Reports of Public School Study In Texas To Determine School Legislation

The Hale-Aikin Committee of 24 has approved a "grassroots" study procedure which should yield at least 42,418 separate replies (167 in each county's report) to questions which the Committee believes are pertinent to its state-wide survey of the public schools.

State Representative L. DeWitt Hale, vice-chairman of the Committee and co-sponsor with Senator A. M. Aikin, Jr. of the legislation which authorized the public school study, said today that he and other legislators plan to make direct use of all 254 county reports in determining what school legislation, if any, may be needed.

"Twenty-five thousand copies of the study guide prepared by the Hale-Aikin Committee will be mailed throughout Texas before February 15," the Corpus Christi legislator said. "It will be obvious to all persons requesting and using the 44-page study guide that much research and many group meetings will be needed in each county if the local committees are to fulfill their responsibilities in this study."

Representative Hale said all local committees are invited to add questions of their own choosing to the 167 questions posed by the Hale - Aikin Committee. Facts and opinions about any public school matter, whether local or state, may in this way be brought to the attention of the State Committee.

"In view of the vital importance of our schools, no County Committee should feel unduly burdened by the size and scope of this survey," Representative Hale continued. "The Legislature needs this information. Also, the local boards of school trustees and the average citizen whose votes, taxes, and influence contribute toward the local management and control of their schools need this information."

"The Hale - Aikin Committee is working on the premise that all who act in behalf of the public schools should do so with the assurance that their actions are based upon the facts as well as upon the will of the people."

Each County Committee has been encouraged to organize and conduct the study in any suitable manner. In many counties, each school district is making a district study before reporting to the overall County Committee. Other counties are conducting the study through four sub-committees one for each of the major study topics of School Program, Teacher Supply, School Construction and School Finance.

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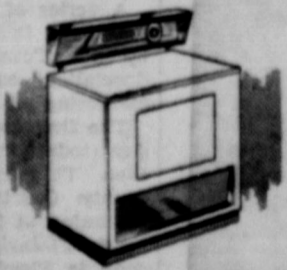

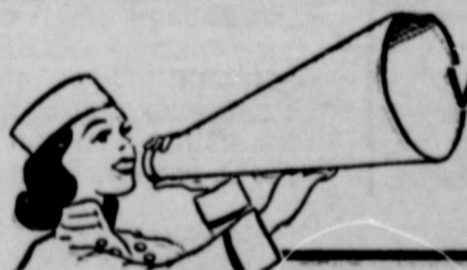

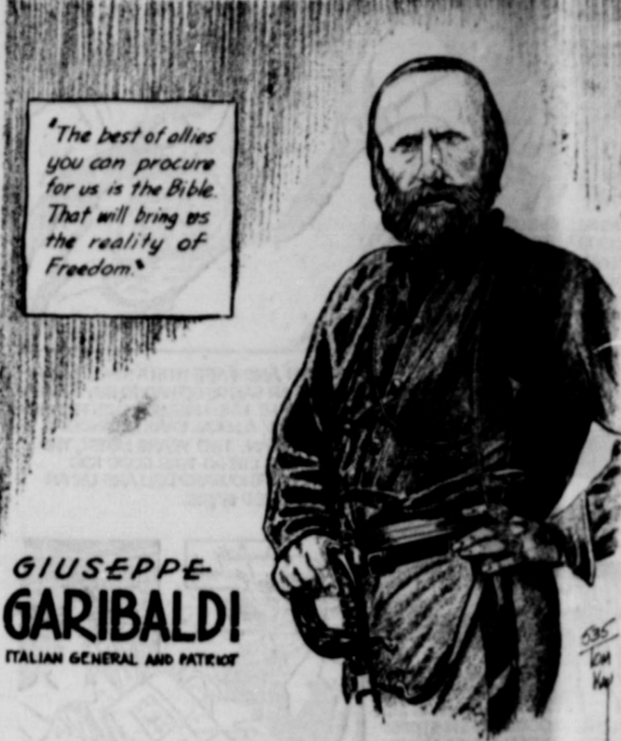

County presidents from 125 counties all over the state met to discuss methods of improving the organization on the county level and to set up standards for measuring achievements of the local organizations.

The county leaders were grouped into seven "task forces" to analyze the following phases of the county Farm Bureau Organization: Organizational Structure and Procedures, Membership Acquisition and Maintenance, Policy Development and Commodity Program, Policy Execution and Legislative Program, Service To Member Program, Local Projects and Activities and Information and Public Relations.

Each of the seven categories was given a total valuation of 100 points for use in determining recognition awards for county Farm Bureaus each year. Heretofore, these awards have been based only on membership accomplishments. Now, a county organization will have to "measure up" to high standards in all phases of Farm Bureau activity to be eligible for recognition awards.

The overall purpose of the conference was to strengthen the entire Farm Bureau organization on all levels by building more effective county Farm Bureaus.

Amherst Youth Knows First Hand The Help Afforded By The March of Dimes

Infantile paralysis is a dread crippling disease. That's how most people know it.

But polio, as it's more commonly known, holds a different meaning for those who come in contact with it.

Take the case of a 16-year old Amherst boy, James Glenn Cox, who knows polio for the real thing.

James, son of Mr. and Mrs. James E. Cox of Amherst, is getting along pretty well now.

But there have been times in the past two years that life was dark for the Amherst youth.

Stricken in November of 1955, James faced an unknown future. His parents faced tremendous medical bills, far out of their reach.

Today, James is able to attend school. He recently was able to quit wearing a corset. Mr. and Mrs. Cox have gotten some financial help.

Their aid came from the Lamb County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

"We're doing what we can," says Rev. Donald Luckemeyer of Littlefield, who heads the chapter, "to help James and his family beat polio."

But more funds are needed. Rev. Luckemeyer says, if Lamb County is going to its share in fighting the disease.

The way to help, Rev. Luckemeyer says, is to join in a county-wide campaign that is now under way.

Ronnie Onstead of Littlefield, who is heading the county campaign, says polio "is far from finished, despite the Salk vaccine."

Polio has left in its wake thousands of victims. Two-thirds of the people in susceptible age group still need one or more of the three shots needed for maximum protection against the disease.

That's where the 1958 March of Dimes comes in, Onstead says. Research and patient care must go on, he adds.

Turner Boys of Pleasant Valley Among Winners In Texas Hybrid Corn Program

Jerrell Young, a Hale county 4-H member from Hale Center, has been declared winner in the annual Texas Hybrid Corn Production Program. From his acre of Texas 30, he harvested 2221 bushels to lead all participants in the 1957 statewide program. His outstanding yield was made under irrigation and he used 250 pounds of 16-20-0 fertilizer before planting and later sidedress with 100 pounds of anhydrous ammonia an acre.

In addition to the area award of \$50, he will receive a plaque and another \$50 for making the state's best record. The program is sponsored by the Texas Certified Seed Producers, Inc. in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Ben Spears, extension agronomist, released the list of winners and reported that 69 records were submitted from all sections of the state.

Top winners in the dryland division of the program was Austin DeLaughter of Bowie county with a yield of 148.8 bushels an acre. He was also winner for the North-east area and will receive the \$50 first place award, as well as a plaque for his state placing in the dryland division.

Other winners, listed by Spears for the West Texas area, include besides Young, Johnny Collins of Castro county with a yield of 178.7 bushels; Leon Collins from the same county, 176.6 bushels; and Royce and Doyce Turner, former state winners in the program from Lamb county, with 168.8 and 132.7 bushels an acre, respectively. They planted Texas 22, 28, 30 and 17W.

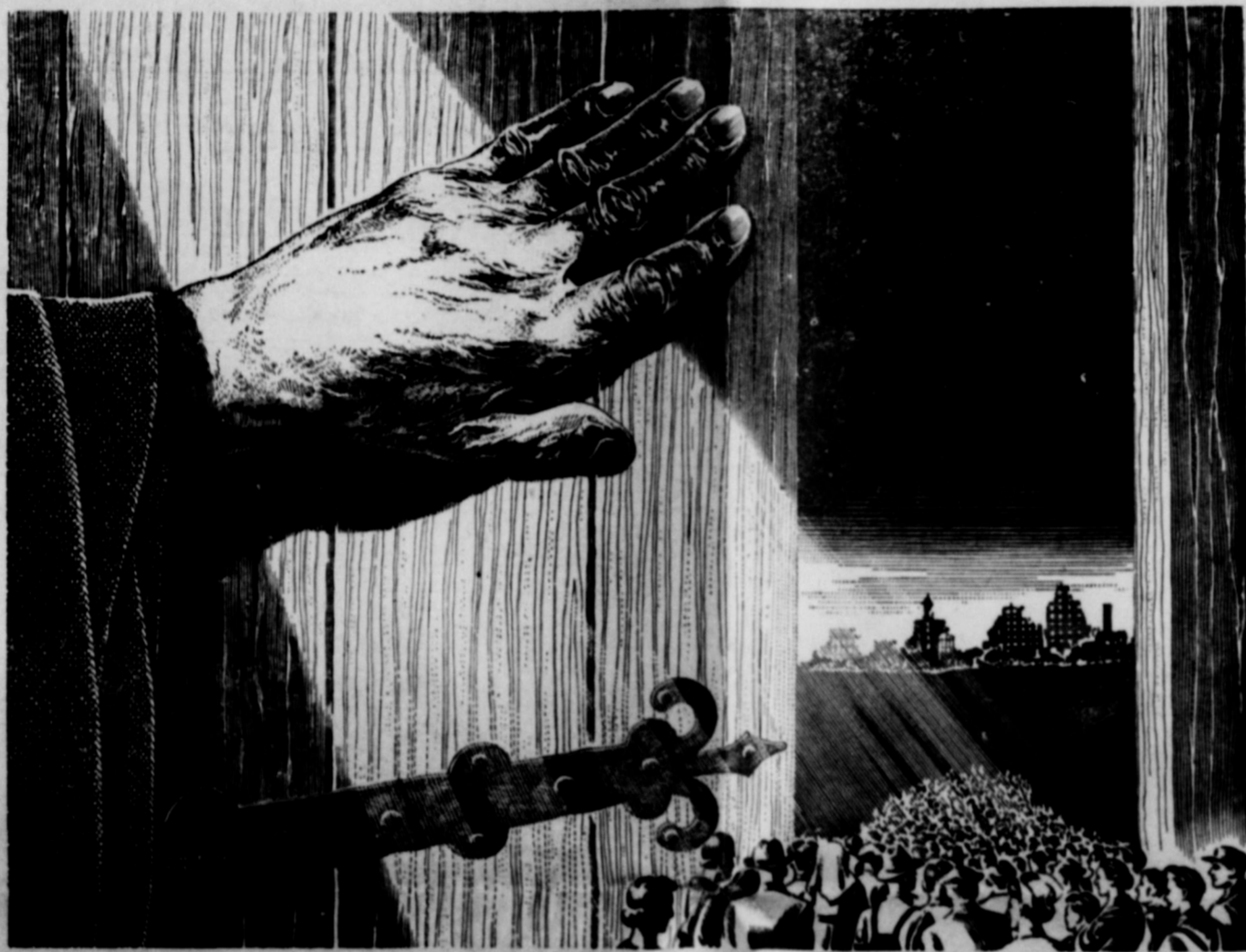

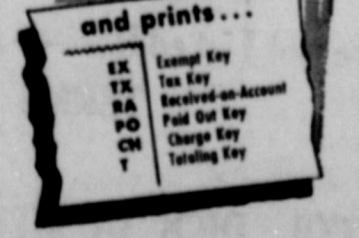

Reduce Delinquency

CORRECTION PUNISHMENT III.

(A distinguished Texas judge offers pointers on combating our rapidly increasing juvenile delinquency problem.)

By JUDGE SARAH T. HUGHES



JUDGE HUGHES

Juvenile delinquency is by no means a new problem. But our attitude toward children who commit offenses has changed materially in the last 50 years.

Formerly a child of 7 was considered responsible for his offenses and was punished as an adult. The object of society was to punish the offender, regardless of his age if he was over 6, and revenge the crime as well as to protect society.

Double Object
Today we no longer try to revenge ourselves, as was done as late as 1828—when a 13-year-old New Jersey boy was hanged for stealing a pair of shoes. We try now to rescue the child as well as to protect society.

We try to find out the causes of the individual child's delinquency so that we can remove them. We are not so concerned with handing out punishment as we are with trying to save the offender for good citizenship.

Training Program
The sentence may be probation or an institution, both involving a positive program to prepare the boy or girl for wholesome community life, including vocational training.

Whatever the punishment, the object is the same—to protect society, remove the causes of delinquency, and make the youngster a good citizen.

Charley F. Brannon To Speak At Farm Conference In Lubbock Friday, Jan. 31

DENTON — Former Sec. of Agriculture, Charley F. Brannon, now general counselor for the National Farmers Union in Denver, Colorado, will address an all-group Farm Program Development Conference at the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum, Friday, January 31, beginning at 9:30 a.m. Alex Dickie, Jr., Denton, president of the Texas Farmers Union, which originated the idea of the conference, said all producers of agriculture commodities and all farm organizations in the state will be invited to the conference. Other sponsors include Grain Sorghum Producers, Plains Cotton Growers, Texas Wheat Growers, Texas Milk Producers Federation, Co-op Oil Mill, Producers Grain Co-op of Amarillo, Cotton Marketing Co-op and Texas Tech.

The primary purpose of the Conference, Dickie said, will be to develop a comprehensive farm program that would have the backing of the producers of all agriculture commodities.

After a round of speeches during the morning, which also includes address by Professor Troy Cauley, Department of Economics, University of Texas, the conference will be broken down that afternoon into commodity groups, with the producers in each session working up a program to suit their particular needs.

The conference then will reconvene in a general session to map an overall farm program acceptable to the entire group.

Selected to head the commodity group discussions were R. G. Peeler, president, Grain Sorghum Producers, Chairman of the Grain Sorghum group; George Pfeifferberger, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Chairman of the Cotton Group; Russell Hogge, President of Texas Wheat Growers, Chairman of the Wheat

Group; S. E. Brown, former president of United Livestock Producers Assn, Chairman of Livestock Group; and B. E. Stallings, President, Texas Milk Producers Assn, Chairman of the Dairy Group.
