WAR DECLARED ON MOSQUITOES IN CITY OF EARTH

All lakes and other breeding places for mosquitoes are being sprayed by airplanes, in Lamb County, in an effort to check encephalitis bearing mosquitoes.

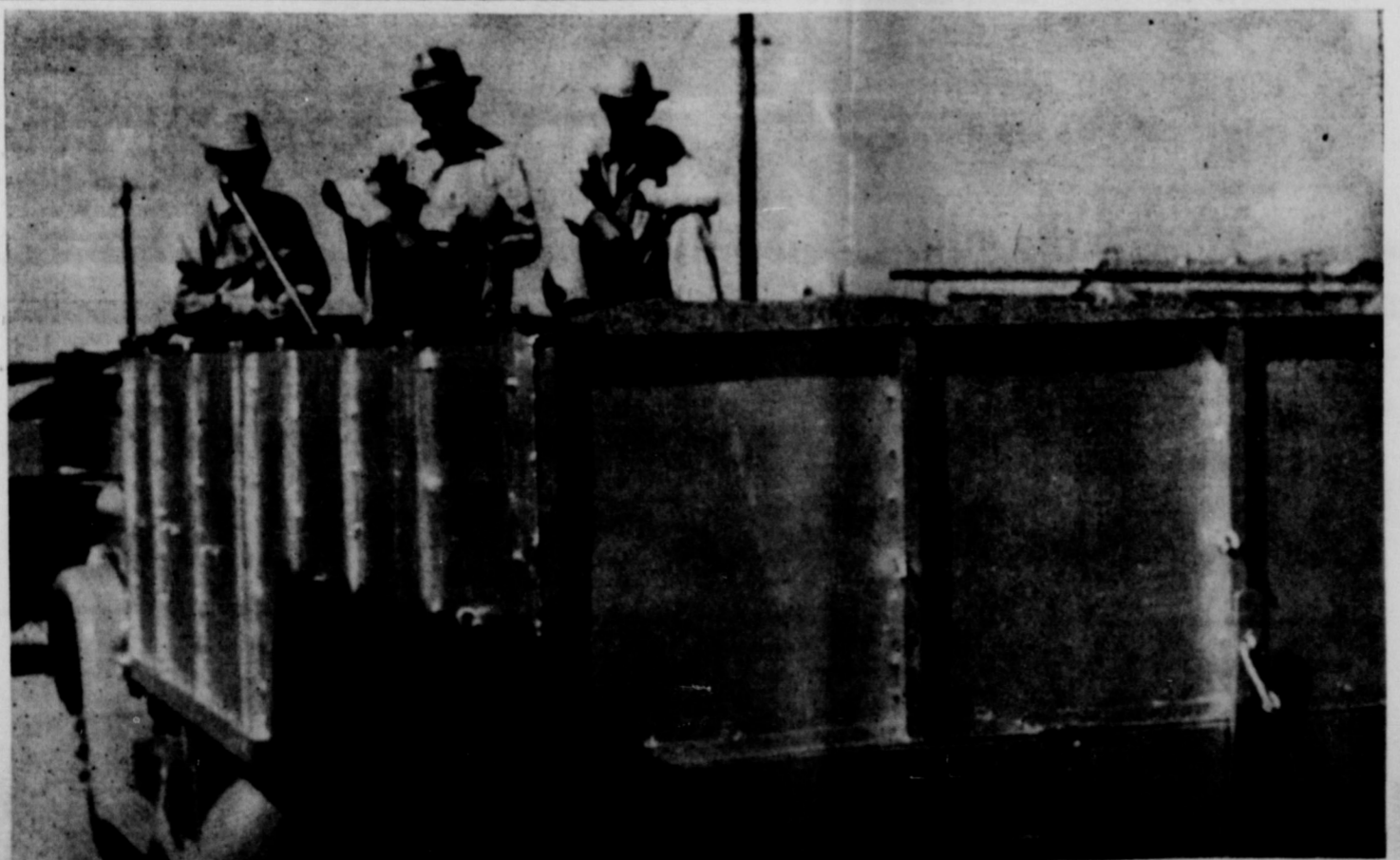
The extensive spray program, which started in the Pleasant Valley community and spread to all parts of the county, is practically completed.

A \$5,850 grant was administered by the office of Civil Defense Mobilization and Disaster Relief. The county will pay for the project but will be reimbursed by the federal government as part of an eleven county distress area.

Dieldrin was applied to lakes to kill mosquito larvae and all other mosquito breeding areas were dusted with BHC and DDT to eliminate daytime hiding places for the insects.

Streets and alleys were sprayed in Earth, the first of the week. The spraying was done by W. F. Williamson, city water superintendent, Carroll Blackwell and Ronnie Williamson.

Several new cases of encephalitis have been reported in Bailey county within the last few days.

Earth Elevator Gets First Load Of Grain Monday

The Earth Elevator received its first load of grain for this season Monday.

The grain, grown by Kenneth Cowley, two miles east of Earth, was planted April 25 and was cut from approximately three and one half acres.

The grain was of the Martin variety of Milo.

The load weighed 17,640 pounds and had moisture content of 15.81. W. H. (Sap) Kendrick did the combining of the grain.

The Springlake Elevator received its first load of grain just one week ahead of the Earth Elevator.

Earth Elevator received their second load of grain Tuesday afternoon, brought in by Orbie Armstrong.

Earth's first bale of 1960 cotton was produced by R. C. Davis, Sr. and ginned at the Earth Co-op Gin, Inc. No. 2, Monday, September 12.

The bale was pulled from approximately 11 acres of Improved Gregg Cotton on the Bill Stockard farm, one mile east of Lazbuddie. The cotton had received no hail damage.

The 2270 pounds of cotton was ginned by Jess Goode, manager of the Co-op Gins and his employees, B. F. Poe, S. M. Adams and A. J. Howell. Ginning of the first bale is free and the cotton was purchased at a premium price of 50 cents per pound.

The bale netted 620 pounds.

The cotton was planted April 13.

Last year's first bale was produced by L. S. (Abe) Griffin on September 7.

Griffin's bale of Gregg cotton weighed 2130 pounds and netted 495 pounds of cotton. Griffin raised the cotton seven miles north, and one half mile east of Earth.

Each year the Earth Jaycees sponsor the first bale of cotton prize raising program. Approximately \$300 in cash and merchandise has been donated by Earth businessmen and sponsored by the Earth Jaycees.

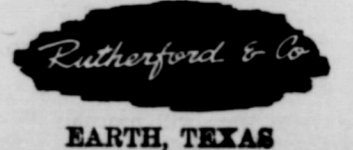

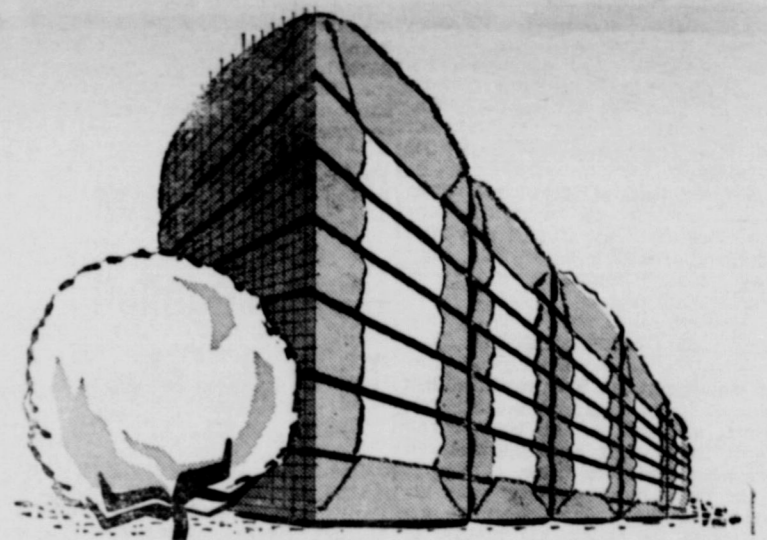

Anderson Speaker At Assembly

Stored Grains May Require Fumigation

College Station. — Grains cannot be stored and then forgotten. Insects such as the rice weevil and Angoumois grain moth may infest the grain in the field, and infested grain may be brought into storage.

E. F. Garner and R. L. Ridgway, extension entomologists, say that fumigation is the best protection against insect damage to stored grain.

Several fumigants are effective for killing stored grain insects, the specialists continue. They are formulated as various combinations, and are sold by companies under different trade names.

When applying liquid fumigants, the storer should be careful to spray the entire surface of the grain. Fumigant application may be accomplished with hand pump sprayer or small quantities of gran-

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or with some form of power operated sprayer for large amounts. The bin should be closed after the fumigant is applied, and it should not be opened for at least 24 hours — preferably 4 to 5 days. As a safety precaution, at least two men should be present when the fumigants are being applied, the specialists continue.

Garner and Ridgway suggest that anyone planning fumigation contact the local county agent. He

can supply specific information for the particular situation and he can also offer valuable suggestions and advice.

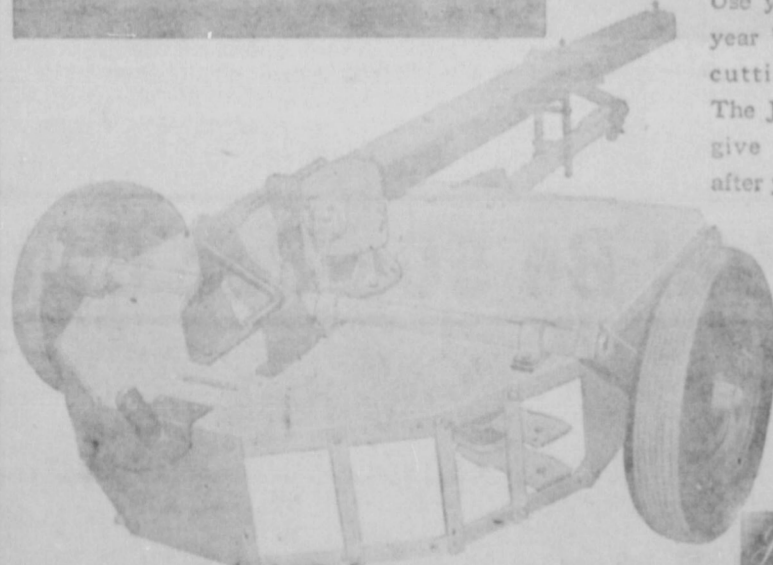

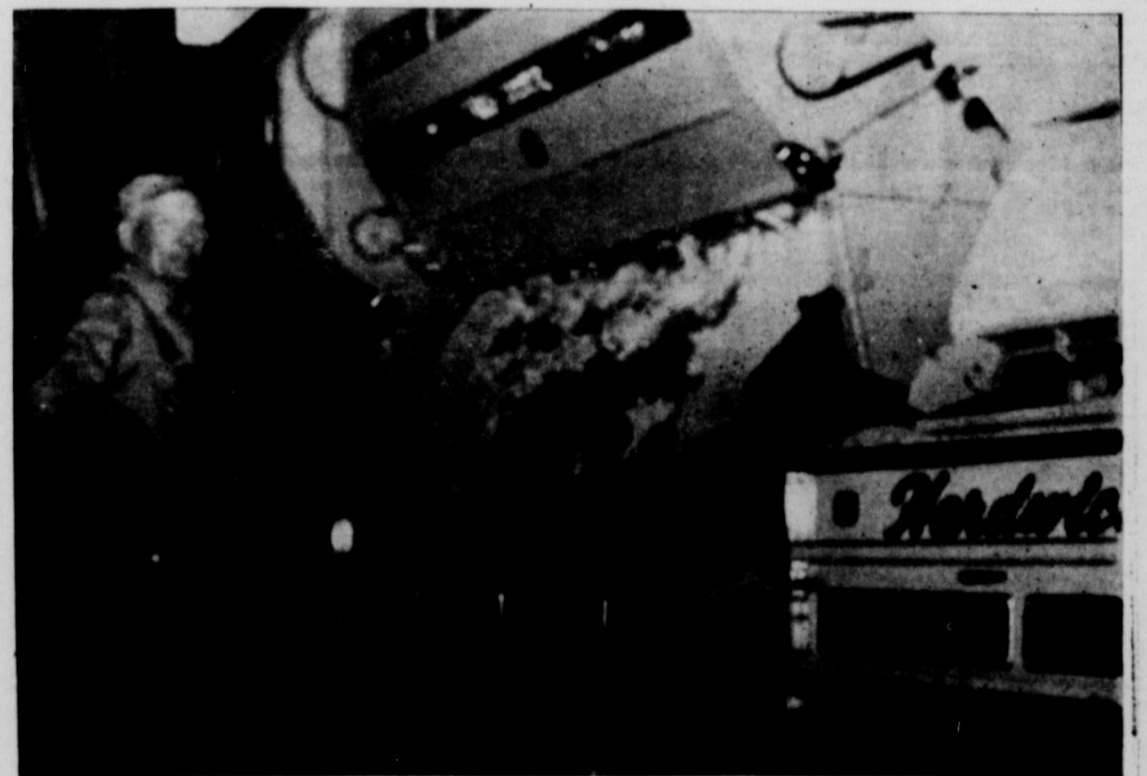

Free coffee and donuts will be served before departure.

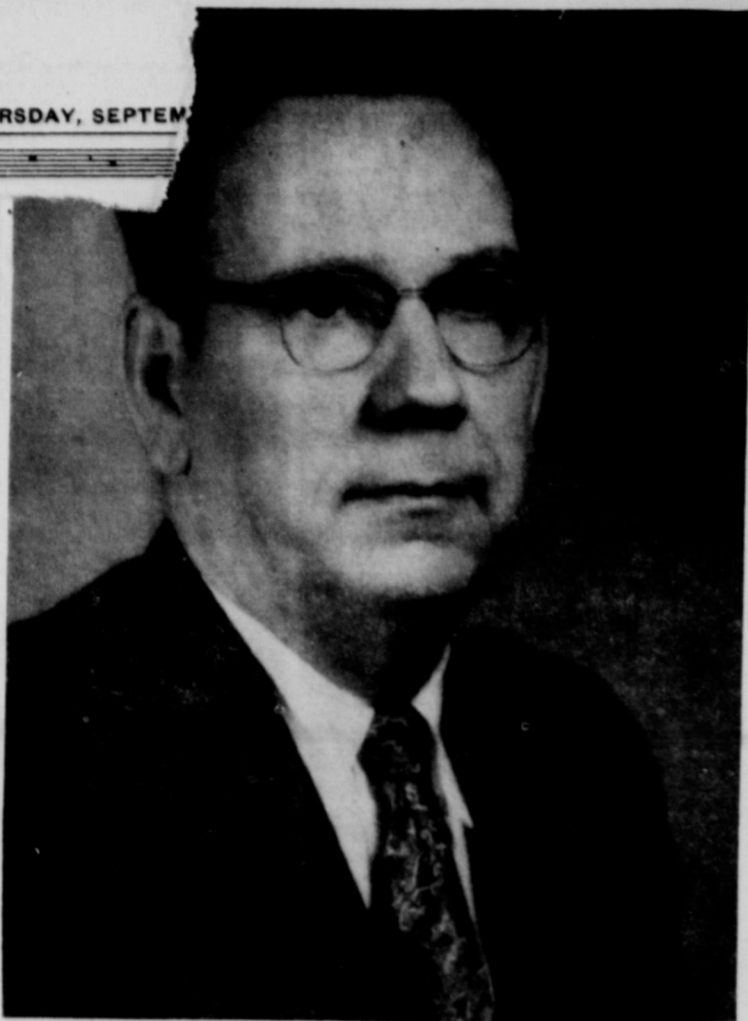
Group To Attend John Deere Field Day In Amarillo

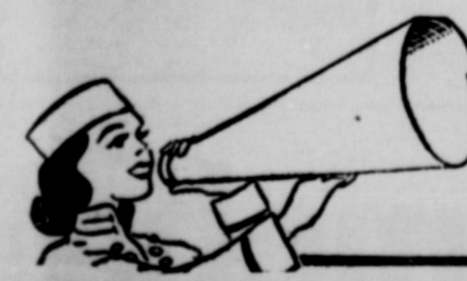

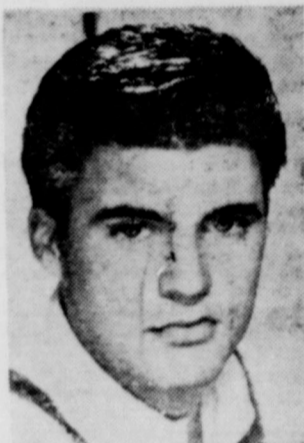

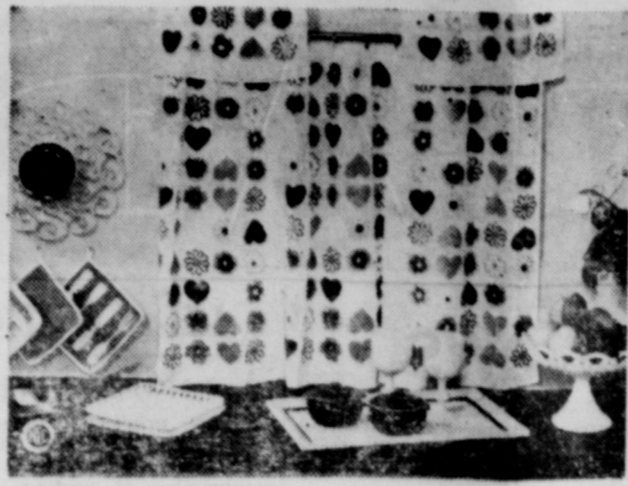
