Seeing And Perceiving

You can have perfect eyesight, and still be driving blind - right into an accident!

The reason? You don't really "see" until your brain gets the message from your eyes and understands it. If you drive absent-mindedly, your brain may not



"pick-up" what your eyes see. Scientists studying highway safety report that driving a motor vehicle calls for more continuous attention than operating any other type of transportation - including an airplane.

For safe driving, seeing must be perceiving.

How can you be a perceptive driver? Here are some tips:

Keep your mind clear of irrelevant thoughts. Think about driving, and you'll be ready for any emergency.

Sharpen your perception. Learn what's important about what you see and concentrate on that.

For example, if you're about to pass a car, perceive its speed, road position, clearance space, speed and distance of other cars nearby. But other facts about the car - its make, color, year, license plate - are irrelevant to the passing.

Finally, don't drive when you're emotionally upset. It saps the energy needed for perceptive, safe driving.

Stars On A Summer Night Program At Lubbock Planetarium

Interested in the universe? Public demonstrations will be held in the Planetarium at the West Texas Museum on the Texas Tech campus on three nights this summer. Dr. W. C. Holden, museum director, has announced.

Theme of the summer programs to be held at 8 p.m. on July 21 and Aug. 11 - will be "Stars on a Summer Night." Following the demonstrations, planetarium visitors may take a look at the galaxies through the museum's six-inch telescope.

Admission to the 8 p.m. demonstrations will be 25-cents for school-aged children, 50-cents for

adults, or presentation of a Museum Assn. membership card.

Speaking will be Donald Myrick, junior physics major at Tech, who has served as Planetarium lecturer during the past year. Because of the technical nature of the demonstrations, children under school age will not understand or enjoy the program.

"For all but a few people, the sky is a completely new world," Dr. Holden said. "To the novice it appears confusing. However, experience has proved that it is far easier to become acquainted with the sky than to become even passably at ease in a new city."

"With summer here, we urged, why not visit the Planetarium and learn the position of the major stars and constellations so you can point them out to your family and friends on your vacation - or from a comfortable armchair in your own backyard."

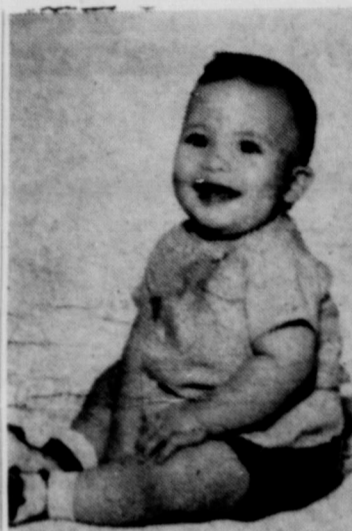

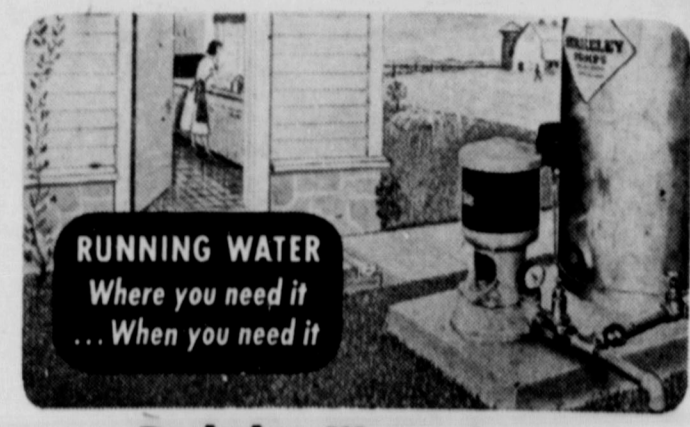

LOST . . .

She was a first-grader. One day I found her on the porch after school, clutching her scrap of a red sweater and trying to hold her face against a flood of tears. Very slowly I laid a hand on her shoulder. "What's the matter, honey?" I asked.

She began to sob - deep, tearing sobs of utter desolation. I carried her to my empty classroom. She kept mumbling something a host report card and I kept trying to tell her I would make another, though I was not her regular teacher and it was not in accord with rules.

We take it for granted that we can hit the road any time of the day or night, travel in any direction, and know that we can find comfortable, reasonably-priced accommodations en route. Motels have multiplied our mobility.

Here are some good tips on selecting a good motel:

Make sure it is located in a quiet spot. Try to find one set back from the highway. Traffic noise is usually heavier on hills or near intersections where trucks change gears or apply brakes.

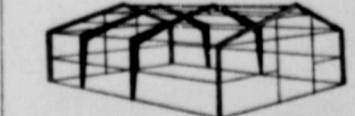

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #48—Number Five on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958:

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by Charter Provision and a general law city operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby, providing for an election, a form of ballot and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

SECTION 1. THAT ARTICLE XI OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS BE AMENDED BY ADDING THEREIN A NEW SECTION TO BE KNOWN AS SECTION II OF ARTICLE XI AND TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

"Section II. A Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby."

"Provided, however, if any of such officers, elective or appointive, shall announce their candidacy, or shall in fact become a candidate, in any general, special or primary election, for any office of profit or trust under the laws of this State or the United States other than the office then held, at any time when the unexpired term of the office then held shall exceed one (1) year, such announcement or such candidacy shall constitute an automatic resignation of the office then held, and the vacancy thereby created shall be filled pursuant to law in the same manner as other vacancies for such office are filled."

"A municipality so providing a term exceeding two (2) years but not exceeding four (4) years for any of its non-civil service officers must elect all of the members of its governing body

by majority vote of the qualified voters in such municipality, and any vacancy or vacancies occurring on such governing body shall not be filled by appointment but must be filled by majority vote of the qualified voters at a special election called for such purpose within one hundred and twenty (120) days after such vacancy or vacancies occur."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby, and providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby, and providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**EDITORIAL —
NEW MIRACLES IN THE MAKING . . .**

The agricultural revolution, far from being spent, is just beginning. The parts 50 years have seen hand and horse labor disappearing from the fields; trends today indicate that the future will bring complete mechanization and precision control of nearly all farmstead operations.

This forecast comes from Earl D. Anderson, president of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers. As he sees it, four major trends are now in being: mechanization of farm chores and materials handling; providing proper environmental conditions for livestock; storing and processing crops for a marketing profit; and strong emphasis on quality control of farm products.

Of these four, he considers the first is probably the more important. In his words: "The farmer who steps down from his tractor equipped with finger-tip control of the hydraulic mechanism is loathe to feed his cattle with a bushel basket." And this farmer no longer needs to do chores the old hard way. The engineers have developed all manners of highly efficient machines to take the place of human muscle and more are coming.

President Eisenhower has pointed out that farm productivity per man hour has actually doubled since 1940 - - and this increase is as great as the total increase between 1820 and 1940. Mechanized equipment, electricity, improved fertilizers and pesticides - - these are forces that have transformed farming to an almost miraculous degree. And new miracles are in the making.
