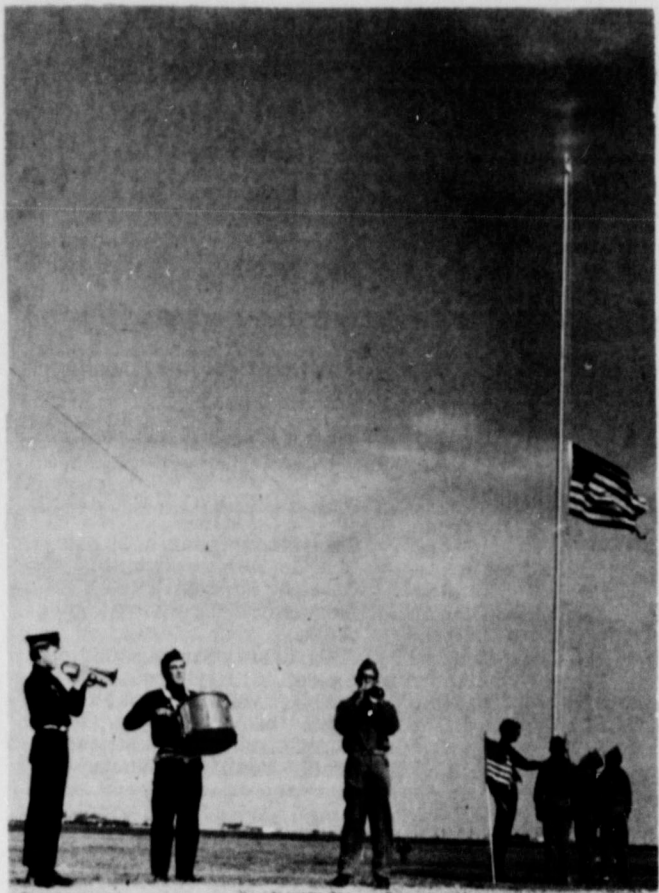

Cadettes Share Three Day Camping Adventure

Five members of the Earth Cadette Troop left Friday morning, May 29, at 7:30 for a three-day adventure in Troop Camping held at Camp Rio Blanco.

After their arrival and check in at 10:00 a. m., the group was assigned the covered wagon on they shared during their camping festivities. Each of the covered wagons will accommodate five girls.

Following the unpacking of bed rolls, members of the local troop enjoyed a nose bag lunch. The camp compound which consisted of a campfire, chuck boxes and clothes line was then set up.

A short swim was enjoyed by the girls under the supervision of the water front staff of Camp Rio Blanco prior to an afternoon hike to the Tree House. In order to reach the Tree House, the Cadettes were required to cross the Big Sandy on a wooden bridge. The house sets approximately 20 feet above the ground in a large tree. The time spent in the Tree House was used to observe various types of wildlife which included woodpeckers, blue jays and morning doves.

Upon returning to the campsite, the girls were allotted a free period to enjoy as they wished.

Friday evening a supper of hot dogs and sometimes was prepared over an open campfire and enjoyed by the Scouts. Sometimes are roasted marshmallows and Hershey bars placed between graham crackers.

After a clean-up session, everyone participated in campfire singing. Activities were limited Friday night due to the weather conditions. Work Survey Underway In 35 Mile Radius Of Earth

The local Chamber of Commerce is currently conducting a labor survey of the surrounding area to determine how many people are available for employment.

This is an attempt to obtain an accurate picture of the availability of workers within a radius of 35 miles of Earth.

Miss Grain Sorghum Contest Entries Sought

Dimmitt (Special)-The Grain Sorghum Industry has begun its annual search for a new title bearer. This week entry blanks and instructions have been forwarded to civic clubs, chambers of commerce and other groups for contestant sponsorship in the Miss Grain Sorghum of the Nation contest.

New rules set by the Castro County Chamber of Commerce at Dimmitt specify that girls must have been in at least one beauty pageant during the past year. Entries are expected from at least five of the 13 major grain sorghum growing states in the Midwest.

At Dimmitt, chamber workers and merchants have begun preparation for the pageant August 7th and 8th with programs both nights open to the public. Since the program is being expanded to two days, it will require more time in getting things in readiness.

This year for the first time in the history of the eleven year old contest, girls will all be given the opportunity to present their talent to the judges. Other judging will be based on poise, beauty and personality. Scholarships of \$1,750 will be available for the winners of first, second and third places.

From a trophy for first in 1960 to the first place prize of \$1,000 the contest is one of the fastest growing in the southwest in number and prestige. Trophies again this year will be furnished by the Grain Sorghum Producers.

Miss Karen Lafferty of Farmington, New Mexico, is the reigning titleholder, beating out 29 other girls in 1969. Miss Lafferty during the past year has represented the more than 2 million persons in the grain sorghum industry and its related fields.

Two Dead, Three Injured In Two Car Accident

A grinding two car collision at 3:30 p. m. Monday in the Flagg Community at the intersection of FM 1055 and FM 1524, resulted in the death of two persons and left three others injured. The victims were Lon Boothe, 45, and his 15-year-old daughter, Janie.

Boothe's wife Betty, 42, and son, Lonnie Joe, 8, are in the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. She is listed in serious condition and the boy is in critical condition in the intensive care unit. Mrs. Boothe suffered neck and back injuries and her son sustained head injuries.

Driver of the other car, Terry Ott, 18, of Route 2, Earth, was dismissed from the Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt on Tuesday.

The Boothes of Route 4, Dimmitt were reportedly enroute to Dimmitt for baseball practice when the accident occurred. Boothe was coach of a ball team and his son was a member of the team. Boothe's daughter, Janie, was driving the family auto, according to a Department of Public Safety spokesman.

Boothe, who operated a farm in the Flagg Community for the past 42 years, was apparently killed instantly in the crash. His daughter was dead on arrival at the hospital in Dimmitt.

Funeral services for Boothe and his daughter are set for 3 p. m. Thursday (today) in the First Baptist Church in Dimmitt with Rev. Raymond Perkins, pastor, and Rev. Bill Wadley, pastor of the Lee Street Baptist Church, officiating.

Open House Sunday At Prairie Cattle & Grain Company, Inc.

Open House for Swisher County's newest custom cattle feeding and grain storage operation, Prairie Cattle and Grain Co. Inc., will be held Sunday, June 7, Prairie Cattle Company, the feeding lot, where the open house will be staged is located nine miles west of Tulla on Hwy. 86, 5 miles south on FM 1424 and 2 miles west of FM 928, all excellent highways. The lot is situated on 274 acres and has its own self contained lake, good slope and run-off system.

The facility makes a substantial addition to the High Plains custom cattle feeding industry, with a pen capacity of 31,000 head and ample land purchased to expand. At present, 20,000 head are on feed and more arriving daily.

The new lot has all the latest conveniences and concepts of modern construction and design. The modern office building houses attractive rustic offices with a "taste of the west" decor throughout, the air conditioning, temperature control heating and carpeting assure comfort. Records are kept by a completely computerized record system and a pen sprinkler system, for dust control, is automatically controlled from the office. Complete telephone communications and intercom are provided by Mid Plains Telephone Co. and also the ticker tape machine, keeping the company posted on latest market quotations from Chicago.

The automated feedmill, a Williams-Built batch type, is built to handle 40,000 head and can be expanded to feed 60,000 by installing more equipment in space provided in the original design. Located at the far west side, past acres of steel and concrete pens and bunk, is the water storage tank with a capacity storage of 44,000 gallons. Two big volume irrigation wells assure plenty of water. The main well is electrically controlled and the back-up well is on gas. Continuous water flowing equipment is provided.

Unloading chutes, dual purpose scales and the cattle working areas are located conveniently to eliminate congestion in speeding cattle to designated pens, four hospital areas are conveniently located.

According to Bailey Reece, a representative of Swisher Electric Cooperative who provided electricity, "this is the best night lighted feedlot in America". Experienced manager of Prairie Cattle Company is Frank Smith. Previous to his employment by Prairie Cattle Company he was assistant manager of the nearby Tulla Feedlot for over four years.

Open house will be from noon until 5 p. m., refreshments will be served and cars will be available for those guests who wish to tour the feedlot or visit the main facilities of Prairie Grain Co., which is located in Tulla, with storage facilities for 14 million bushels of grain. Three other pick up stations have storage facilities totaling one million bushels.

SP/4 William Wells Receives Medal For Heroism In Vietnam

Army Sp/4 William M. Wells, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cap Lanier of near Earth, received the Army Commendation Medal with "V" Device in Vietnam on April 24.

The medal was awarded for heroism in connection with military operations against an armed hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam.

Wells distinguished himself while serving as a crew chief with Company A, 4th Aviation Battalion, 4th Infantry Division, on 24 January, 1970, while flying a resupply mission. Wells monitored a call that Landing Zone Challenge was receiving small arms fire, seriously wounding one soldier.

Wells' helicopter landed at Landing Zone Challenge, un-

der intense hostile fire. He immediately jumped from the aircraft and began unloading the supplies.

With the space now available, the aircraft was flown to the location of the wounded man, and under Specialist Wells' direction, cleared into and out of the area, extracting the casualty.

The commendation order stated that Specialist Four Wells' personal bravery, outstanding performance, and exemplary devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army.

Wells is stationed at An-Kle, South Vietnam.

FINANCIAL FACTS

Do you know what happens when a foreign government cashes in dollars? And takes the money out in the form of gold? First the gold is moved from Fort Knox to New York. However, it is seldom shipped across the ocean to the foreign government.

It is deposited for safekeeping in the vaults of the New York Federal Reserve. There the gold resides five stories underground. It is protected by an air-tight cylindrical door ninety tons in weight.

When this gold is officially received, the foreign government issues a check. This check is drawn on its bank account to the order of the United States government.

The Treasury deposits this check at one of the Federal Reserve banks. Both countries adjust their records accordingly.

Local Youths Attending Camp

Two local youths, Kenneth Wimberly and Jimmy Lanier, left by bus Saturday, June 6, at 11:00 p. m. for Camp Hoblitzelle in Midlothian for a one week's stay at the Salvation Army Camp. Kenneth is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Wimberly of Earth, Jimmy's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Cap Lanier of Earth.

The boys arrived at the camp before lunch time on Sunday, June 7. They will begin their return trip following breakfast on June 14.

While attending camp, the boys will be housed in redwood and brick cabins each offering accommodations for twelve campers and one counselor. Complete bathroom facilities are provided for every six campers.

The camp consists of a pool, recreation hall and the most modern camping facilities available. Activities to be enjoyed by those attending include swimming, horseback riding, sailing, canoeing, archery, campfires, handicrafts, fishing, baseball, various other sports, movies, stunt night, amateur night, boating, worship services, Bible study, hiking, Indian council rings, carnivals and various awards.

Nutritious meals are prepared on schedule and water at the camp is checked by Public Health Authorities to insure its quality for drinking. The camp is completely supervised to promote health and happiness for

those boys attending. The swimming is supervised by qualified lifeguards and the camp offers complete infirmity facilities with a registered nurse on duty at all times. Insurance coverage is provided for each of the campers during their stay at camp and while they are being transported to and from the camp.

The two local lads participating in the camping festivities along with the others attending were chosen by the Salvation Army Committees of their respective towns. Recommendations of local school faculty members are considered in the selection of the boys who will attend the camp. Each committee tries to the best of its ability to select two boys who get along well together so they will not feel so alone.

Those chosen are children whose parents are not financially able to send them to camp. Campers must be between the ages of 8 and 14. The selection of boys who smoke, drink, etc. is highly discouraged due to the bad influence they may have on others attending.

The Midlothian camp is free but each boy participating is required to take \$2.00 for personal use for cold drinks and candy which may be purchased at the camp store. They must also pay for their meals while they are traveling to and from the camp.

Area Crops Receive Damage

Final grades for the year reveal that the Queens had a collective total of 49 "A's", 44 "B's", 20 "C's" and only three "D's" and no failures. That averages out to a 3.15 grade point on Wayland's 4.0 scale. WBC is noted for its high academic standards.

During the Fall semester, the Flying Queens took 184 hours and averaged 3.22 with 26 "A's", 25 "B's", only 9 "C's" and no grades below "C". The 11 players and their manager combined for a 3.08 average for the Spring semester, the drop off attributed to the pressures of a heavier basketball schedule. For 179 hours of classroom work, the team posted 23 "A's", 19 "B's", 11 "C's" and three "D's".

Census Bureau To Conduct Employment Survey In Area

The Bureau of the Census will conduct a survey of employment and unemployment in this area during the week of June 14. Walter A. Freeman, Jr., Director of the Bureau's regional office in Denver announced today.

The households to be interviewed here are part of a scientifically designed sample that is representative of the entire U. S. population. The employment and unemployment statistics are collected monthly by the Bureau for the U. S. Department of Labor to provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the Nation as a whole and of its major regions. Questions on employment similar to those in the sample survey were asked of the entire population in the 1970 decennial census, now being completed. Bureau officials point out, however, that the monthly survey is es-

sential as the source of current employment data.

Facts supplied by individuals participating in the survey are kept confidential and the results are used only to compile statistical results. The law safeguarding the privacy of the individual applies to all census taking operations.

First there is the individual. The account is in the name of the individual only. Then there is the joint account. The account is in the name of two mutually interested persons.

There is the partnership or firm signature. This is where two or more persons are engaged in an unincorporated business. Anyone or more of the partners may sign for the partnership.

There is the corporation where one or more officers may sign. There is the guardian, executor, or administrator signature. These are court appointees qualified to sign as legal representatives of estates.

There is the agent or manager signature. These officials are acting in such capacities for others under time limits.

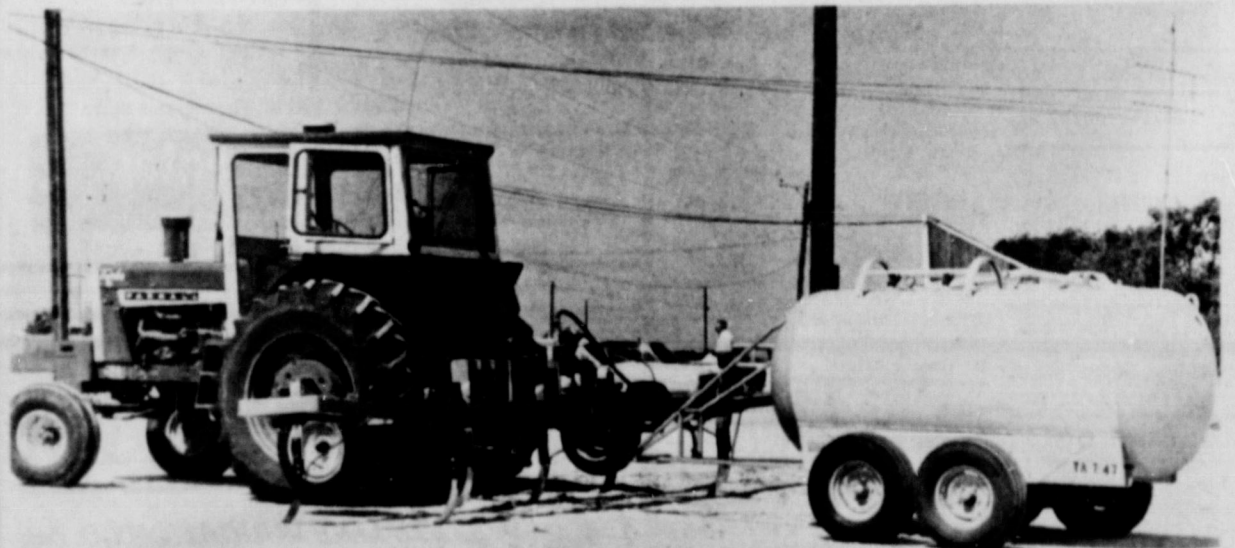
