Dave Cavitt Named Local Southwestern Manager

Dave Cavitt will become Earth manager for Southwestern Public Service Company on April 1st while Leroy Wilkinson, who has been manager here since 1965, will take over as manager in Abernathy on the same date, it has been announced by J. M. Collins, Plains Division manager of the electric company. Cavitt began his work with the electric company in Plainview in 1953 as a groundman, worked through the various apprentice ranks to journeyman lineman

and working foreman, the position he had at the time of his promotion to manager here.

He has availed himself of many opportunities in his company's educational program and completed supervisory courses, first aid and customer relations. License Plate Deadline Nears

Herbert Dunn, Lamb County tax assessor-collector, reminds the public that Lamb County registration stations will be open only three more days for acquiring 1968 license plates before the midnight April 1 deadline.

Bettye McAlpine said she would be glad to keep the Earth City office open Saturday, March 30, to help in the car license sale.

To date only 644 tags have been sold through the Earth office.

Dunn said he estimates only 50 percent of this year's plates have been sold to date and that ordinarily as many plates are sold in the last ten days as are sold prior to that time.

He stressed the fact that owners registering vehicles should bring title certificates to their vehicles, the 1967 registration receipt and the 1968 registration fee.

Registration fees, as revised by the last legislature are: for motorcycles, motorscooters and boat trailers, \$5.30; other passenger vehicles up to 3,500 pounds, \$12.30; 3,501 to 4,500 pounds, \$22.30; 4,501 to 6,000 pounds, \$30.30; and 55 cents for each 100 pounds over 6,000.

During the final three days the offices will be open, tax deputies are expecting long lines, and persons who have delayed going through the registration procedure may face long waits.

OUR TOUR OF EUROPE

We left Lubbock Monday, March 4 going via Dallas to New York where we took Lufthansa German Airline to Frankfurt, Germany. Arriving there Tuesday we were met by Mr. and Mrs. Billy Taylor and family of Zweibrucken, Germany and parted from Mrs. Jerle Taylor as she continued on to Amsterdam, Holland.

We traveled via Volkswagen to the home of the Billy Taylors in Zweibrucken. There we were greeted by a host of friends and neighbors of the Taylors' all of them Germans. While in Zweibrucken we were also entertained in the homes of German friends and privileged to attend all of the clubs of the U. S. Armed Forces Bases, Billy's work in Germany entitles him to membership in all of the Armed Forces Clubs and certain privileges on the bases. This gave us the opportunity to be in contact with the good ole American food and people.

On Friday, March 8 the four of us left via Volkswagen for a drive through some of Europe. We traveled through Karlsruhe to Basil Switzerland on the Rhine. There we continued to Luzerne Switzerland and crossed the alps to Milane, Italy. We were able to drive over the alps except for a short distance where we put the folks on a train and traveled through the mountains via tunnel.

The Alps are truly beautiful in winter in that they are covered with green grass and snow. In fact the grass, vegetables gardens remain green in winter throughout though freezing cold and snow covered, Switzerland was very beautiful and the Alps dotted with skiers.

From Milano, Italy, we continued to Venice. Here we toured the city via gondolas on the streets. We visited the church of St. Mark, The Cucal Palace and saw the flight pigeons. We visited the glass and lace factories and browsed through the shops.
