the beef business find reason to be cautiously optimistic in the face of rising per capita con-sumption and a decrease in the industry's number one problem. glut. Caused by a combination of price controls. natural cattle cycle (cattle population reaches a cyclical peak every 10-11 years) and high feed prices, glut loversupply) seemed for a while to unending. Consumers are solving the problem by buying more beef and accepting grass-fed meat. Packers buying grass-fed cattle have to use 2 or of the young pasture-fed cattle to produce as much meat as a single grain-fed animal. So the problem seems to be solving itself, but even the optimistic cattlemen (not the easiest thing to find) say it will take at least 18 months before the industry is back to normal.






