Farvis Angeley, a farmer and long-time resident of Lamb Coun-ty topped the wheat record in a five-state area this year when he harvested a 14-acre field last week which turned out 97.3 bushels of

This yield may set the acreage production record for Gol den Spread area.

Angeley lives in the Pleasant Valley community which is a short distance west of Earth.

The wheat was delivered to the Ray Griffith and Son Elevators at Muleshoe with the grain testing out 64 pounds per bushel.

The irrigated field was planted September 15 last year, at a planting rate of two bushels per acre.

Angeley placed 160 pounds of Anhydrous Ammonia pre-plant per acre on the field and watered the the crop three times. The crop was

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



Mushroom Root Rot Kills Trees, Shrubs

most common root rot diseases of shade trees and shrubs. Peach and plum orchards are frequently des troyed by the disease which occurs in all areas of Texas. Infected trees or shrubs usually die from April through July. The disease is very often confused with cotton root rot.

Wilted leaves are the first symptom. Next, one or two limbs may die. In a few days or weeks the entire tree or shrub dies. Dead areas are produced in the bark on the main trunk and larger roots just beneath the soil surface. When the dead bark is peeled back, the white mold growth of the fungus over the wood surface

The fungus occurs most frequently in wooded areas or in re-cently cleared oak land. Arbor-viate, chinaberry, cultivated junipers, rose and pyracantha appear to be very susceptible. Fruiting bodies of the fungus consists of honey-colored or light-brown "toadstools" or mushrooms. These mushrooms cluster near the base of infected trees or shrubs, gener-ally in the fall. Whether they develop depends on the weather and the extent of decay.

All tree stumps and large roots should be removed as thoroughly as possible before orchards are set in infested soil. Planting of newly-cleared land to an annual crop for several years helps to kill the

Native yaupon and ceadar are resistant. Photinia, gardenia, waxleaf ligustrum, Japanese privet and crae myrtle have been known to escape the disease in infested



Reduce Root Rot In Area Cotton

College Station — To reduce "dying-off" or root rot, a cotton former needs to know when dry weathered is eppected for 10 days to 2 weeks. When dry weather follows deep plowing, root rot will be reduced, says Harlan E. Smith, extension plant pathologist.

Soil shoud be plowed 6 to 18 inches with a lisk or moldboard type. The drying of the soil that follows help to kill the root rot fungus. Deep plowing and drying hels to kill old cotton roots and roots of susceptible weeds that harbor the root rot fungus.

Deep plowing plus the turning under of a large tonnage of old crop straw, stalks or leaves will give added insurance against root rot, Smith continues. The deep plowing and turning under of or ganic matter can often be done in one operation. Grain sorghum small grains, clovers and winter peas, where adapted, are often turned under to supply organic matter. Cotton burs have also been used. The organic matter must be turned under deep in orded to be effective against rot rot the follow

Following the deep plowing, rain may occur before the soil drys. When this happens the deep plowing should be repeated or a resistant crop should be planted, explains Smith. Crop rotation in itself will not reduce root rot. However, a rotation using deep plowing and burying of organic matter will reduce root rot.

Because of different amounts of rain each year, no single practice is likely to reduce root rot everytime. A combination of practices carried on for a number of years is necessary for best results, says

They were aware of the dignity of man they respected the rights of their dellow man, Each evening of ac tivities was brought to a close by an evening devotion.

The American Legion and the Auxiliary are to be commended for providing the leadership necessar, to provide Boy's and Girl's State. The firms and individuals are to be congratulated for sponsoring the students, and the boys and girls are to be commended for their conduct and their interest manifested in the ideals that made this country great.




