Farmers Urged To Combat Soil Bank Weed Problem

It has been recommended by the Lamb County ASC office that the farmers who have acreage in the Conservation Reserve, on which there are tumble weeds that they shred these weeds, instead of moving them, pointing out that due to the high winds at this time, cotton growing in the immediate area might become damaged if the large weeds should be blown over the cotton plants.

Lamar D. Aten Jr., Lamb County ASC Manager, is urging all farmers to cooperate with their neighbors in this regard and work together to combat with this Soil Bank problem.

Springlake F. F. A. Booth Wins Third Place At Fair

The Springlake Future Farmers of America Chapter entered an educational exhibit booth in the Panhandle-South Plains Fair at Lubbock. The booth won 3rd prize and \$60.00 in prize money. There were 14 booths entered.

The title of the booth was on Early Season Control of Cotton Insects, Aphids, Thrips and Fleahoppers. It was based on the 1954 investigation of the Lubbock Experiment Station. During that year they got a yield of 2053 lbs of seed cotton per acre where they controlled these insects. Where no control was practiced the yield was reduced to 1325 lbs of seed cotton per acre.

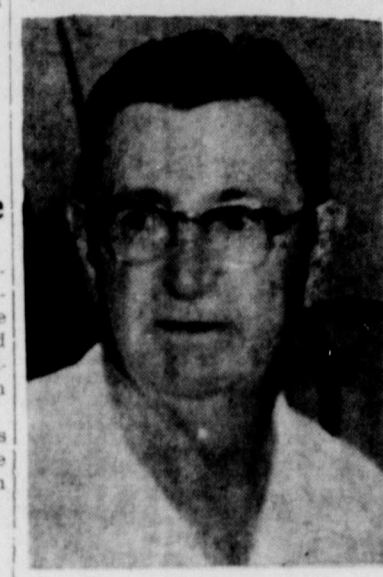
There are now four participants in the United Fund Drive in Lamb County. They are the Salvation Army, Red Cross, the Boy Scouts and the Girl Scouts.

The 1950 lbs of seed cotton ginned out 500 lbs of lint. It was of the Paymaster 54B variety.

Sanders said the bale was ginned free of charge and a premium of 50 cents per lb. would be paid Burnett for the first bale.

They toured several points of interest including Knox Berry Farm and the U. C. L. A. Camp.

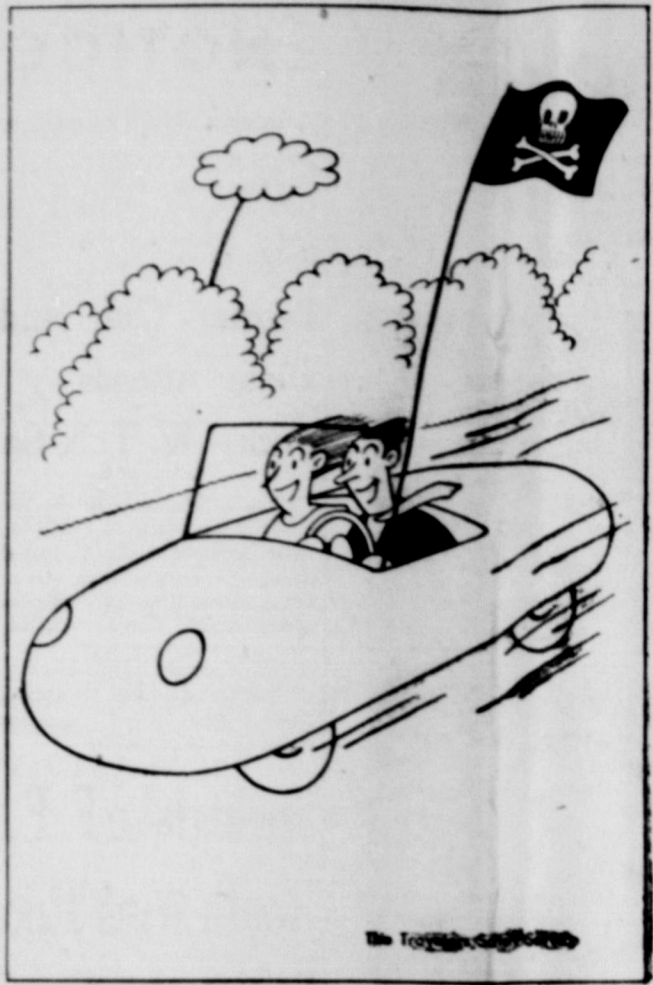

Canvass Of Former Polio Patients In Lamb County Now Being Conducted

The local canvass of former polio patients now being conducted, part of a national program, is to serve as basis for an intensive study of the current medical needs of all post-polio patients, both paralytic and nonparalytic. It has been noted that some patients, originally diagnosed as nonparalytic, develop weaknesses and even deformities after a lapse of years, Rev. Donald Luckemeyer, county chapter chairman, explains.

Facts gathered here relate to type of treatment received and the amount of recovery achieved by each patient. They are to be compiled in roster form to be forwarded to the National Foundation's headquarters. The canvass is to be completed this month.

County physicians as well as those throughout the nation have been informed of the projects and have been asked to cooperate in completing the roster, "not all patients are known to us through our chapter rolls," Rev. Luckemeyer explained; "thus we welcome the aid of our doctors and health

authorities in locating those for whom no continuing record has been kept.

The chapter asks that all persons who have ever had polio—whether disabled or not—send their names and addresses directly to Mrs. Buster Owens Jr., Lamb County Chapter, National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, 129 East 17th Street, Littlefield, Texas.

WHAT TO DO WHEN BREATHING STOPS



These five figures illustrate, from top to bottom, the steps in mouth-to-mouth resuscitation now being taught in Red Cross First Aid courses.

(1) Mother, using middle finger of one hand, clears child's mouth of any foreign matter. With same finger, she holds the tongue forward.

(2) Mother places child in a face-down, head-down, position, and puts him firmly on the back with the free hand, to help dislodge any foreign object in the air passage.

(3) The child is placed on his back, and the mother, using middle fingers of both hands, lifts the lower jaw from beneath and behind so that it "juts out."

(4) With one hand only, the jaw is held in this jutting-out position.

(5) The mother, covering the child's mouth and nose with her mouth, breathes into the child with a smooth, steady action. The free hand applies continuous moderate pressure to the child's abdomen, between navel and ribs, to prevent the stomach from being filled with air.

Social Security Representative To Be In Earth October 2

Now would be a good time for some South Plains farm and ranch operators in the area serviced by the Lubbock Social Security Office to take a long look at their earnings prospects for 1957, according to John G. Hutton, District Manager of the Social Security Administration.

The particular farmers referred to are those who have filed claims for social security payments and were under age 72 on January 1, 1957. Some of these persons have had their checks suspended, while others have had them arriving each month, depending on how much they estimated their 1957 earnings to be. Rain . . . too much or too little . . . and other workings of nature may have caused their original estimates to be too high or

too low. As a result, some of these persons who have had no checks this year could now get them, and others who have been receiving their checks should have them stopped.

This comes about, stated Mr. Hutton, because of the earnings restriction for beneficiaries not yet 72. If net earnings for the year are \$1200 or less, the claimant can collect all twelve retirement checks from Social Security this year. If net earnings are between \$1200 and \$2080, some benefits may be payable for the year. If earnings are expected to exceed \$2080, generally no social security checks would be payable for that year since such persons are not considered "retired" within the meaning of the Social Security Act.

Persons living a considerable distance from Lubbock are reminded that social security representatives visit all counties, following a schedule which is available at your local post office. A representative will be in Earth at the post office, on October 2, 1957, at 11:00 a.m.

Questions And Answers On "Asiatic Flu"

1. What is "Asiatic Flu"?

It is the name given to the influenza seen recently in epidemic form, caused by variants of Type A influenza virus.

2. Whom does "Asiatic Flu" strike?

Young adults, in good health, appear to be particularly susceptible to the disease itself, but the dangers of complications are more serious when the victims are children or elderly people.

3. How is it spread?

Presumably in the same way as other types of flu; namely through direct personal contact, droplet infection or by direct contact with the objects contaminated by discharges from the nose and throat of infected individuals. There is some evidence that flu infection is airborne.

4. How widespread may it become?

At this time it is impossible to predict with accuracy the prevalence of influenza varies widely, depending upon the contagiousness of the virus and personal factors. In past epidemics, attack rates of the milder strains have varied from 5 to 30 per cent of the population.

5. What is the incubation period?

This is variable, but it is seldom less than 24 or more than 72 hours.

6. What are the symptoms?

The symptomatology is the same as with previous types of influenza. The disease begins abruptly, there may be lassitude, weakness, chills, severe muscular pains, headache, fever usually from 101 to 103 degrees, nausea, vomiting, sore throat and cough. The disease usually runs its course in three to five days if no complications. Not every patient will show all of the above symptoms.

7. Is there any particular symptom diagnostics?

To date, there have been no

reports of any distinctive single symptom.

8. How serious is the flu? The present "Asiatic Flu" is believed to be a mild disease, even though the attack rate seems to be relatively high. The more serious aspects of the disease have been the complications which have, as yet, been few.

9. What are the complications? The usual complications are secondary bacterial infections, such as pneumonia, otitis, etc.

It was the secondary pneumonia that made the epidemic of 1918 so severe.

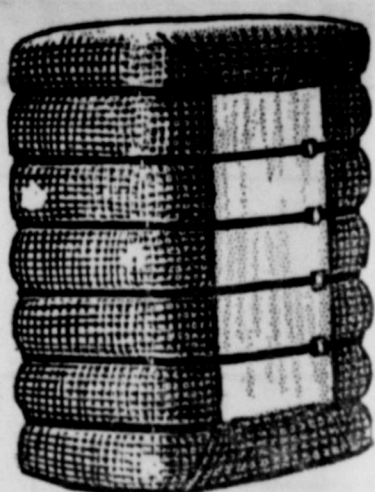

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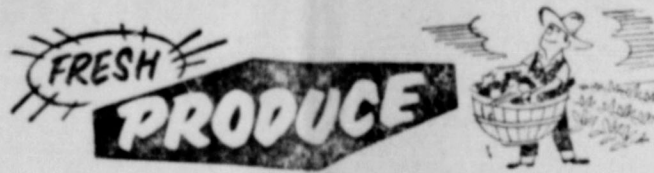
