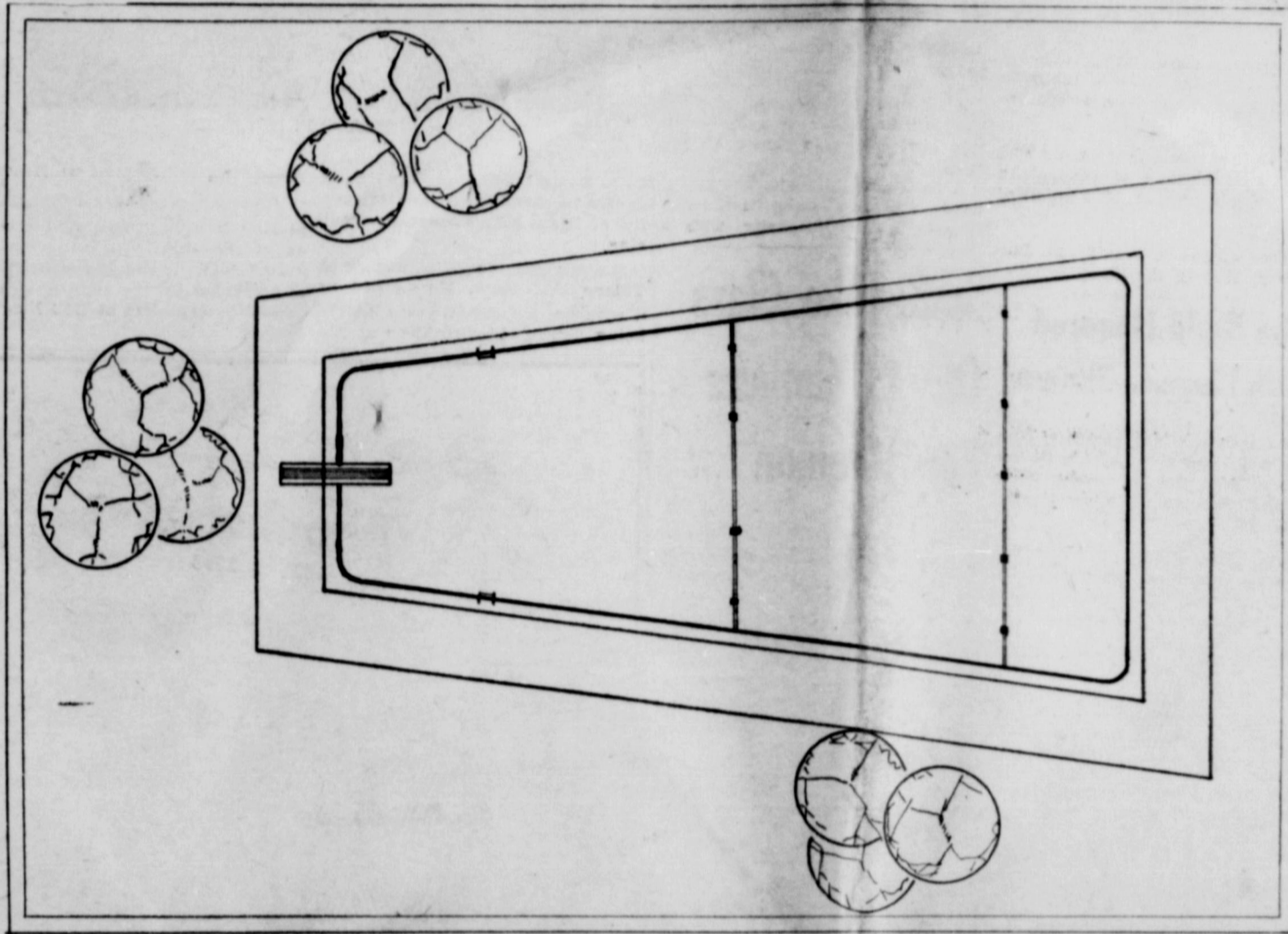
Both teams, accompanied by E. G. Gaston Ag teacher attended an FFA banquet in Littlefield Tuesday night, where banners were awarded the teams.

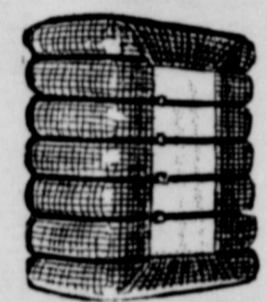
THE PROPOSED FAN SHAPED SWIMMING POOL FOR EARTH AREA

The Big Kickoff Breakfast for the Swimming Pool Fund Drive will begin at 7:30 a.m. Tuesday at the Community Building in Earth.

Following the breakfast a campaign will be launched to call on individuals throughout the area for donations to build the Community Swimming Pool and have it in readiness for the 1959 season.

Members of the local Jaycees and the Senior Chamber of Commerce along with other civic minded individuals will begin the Fund campaign to raise approximately \$14,000 to add to the fund which now stands at approximately \$4000. Estimates to build a heated pool, with the necessary bath house have been between \$18,000 to \$20,000.

Bids have been submitted by the Seahorse Pool Company and the Simplay Pool Company, both of Lubbock, also Texas Blue Lake Pools of Amarillo.

Tentative date for the completion of the pool will be May 1, 1959, at which time it is hoped the pool will be opened for the season.

The Local (Jaycees) Junior Chamber who have met and planned out the Fund Raising Campaign, dug down in the clubs general fund and donated \$500 to the fund this week.

(DONATIONS TO THE POOL FUND IS TAX DEDUCTIBLE)

The pool will in all probability be a fan shaped Landon Pool 35'x 50'x75'. At the small end the pool will be 35 feet and taper outward until it reaches 50 feet in width at the larger end. It will be 75 feet in length.

The water line will be 3 inches below the 12 inch white pre-cast travertine coping, and will vary from 2 feet to 10 feet in depth. The pool will be built with a 15 foot slope, allowing a gradual water depth.

DETAILS OF CONSTRUCTION

The pool will be constructed of a ceramic tile concrete shell using steel reinforced poured concrete floor and Gunite walls, marble dust plastered interior, with 6 inch ribbon of blue fireproof ceramic tile at waterline.

MECHANICAL EQUIPMENT

The pool will be equipped with filter, chlorinator, (with 50 lbs capacity) and a pool heater with 205,000 BTU output.

ACCESSORIES

The pool bid estimates received, covers a 14 ft. springboard, also a 2 ft. diving board, a galvanized steel ladder, a brush type vacuum cleaner with 30 ft hose, 3 floats with 16 ft handle. Also a water test set, to test the amount of chlorine in water.

The finished pool will have fence, decking and bath house and will be a pool that Earth and Springlake area people can rightly be proud to patronize.

The Jaycees and Chamber of Commerce are hoping that the time is right for area people to donate willingly to this much needed project. They are very enthusiastic over the project and hope to be met with eager to donate folks so they can wind up the drive within a very few days.

Dr. Holden Addresses M. A. In Panama

A Denver doctor who has played an important role in the open heart surgery program at National Jewish Hospital at Denver, addressed the Medical Association of the Isthmian Canal Zone, Balboa Panama Canal Zone at the November 18 meeting.

He is Dr. Robert F. Holdren, 40, chief surgical resident at NJH. His wife, Dr. Mary Lou Holdren, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Hinson, Springlake. Mrs. Hinson visited in Denver with her daughter while Dr. Holdren was in Panama.

Dr. Holdren described the technique developed at NJH for repair of inter-ventricular septal defects (opening in the wall between the lower heart chambers), using hypothermia (deepfreeze) and coronary perfusion (oxygenated blood given during surgery to nourish the body while the heart is stopped).

A film taken in surgery at NJH, showing the repair of a defect of this kind was also shown at the meeting.

B. S. Degree and received a Ph. D. degree in chemistry at the University of Iowa before entering medicine.

He received his M. D. degree at Tulane University. He worked as a surgeon for seven years before being named chief resident at Na-

tional Jewish Hospital at Denver, a free-care, nonsectarian medical center for tuberculosis and diseases of the chest.

Dr. Holdren and his wife, who is employed by the Denver Public School System, live at 1925 Niagara, Denver.

A white glittering cross before a background of red roses and rainbow streamers, completed the room decorations. The place cards, programs and napkins were in the rainbow colors.

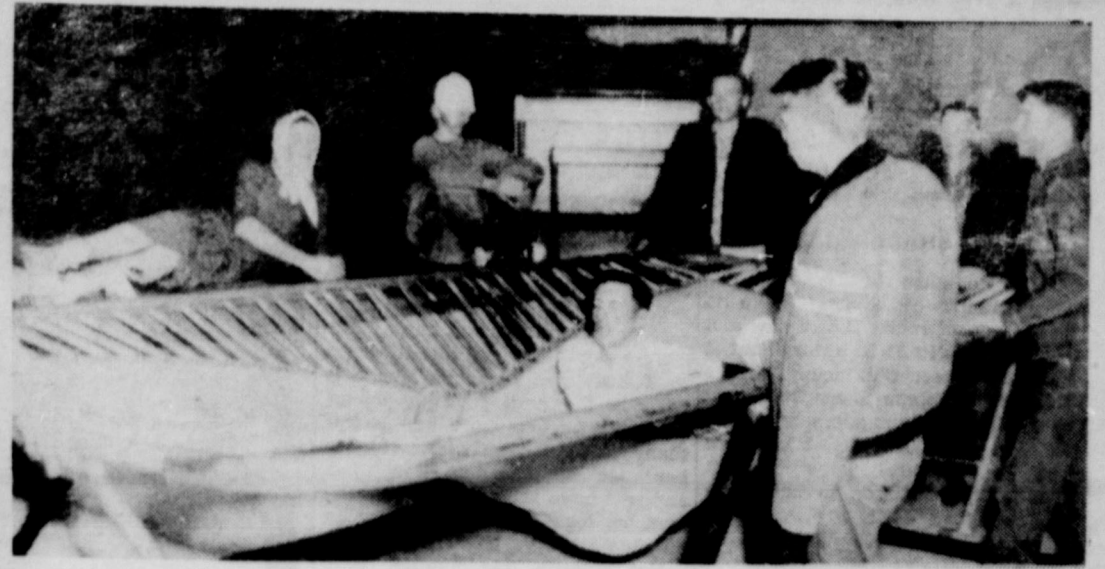
