Earth To See Big Stage Show

Variety Show Sponsored By Earth Lions Club To Be Presented April 18-19

The Earth Lions Club is sponsoring "Around The World In A Daze," a musical revue which will be staged at the Springlake School Auditorium on Friday and Saturday evenings, April 18 and 19, at 8:13 p.m.

Proceeds from the show will go to the Earth Lions Club to aid in the Crippled Childrens Camp and Sight Conservation programs.

"Around The World In A Daze" is the latest in a series of variety shows which is just what its name implies. Two quiz show winners, Mabel Mullins and Casper Perkins, make a whirlwind tour escorted by a pair of airline hostesses who lyrically introduce them to each new foreign port. The first stop is Copenhagen, Hans Christian Anderson's Fairyland, where the story of Cinderella comes to life. The contest winners are then hustled on to Czechoslovakia where a lively polka features teenagers in colorful costumes. Then to Paris and the famed Folies Bergere for night on the town featuring outstanding acts of local talent which will be chosen by Miss Lillian Knoop, a director who is here to produce the show.

Impressed by a little homesick, Mable Mullins and Casper Perkins hop aboard the jet airliner and arrive in Tennessee, U. S. A. just in time for Sadie Hawkins Day, when the annual footrace for husbands is held. At the "social" before the race, the mountaineers witness a most rib-tickling silent movie version of the "Martins and Coys." Chosen members of the community will take part in this skit.

After intermission, Mable and Casper continue on for a visit to Australia and a Garden Party for the Queen, to England for a B. B. C. version of an American television quiz show, to Turkey for a privileged audience with the Sultan's Sweeties, charmingly portrayed by six members of the local Lions Club.

Travel weary after dashing around the world in a Daze, Mable and Casper are welcomed back to good old U. S. A. by all their friends and neighbors in a big, colorful, tune-fest finale.

Press notices from other towns across the country where the show has been successfully staged all say audiences leave chuckling and humming the singable music of "Around The World In A Daze."

Billy Graham Film To Be Shown In Baptist Church

"Miracle In Manhattan," The unusual documentary film account of Billy Graham's New York Crusade will be shown at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 16, in the First Baptist Church.

Jinx Falkenberg and Tex McCrary report the sixteen weeks coverage of Mr. Graham's largest Crusade for Christianity. They "set the stage" with a photographic tour of Manhattan, followed by the excitement of the Crusade's opening night in Madison Square Garden.

In the gigantic sports arena of Madison Square Garden, where men like Rocky Graziano and Joe Lewis once punched their opponents into unconsciousness, the film offers a "front row" perspective of the Graham team in "spiritual combat." The arena becomes a cathedral and the dynamic preaching of the evangelist is augmented by the singing of George Beverly Shea and the music of the massive choir under the direction of Cliff Barrows.

High moments in "Miracle In Manhattan" include the overflow crowd that jammed Yankee Stadium, breaking every attendance record in 34 years of the park's colorful history; a brief appearance of Vice-President, Richard M. Nixon; a glimpse of Ethel Waters singing with the Crusade Choir; and the final service held at 42nd Street and Broadway.

Nearly two million persons attended Madison Square Garden during the 16 week's Crusade activity, making this "spiritual campaign" the largest sustained effort for evangelism in the history of the church.

There is no charge for the showing and the public is cordially invited to attend.

Midland Man To Address The Second Annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet

The Earth Chamber of Commerce will have their second annual banquet Friday, April 11 at 8 p.m. in the Springlake School Cafeteria.

The main address will be given by Delbert Downing, manager of the Midland Chamber of Commerce since 1946. He will be introduced by Jack Lacey, Jr., manager of the Littlefield C. of C.

Downing is a native of Stephens County, Texas and went to Midland in 1938 as manager of a chain grocery store.

He has long been active in civic and church affairs. He is past president of the Rotary and Jaycees, teaches a Sunday School class and is affiliated with many special groups and commissions.

Downing is one of West Texas' most popular public speakers. He has addressed hundreds of gatherings in the past few years. The editor of his hometown newspaper describes him as "a little Lincoln, some Will Rogers, lots of humor and plenty of good common sense, all of which are noticeable in his messages. He is an advisor and father-in-confessor to more people in Midland than perhaps anyone else."

The Downings have a son who is pastor of the First Christian Church of Lake Jackson, Texas; a daughter who is with her soldier husband in Germany and a son who finishes high school this year.

Recently Downing appeared on a half dozen Knife and Fork Club programs in Colorado, Oklahoma and Texas. One Newspaperwoman dubbed him the "Ferry Como of the lecturing platform." He is a relaxed story teller with a knack of making his audience search its collective soul.

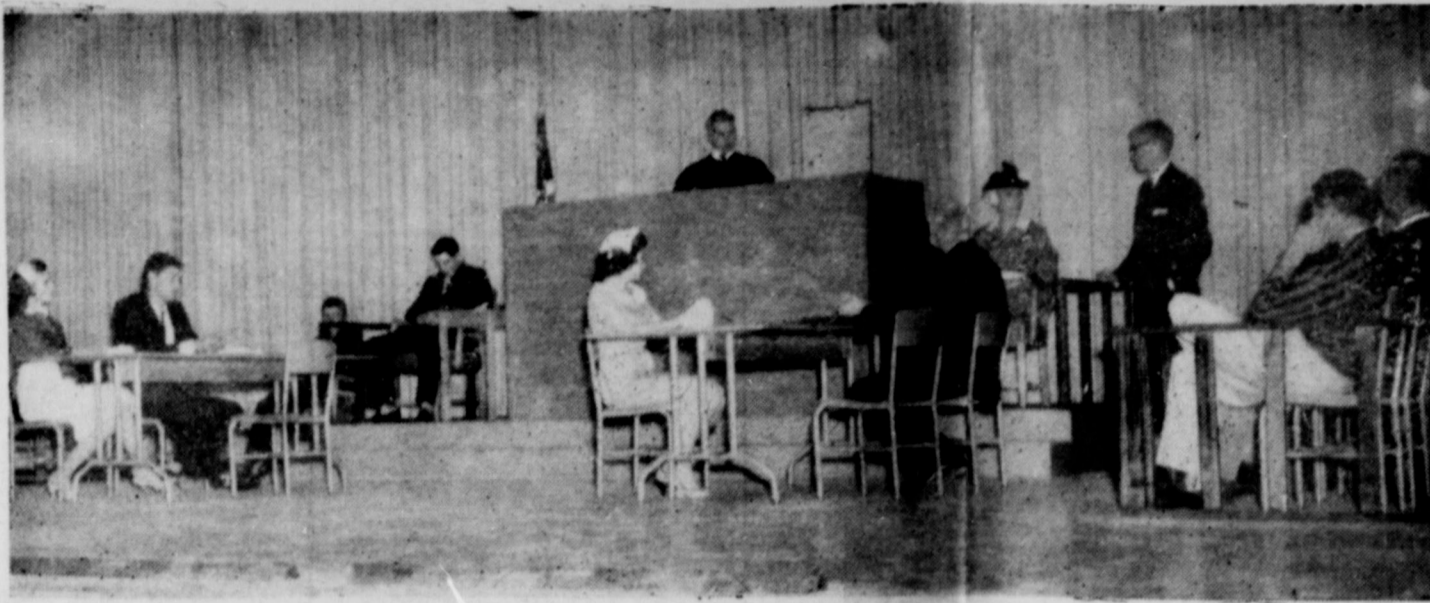

Texas Traffic Safety Quiz

Editor's note: Once each month, the Texas Traffic Safety Council will present the Texas Traffic Safety Quiz, prepared by the Safety Education Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety and distributed by the Texas Press Association.)

Q. If I signal properly for a turn in mid-block, do I have the same legal protection as in making a left turn at an intersection?

A. No. At an intersection, the driver who is meeting you and who is far enough away to slow down safely is required to yield for you to turn left, provided you have signaled properly. He is not required to yield to you in mid-block. You are permitted to cross the center line to turn left in mid-block only when your vehicle will not interfere with the movement of traffic. (Some city ordinances prohibit the mid-block left turn, especially in business areas.)

Q. Are blinking lights a legal signal for making turns, the same as hand signals?

A. Yes, if you are talking about directional signals mounted on each side of the car, front and rear, which a driver can turn on and off. A warning for a turn may be given by either a directional light signal or a hand and arm signal, or by both. (At night, the directional signal is safer.)

Q. If I am backing out of an angle parking stall, does a car coming up behind me have the right of way? If it does, how can I get out when traffic is heavy?

A. Yes. A driver starting from a parked position is responsible for the start being made with safety. The best thing for you to do is wait for a break in traffic. If there is a signal light at the intersection behind you, wait until the light is red before you start backing.

Q. A truck had two signs on the back of its trailer. The left sign read: "Passing Side." The right sign read: "Suicide." This truck passed me on the right side. Was this an illegal pass?

A. Not if the right side of the roadway was wide enough for two lines of traffic to move safely.

The signs referred to driving off the pavement of a two-lane road to pass on the right side. Such a pass on the right side is illegal.

Q. What is the speed limit for pick-ups outside of towns?

A. 60 MPH in daytime, 55 MPH at night. These limits apply to all commercial vehicles which have a rated load capacity of 1500 pounds or less.

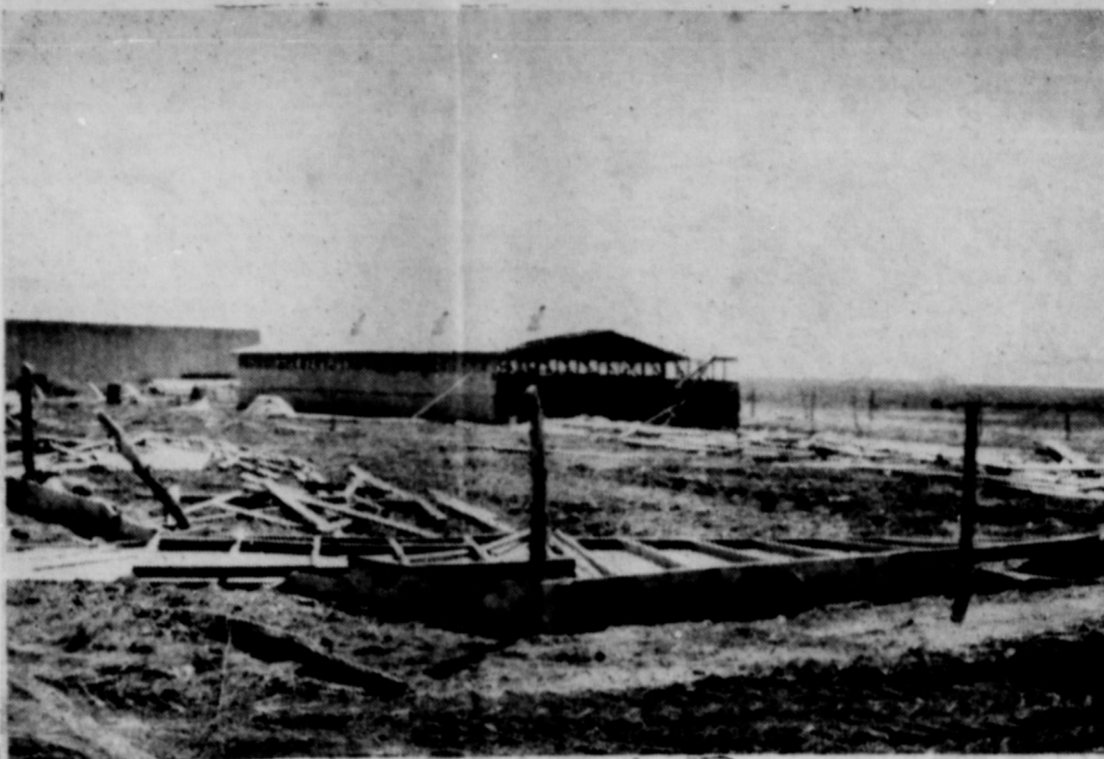

Production practices govern quality and yield. Do your best to see that your land preparation is adequate. Check your soil fertility needs now so that maximum production of quality cotton will not be hampered by lack of nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium or organic matter. Sub soil moisture may be adequate — but check to be sure.

Planting time is almost here. Optimum planting dates on the High Plains are May 5-20. Later planting usually results in lower quality. Before planting be sure the minimum soil temperature averages 60 degrees for 10 days at an 8-inch depth from the top of the bed. Use delinted, treated seed and check for germination. A uniform stand of approximately four stalks per foot in 40-inch rows is recommended. The method of harvest to be used should help determine the variety planted.

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Area Cotton Harvest Report

LUBBOCK — Total number of bales of cotton ginned and harvested from the 23 member counties of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. off the 1957-58 crop according to the Bureau of Census, U. S. Department of Commerce stands at 1,570,520 bales.

The Bureau of Census released the figures as of March 24. The 1957-58 crop total compares to approximately 1,650,000 bales produced in 1956-57.

For the entire state of Texas production was higher in 1957 than it was in 1956. The '57 crop total was 3,600,425 for the state as compared to 3,555,106 bales in '56.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has reported that 1957 ginnings contained the smallest proportion of higher grade cotton of any crop in the past eight years.

Spotted cotton comprised nearly one-third of the season's crop, the largest percentage of spotted cotton in any crop record.

California and Texas were the only two states that produced more cotton in 1957-58 than they did in 1956-57.

Lamb County produced 143,488 bales in 1957-58 and 172,331 bales in 1956-57. Hale County had 138,400 bales in 1957-58 and 199,914 bales in 1956-57. Bailey County totaled 72,632 bales in 1957-58 as compared to 73,148 bales in 1956-57. Castro County ginned 40,305 bales in 1957-58, dropping from a total of 54,490 bales in the 1956-57 season.

Counties showing increase in number of bales ginned in 1957-58 were Motley, Lynn, Howard, Garza, Dickens, Deaf Smith, Dawson, Borden and Briscoe.

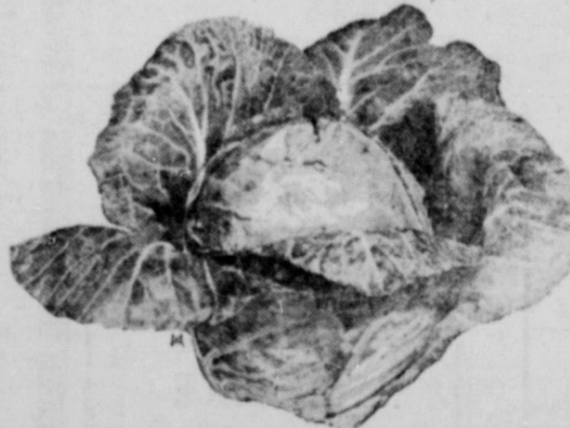
