The Annual Lamb County Soil Fertility Day will be held at Springlake High School on Friday, February 19 at the High School Auditorium. The meeting is scheduled to begin at 9:45 a.m. Highlighting the day will be talks from several of the state's outstanding authorities on proven farm practices. The meeting will begin with free

coffee from 9:45 to 10:00 a.m. courtesy of Earth Chamber of Commerce. Ross "Skeeter" Brock of Earth will act as master of ceremonies for the morning session. Phil Cannon, president of the Earth Chamber of Commerce, will give the welcome address. At 10:15 a.m. Bob Thurmond, irrigation specialist will speak. He

will be followed by D. W. Sherrill, who will speak on Economics of Irrigation. Both speakers are from Texas A. and M. At 11 a.m. Soil Agronomist Jack Barton of Texas A. and M. will speak on field production and soil management. The Teen Tones of Springlake High School will provide entertainment at 11:40 a.m.

At 11:50 a panel of local farmers is scheduled. Appearing on the panel to discuss "Method and Result" will be Wiley Medgett of Sudan, water management and fertility; Euel Jones of Olton, 29 inch grain sorghum; W. W. Bearden of Circle, use and management of cotton burrs; Billy Wayne Clayton of Springlake, hybrid grain sorghum and fertilizer; C. E. Jones of

Littlefield, tomato production and soil improvement crops; Walter Gray of Littlefield, grasses; Mur- rel Brigrance of Olton, feeding livestock home feed; and Harold Allison of Pleasant Valley, farm management. The noon meal will be served in the school cafeteria at 12:45 p.m. At 1:30 p.m. the group will gather

for continuation of the panel. A question and answer period will begin at 1:50 and continue for 15 minutes. Mr. Stokes, vice president of the Federal Land Bank of Houston, will begin his 45 minute talk at 2:05 p.m. At 2:50 p.m. a question and answer period will be held for anyone attending to benefit by asking

questions which present a problem. This will close the day's program. Filing Period Ends March 3, Election Date Set For April 1

The City Council met in a regular session Monday night with Mayor Roy Neal, City Aldermen Carroll Blackwell, John Welch, Pete Parish and Clarence Kelley, City Secretary Rubye Anderson, Water Superintendent W. F. Williamson, Joe Simpson, and Mrs. Polly Middleton attending.

Monday, Feb. 3 was the opening day for candidates to file for City offices. The deadline was set for 5 P. M. Monday, March 3. The Council elected Harvey Evans as Election Judge for the City Election, April 1, which will be held in the community building.

The terms of Mayor Roy Neal, and Aldermen Carroll Blackwell, Clarence Kelley and Pete Parish will expire.

The matter of rates for water to the Cemetery was discussed, but no action was taken.

A discussion was held on extending City Water to twelve homes east of town, providing they furnished their own line. It was decided that for efficient water line operation, these persons would have to tie onto a six inch line, rather than a smaller pipe, if they choose to join onto the City Water. No concrete decisions were reached.

Council voted to buy one dozen chairs for the City Office and to pay their routine bills.

No candidates had filed at press time Wednesday for any of the four vacancies created by the expiration of terms in our City Government.

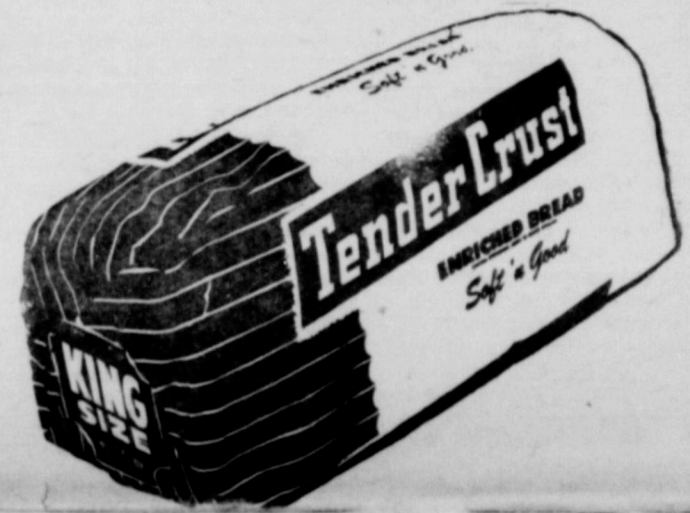

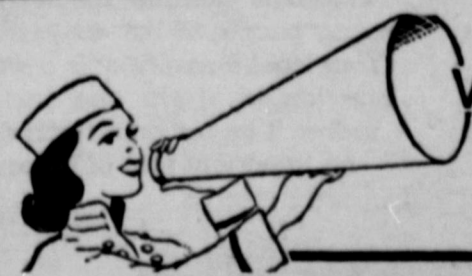

Data Obtained On Ten Varieties of Soybeans In Tests Conducted at High Plains Station

The need for an irrigation in late September to mature the seed of soybeans was apparent from the yields obtained in a variety test at the High Plains Station of Texas Research Foundation in 1957. Due to the inability to acquire aluminum transport pipe, it was nearly impossible to get water to this test in late September. It appears that this late irrigation was necessary for maximum yields. However, recognizing the fact that the earlier types were favored by this lack of a September irrigation, data obtained are presented.

The ten varieties were planted on June 17 at the rate of sixty pounds of seed per acre in two row plots 160 feet long. There were three replications of each variety randomly placed in the field to eliminate the effects of soil and water differences on yield. Thirty six pounds of nitrogen and forty five pounds of P205 were applied at planting. The plots received a preplant irrigation and three subsequent waterings to make a total of 15 inches of applied water. There were 17.4 inches of natural rainfall during the period of April 1 and October 1 making a total of 32.4 inches of water which could be considered available for plant growth.

In this test a difference of less than 2.66 bushels per acre between any two varieties might be due to a chance and in another test under similar conditions, the ranking might change. One example of a variety made over two bushels more than Dorthosoy No. 2. Therefore, this variety can be considered as high yielding under these conditions as any of the others.

Tree Seedlings Now Available For Windbreak Plantings This Spring

COLLEGE STATION — Some 210,000 tree seedlings are available to West Texas landowners for windbreak planting this spring according to Don Young, head Forest Management Department of the Texas Forest Service.

"Landowners interested in planting windbreaks should get their orders in before the March 1 deadline," Young said. "However, these trees may be used only for windbreaks; they are not to be used for ornamental or shade planting purposes," he added.

Red cedar, Chinese elm, Australian pine, and ponderosa pine seedlings are available and will be shipped for planting shortly after March 1. The small trees will be sold for \$3 per hundred.

"Cedar and pine seedlings have 6 to 9 inch tops while the elm tops range from 12 to 18 inches. All of the small trees have 8-inch roots. The seedlings are packed root to root in moss and moisture-proof paper rather than being individually wrapped in burlap," Young reported.

Application blanks can be procured from county agents and Soil Conservation District offices in the West Texas area. In addition, the forms are available upon request from the Director, Texas Forest Service, College Station.

"Established windbreaks are an excellent means of preventing wind erosion of valuable topsoil as well as providing protection for farmsteads," Young stated.

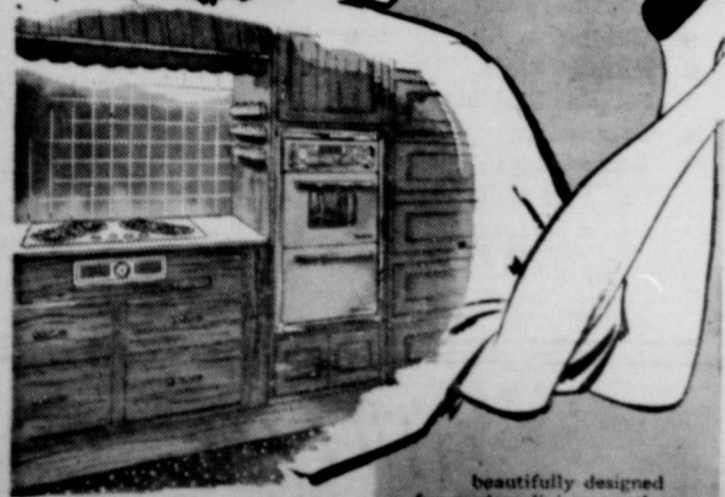

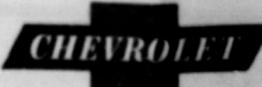

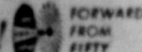

Production Of Thirty Tons Of Ensilage Per Acre Possible With Forage Sorghum

High Plains farmers can produce thirty tons of ensilage per acre with forage sorghums. This is shown in a variety of tests at the High Plains Station of Texas Research Foundation.

In a test of six varieties planted at the Station in 1957, the yields ranged from 23.5 tons to 30.5 tons of green material to the acre. Honey Drip was the highest yielding variety and produced approximately two tons more than Honey Sorgo, the second highest.

This test was planted June 21 at the rate of ten pounds of seed per acre. The seed were planted in four row plots 100 feet long with four sets of plots (replications) randomly placed so as to eliminate differences in soils, watering, and other factors in the field which effect yield. Thirty six pounds of nitrogen and forty five pounds of phosphorus were applied at planting time with seventy five pounds of nitrogen sidedressed July 18. The plots received a pre-plant irrigation with three subsequent waterings. A total of 15 inches of water was applied by irrigation and 17.4 inches of rain fell during the period of April 1 to October 1. This made a total of 32.4 inches of water which could have been available for plant growth.

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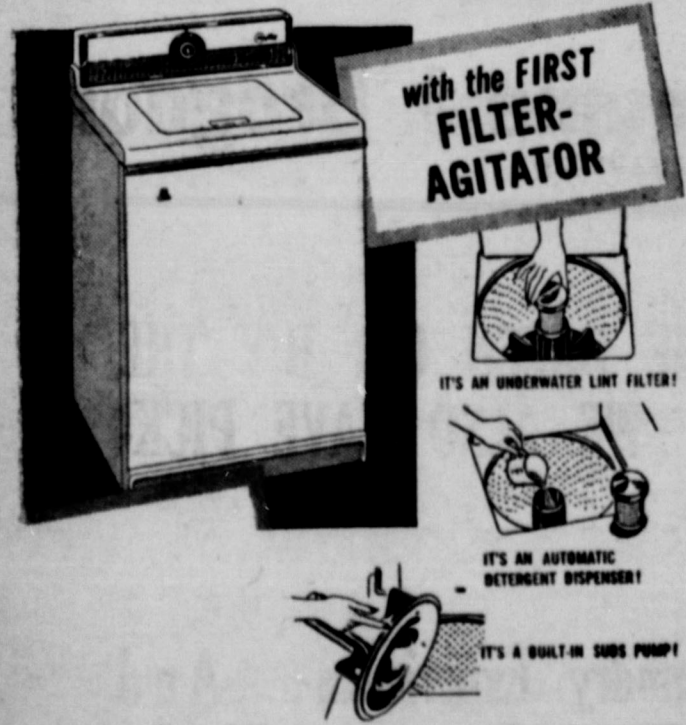

INCREASE FACILITIES
*(A distinguished Texas

Our good Texas program for re-training juvenile delinquents into worthwhile citizens is today imperiled by too little space in our very good institutions and too few probation and other personnel for adequate supervision and training.

The last regular session of the Legislature did something to relieve the situation but not enough.

Extremely Overcrowded
 The State Training School for Boys at Gatesville is designed to handle 575 boys. It now has about 850. The girls' school at Gainesville was built for 180; it has 220. The last Legislature provided dormitories for 160 boys, a school building, kitchen, and dining room.

Release Too Soon
 No more boys, however, will be accommodated. The new buildings will simply serve to relieve the present overcrowding. Many boys who already need to go there can't be sent; many boys sent will be released before their training is sufficient. And with our ever-increasing delinquency rate, even more offenders will be free who need to be confined and trained.

At Gainesville three new dormitories and a security treatment cottage were provided to replace existing ones considered extreme hazards. But they will not provide room for more girls.

Increase Facilities
 With present facilities so inadequate, whose responsibility is it for failure to rehabilitate? Isn't it ours? We are the people whose elected representatives carry out our wishes. What can we do to remedy the situation? We can make our legislators and our county officials (for county-level facilities) understand clearly what we want.
