The participants are Quency Lewis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wilson Lewis, Jr. and E. Dwane Fryar, both of Earth.

More than 500 of the state's top science students and instructors will attend the symposium which is jointly sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the University of Texas.

Southwestern Public Service Company is sponsoring 42 High Plains participants, including the Earth student and teacher, Miss Lewis, a junior at Springlake-Earth High School, has been a member of the National

Enrollment Up From Last Months Figure

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of Springlake-Earth School, Monday night, the Board reviewed enrollment figures and found the current figure to be 777, up ten students from the enrollment of last month. There are 355 students in Elementary grades, 190 in Junior High, 202 in High School and 30 in Special Education Classes.

The Board hired two new Faculty members. They are Mrs. Don (sue) Haberer, and Mrs. Glen Smith. Mrs. Haberer will be teaching Homemaking and Mrs. Smith will be teaching in the Elementary Grades.

A committee of people were appointed to function as a Public Relations Committee to involve more people in school Business, and School Booster Clubs, etc.

The group discussed items relative to school plant improvement.

They agreed to take Bids for the purchase of a pick-up for the Agricultural Department. They also agreed to the purchase of two electric typewriters.

Rural Telephone Rates to Increase May 28

Rural telephone customers in the Earth exchange will begin paying new telephone rates effective May 28 it has been announced by General Telephone District manager, Ed Richardson.

Richardson said the new rural rate schedule is the second step taken by the company in the last year to place as nearly as possible the cost of providing service on the customers utilizing that service.

The manager explained the company started its repricing of services program last year by bringing the charges for business customers to level required to pay for the large volume of usage by the business community.

"Business customers use telephone equipment to a much greater extent that residential customers and we feel they should pay the costs of providing the additional equipment required to handle the calls," he said.

The company has placed the new business rate structure in most of the areas it serves in Texas, according to Richardson. He continued: "Now, we are inaugurating a new rate schedule that recognizes a portion of the higher costs of providing rural telephone service and we are adjusting rural rates in relation to this higher cost," he stated.

"Facilities (poles, cables, lines, connectors, lightning arresters, etc.) in rural areas are more costly to the company per customer than in urban areas because of the length of the facilities between rural customers and the fewer customers served

by rural facilities. A mile of rural facilities usually serves very few customers, making the cost per customer higher than a mile of facilities in towns where there may be hundreds of customers per mile.

Additional equipment is needed to provide rural service because it is scattered and this additional equipment means possibilities of outages and trouble reports.

Other rural-oriented expenses cited include more automobile expense and manhours in driving time; wire facilities usually require more time and are more party lines, predominant in rural areas, require more manhours to locate trouble.

Clayton Announces New Support

Clayton announces new support. House Speaker candidate Bill Clayton said Monday the Texas Electorate had "clearly established" him as the "leading candidate for Speaker" by electing a large number of candidates who favor him for Speaker in the May 4th primary elections.

"As a result of the primary election, my campaign for Speaker gained at least 12 new supporters, and I am assured of several more during and after the runoffs," Clayton said.

The winner of a three-to-one re-election victory himself, Clayton said he felt confident he has enough pledges from members or members-elect, who will be voting in the Speaker's race next January, to clearly establish him as the leading candidate. As long as things continue to progress so well in my Speaker's race," Clayton stated, "I should be able to declare victory in the race in the near future."

Kin of Local Woman Dies in Oklahoma

Roy C. Taylor 73, of Midwest City, Oklahoma died Sunday morning at the home of his son in Midwest City. He had been seriously ill for the past two months.

Local Bank Deposits Show Large Increase

Deposits at the Citizen State Bank of Earth on the recent quarterly "Call" date of April 24 showed a tremendous gain in the amount on deposit as compared to that same date a year earlier.

The total deposits on the current statement stands at \$6,537,886.08. This was a net increase of \$1,927,737.08 over the statement on that date in 1973 when the deposits amounted to \$4,610,149.00.

The excellent crop en-

joyed by the farmers, coupled with record farm prices, were given credit for the sizeable increase in deposits.

Total assets on the Bank's quarterly statement also showed a sizeable increase. The figure amounted to \$7,085,620.14, as compared to \$5,009,630.94 the previous year.

Deposits in all the Banks in Lamb County Showed a total increase of \$25,030,605 for the year, over the same time last year.

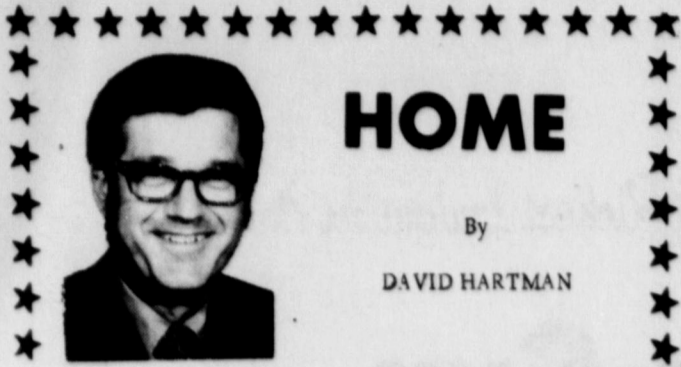

What images does that word bring to your mind? Does it bring pleasant thoughts of days gone by? Perhaps happy carefree days of childhood and youth? Does it call to mind caring parents? You may even laugh about those brother-sister rivalries. Then it was serious business. Now it's funny. On the other hand the word may bring very unpleasant memories to mind. Memories you would rather forget. Pleasant or unpleasant your

past home life is last. What about right now? What kind of home do you have right now? I'm not talking about the house you live in. But the relationship between you, your spouse, and your children.

My educated guess is most home need a little attention here and there. It's interesting that some folks take better care of their cars, horses, tractors, cattle, etc. than their home relationships. I heard somebody quote a figure the other day that 1 out of 3 marriages end in divorce. This tells me that somebody somewhere gave more attention to something else besides his marriage and home. Therefore, the American home is in deep deep trouble.

Who is doing anything about it? Most marriage counselors I hear talk have their hands full. They are doing what they can. There presently exists three institutions that could be used to strengthen the home in connection with other resources.

One is the home itself. Especially if the children are still in the nest. There is much truth in the statement "Happiness is home-made." What does your home life communicate to your children about marriage? Your present home is the training ground for their future home. Our attitudes and practice of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control are communicated to our children. So are our negative attitudes and practices. However, with 1 out of 3 homes in trouble nationwide it's almost like the blind leading the blind. Therefore, we must come at it from other directions.

Another potential source of help is the church. What are churches doing to deliberately and intentionally help the home? A few are trying hard to help. Most are doing nothing. Most of what is being done by pastors is corrective rather than preventative. That's like shutting the gate after the horse is out.

I have a growing conviction that every church ought to set up a pre-marital counseling program and faithfully abide by it. Too many people rush into marriage without working through some very important things that will come up in their home.

The third institution is the school. I am glad our school system offers a course in home and family life. I urge more of our youth to enroll in it.

Home can be a pleasant or hellish experience. Which is it for you? Either way it didn't just accidentally happen. If you have a happy home it took work to make it that way and I heartily congratulate you.

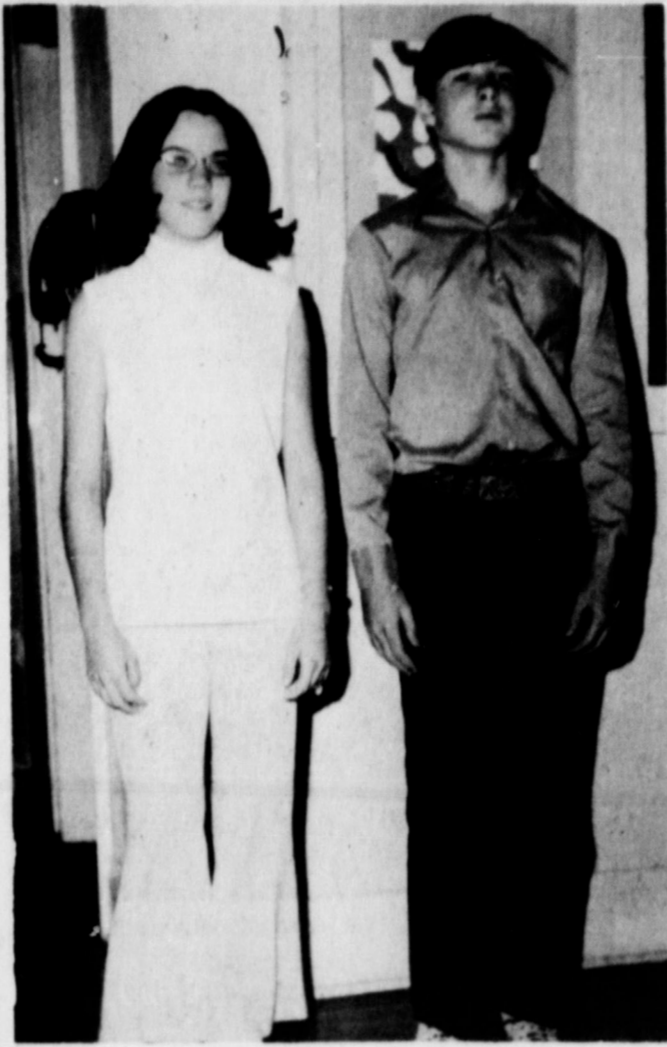
