One Killed - Nine Injured Friday In Head-on Collision

A head-on collision Friday near Plegg community in Castro County resulted in the death of Joseph Melvin Collins 81, of Portales, N. M., who died in the Muleshoe Hospital two hours following the accident. Nine other were also injured, two seriously.

The accident occurred eight miles north of Earth on FM Road 1035 at 5:15 p.m. Friday.

Elisa Acevedo, 17, driver of one of the cars was treated for a scalp laceration, multiple bruises and abrasions at the Castro County Hospital.

The most seriously injured was Mary Lou Acevedo, 14, who was treated at the West Plains Hospital and Clinic in Muleshoe and transferred to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock for surgery and treatment. She suffered a broken leg and internal injuries, her condition was described as critical.

Other occupants of the Acevedo car was Alicia, 11; Miguel, 12; Lupe, 9; Pete, 7; Joe Louis, 3 1/2; all are the children of Mr. and Mrs. Miguel Acevedo and Joe, 10 and Romulo Sandoval, 8. All were treated at Castro County Hospital and released.

Highway Patrolman Don Taber of Dimmitt and Jack Cartwright, Castro County Sheriff investigated the accident. They said both cars collided in the east lane of the road. Collins was driving south. The children had returned home from school and was on their way to pick cotton at a field nearby.

Miss Acevedo was released Sunday from the Castro County Hospital. A later report on Mary Lou Acevedo is that she is steadily improving.

Steam Roller - Mixing Plant Opening Today

The grand opening of the Earth Elevator's Steam Roller and Mixing Plant is being held today (Thursday).

Free coffee and doughnuts will be served to those attending the grand opening. Free prizes will be given away all day and free favors for the children.

The plant, the only one of its kind in the area is located near the Earth Elevator on North Amherst Road.

Construction of the 30'x50' plant began in early June. Contractors for the iron works and electrical wiring were by Earth Pump and Machine Works and Carlis Bills Electric Co. The plant has a storage capacity of 30,000 bushels.

Greetings:

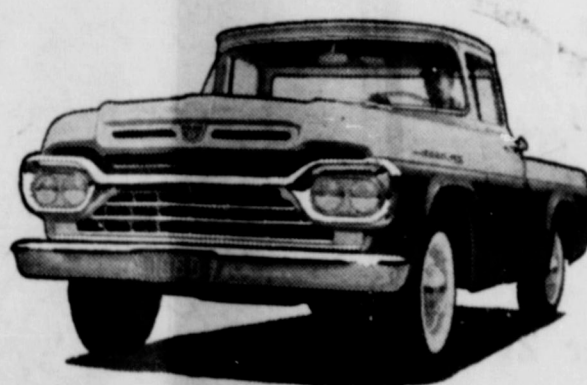

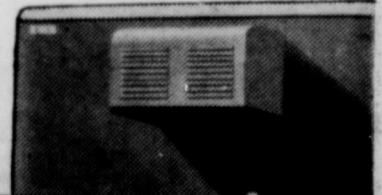

Editorials . . .

THE NATION'S JUGULAR —

Following is a condensation of an editorial in the Wall Street Journal. It brings into focus an issue that cannot be dodged forever. Labor leaders by unbridled use of monopoly powers are crystalizing public opinion in favor of remedial legislation. Says the Journal:

"The strike against Kohler company has been going on since April 5, 1954. But the effects, however grim, are local.

"In marked and revealing contrast is the current steel strike. Here again is one union, but it is striking not one but scores of firms that normally produce the overwhelming bulk of the nation's steel. Such a strike is bound to be of national concern, and the longer it drags on the more dangerous it becomes to the entire country.

"Does the right to strike include the right to close an industry forever?

"The American people, seeking to protect and nourish unions, long ago granted them through Congress powers and immunities not accorded any other group in our society. One of the largest of these is specific exemption from the anti-trust laws, which means that unions are free to be monopolies. This monopoly power is what makes it possible for unions to strangle the economy by closing one (or more than one) entire basic industry.

"To get a solution we must go back to the cause of the trouble, which is found in the privileges and powers uniquely enjoyed by unions.

"The right to strike is beyond dispute in our way of doing things. But there is no God-given Constitution-granted right of union leaders to continue a strike indefinitely regardless of cost to the nation. Nor is there any sanction in reason for the right to strike an entire industry; that right exists now only because of sins of legislative omission.

"We must deal, sooner or later, with this problem of industry-wide strikes, which are in fact strikes at the nation's jugular."

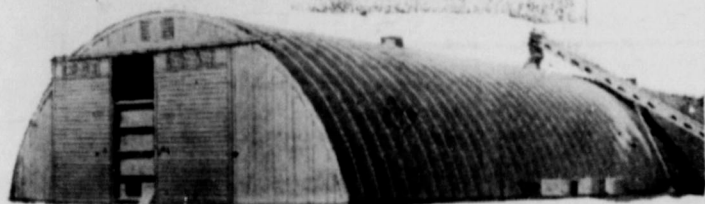

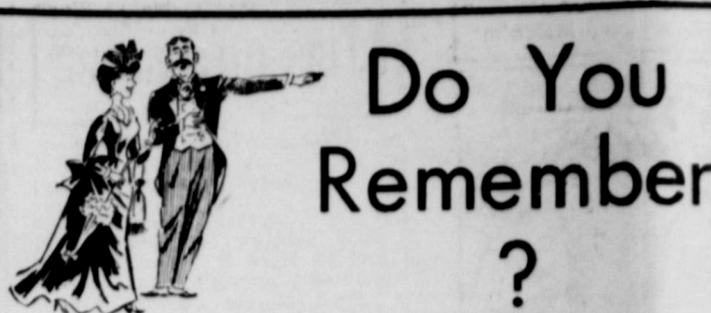

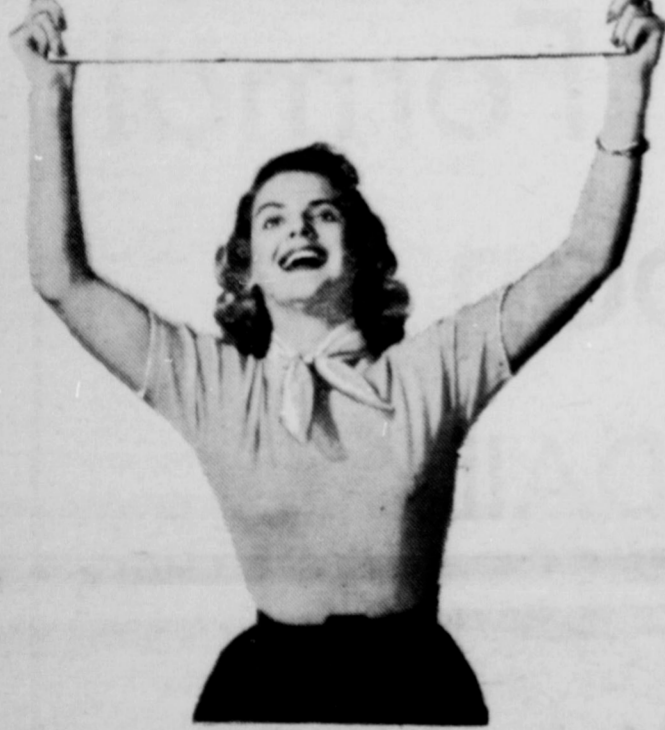

Tips on Touring

Bicycle Safety

One thing every mother knows—when school's out, bike riding booms. Here are some tips for keeping young bike riders safe. Most bicycle accidents occur during daylight hours—70 per cent, according to the National Safety Council. April to September are the worst months, with Saturday the most dangerous day.



As an adult, your first responsibility is to drive safely—keep youngsters from getting into bike-car accidents.

But you can do more—and parents, especially, should help with this:

Teach children safe bicycling practices. Since bike riders violate the law in four out of five accidents, according to a recent survey, stress the necessity of obeying all traffic laws. Traffic lights and signs are for bicycle riders, too.

Teach the children to stay on the right, ride with traffic. Riders should go single file, never zigzag.

Bicycles must be kept in perfect mechanical condition. When traffic is heavy at a corner, children should dismount, push their bikes across the street—always staying within the crosswalks.

Finally, don't allow the youngsters to bicycle at night unless it's absolutely necessary. If they do, make sure the bicycle has a head light and rear reflector. Have the children wear glowing or light-colored clothing that can easily be seen by motorists.

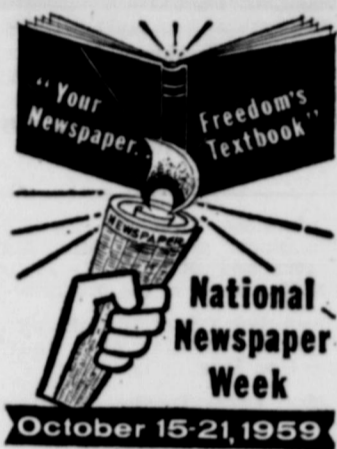

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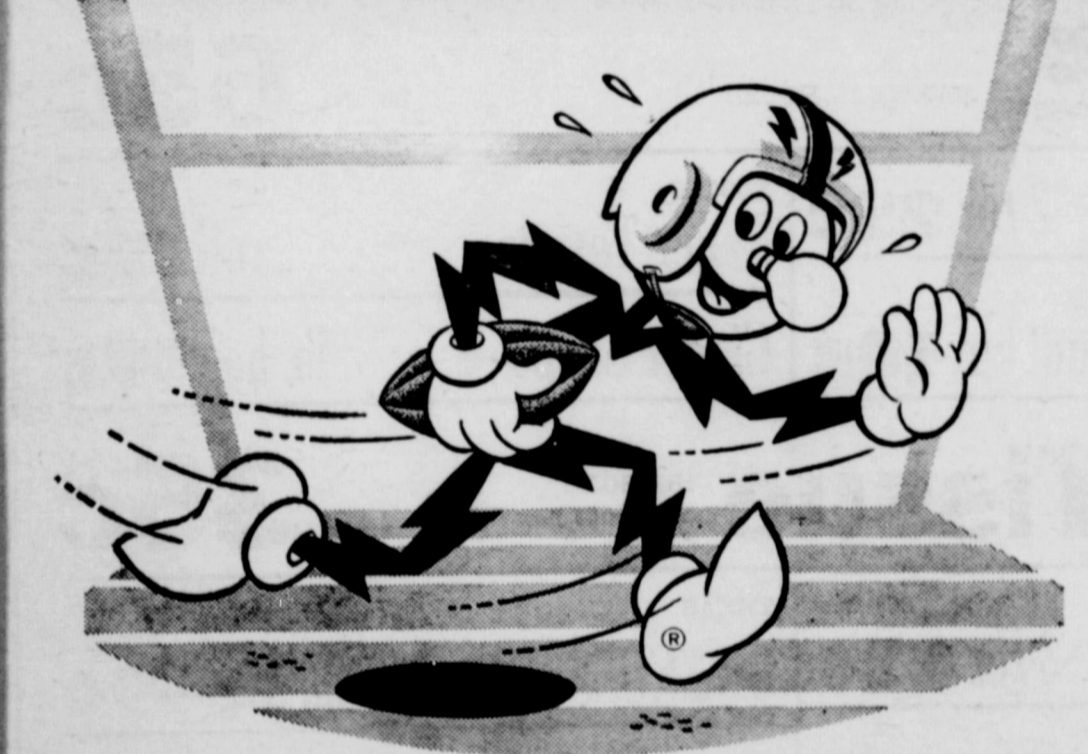

Consumer Credit Publication Available

College Station — Do you know how to use your credit. Consumer credit can be a valuable tool or it can be a trap that will make your life miserable. Knowing how to use credit is an important asset.

Consumer credit is a business transaction that allows an individual or a family to get money, goods or services and pay for them at some future time. Good financial management often includes the use of credit. If used wisely, credit may enable a family to attain some of its major goals more quickly and easily. It may permit the purchase of furnishings and equipment when the family is young and needs are greatest, and allow the family to enjoy the goods as they pay for them.

To help individuals or families better use credit, extension specialists in home management have written a publication entitled, "Using Consumer Credit." This publication discusses the many phases of credit.

A few of the many reasons for using credit are: convenience, emergencies, savings, consolidation of debts and establishing a credit rating. Credit can be used at times to take advantage of special sales when cash is not available and also it is easier to return charged purchases than cash ones.

The specialists add that when using credit you should be cautious. When a person signs a credit contract, he mortgages his future income. The use of too much credit will lower the level of living. Research shows that people usually buy more when they can use credit. Also, goods, bought at a store with charge accounts are usually more expensive because of investigating each person's credit rating and keeping records of payments; loss through non-payment of accounts; and difficulty of collecting from some customers. This cost of credit is hidden, although included in the price of goods bought.

The publication also discusses

types of sales credit available, where to borrow cash, decisions the individual or family should make before using credit, and as explanation of legal credit contracts.
