

The Soil Conservation Service has proposed that a watershed project be considered for the stream. As it now stands, the project would be financed by the Federal Government under Public Law 566.

The project would consist of several earthen dams designed to hold a 250 acre feet reservoir with a flooding capacity of 500 acre feet.
