An 11 month old baby died Friday after its parents thought they had been refused admission to the Plains Memorial Hospital for lack of money

The incident is being investigated by the County District Attorney's office.

Dead is Isidro Aguinaga Jr., son of Mr. and MR.S Isidro Aguinaga Sr. of Dimmitt. The father is a farm laborer here.

Those involved in the incident said a Spanish-English barrier may have been a major factor in the baby's death. But the incident brought Plains Memorials admission policies into question and has resulted in a change in procedure at the hospital.

Aguinaga took their sick baby to the Dimmitt Medical and Surgical Clinic Friday morning, where Dr. B.D. Murphy treated him for respiratory infection and dehydration. Dr. Murphy said the baby was running a figh fever. He called the hospital, ordered the baby admitted and prescribed a program intensive treatment and medication. The hospital staff reportedly prepared for the admission and was ready to begin treatment when the Aguinagas arrived.

But according to Dimmitt Police Department interpreter who later took statement from the Aguinagas, they said they were told at the hospital's business office that the baby wouldn't be admitted unless they

paid \$400 or \$450. "The parents assumed that since they didn't have \$450, the hospital had refused to admitt the Police Department spokesman said.

The Aguinagas decided to take their sick child to Swisher Memorial Hospital in Tulia.

"They started to leave the hospital and stopped them in the lobby as they passed my office," Hospital Administrator Jack Newsom said. repeated that the baby could be admitted, but that they would need about \$400 to pay the

Newsom added that the conversation between Aguinagas and hospital personnal were being translated by a teenage boy who had accompanied the family to the hospital.

"The parents took the baby on to Swisher Memorial Hospital in Tulia, where he was seen by a doctor and was given more medication." the Police Department spokesman said. "There, the Aguinagas were told that since they were residents of Castro County and not Swisher County, they would have to bring the baby back to Plains Memorial for treatment. That doctor too said the baby needed

Sheriff's office at 3:20 p.m.," Sheriff Granville Martin said. "The woman was crying and said in Spanish "I think my baby is dead."

"I felt the baby's throat and thought I could feel a small pulse, but I wasn't sure." Martin said. "I had two of our deputies (Boots Crews and David Dalton) take the mother and baby to Dr. Lee's office immediately.

Dr. B.H. Lee is the county medical officer. At Dr. Lee's office, the baby was pronounced dead.

"The baby might have died even with intensive treatment," Dr. Murphy said this week. "But the family should have been ushered in quickly and admitted.'

He added "when I ordered the baby admitted, I knew I'd need to go over to the hospital to start the IV treatment. But when I called the hospital to make sure they were set-up, they said the family had left.'

"We followed the normal admission prosedures," the hospital administrator said later. "I don't know how much money was asked of them, but a cash deposit of about \$400 is usually required for three days treatment. This financial requirement is standard





This allows for the detection of declines as well as excessive build-ups. If a field is used for intensive production, a soil test should be run more often. special problems. Better management may have elevated soil fertility levels. If this is the case, a soil test will indicate the need for less fertilizer, says Jones. If yields above those expected were obtained, an increase in fertilizer application may be needed.



Rural Development Perspectives

After decades of population loss and economic decline, rural America progressed significantly in improving its social and economic condition during the 1970's, according to a new publication released today by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"Rural Development Perspectives," prepared by the Economics, Statistics, and Cooperatives Service (ESCS), contains articles on many aspects of rural development, including population trends, women in the rural labor force, rural housing and volunteers in rural communities.

Although agriculture remains the major industry in many rural counties, over 66 percent of rural residents have more than 90 percent of their employment in other industries, reports ESCS demographer Calvin Beale in one of the main articles.

Rural women are joining the labor force in greater members, accounting for the vast majority of non-metro job growth in the 1960's, said ESCS economist Jeanne O'Leary. Expanding opportunities, changing family size and structure, inflation and a changing attitude toward female employment outside the home all help explain the rapid growth of rural woren's participation in the labor force.

Rural housing conditions improved dramatically from 1950 to 1975, as the percentage of households in substandard units dropped from 59 to 8 percent. Yet 1.9 million rural households lived in substandard housing in 1975, mainly low-income people, report ESCS agricultural economists Ronald Bird and Ronald Kampe

Volunteers contribute much to the quality of life in small town America, said Thomas F. Stinson, ESCS agricultural economist. By using volunteers, communities can have publicly goods and services at a level they could not otherwise afford.
