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Rodeo Queen Contestants Needed

Preparations are now being made for the 28th Annual Earth Amateur Rodeo to be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 13, 14, and 15.

Only five young ladies have announced their candidacy for the title of 1972 Rodeo Queen. The annual contest will be held on July 13, following a parade to kick off the 28th Annual Earth Amateur Rodeo.

The Queen Contest is being sponsored by the Earth Roping Club this year who want more contestants to register as soon as possible. Several stores are wanting to sponsor a girl so a number of entries are still needed.

The contestants must be single, high school student for the 1972-73 school year and have some riding ability.

The girls will be judged by out of town judges on simple horsemanship (60%) and poise and personality (40%). On July 10 at 9 a. m., contestants will display their horsemanship ability at the local arena. Later a luncheon will be given at the Springlake-Earth School cafeteria where the judges will rate the girls on poise and personality.

The 1972 Earth Rodeo Queen will be crowned during the first night performance and will reign over the rodeo activities.

Merchants are asked to pay a \$5.00 entry fee to sponsor their girl and provide transportation of some kind for her during the rodeo parade.

A coke party for all the girls will be given by Linda James in her home June 29 at 2:00 p. m.

Girls are asked to furnish their own horse for the judging and go with the caravan to surrounding towns, if possible.

married in Estelline in 1921. Mrs. Smith was a pioneer resident of this area. When the couple moved to Earth they lived in a small shack as did their early day neighbors. They built a lovely Austin stone home in 1955 where they have lived since that time.

Mrs. Smith was involved in a car wreck 19 years ago which left her almost at death's door. She survived but has been in nearly constant pain since that time. She had grown to know pain as a constant companion but with the help of many friends and relatives chose to live on.

She had been a member of Earth Garden Club for several years and was an active worker in the annual Red Cross Drive. Mrs. Smith was a member of First Baptist Church of Earth. In December of 1971, Mr. and Mrs. Smith celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in their home east of Earth. The hostess gift was won by Mrs. Tommy Graham.

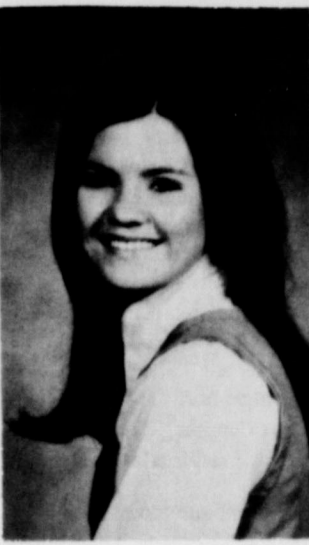

Three Earth students were among some 120 Texas high school student leaders attending the Texas Association of Student Councils' summer leadership workshop last week (June 18-23) at North Texas State University. Representing Springlake-Earth
