

Interest was paid on time deposits. Two and one half percent was the usual rate. Thrift and profitable investments were practiced and encouraged.

There is no evidence of the existence of regular savings banks. However, there were three methods of saving: First, by entrusting funds to bankers. Second, by placing them in the care of priests. Third, by depositing them in safes guarded y the State.

The first method was strictly a means for safeguarding sav-ings. The banker received the deposit but paid no interest. Excellent facilities were furnished by the State for the safekeeping of valuables. The cit-

It not quite as lucky, the same parent may hold his breath anxiously as the pileup on field dissolves and he discovers that it is Junior lying there in a heap on the

Football, like all "contact sports" does carry certain innerent risks of injury, reminds the Texas Safety Association, but proper training, equipment and supervision can improve the young ball player's chances to avoid injury on the field. Head and neck injuries are

most likely to be serious or even fatal-there were 36 fatal football injuries reported in 1966, 26 of them involving high school age players. The most important piece of protective equipment worn by the football player is the suspension helmet, complete with face guard, the organization pointed out.


