## Be On The Alert -- Learn Siren Signals

The siren blasts -- your heart skips a beat, PANIC! Can't remember the signals, . . . Is it a fire or a possible tornado???

The Civil Defense Units have announced this week they have set up a new system of storm warnings this year to remove any possible doubt in your minds as to the meanings of the siren blasts.

When you hear the siren blast listen for 1 long blast -- this means a warning, be on the alert for possible turbulent weather; continuous blast -- 17 seconds on and 17 seconds off. This means the town is

in danger and you should proceed to a safe place; 1 long blast -- all is clear. The turbulent weather has passed.

Three (3) blasts of the siren mean a city fire and 2 blasts mean a country fire.

To make sure the signals are fully understood, the Civil Defense Unit will conduct a practice alert, weather permitting, Sunday, May 2, at 2 p.m.

The firemen will no longer be reminded of their meetings by a blast of the siren, as this has been included in the storm warnings.

## Cancer Drive Has Kick-off

The Earth division of the American Cancer Society had its kick-off meeting at 8:45 a.m. Tuesday in the home of Mrs. Thurman Lewis. Workers enjoyed a morning coffee prior to beginning their task of canvassing each household in Earth for needed donations for the cancer fund.

Funds given by Texans to the American Cancer Society were spent in these ways during the fiscal year which ended August 31, 1970.

38 cents for cancer research -- sponsoring investigations in ten major Texas hospitals and medical schools;

15 cents for professional education, fellowship and service -- providing information on developments in the treatment of cancer, providing clinical fellowships, supporting tumor clinics and professional conferences;

21 cents for public education -- providing free films, exhibits, and pamphlets to reach 3,000,000 Texas families;

23 cents for service to patients -- providing dressings, loan closet and comfort items, speech rehabilitation;

5 cents for development of program and administration; 9 cents for campaign -- providing materials for 267 Unit Campaigns, developing and providing Crusade staff assistance.

The goal for Earth is \$1800 and for Lamb County, \$8000.

## Earth Day Greeted With Enthusiasm

Earthites of all ages, shapes and sizes donned their work clothes Wednesday, April 21, and hit the streets to participate in a town-wide Earth Day Clean Up.

Although activities were slated to officially begin at the Community Building at 2:30 Wednesday afternoon, numerous citizens of our city were already spreading enthusiasm and were hard at work as the hour of 9 a.m. rolled around.

It wasn't unusual to see a pickup suddenly stop on Main Street and have workers jump out, grab some tools and begin industrious labor. Many of the not so beautiful scenes of our town that have been accepted and looked over as part of Earth for so long, are no longer hampering the true beauty of our city. Workers accepted all types of clean up tasks with a pride that seemed to shout "This is my town and I want it to be clean and attractive."

As the hour of 6 p.m. drew near, workers were a little hesitant to conclude their activities and their pride in Earth as a clean, attractive town had grown tremendously.

Not only were adults enthused about Earth Day, but local students were dismissed from classroom activities at 2:30 to join in the effort to clean up their neglected town. Scouts, students, civic organization members, club members, business personnel and residents of Earth wasted no time in filling the beds of trucks furnished by the city, Earth Oil and Gas Company, H. S. Sanders Lumber and Service Seed and DeWitt with trash and debris to be carted off for disposal at the City Dump.

Shifts of workers took short breaks to refresh themselves at the Community Building where several women of the community served various types of refreshments.

After hours of raking, hoeing, chopping and general cleaning, workers retired to the City Park for a fellowship session and the presentation of various Earth Day awards. Mrs. Phillip Haberer was the proud recipient of a \$50.00 Savings Bond awarded to her as winner of the slogan contest. The winning entry, to be seen on bumperstickers, is "We're Down to Earth at Earth, Texas."

Local students promoted Earth Day through the construction of posters and \$90 in prizes was awarded to first, second and third place winners at the community gathering. Nine first place prizes of \$15, \$10 second prizes and \$5 third prizes were awarded to high school, junior high and elementary winners. First place winners were Mary Longoria, Fonda Goodwin and Elaine Bills. Second place winners named were Lillie Martinez, Joe Herrera and Beth Pounds. Posters winning third place were constructed by Jimmy Coker, Cindy Dent and Jimmy Randolph.

Chairmen of the steering committee of Earth Day Activities, Bill Scott and Dale Riggs, have stated that Earth residents did a "good job" in cleaning up our town. But, there is still work to be done.

## Junior Rodeo Slated

Members of the Earth Roping Club have been busy this week cleaning the rodeo arena and grounds in preparation for the 1971 Earth Junior Rodeo. The event is slated for Friday and Saturday, April 30 and May 1, for all junior cowboys and cowgirls up to 19 years of age. Activities will begin at 8 p.m. each night at the local arena.

Books will open at 9:00 a.m. Friday and youngsters will be able to register entries until 6 p.m. that evening at the arena office. Boys must enter at least three events, including a riding event, to be eligible for the All-Around Buckle. Girls must be entered in at least three events to become eligible for the honor.

Rodeo riders age 6 and under will be vying for first place in the calf roping event.

Competition open for those ages 12 and under will include calf riding, pole bending, breakaway roping and barrel racing.

Rodeoers ages 13 through 15 will see action in tie down roping, ribbon roping (boy and girl), cow riding, barrel racing, pole bending, flag racing and rescue racing.

Rodeo events open to riders ages 16 through 19 will be bareback bronc riding, tie down roping, ribbon roping, cow riding, barrel racing, pole bending, flag racing, rescue racing and team roping.

Entry fee per contestant is \$3.00 for each event except cow riding and bareback bronc riding which require entry fees of \$5.00. Each contestant must have a consent signed by their parents to participate. Participation will not affect any interscholastic league standings.

Prizes for those rodeo entrants capturing first place in each event will be buckles. Ribbons will be awarded second through fourth place winners. Buckles will be awarded for All-Around cowboy and cowgirl.

In the pole bending event six poles will be run (boys or girls). In breakaway roping the rope must breakaway from the saddle horn; flag race, rider will put one flag in and take one out of a bucket (boys or girls); barrel race, a cloverleaf pattern will be run (boys or girls); ribbon roping, girl must run ribbon for the boy, but if the girl is roping the boy may run and helpers must be from the same age group. In the rescue race, each entrant rides his horse and rescues his partner from a barrel, who must be astride the horse when the partner crosses the finish line. The two must be from the same age group.

So, rodeo riders and fans, make your plans now to attend the Junior Rodeo Friday and Saturday at the Earth Rodeo Arena.

Bro. Smith used "Some Names We Ought to Love" as his topic and began by stating we should love our own name

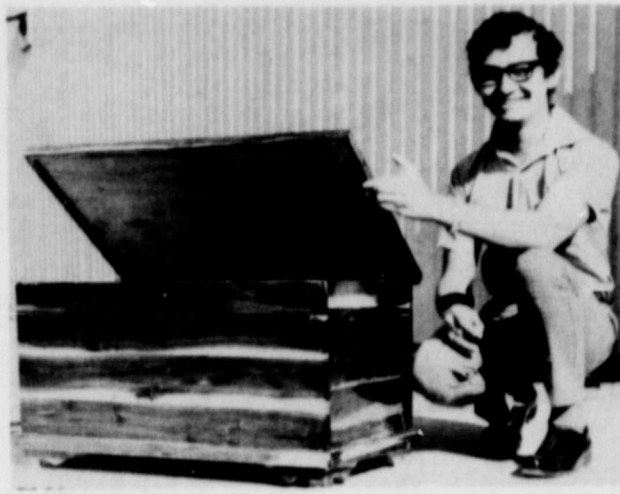
and be proud of our family heritage. He also pointed out that we should love Texas and be proud to be called a Texan.

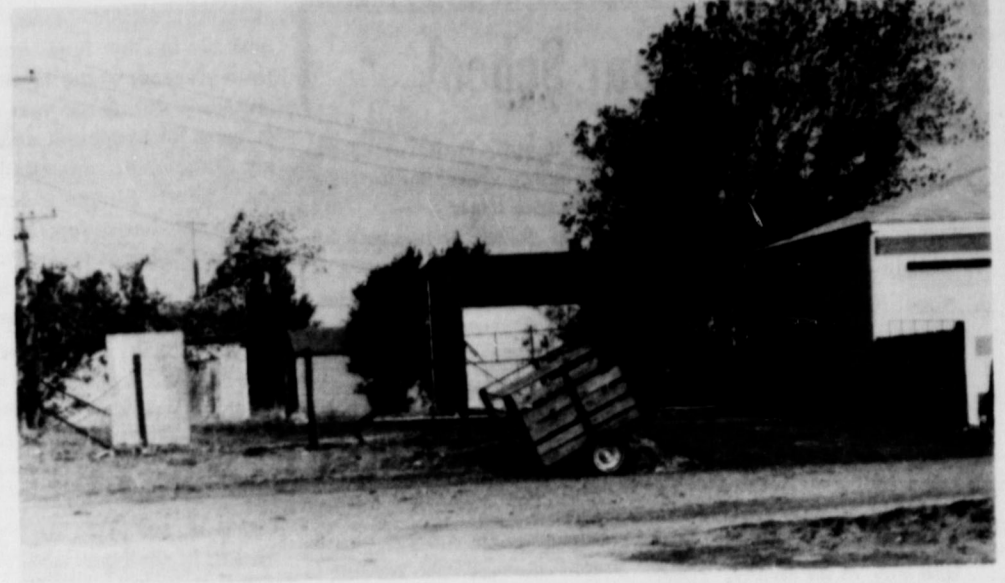

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## Know Your School

ACTIVITY FUND

The School Activity Fund is probably the most misunderstood fund in the school and the primary reason is that it is made up of so many smaller funds. Activity Fund is a name for several different school funds, each carried on a separate ledger to insure that all accounts receive their proper income and that no fund will lose any of its money. These accounts are incorporated into one bank account under the title of Activity Fund. The reason for this is the regulation of the Texas Education Agency that all funds relating to student activities are to be kept in a central accounting system. The separate accounts in the Activity Fund are: Choral Music, Industrial Arts, National Honor Society Scholarship Fund, Revolving Fund, Band, Uniform Fund, F. H. A., Driver Education, Letterman's Club, Athletics, Student Council, Pep Club, Library, F. E. A., Lab Fees, Annual, Typing, National Honor Society, Future Teachers, Vocational Agriculture Instru-

ment Rental, Freshman Class, Sophomore Class, Junior Class and Senior Class.

When money is received by school personnel, a receipt is given to the individual who turns the money into the Principal's Office. The receipt is dated, credited to the proper account and the source of the money is also indicated on the receipt.

For money to be spent from a given fund, the sponsor of the organization or the principal involved must approve the expenditure. Under no circumstance will money be dispersed on the recommendation of a student officer. All bills are paid for by check and the receipts are kept for audit purposes.

The Activity Fund is audited annually by a Public Accountant to make sure that the funds in this account are being handled properly. The Activity Fund is organized so that the balance in all of the individual funds, when totaled must agree with the General Control and Bank Statement.

A list and explanation of the different accounts that are in the Activity Fund are as follows:

**CHORAL MUSIC**-Money deposited in this fund comes from proceeds of the Musicals presented during the year and is spent for incidental expenses of the choir, requested by the Choral Director. Music and other basic supplies are purchased from Budgeted Funds.

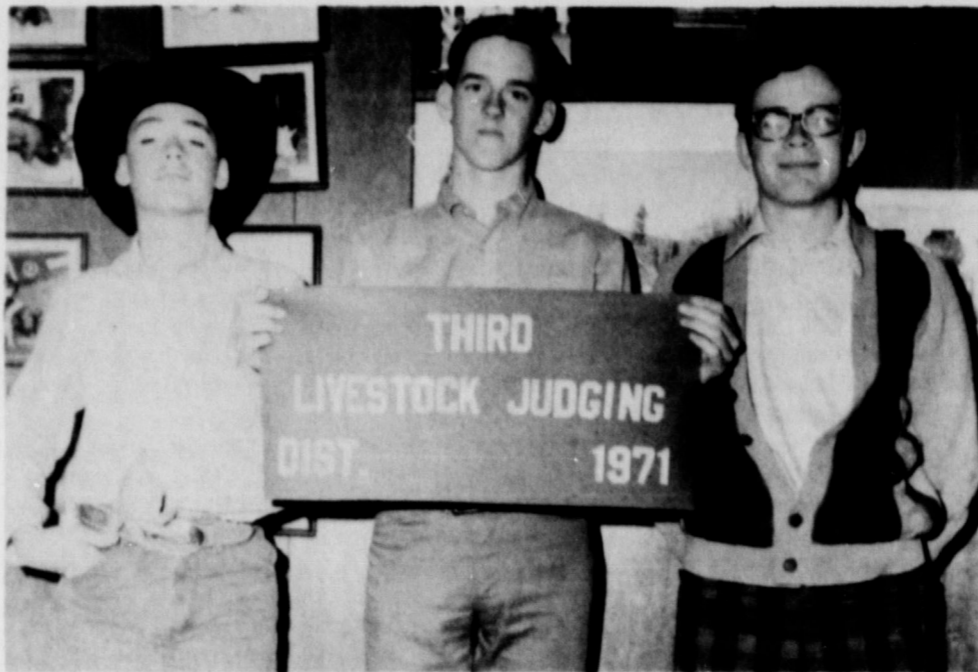
**INDUSTRIAL ARTS**-This fund is for student projects. Money is turned in by the student to Mr. Fields to pay for wood and other materials for individual student projects. These materials are purchased by the Industrial Arts teacher. Equipment and basic teaching materials are purchased from Budgeted funds.

**NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY SCHOLARSHIP FUND**-Money set aside by the National Honor Society for an Annual Scholarship for some worthy student.

**BAND**-Money in this fund comes from the sale of magazines and other money raising projects and is used for the miscellaneous expenses of the Band.

**UNIFORM FUND**-A fee of \$10.00 is collected from each band student each year as a rental fee -- which is to be used to purchase band uniforms.

**FUTURE HOMEMAKERS OF AMERICA**-Money in this fund is derived from dues from the

members and other approved selected activities and is used to pay for the operation of the organization.

**FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA**-Money in this fund is derived from dues and money making projects of the boys and is used to carry on activities of the organization.

**DRIVER EDUCATION**-This fund contains student fees for Driver Education. The money is used to pay the instructor's salary along with other expenses of the program.

**LETTERMAN'S CLUB**-This money is used to carry on the activities of the organization. **ATHLETICS**-The money in this fund is derived from gate receipts of basketball and football along with concessions from basketball and track. The money is used to buy equipment, athletic insurance, supplies and other expenses of the program.

**STUDENT COUNCIL**-Money in this fund comes from money raising projects and is used to carry on the activities of the organization.

**PEP CLUB**-Money in this fund comes from sale of beat tags and programs at football games and is used to carry on the activities of the club.

**LAB FEES**-This money is derived from Lab fees charged to students who are enrolled in the science program and is used for supplies and replacement of equipment.

**LIBRARY**-Money in this fund comes from library fees and fines charged to students and is used to purchase books and other library supplies.

**REVOLVING FUND**-This is a general fund for money which does not go to any particular class or organization. Money in this fund comes from such sources as school supplies sold by the principal like pencils, pens, notebook paper, etc. and the sale of school pictures. Money is used for purchases such as supplies for resale by the principal, flowers for teachers who are ill and etc.

**ANNUAL**-Money in this fund comes from the sale of ads and annuals and is used in the production of the annual.

**TYPING**-Money in this fund comes from students who participate in typing and is used for maintenance of machines.

**FUTURE TEACHERS OF AMERICA**-Money in this fund comes from dues and money raising projects and is used to carry on activities of the organization.

**VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE**-This money is received from Ag fees and departmental projects and is used to carry on activities of the organization.

**INSTRUMENT RENTAL**-Money in this account comes from rental of school band instruments. It is applied to the repair of the instruments.

**NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY**-Money comes from dues of the members and fund raising projects such as bake sales and car washes and goes to pay for activities of the organization and the scholarship that is given by the society.

**FRESHMAN, SOPHOMORE, JUNIOR AND SENIOR CLASS FUNDS**-Money in these funds comes from class dues and class projects and is used for class

## Vacation Bible School Set

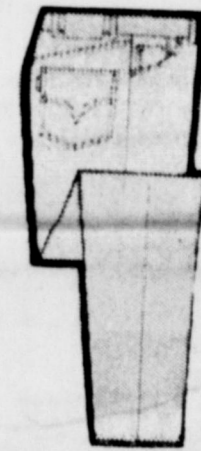
