Crash Kills Three, Injures Two at Muleshoe

A shattering head on car crash about one mile west of Muleshoe on U. S. Highway 84 Wednesday afternoon at 5:45 killed three persons and critically injured two others.

Joint funeral services will be held Friday, at 2:30 p.m. in the Earth Church of Christ for Mrs. Parker and her children.

Mrs. Loraine Parker, 25, wife of Curtis Parker, a Farmer County farmer and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Cody of Earth died en-route to the hospital in Muleshoe.

Her son Allen Ray, 17 months was still living as he was carried into the hospital, but died 15 minutes later.

Mrs. Parker's 4 year old daughter, Lillian, died at 4 a.m. (today) Thursday in the West Plains Hospital in Muleshoe.

Joe Neal Sparkman 25, Slaton and his fiancée, Miss Judith Annette Allen, 22, Rt. 1 Slaton were occupants of the other car involved in the fatal accident.

Miss Allen's condition was listed as critical by hospital attendants. She suffered a fractured jaw, head injuries and possible internal injuries.

Sparkman, who was driving the car suffered a broken arm, dislocated hip and multiple injuries. He and Miss Allen, who was graduated from Texas Tech in June, were traveling to Slaton from Clovis, New Mexico. They were engaged to be married later this summer.

The crash occurred on a stretch of U. S. 84, where, officers say, many deaths have caused them to put a "deadman" description on it.

Bailey County Sheriff, Dee Clements said he was driving near the wreck scene and was one of the first to arrive at it.

Clements said, Mrs. Parker was crumpled over the steering wheel and the little boy and girl were in the back seat.

The impact of the collision threw young Allen Ray out of the car, and his sister was thrown against the back seat. Fronts of both cars were ground back into the passenger compartment. Sparkman's car spun half way around and stood in the south-east lane, the Highway Patrolman stated, and Mrs. Parker's car was spanning the northwest lane.

Both cars, the Parker 1957 Chevrolet sedan and Sparkman's '58 Ford 4 door were declared "total losses."

Officers said Mrs. Parker, who was traveling northwest "into the sun" could have been blinded by glare, but this was not officially determined.

Mrs. Parker, and her children probably were returning to their farm home, 10 miles northwest of Muleshoe when the accident happened.

Mrs. Parker was the former Loraine Cody, and attended Springlake Schools.

Mrs. Parker is survived by her husband, Curtis, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Cody of Earth; two brothers, A. L. Cody, Dalhart and Filmore Cody, Lubbock; one sister Betty, of the home.

Jarvis Angeley Tops Wheat Record In Five-State Area

Jarvis Angeley, a farmer and long-time resident of Lamb County topped the wheat record in a five-state area this year when he harvested a 14-acre field last week which turned out 97.3 bushels of wheat per acre.

This yield may set the 1961 acreage production record for Golden Spread area.

Angeley lives in the Pleasant Valley community which is a short distance west of Earth.

The wheat was delivered to the Ray Griffith and Son Elevators at Muleshoe with the grain testing out 64 pounds per bushel.

The irrigated field was planted September 15 last year, at a planting rate of two bushels per acre.

Angeley placed 160 pounds of Anhydrous Ammonia pre-plant per acre on the field and watered the crop three times. The crop was not sprayed for greenbugs.

Following the harvest last week Angeley baled 48 bales of wheat straw per acre, aside from the bountiful wheat yield.

In 1960, 72 and one half of wheat per acre was harvested from the same field. Angeley was assisted with the crop by his son, Bobby Angeley.

The old wheat record for the Golden Spread was held by Curtis Deason, a Deaf Smith County farmer, who lives south of Vega. He harvested a field of wheat in 1960 that averaged 93 and one half bushels per acre.

Harvesting was continuing late last week in most counties of the northern Panhandle area, with above average yields reported. An estimated yield of 24 bushels per acre has been set for the 2 and one half million acres of the Golden Spread wheat.

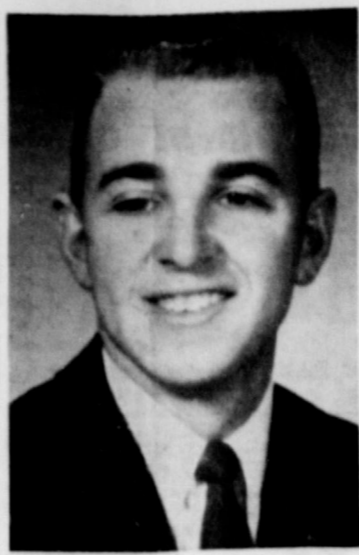

Mushroom Root Rot Kills Trees, Shrubs

Mushroom root rot is one of the most common root rot diseases of shade trees and shrubs. Peach and plum orchards are frequently destroyed by the disease which occurs in all areas of Texas. Infected trees or shrubs usually die from April through July. The disease is very often confused with cotton root rot.

Wilted leaves are the first symptom. Next, one or two limbs may die. In a few days or weeks the entire tree or shrub dies. Dead areas are produced in the bark on the main trunk and larger roots just beneath the soil surface. When the dead bark is peeled back, the white mold growth of the fungus over the wood surface is seen.

The fungus occurs most frequently in wooded areas or in recently cleared oak land. Arboreal, chinaberry, cultivated junipers, rose and pyracantha appear to be very susceptible. Fruiting bodies of the fungus consists of honey-colored or light-brown "toad-stools" or mushrooms. These mushrooms cluster near the base of infected trees or shrubs, generally in the fall. Whether they develop depends on the weather and the extent of decay.

All tree stumps and large roots should be removed as thoroughly as possible before orchards are set in infested soil. Planting of newly-cleared land to an annual crop for several years helps to kill the fungus.

Native yaupon and cedar are resistant. Photinia, gardenia, wax-leaf ligustrum, Japanese privet and crae myrtle have been known to escape the disease in infested

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

By Vern Sanford

Earl Golding, the prolific outdoors writer from Waco, makes some interesting observations.

The News-Tribune columnist, who also writes for the Austin Statesman, notes that there seems to be a "pattern" of lake fishing, employed by anglers fishing the different lakes in Texas.

Once you stop to think about it, fishing styles do follow a trend and these tendencies vary in different sections of the state. Lake Travis, fishermen, for example, employ methods quite unlike those used on Falcon. Fishing on Lake Belton differs from that on either Travis or Falcon.

Earl's research reveals that fishermen from the same town often fish alike. They sort of have their own trademark.

It's very likely a case of follow the leader—of copy the ideas of the most successful anglers. Exhibit A could well be the fast growing popularity of jig and eel fishing on Lake Buchanan, for example.

When a certain type of lure, or a certain type of gear, or a certain method of taking fish from their habitat clicks with an angler, he's likely to stick with it religiously. Only person who can change that pattern is a more successful fisherman.

That's when styles change! That's when even the better fishermen adopt a new method. And if it does prove more productive

Reduce Root Rot In Area Cotton

College Station — To reduce "dying-off" or root rot, a cotton farmer needs to know when dry weather is expected for 10 days to 2 weeks. When dry weather follows deep plowing, root rot will be reduced, says Harlan E. Smith, extension plant pathologist.

Soil should be plowed 6 to 18 inches with a disk or moldboard type. The drying of the soil that follows help to kill the root rot fungus. Deep plowing and drying help to kill old cotton roots and roots of susceptible weeds that harbor the root rot fungus.

Deep plowing plus the turning under of a large tonnage of old crop straw, stalks or leaves will give added insurance against root rot, Smith continues. The deep plowing and turning under of organic matter can often be done in one operation. Grain sorghum, small grains, clovers and winter peas, where adapted, are often turned under to supply organic matter. Cotton burs have also been used. The organic matter must be turned under deep in order to be effective against root rot the following season.

Following the deep plowing, rain may occur before the soil dries. When this happens the deep plowing should be repeated or a resistant crop should be planted, explains Smith. Crop rotation in itself will not reduce root rot. However, a rotation using deep plowing and burying of organic matter will reduce root rot.

Because of different amounts of rain each year, no single practice is likely to reduce root rot every-time. A combination of practices carried on for a number of years is necessary for best results, says Smith.

For further information, ask your agricultural agent for a copy of the publication, MP-361, "Root Rot Losses of Cotton Can Be Reduced."

THE AMERICAN LEGION AT WORK

In this age of skepticism, cynicism, distrust, violence and crime, we are apt to reach the conclusion that this generation has "gone to the dogs." Perhaps this is due to the emphasis given to such activity by various news media.

It is not uncommon to read stories dealing with riots, murders, assaults, rape and vandalism. Many times, these stories overshadow the good that is being done, the contributions made by various members to our society, and the research that results in a saving of lives rather than destroying their lives.

Perhaps it is time to think of the scholar rather than the delinquent, to recall the good rather than the bad, to recognize the giver rather than the taker and to emphasize the positive rather than the negative.

During the past two weeks, it has been my privilege to work with Boy's and Girl's State in New Mexico. I accepted the invitation without realizing the true nature of the occasion or the impact that such activity could make on our young adults.

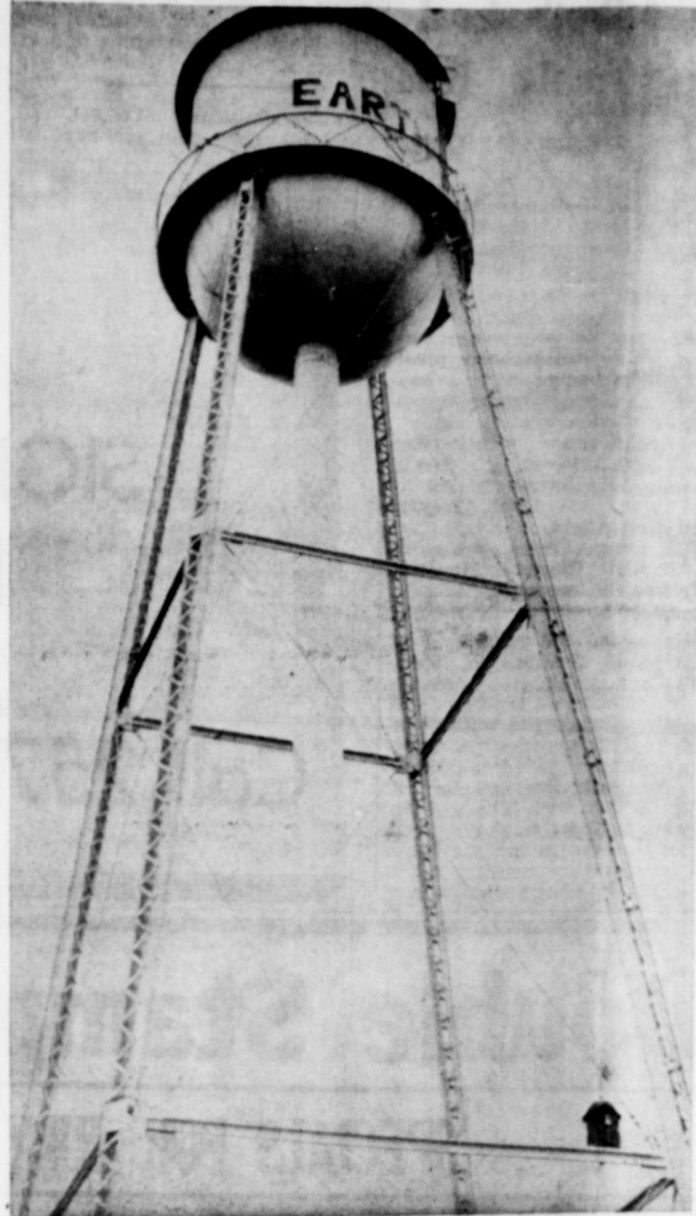
Boy's and Girl's State are under the auspices of the American Legion. Usually some service club, Legion Post, or an individual will sponsor one or several students to Boy's or Girl's State. The students are selected on the basis of scholarship, character, and leadership ability. They are expected to return to their respective communities to give a report on the week's activities and to give leadership to their school during their senior year.

If what I witnessed at the State meetings is indicative of the type of young people that will assume the leadership role in our nation, I am convinced that this country will survive. The boys and girls were concerned about the dangers that we face and the challenges and responsibilities that must be accepted if America is to maintain its leadership in the free world.

The "staters" received a two fold emphasis: (1) The importance of local and state government and (2) the true meaning of our American heritage, the practical approach on one hand and the theoretical on the other.

Perhaps the thing that impressed me most was the character of the people which were there. At no time did I see anyone get out of line; at no time did I hear an unkind word or abusive language. The students portrayed respect to their counselor and speakers. They were aware of the dignity of their fellow man. Each evening of activities was brought to a close by an evening devotion.

The American Legion and the Auxiliary are to be commended for providing the leadership necessary to provide Boy's and Girl's State. The firms and individuals are to be congratulated for sponsoring the students, and the boys and girls are to be commended for their conduct and their interest manifested in the ideals that made this country great.

'Recent changes in agricultural programs have created new requests for research to be conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation,' Frank Moore, President of the Foundation, stated this week that 'Sunflower Variety research would be revived at the Halfway Foundation for 1961.' Testing this crop was in the original program for the Foundation, but was set aside by other projects that were in greater demand.

Twenty varieties of sunflowers have been planted in the tests. The search is being made for disease and insect resistant varieties that will produce a profitable combine type head.

The sources of these seed are: five from South Africa, seven from Chili, four from Russia, and four from Canada.

'The Foundation is resuming its sunflower research as a part of their obligation to produce crops that will further add to the profit as well as diversity of High Plains agriculture,' Mr. Moore said.

Installation of new irrigation equipment has permitted the enlargement of the water conservation research program at the High Plains Research Foundation. James Valliant, Assistant Water Engineer said, 'The new facilities will provide an opportunity to enlarge the studies on irrigation and recharge well problems for the benefit of farmers on the High Plains.'

New equipment includes 2,100 feet of 12-inch underground concrete pipe contributed and installed by the American-Marietta Company of Littlefield, Texas. Five hundred feet of this pipe was the thick wall type and 1600 feet was the standard 12-inch concrete pipe.

The drilling of the new recharge well, located at the Playa Lake in the southwestern part of the Foundation farm at Halfway, was contributed by Bud Gibbons of Plainview, Texas.

The 301 feet of 15-inch steel casing for the new recharge well was a gift from Pioneer Natural Gas Company. Transportation of the pipe from Amarillo to Halfway was donated by Jay Taylor of Amarillo, Texas.

A new pump for the well was presented by Green Machinery Company of Plainview, Texas. This company, with the Chrysler Corporation, contributed the Chrysler engine. Swaze Brothers of Plainview dug the intake ditch for the pipe to the new well.
