Thomas Gregory Exhibits Champion Poland China Barrow At Lubbock

A 16-year-old Springlake FFA member, Thomas Gregory, exhibited the Champion Poland-China barrow Tuesday at the South Plains Junior Livestock Show, winning with an animal bred by Jack Hadaway, Fort Worth.

Thomas, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Gregory, Earth, made his first appearance at the big barrow show.

The Springlake youth has been active in FFA for two years, and with this animal, has recorded three awards. He received Grand Champion awards in the Earth and Lamb County shows.

T.D. Tanksley, swine specialist of the Texas Agricultural Station, served as judge. He reports that this was possibly the largest and strongest barrow show ever held in the Southwest.

A total of 901 entries were shown with 100 pigs in most classes. Twenty pigs placed in each class. Approximately 270 were shown in the Poland China breed.

Jimmy Smith, Springlake, was awarded 5th place in the medium weight Poland China division and Bill Chaney 7th. In the heavyweight Hampshire class, 18th place was awarded to Don Johnson.

The Springlake Chapter had six entries in the show.

91,684 Acres of Cotton Allotment Transferred to 23-County Area

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., of Lubbock has announced the transfer of 91,684 acres of cotton allotment from other areas in the state for planting by farmers in the 23-county PCG area. On an average year, the acreage increase should add approximately 90,000 bales to the High Plains production, and some \$135,000 to its gross income.

The acreage bonus comes under the 1960 law which permits farmers to release unwanted acres to their county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee without losing those acres for purposes of calculating future allotments. And, since these acres are retained as planting "history" by farmers who released them, producers who receive the extra acreage will not be given credit for them when allotments are figured in future years.

The final figure of 91,684 acres was compiled by PCG from information supplied by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation service office of College Station. The State ASC office first uses the acreage released to fill requests for additional planting quota in the county and zone where it is released. Excess acreage not needed to fill these requests is then available, for filling applications for increased acreage outside that particular zone.

The acreage received this year represents an increase of 50,720 acres over the 40,964 allotted to the High Plains in 1962. The increase comes as a result of the state having been re-zoned for 1963 by the State ASC committee, with only two zones as compared to the previous five. The zoning was changed in order to provide for a more equitable distribution of released acreage and a consequent maximum utilization of the state's allotted acres. The High Plains area is a part of the area designated as "Zone 2".

The deadline for individual farmers to make application for sharing in this acreage "bonus" expired on March 4, and final distribution of the acreage assigned each county is to be made by county ASC committees by March 25. A producers' share of the county's total is figured by the county committees, using various systems designed by the committees to reflect existing conditions in that county.

Addition of these extra acres to the original allotments brings the total available for planting in the 23 counties to 2,202,553 acres, or an overall reduction of 194,293 acres from the 2,396,846 total for 1962. This amounts to about 8.1% less acreage, while the reduction in original allotment figured over 10%.

The reapportioned acres, by counties, together with other pertinent figures for comparison are given below.

Acres received 1963 reapportionment for Bailey County 6,340; original 1963 allotment, 94,855; total 1963 acreage, 101,195; total 1962 acreage, 108,258. Total acreage lost, 7,063.

For Castro county, reapportioned acres total 4,209; original 1963 allotment, 52,020; total 1963 acreage, 56,229; total 1962 acreage, 60,128 for a loss of 3,899 acres.

Reapportioned acres for Lamb county are 4,316; original 1963 allotment, 184,894; total 1963 acreage, 189,210; total 1962 acreage was 208,298 for a loss of 19,088.

Final Round Due Sunday For Polio Vaccine

The third and final round of the county-wide Oral Sabin Vaccine, Type III immunization is scheduled for next Sunday, March 24 at the Springlake High School from 1:30 p.m. to 6 p.m.

The importance of children and young adults taking the vaccine is being stressed by health authorities from the Lamb County level to the

surgeon general. The number of residents taking part in Types I and II immunizations was reported to be very good and it is hoped that the scheduled Type III participants will be equally as eager to help prevent the dread disease.

Members of the Earth-Springlake Lions Clubs will assist in this club-sponsored project.

Herbicides And Insecticides To Highlight Meeting

There will be a farm chemical meeting, Monday March 25 at 8 p.m. in the Springlake School Cafeteria.

Pre-emergence Herbicides and the new modern method of systemic insecticides for cotton will be the highlight of the program, featuring Mr. Charles Cobb, Educational Representative for Farm Chemicals from Lubbock.

Mr. Cobb will preside at the program, which is being sponsored by Springlake Vocational Agriculture Department.

He will have slides on tests of these chemicals from last year's crops. He will also explain uses, problems and benefits from the uses of these farm chemicals.

Everyone is invited. The program will start promptly at 8:00 p.m.

Cattle Feeding To Be Discussed At Meeting Tonight

A meeting pertaining to the new program of self-feeding cattle will be held Thursday at the Earth Community Room at 7:30 P.M.

John Shaw, Purina representative for this district will show slides and present a short talk on the advantages of self-feeding cattle.

Bob Vail, Dock Potts and Bonnie Rice of Taylor-Evans Seed Company will show a short film and discuss the new grain varieties that will be on the market this year for seed planting.

Cotton John of Lubbock and the film "Follow The Bamboo" will be an added attraction.

The latter film revolves around the trip to the Far East and the Holy Land made by residents of the high plains, among whom was Bonnie Haberer of Pleasant Valley.

Murder Charge Filed Against Lazbuddie Man

Cirilo Villa, 29, of Lazbuddie was arraigned Tuesday before Justice of the Peace M.P. Morgan on an open charge of murder.

He is charged with the gun slaying of T. Guadalupe Madrid 22, of Clovis, Saturday.

Villa entered a plea of not guilty by reason of self-defense. Bond was set at \$5,000. Villa posted \$2,000 cash bond and was released from the Curry County jail.

Curry County Sheriff Nelson Worley said Villa was apprehended at his residence near Lazbuddie Monday afternoon, and later signed a statement concerning the shooting.

Two Lamb County Latin-Americans were picked up early Sunday morning in Earth on suspicion of the Clovis shooting, by Deputy V.L. Smith, Jr., but were cleared when witnesses failed to identify them. They were charged with drunkenness.

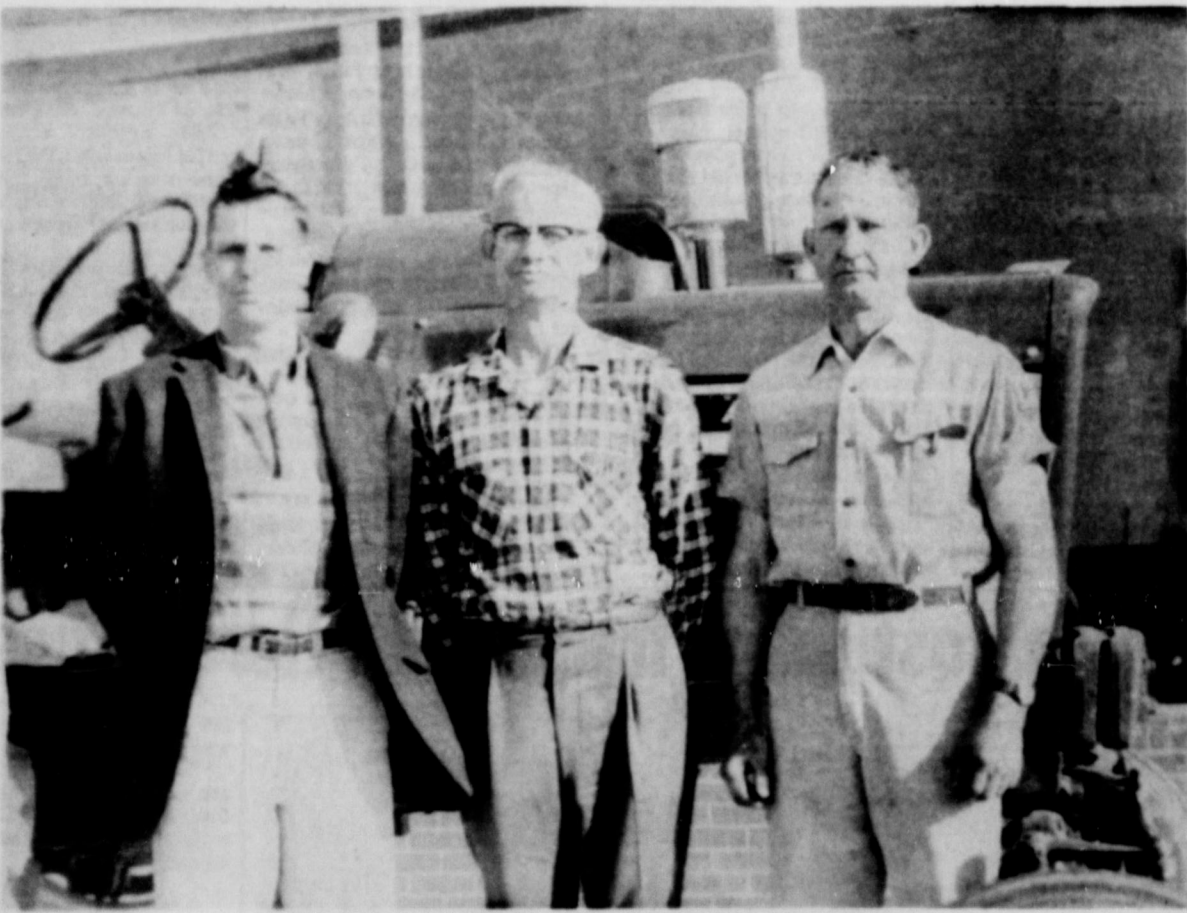

Persons Above 30 Told Immunization Risk Slight

The importance of children and young adults taking the third oral Sabin polio immunization is being stressed by health authorities from the Lamb county level to the surgeon general.

However, vaccination of adults, particularly above age 30, should be carried out only with full recognition of its very small risk, according to a statement made recently by the Surgeon General's Special Advisory Committee.

"Vaccination is especially

recommended for those adults who are at higher risk of naturally occurring disease; for example parents of young children, pregnant women, persons in epidemic situations, and those planning foreign travel", the committee advised.

The third and final round of the county-wide oral Sabin immunization is scheduled for next Sunday, March 24, from 12 p. m. to 6 p. m. at seven stations in the county.

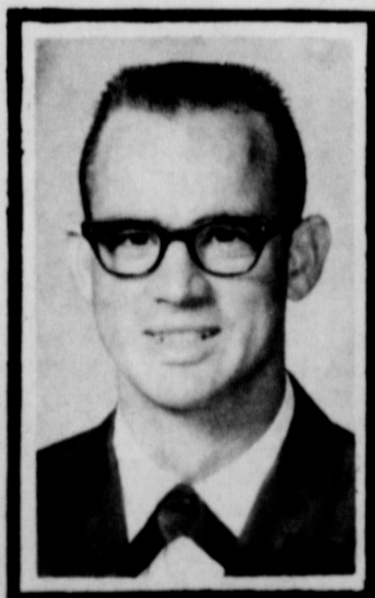

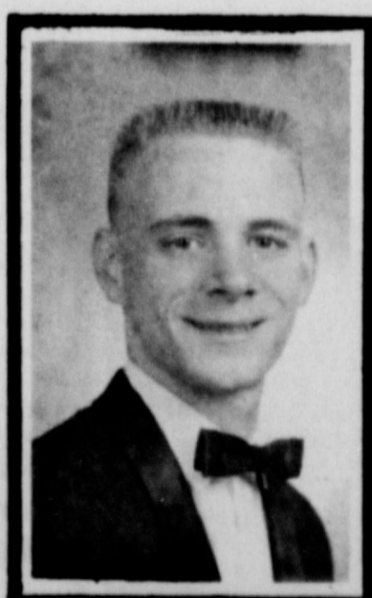

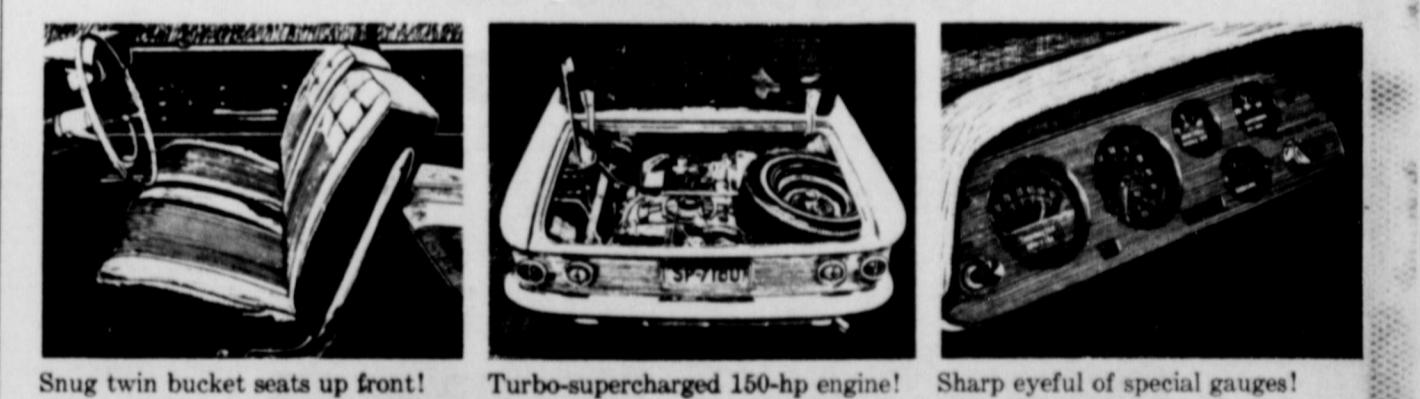

Three Cotton Varieties Show High Performance In Recent TAES Tests

The superior performance characteristics of Rex, Austin, and Lockett 88A varieties of cotton were again demonstrated by the most recent results of Texas Agricultural Experiment Station tests being conducted with financial support from Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. PCG has announced that these three varieties out-produced all others in the tests, which include studies of 12 varieties over the four-year period, 1958 through 1962. Test plots at Brownfield and Lubbock were utilized, with those at Brownfield slightly exceeding yields at Lubbock. LeVon Ray, Assistant Agronomist for the Station at Lubbock, explained that this fact largely stems from the longer growing season at Brownfield.

In open-boll varieties, the new Acala 1517 BR-2, which was released in 1962 by the New Mexico Experiment Station, showed greatest promise for those areas where length of season and other factors are adaptable to Acala-type, or open-boll cottons. Others in this category which did well in 1962 tests were Rex Smoothleaf, Paymaster 8890, and Rex

The advantage of the Acala 1517 BR-2 over these other varieties is its greater resistance to Bacterial Blight and tolerance of Verticillium Wilt.

Additional details concerning the tests, both on stripper and open-boll varieties, can be obtained by growers from county agents, or from the Experiment Stations. All figures reflect an average of results obtained in the Lubbock and Brownfield tests.

Record Premiums To Be Offered At 1963 State Fair

A total of \$91,200 in livestock premiums will be offered at the 1963 State Fair of Texas, October 5-20, it has been announced by Ray W. Wilson, livestock manager. The Pan-American Livestock Exposition, Oct. 5-13, will have premiums of \$67,856, and the Junior Livestock Show, Oct. 14-19 will offer \$23,344. There is an overall increase

of \$6,138 in premiums for 1963 over last year's State Fair livestock shows, Wilson said.

A highlight of the Pan-American will be a National Register of Merit Hereford Show, with premiums of \$15,000. It is the first time in the history of the State Fair that the Hereford Show has received Register of Merit recognition from the American Hereford Association. The total of \$36,500 for beef cattle breeds also includes Angus, \$7,500; Brangus, \$2,000; Brahman, \$4,500; Charolais, \$2,000; Santa Gertrudis, \$3,000; and Shorthorn, \$2,500. Plans are underway with the Texas Brangus Breeders Association to

present the official Brangus show at the Pan-American, Wilson said. There will also be a display herd of Charbray cattle.

The dairy cattle show will offer premiums totaling \$18,300. Breeds and the premiums for each are Ayrshire, \$2,000; Brown Swiss, \$1,900; Guernsey, \$4,000; Holstein-Friesian, \$5,700; and Jersey, \$4,700. The Brown Swiss show will be the first for this breed at the Fair. There will be a display herd of Milking Short-horns.

Premiums for swine will total \$6,675, with whows for Berkshire, Chester White, Duroc, Hampshire, Landrace, Poland China

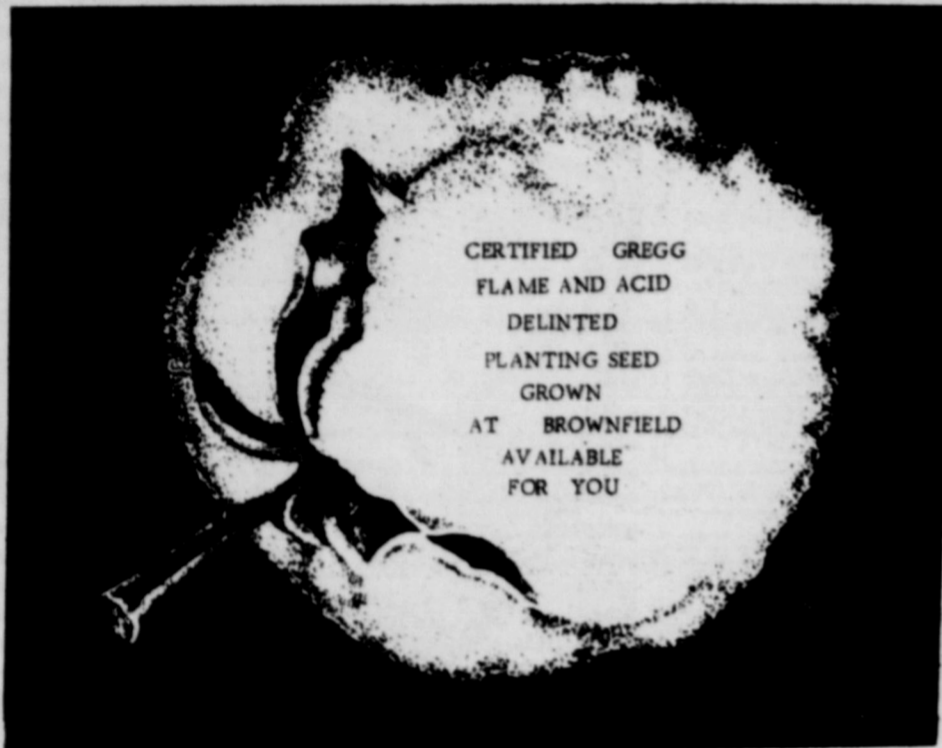
and Yorkshire breeds. The Landrace show is new at the Fair.

The sheep show premiums amount to \$5,023, for Columbia, Delaine-Merino, Hampshire, Rambouillet, Southdown and Suffolks breeds. Angora goat premiums are \$718.

Special herdsman awards totaling \$640 will be made.

In the Junior Livestock Show, premium money will be awarded as follows: Dairy Show: \$4,665; Beef Heifers, \$4,300 steers, \$2,605; market steers, \$4,025; barrows, \$4,628; lambs \$2,640, and display awards, \$480. The Brahman breed has been added to the Junior Beef Heifer Show this year.

A great many anglers like to fish whenever and wherever they can. These fellows are ready to go at the drop of a hint, anytime.

Some keep a rod and reel and a small tackle box in the car, handy at all times. More avid anglers even carry fishing "gear" in their suitcases... just in case.

In such instances the "gear" usually includes a three-piece bait-casting rod, protected against breakage by a metal tube. Also a reel encased in a leather or cloth bag, to keep it clean and to protect clothes from oil or gear grease.

A very small aluminum tackle box, that holds the minimum of lures and other essentials for lake or pond fishing, completes the equipment.

Those who like to bay-fish, of course, include the necessary salt-water tackle. A looksee at one angler's gear revealed the following items:

1. A three-piece, suitcase-sized bait-casting rod in an aluminum case, small enough to fit into almost any size travel bag.
2. A narrow-spool Ambassador bait-casting reel.
3. An aluminum tackle box of midget size, but adequately supplied with lures.

He was ready to go—now. And with lightweight equipment that didn't up the baggage scales much.

In the tackle box, about 6x9 inches in size, and some three inches deep, were the following items:

- 3 Heddon Spook topwater chuggars, all in the smaller size. Colors: black, silver and yellow.
- 3 pen-shaped topwater spinners, similar to the Gold Digger, with blades on both front and back. Colors: black, white and yellow.



- 3 Extractors: the jig with the spinning blade.
- 2 Sparkling Dixie Jets; and 2 Mr. Champs — all with white or yellow bucktails attached.
- 4 black bucktails, for replacements if needed.
- 8 floating, artificial worms: 2 each in solid black, blue and brown. Also in white with black polka dots.
- 6 weedless hooks (2/0).
- 6 sliding sinkers, in the very smallest size.
- 1 small box of medium-sized split shot.
- 8 snap swivels.
- 8 double swivels.
- 1 penny box of matches.
- 1 extra spool of monofilament line for the reel.
- 1 pair of fingernail clippers, for line cutting purposes.
- 1 knife with scaling niches on the back of its long slender very sharp blade.
- 1 stringer.

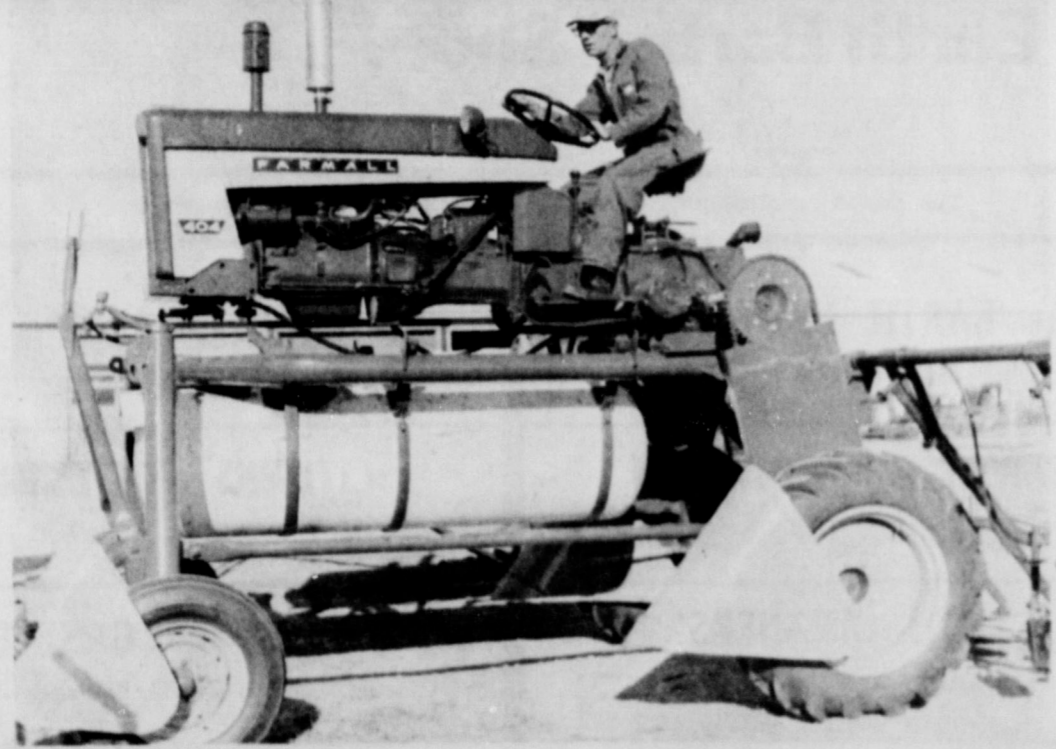

What America Means To Me
