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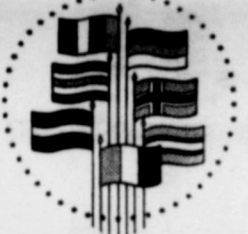

LIONS CAGED BY WOLVERINES 23 - 7

The Springlake Wolverines evened the score Friday night, defeating the New Deal Lions 23-7 and upping their standings to two wins and two losses.

The first half ended with the score 7-0 in favor of the Lions. The Lions only TD of the night came with only 49 seconds left in the first half. On the third down Randy Peoples connected with Clifford Rieken the right end on a quick jump pass that covered 15 yards.

Randy Peoples kicked the extra point and put New Deal out in front 7-0 at the end of the first half.

Springlake fans were kinda blue at the start of the second half and the Wolverines started to work. Troy Layman took the kickoff and returned it back on a nice 30 yard run.

The first play from center saw Jerry Don Sanders carry the ball for seven yards, Cary Latham carried the ball on the second down which netted 8 yards and a first and 10.

Jerry Don Sanders carried for three yards. An illegal procedure penalty set the Wolverines back five yards but on the next play Jerry Been carried the ball for three yards and a personal foul against New Deal gave the Wolverines a first and 10.

The first play from scrimmage, saw Don Sanders take the ball over left tackle for 10 yards, which set the ball up first and goal to go.

On the next play the Wolverines fumbled the ball, the Lions took over on the 13 yard line, but was unable to move the ball, and was forced to punt.

On the first play from scrimmage the Wolverines fumbled again, but recovered the ball on the 43 yard line. Don Sanders carried

the ball for 2 yards and Cary Latham was held for no gain. With third down facing the Wolverines Jerry Been carried the ball for 21 yards and a first and 10.

Possibility Of Large Lake In Lamb County

The prospects of having a large recreational and water reservoir in Lamb County are being examined. The soil conservation is investigating possibilities of a small watershed project on the Running Water Draw.

Although the stream is filled only when rain falls on its watershed it has at times caused considerable flooding along its course. There has been loss of valuable topsoil, and as in 1960 in Plainview, millions of dollars in personal property was damaged.

The Soil Conservation Service has proposed that a watershed project be considered for the stream. As it now stands, the project would be financed by the Federal Government under Public Law 566.

The project would consist of several earthen dams designed to hold a 250 acre feet reservoir with a flooding capacity of 500 acre feet. These structures could be enlarged, should any local governmental body desire, on a 50-50 cost basis between the local government and the federal government.

What is the value of such a project to Earth and Lamb County? Other than the primary reason for the project, that of prevention of soil erosion, there are possibilities of a source of water for such towns as Earth, Olton and Springlake, and many recreational values, boating fishing etc. Instead of water sports fans traveling many

miles to enjoy recreation, they would have it right at their backdoor, so to speak.

But to every good thing there must be a price. If the structure is to be enlarged, one of the local governments must sponsor the project. They must be ready to pay half the cost of the enlargement, and maintain the dam after it is completed. In addition if the landowner gives an easement for the required land, the pond remains on private property. If the landowner does not choose to give the easement, the land must be purchased by a local government, thus it becomes public property and is available for public use.

Brady, in Central Texas is in the process of completing such a project. The people there are enthusiastic about the boon this will give their community. A meeting was held recently in Brady, which several county men attended. They were given an air tour of the Brady project. Among those attending were Guy Daugtry of Earth and James Washington and Bill Clayton of Springlake.

HOT ROLLS

2 c milk
 1/4 c oleo
 1/4 c sugar
 2 t salt
 2 pkgs. yeast
 1/2 c warm water
 5 to 6 c sifted flour
 Bring milk to a boil, add oleo, sugar and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Sprinkle yeast over warm water. After 5 minutes stir and combine with cooled milk mixture. Add half the flour to make a soft dough, mix thoroughly. Turn out on lightly floured board, cover with mixing bowl and let rest 10 minutes. Then knead 10 minutes until smooth and satiny. Place dough in warm greased bowl, brush top with melted oleo, cover and let rise in a warm place about 2 hours or until doubled in bulk. Do not punch down. Turn out on board and shape into rolls. Place on greased baking sheet; cover and let rise one half to three quarter hours or until doubled in bulk. Brush with milk or melted fat. Bake in 375 degree oven 15 to 20 minutes.
