This week, cotton stripping hroughout the area has stepped up following the first killing freeze Monday, November 22, when the Mercury dipped to 29 degrees to tie the latest date on record for the area's first freeze, set 31 years ago, back in 1934. Farmers had been patiently waiting for the first freeze to kill the leaves on the cotton and speed up the opening of many green bolls,

Gins begin this week running on a 24 hour schedule when trailers loaded with cotton began to stack upon the lots waiting four local gins. Tuesday noon an estimate of 450 bales were
