Postmaster Marshall warns that if any of your Christmas card envelopes are larger than 9"x12" or smaller than 2 3-4" x4' they must be sent by first-class mail because such cards require hand cancellation.

When your cards are ready to mail, you will do both yourself and the clerks a real favor by putting the cards with LOCAL addresses in one bundle and those for OUT-OF . TOWN destinations in another. Then mark each bundle with special identification labels you can get free at the Post Office which read "ALL FOR OUT OF TOWN DELIVERY" and ALL FOR
