DYER-DUNN RE-ELECTED...

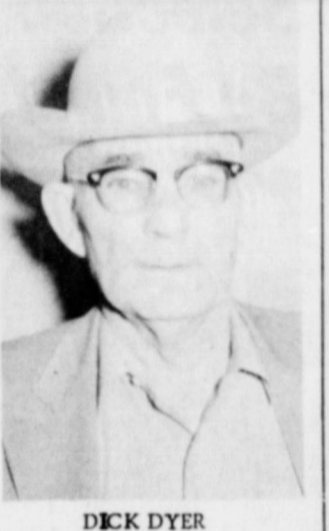
Voters Cast 4,036 Ballots in County

A grand total of 4,036 Democratic Lamb County voters went to the polls Saturday and re-elected Sheriff Dick Dyer, and Herbert Dunn, County Tax assessor-collector to their respective offices for another term.

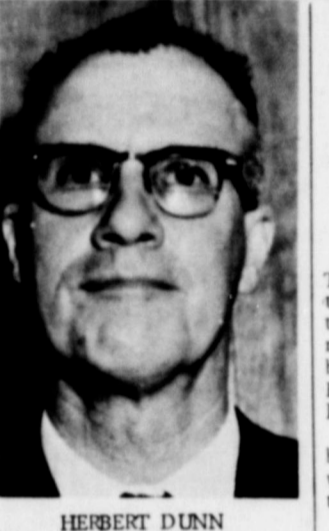
Dyer, a 12 year veteran as Lamb County Sheriff staged a surprising first primary victory over his three opponents in Saturday's voting, carrying 16 out of 17 precinct boxes.

In Earth's precinct opponent V. L. Smith, Jr. polled 162 votes to Dyer's 92 with Candidates, W. D. Dick Ratliff receiving 75 votes and Loy Dalton polling 19 votes in that precinct.

In official counts Tuesday afternoon Dyer polled 2,245 votes to a total of 1,660 votes for his three opponents.

Ratliff polled 713 votes as runner up in the sheriff's race, Smith's count was 581 and Dalton's was 366.

In the other two contested county races, incumbent Herbert Dunn, tax assessor-collector was a decisive victory over his one opponent Bill Jefferies, and County Democratic Chairman Glenn Batson barely edged out his opponent, Guy Walden, Sudan banker in a two man race.

As expected, county wide, Gov. John Connally won strongly over challenger Don Yarborough in the governor's race, a result which was duplicated in the over the state race. In the U.S. Senate race Ralph Yarborough led his only opponent, Gordon McLendon by over 500 votes in the county election.

For governor, Jack Crichton polled 252 votes over the county Lt. Governor candidate Horace Houston 253, John Trice for attorney general 250, for Congress at Large, Bill Hays 255, for representative in Congress, 19th district Joe B. Phillips 254, for Associate Justice of Texas Supreme Court, place 1, T. E. Kennerly 254, for Railroad commissioner, Don Flanagan, 254, for Comptroller of public accounts, Dallas Gaines, Jr., 254, for State Treasurer Fred S. Nueman 255, Commissioner of the General Land office John A. Matthews 254, Commissioner of Agriculture John B. Armstrong 254.

For Republican chairman of Lamb County, W. H. Bill Carter polled 252 votes against three write in votes for Bob Manley. Precinct chairmen elected were precinct 1, Bill Thomas, 2, Jay Winders, 3, A. A. Brown, 4, Jack Barton, 5, Kenneth Burgess, 6, Harold Allison, 8, Jack Yarborough, 9, A. L. Berry, 12, Sam Barden, 16 John Richey 17, Carl Perkins.

Herbert Dunn proved to be a popular choice by Lamb county voters retaining his tax-assessor's post, polling 2,678 votes to Bill Jefferies 992.

Glenn Batson narrowly edged out Guy Walden, polling 1,623 votes to his challenger's 1,472.

These were the only contested races in the democratic primary.

Gov. Connally polled a whopping 2,709 votes compared to Don Yarborough's 1,056 in the county. Connally's state total overwhelmingly topped that of his opponents, to eliminate a second primary run-off.

Senator Ralph Yarborough polled a total of 2,102 votes to his Contender, Gordon McLendon's 1,590, the only bitterly fought race in the election.

In other state contests Lt. Gov. Preston Smith of Lubbock scored a tremendous victory over his opponent Albert Fuentes, Jr., by Lamb counts of 3,343 to 275. Texas Congressman at Large, Joe Pool had a close race in the county with Dan Sullivan of Andrews County, with counts of 1,337 for Pool and 1,229 for Sullivan.

Railroad Commissioner, Jim Langdon outdistanced veteran candidate, Jesse Owens 2,069 to 1,425 in county votes. Supreme Court Justice Jack Pope, loped out ahead of his single opponent Sears McGee by 1,663 to 1,429.

Texas Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler polled 2,810 to his challenger Fred H. Williams 637 and agriculture commissioner, John C. White led his opponent, Millard Shivers by 2,756 to 744 in Lamb County.

Herbert C. Martin, Former Littlefield attorney, now of Amarillo scored 2,182 to his challenger Judge Ernest O. Northcutt's 1,209 in the county for the court of civil appeals 7th judicial district.

In the county's 17 Democratic voting precincts only one recognizable contest developed for precinct chairman with W. G. Finney receiving 125 votes on a write in against the only candidate Howard Hall receiving 473 votes in precinct 1, located in Olton.

In the other county precincts, the ballot had only one candidate. All of them won only two or three write ins at the most, for other candidates.

County GOP FAVORS COX AND GOLDWATER

Republicans in Lamb County voiced overwhelming support of Jack Cox for their U.S. Senator, candidate Saturday with Cox polling 145 votes, Dr. Milton V. Davis, 21, George Bush 53 and Robert Morris 6 in the 255 votes cast by the party in the absentee box.

Senator Barry Goldwater polled 203 votes in the 1964 Republican presidential nominee to Rockefeller's 5 votes, Margaret Chase Smith 2, Harold Stassen 7, In write ins Henry Cabot Lodge received 8, Richard Nixon 6 and George Romney 2.

The senatorial race was the lone contest on the ballot.

Winders Named Republican Chairman

Jay Winders was named convention chairman and Mrs. Wilton Lewis, Jr., convention secretary at the Precinct 2 Republican convention held Saturday, after the polls closed at 7 P.M. Delegates appointed to the county convention to be held this Saturday at 3 PM in the court room at Littlefield were Winders, Mrs. Lewis, H. L. Evans, Margaret Womble, Ann McManigal and alternate, Bill Braden.

At the Saturday meeting the group resolved to support the Republican Party to the best of their ability.

News-Sun Office Nears Completion, Moving Day Soon

Construction of the modernistic and spacious new 1,860 sq. ft. building that will house the Earth News Sun is almost completed and the firm will be moving into the new location within the very near future.

Erected by Highlight Homes Inc., the spacious 25'x75' structure features lovely Arkansas brick frontage, with the walls constructed of block tiling and a large plate glass window in front with a glass front door, that opens from the east into a convenient and roomy lobby.

Ducked evaporative air-conditioning is featured throughout the building for excellent comfort during the hot summer months. Central heating is also installed for winter warmth.

Acoustical ceilings are featured throughout with fluorescent lighting. The floors are covered with vinyl tile. The walls are finished in off white and paneling.

The spacious lobby features shelving around the east and south walls for office supply displays. This will provide customers more excellent and convenient service. The walls in the lobby are enhanced by lovely birch paneling.

Two office rooms are featured on the west wall of the lobby. The spacious 9'x12' front office will house the bookkeeping department. This office features beautiful birch paneling on the south and west wall. Also on the west wall is a large picture window that will be draped in brown draw drapes. The two remaining walls are finished in off white.

The spacious 9'x14' office is fully carpeted, enhanced with 3 walls in birch paneling and one white wall, featuring a picture window that will be enhanced by draw drapes. This room will be furnished with a desk and comfortable chairs in contrasting colors of orange and brown.

A beautiful brick planter is installed to completely separate the lobby and front offices from the workshop in the back. Plenty of floor space and built

ins are featured in the workshop department. A large 8'x9' built in storage will be used for paper stock and also a 12' storage room is built for storing paper files. Work tables are built along the east walls. The commercial printing department will be installed on the west side of the workshop.

The building features two 8'x5' baths with a 30 gallon hot water tank installed. The women's bathroom has a built in vanity and medicine cabinet with built in storage in both bathrooms. The bathroom table tops and back shop work benches, feature formica tops for easier cleaning.

A built in dark room 16" by 6'10" is fully insulated and will be operated by an electrically controlled heat pump that will insure 68 degree temperature the year around. Spacious cabinets, three feet high are installed around the walls of the room, with a double sink installed for picture development purposes, for the production of better pictures.

The entire structure is erected of steel and cement, according to insurance specifications to qualify for lower insurance rates.

City Commission Orders Crackdown on Violators

At the city commissioners meeting, Monday night, city officials voted to back city Marshall, Clarence Hazlett in a crackdown on traffic violations within the city limits of Earth.

Reckless driving, throwing bags of water from cars, and driving down the street abreast has reportedly increased over the past few weeks, causing hazardous driving conditions on city streets. All persons who violate any traffic laws will be given a ticket by local law officials.

The city commission also passed a motion to purchase a radio for the city marshal's car.

Another important item on the agenda approved at the meeting was the motion to build a dog pound at the dump ground area where stray dogs that are picked up will be kept in pound for three days, and if they are not picked up by their owners within this time limit, they will be destroyed.

A city ordinance states that all dogs owners who allow their dogs to run loose within the city limits will be subject to a fine not less than \$5 or no more than \$100.00.

Other items of business discussed and approved were to advertise for bids for the foundation for a new ground storage tank that will be erected in the future, to bring down local insurance rates.

Opening of the swimming pool was discussed and the group voted to publish a notice for a pool manager.

With mosquito and fly season just around the corner, a motion was made to repair the dusting machine in readiness for combating the pests in forthcoming season ahead.

The group also accepted the resignation of Water Supt. Frunderich, effective June 1st.

The group discussed at length the city sanitation problem, and asked that residents burn all trash that is burnable. They agreed to a firm policy of hauling everything left in back alleys, residence are warned to move it out of the alley if you want to keep it.

If residents have their tree limbs or brush to be hauled they are asked to call the city hall. This will be hauled off at a minimum charge of \$5 per load, but cannot be hauled off without extra charge.

Before the meeting adjourned the group voted to raise the salary of Joe Gilmore, head of the trash hauling, from \$260 per month to \$280.

Use of Aqua Ammonia Increases in Area

Aqua ammonia as a nitrogen fertilizer is receiving increasing attention in the area. Most of the interest occurs in the Sandy, lighter-textured soil area in Hale, Lamb and Bailey counties. A small amount of interest has been shown in the area of heavier textured soils in Hale, Castro and Deaf Smith county.

Aqua ammonia is not new. The main reason very little has been used is that it costs more than anhydrous ammonia and it takes longer to apply aqua than it does anhydrous.

Aqua ammonia is ammonia dissolved in water. It usually contains at least 20% nitrogen, and is sold as 20-0-0. The material has a slight vapor pressure and has to be injected into the soil to a depth of one to two inches to avoid loss of nitrogen sources. Aqua Ammonia will give equal results when used on a nitrogen-equivalent basis.

The price of aqua ammonia will usually be quoted at a delivered price and a "picked-up" price, which is usually slightly lower if the nurse tank is picked up at the dealer's location. Some dealers do not deliver it to the farm. It takes four tanks of aqua to be equal to one tank of ammonia on a nitrogen-equivalent basis. Actual nitrogen, from aqua will usually cost about 8 cents per pound. Actual nitrogen from anhydrous is 6 1/2 cents per pound.

The main reason given for using aqua instead of anhydrous is that too much ammonia is lost during application. If, for some reason, the chisel mark cannot be properly covered, for instance in very cloddy soil or soil that is too wet, ammonia can be lost. If the chisel mark can be properly covered, there will be no loss of ammonia. If soil is too wet to close a chisel mark, compaction by tractors may cause more harm than the good you will get from either, anhydrous or aqua. Even our most sandy soils that are being farmed have enough clay in them to hold the heaviest rates of ammonia normally used. The main advantage of aqua is its use on soil with very heavy stalk residue, however, there would be few situations where the higher cost of aqua could be justified over the use of anhydrous ammonia as a nitrogen source.

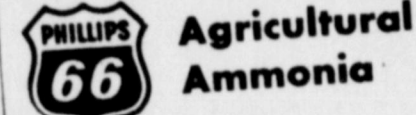

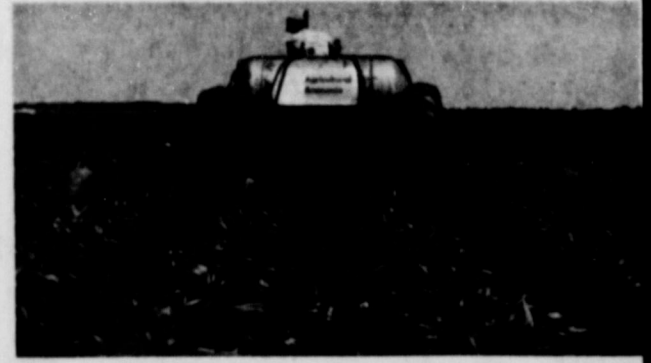

FFA Judging Team Wins 11th In State

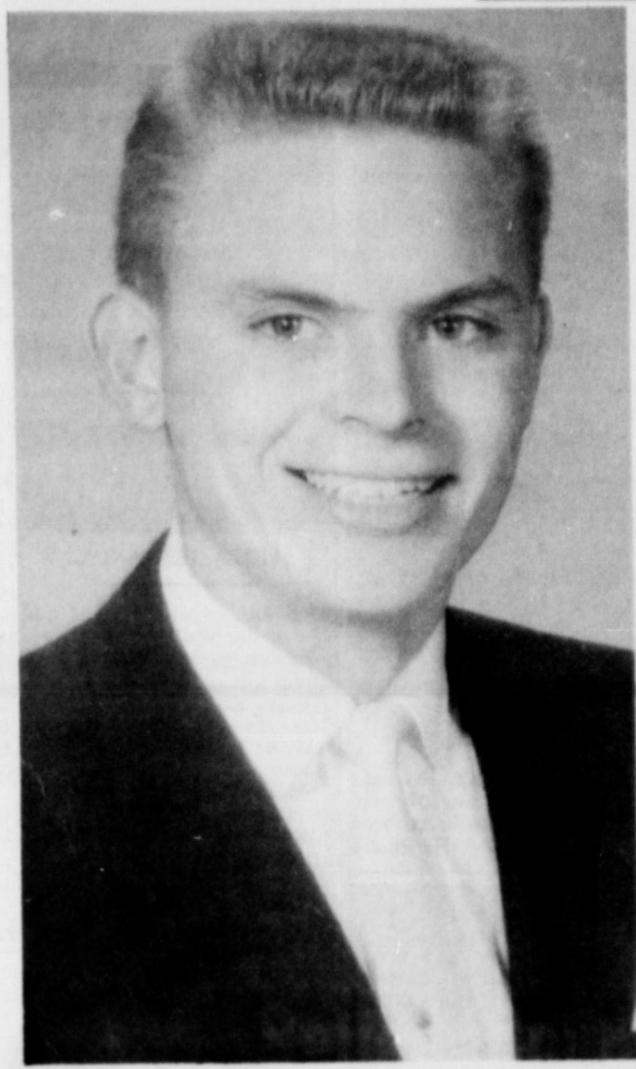
