Vandalism Heavy Over Week-end

Deputy Elmer Hall reported 3 cases of vandalism and one disturbance of the peace over the week-end.

The three cases of vandalism occurred between 1:30-4:30 a. m. Sunday morning.

Two vehicles drove around on the tennis courts at the school tearing the nets down and burning black marks into the courts. Also about 6 mailboxes on the south side of Highway 70 were knocked over and some pulled out of the ground. This type of vandalism is very dangerous as this offense is a federal offense and if the offenders are caught the situation would be out of the hands of local authorities.

The other act of vandalism happened at the home of Johnny Murrell. The hitching post statue in his yard was pulled out of the ground and dragged 3 or 4 blocks and hidden in the alley behind some bushes. Mrs. Gladys Parish discovered the statue Monday morning behind her house and reported it to Deputy Hall. The statue was sunk in a large block of cement. The whole thing was pulled up and dragged off.

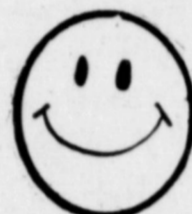
Rabies Clinic May 23

Hearing On Gas Priority Ruling Starts Today

A two-day hearing will begin in Lubbock today, May 15 in the Federal Building to gather evidence on the possible effects of a Federal Power Commission (FPC) ruling which ordered El Paso Natural Gas Company to lower its priority of natural gas for irrigation use from No. 2 commercial.

Everyone interested in the economy of our area is urged to attend these meetings or if you cannot attend to go by the Federal Building and register May 15 and 16 between 9 a. m. and 5:00 p. m. Go on record in protest of this change of legislation.

A minimum of 3,000 persons is needed to show that we protest the change of priority. Our economy depends on it.

Everyone interested in agriculture, businessmen, farmers, employees, housewives are all urged to attend the Public Hearings on priority of natural gas supply to our irrigation farmers from Priority 2 to Priority 3. Our entire economy could be sorely hurt if the availability of natural gas for irrigation use was changed to Priority 3.

FPC officials declared last December that natural gas used for fueling irrigation engines "is an industrial use, properly includable within priority No. 3. But the commissioners left the ruling open to interpretation by saying, "If a particular irrigation pumping use of natural gas

involves a use for which alternate fuels are not technically feasible, and if otherwise consistent with the definition of "process gas," those requirements would qualify for inclusion in priority No. 2 as "process gas."

alternate fuel was "technically feasible" or if irrigation gas could be defined as "process gas" to El Paso Natural Gas Co. Doug James of Lubbock, district director of the Texas Farm Bureau, said the FPC's handling of the matter has created "uncertainty and confusion" among irrigation farmers. He said 40 per cent of the irrigation pumps in Texas depend

upon natural gas for fuel. A low priority in a period of shortage, James said, would "severely cripple a large segment of agriculture."

Studies at Texas Tech University indicate a conversion to gasoline would increase hourly fuel costs about 320 per cent for a 150 horse power engine.

Conversion to propane would increase costs about 280 per cent.

Economists say the annual cost of a 3,000-hour irrigation season on the engine would jump from \$3,570 for natural gas to \$15,000 for gasoline and \$13,650 for propane.

"Hourly fuel costs alone would increase from \$1.19 to \$5 for gasoline and \$4.55 for propane," said Jack Klog, research director of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association at Lubbock.

Because of the unique characteristic of agriculture's use of natural gas, Judge Curtis L. Wagner Jr., ordered supplemental hearings in Phoenix, Albuquerque and Lubbock.

as assistant band director in Pampa.

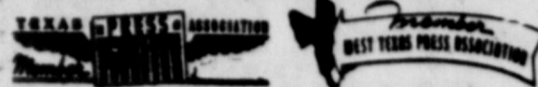
Surface held the head band position at Springlake-Earth Schools for the 1974-75 school term.

School Enrollment Down

The Springlake-Earth School Board met Monday, May 12 at 9:00 p.m. in the high school building.

The minutes of the April meeting were read and approved. The bills were paid.

The school enrollment was reviewed and found to be down one from last month. The enrollment is 767 students. There are 353 students in elementary, 192 in junior high, 190 in high school and 32 in special education.

This is the lowest enrollment in several years at Springlake-Earth Schools.

Board president, Ray Joe Riley gave a report on school legislation. He reported that under any of the plans or bills that pass, relative to educational

reform, taxes will take a tremendous jump. The primary reason for this would be the equalization of the local fund assignments throughout the state and because of an effort of the legislature to provide equal educational opportunities to every school district in the state regardless of the wealth of the district. Mr. Riley indicated that there is no way for taxes to go but up.

The board adopted Sub-Chapter E of the School Depository Act. This act concerns the holding or owning of bank stock by board members.

The school budget progress report was reviewed and studied. A study of the federal program for the 1975-76 school year indicated that the Title I Migrant

Program would be about the same size for the coming year and that funds for the Title I regular program (reading) would be approximately doubled.

The following teachers were employed for the 1975-76 school year.

Kenneth Hill who will teach junior high social studies. Linda Hill who will teach high school English and Sandra Schrantz who will teach in the federal programs.

TEXAS TALK

By CALVIN WOOD EARL JORDAN

The worst is over... probably. Statements like this have become the most common hedge in the cattle industry in the past few weeks as top executives of the beef business find reason to be cautiously optimistic in the face of rising per capita consumption and a decrease in the industry's number one problem, glut. Caused by a combination of price controls, natural cattle cycle (cattle population reaches a cyclical peak every 10-11 years) and high feed prices, glut (over-supply) seemed for a while to be unending. Consumers are solving the problem by buying more beef and accepting grass-fed meat. Packers buying grass-fed cattle have to use 2 or 3 of the young pasture-fed cattle to produce as much meat as a single grain-fed animal. So the problem seems to be solving itself, but even the optimistic cattlemen (not the easiest thing to find) say it will take at least 18 months before the industry is back to normal.
