500 pounds gross) from 2,073,600 harvested acres in 1963 for an average of just over a bale to the acre, including bagging and ties. In lint cotton, however, the area average came to only 464 pounds, which compares with the 1962 average yield of 488 pounds lint per acre.

These figures, along with others pertaining to Texas cotton, have just been released by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in its annual "Texas Cotton Statistics" bulletin. While the figures released later in the year by the same agency.

The High Plains average yield compares with an average for the state of 362 pounds of lint and the national average of 516 pounds. As can be seen from the chart below, eight of the High Plains counties exceeded the national average. The areas' total production was the third highest on record, topped by 2,344,803 in 1961 and by 2,396,846 in 1962. The 2,077,750 bales from

the High Plains figures to be 13.5 percent of the nation's 15,327,000 bales and over 47 percent of Texas 4,417,000.

The report states that 2,231,800 acres were planted on the High Plains, and of these only 2,073,000 acres were harvested. A majority of the 158,200 acres that were planted and not harvested are probably accounted for by the adverse weather conditions last spring, but even so the High Plains' planted but unharvested percentage of 7.1 compares reasonably well with the state's 6.02 percent planted but unharvested.

Bailey County had 103,000 acres planted in 1963, and harvested 89,000 acres, with an average yield of 514; 1962 average yield was 505.

Castro County planted 56,100 acres in 1963, and harvested 52,000. The average was 486. The 1962 average yield 648.

The Lamb County planted 195,000 acres, and harvested 182,000, with an average of 453. The 1962 average was 534.

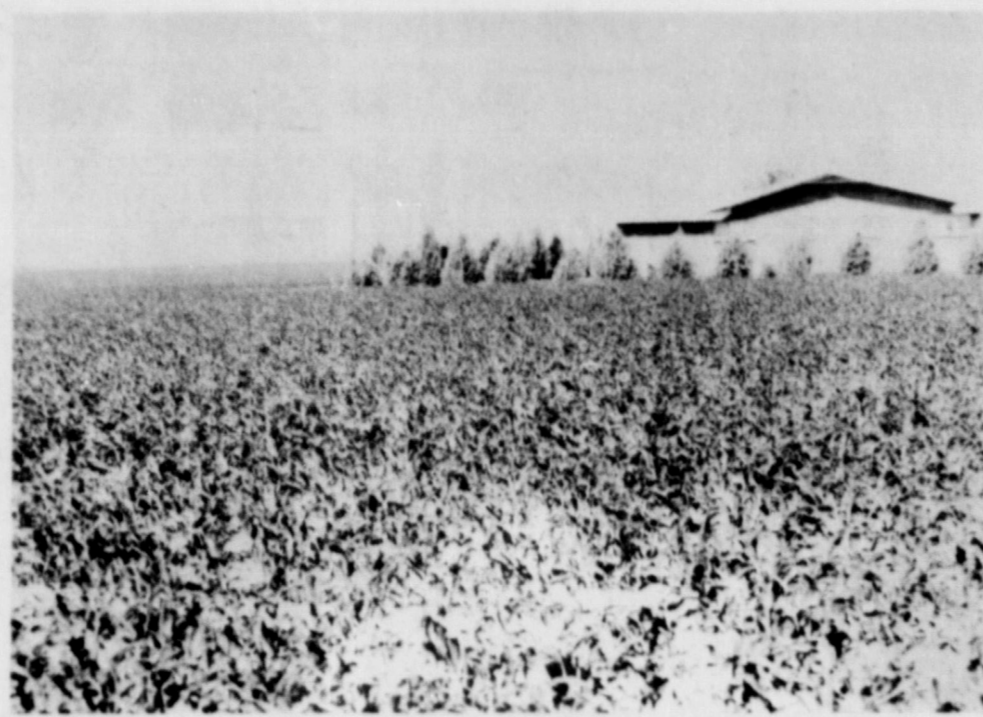

Dear Mr. Trotter,

Thank you for your recent correspondence concerning the pending Civil Rights bill, H. R. 7152. I am opposing passage of this legislation.

Certainly I am desirous of securing equal opportunities for all Americans, just as I feel you are. However, I am of the opinion that portions of the bill, if enacted into law, would be unconstitutional extensions of Federal Government control over areas which our Constitution has reserved to each state and its citizenry. Many of those favoring H. R. 7152 apparently feel the Civil Rights bill should be passed because it has laudible objectives, without realizing its enactment would most probably be destructive of the attainment of such objectives, thus making it even more difficult to permanently resolve racial problems.

The boll weevil survey that is to be carried out this summer preparatory to entering the "diapause" weevil control program this fall got underway June 2.

By means of intensive surveying this summer the cooperating agencies will be able to tell exactly where it is necessary to spray in the fall. And also, through surveys, it is hoped that more effective in-season control can be achieved to reduce weevil migration, thereby reducing the acreage it will be necessary to spray in the "diapause" program.

Final plans for the survey were laid June 1 at a Lubbock meeting of representatives from the USDA Plant Pest Control, Texas Department of Agriculture, Plains Cotton Growers, the Extension Service and Farmers Home Administration. Some of the things agreed upon by the agencies at the meeting are:

1. The Federal Plant Pest Control and the Texas Department of Agriculture will be jointly responsible for carrying out surveys in counties above the Caprock.
2. The Extension Service will survey counties below the Caprock.
3. Mr. W.L. Owen, Extension Service Entomologist, Lubbock, will make identification of all weevils collected from above and below the Caprock.
4. The Extension Service and Plains Cotton Growers will have joint responsibility for publicity.

The Twenty Three High Plains Counties produced 2,077,750 bales of cotton (500 pounds gross) from 2,073,600 harvested acres in 1963 for an average of just over a bale to the acre, including bagging and ties. In lint cotton, however, the area average came to only 464 pounds, which compares with the 1962 average yield of 488 pounds lint per acre.

These figures, along with others pertaining to Texas cotton, have just been released by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in its annual "Texas Cotton Statistics" bulletin. While the figures released later in the year by the same agency.

The High Plains average yield compares with an average for the state of 362 pounds of lint and the national average of 516 pounds. As can be seen from the chart below, eight of the High Plains counties exceeded the national average. The areas' total production was the third highest on record, topped by 2,344,803 in 1961 and by 2,396,846 in 1962.

The 2,077,750 bales from

the High Plains figures to be 13.5 percent of the nation's 15,327,000 bales and over 47 percent of Texas 4,417,000.

The report states that 2,231,800 acres were planted on the High Plains, and of these only 2,073,000 acres were harvested. A majority of the 158,200 acres that were planted and not harvested are probably accounted for by the adverse weather conditions last spring, but even so the High Plains' planted but unharvested percentage of 7.1 compares reasonably well with the state's 6.02 percent planted but unharvested.

Bailey County had 103,000 acres planted in 1963, and harvested 89,000 acres, with an average yield of 514, 1962 average yield was 509.

Castro County planted 56,100 acres in 1963, and harvested 52,000. The average was 486. The 1962 average yield 648.

The Lamb County planted 195,000 acres, and harvested 182,000, with an average of 458. The 1962 average was 534.

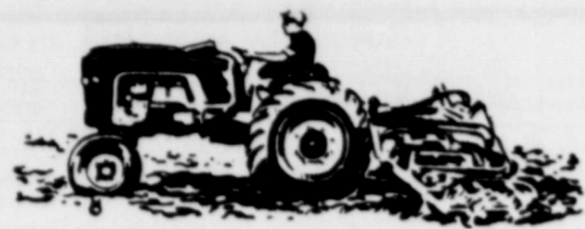
