

 1 teaspoon vanilla
 4 cups sifted confectioners' sugar Pitted dates

Andrew Sanchez Charged In Knife Slaying

as charged at Dimmitt, Friday ith murder in the stabbing death of Bernardo Lopez, 25.

Lopez died Thursday morning at Castro County Hospital of a stab ound he received about 9:30 a m., November 10, Lopez was stabbed in the lower chest, the knife thrust entering his liver

Sanchez is also charged with intent to murder Juan De Luna 27, of Earth who was also stabbed in the lower chest in the same affray in which Lopez was fatally wounded. De Luna still remains in critical condition n the Castro County Hospital.

Sanchez was taken into custody at Houston two days after the stabbing. Sanche's bond has been et at \$5,000.

Dist. Attorney Joe Cox of Plainview, said that the information he had received indicated the three men were returning from a trip to Grady, New Mexico and got into an argument as they drove agong a country road in southwest Castro County.

Following the argument and stabbing. Sanchez drove away leaving the two men by the roadside. De-Luna crawled to a Mexican farm laborers house a few hundred yds. away and asked for help. The family notified Dent Bradley, owner of the farm and DeLuna and Lopez were taken to the hospital. Castro County Sheriff Jack Carlwright said a switch-blade knfe was re-
