Appearing on the ballot for trustees of Springlake school were Pat McCord who received 289 votes, A. E. Wheatley 273, W. H. Lewis 281 and on the ballot for re-election were H. F. Axtell who received 218, Joan Habere 207, and W. T. Claton 204 votes.

Ray Kelley was re-elected as county trustee, receiving 263 votes and E. C. Clayton his opponent received 110 votes.

The new trustees and the present trustee met for their first meeting Monday night, and elected officers.

President Les Watson of Springlake was re-elected, E. O. Tunnell was elected as vice president, and Earl Miller was voted secretary. They met again Thursday night for a regular meeting.

KITCHEN COMMENT

PAN-FRIED SHRIMP
Cooked down on the Mississippi Gulf Coast have a special "know-how" in preparing tasty shrimp dishes, for the shrimp boats are constantly cooking it with a big heat. Here is a favorite Gulf Coast recipe for preparing golden, crisp-fried shrimp. Try these with the sauce you like best.

- (Six servings)
1 pound raw shrimp
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup flour
1 egg, beaten
1/2 cup fine bread crumbs
1/2 cup margarine
Lemon wedges

Wash shrimp and peel off shells, leaving tails on. Remove dark veins. Rinse in cold water. Drain well. Sprinkle lightly with salt. Roll in flour. Dip into beaten egg and then roll in bread crumbs. Melt margarine in heavy skillet over moderately low heat. Arrange shrimp in margarine and fry gently until golden brown on both sides, turning once or twice. Serve at once, garnished with lemon wedges. (Cooked, canned shrimp or frozen shrimp may be prepared same way.)

 - 1/2 cup margarine
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 2 eggs
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
 - 1 tablespoon cream
 - 2 1/2 cups sifted flour
 - 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
 - 1 1/2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted
- Cream margarine. Add sugar gradually, creaming until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well. Stir in vanilla extract and cream. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, and nutmeg. Add to margarine mixture, about one-fourth at a time, mixing well after each addition. Divide dough in halves. Leave one half plain. To other half add cooled melted chocolate and mix well. Fill cookie press and form cookies on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in moderately hot oven (400° F.) 8 to 10 minutes. If desired, decorate cookies with colored sugar before baking. 
