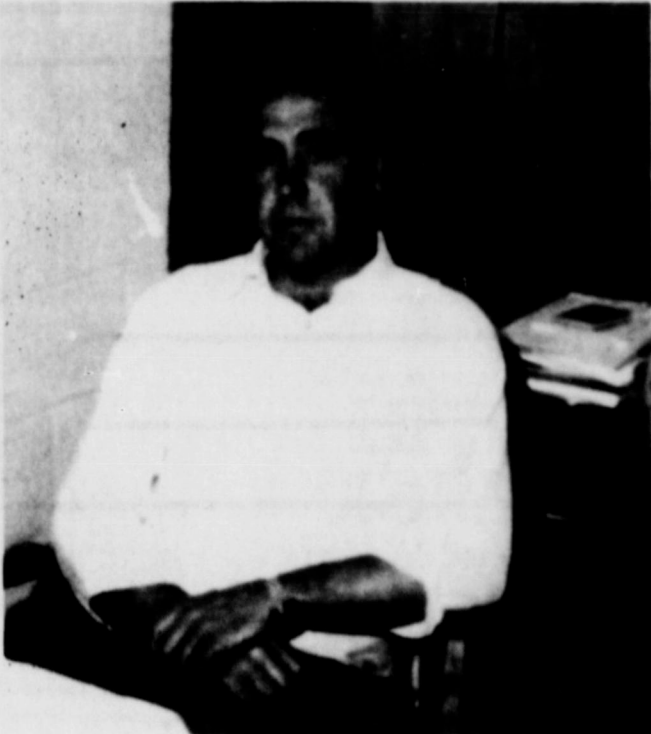

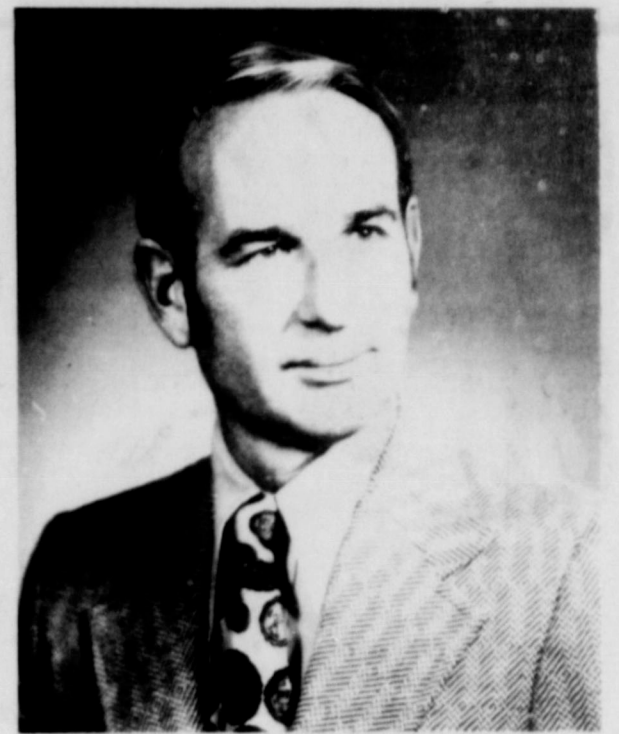


The matter of the County Paving and the City of Earth involvement has not been settled yet, and I want to complete this job in the best interest of the City.

Wood-Jordan—Standby 7

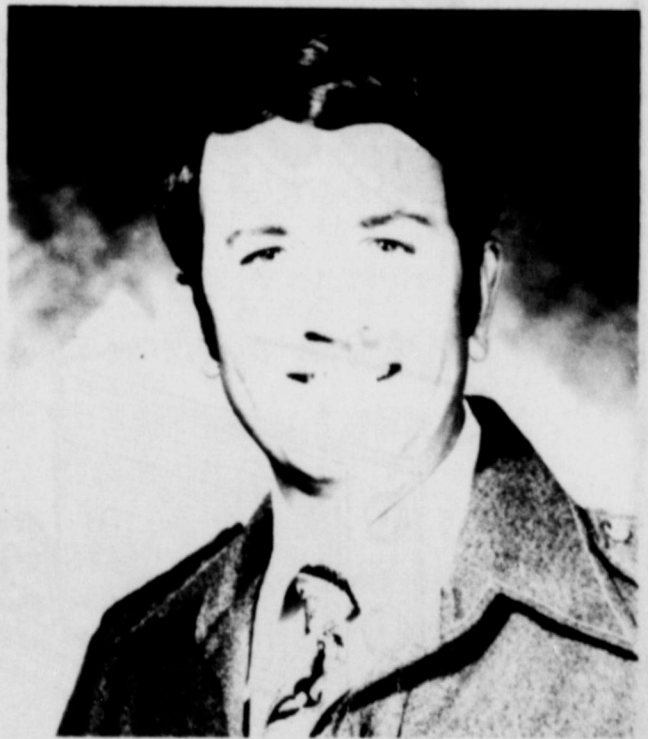

We must provide them service to keep down-time to a minimum."



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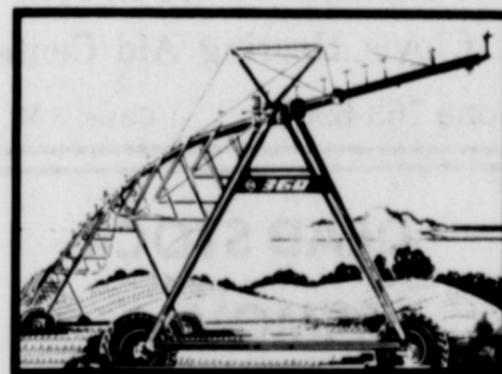
