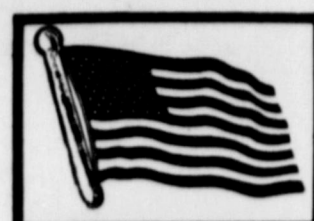

Automobile owners will not have the privilege of driving their cars with '63 license plates much longer, as sale of '64 tags starts Saturday February 1, and the deadline for having the plates on the vehicles is April 1.

Mrs. Ruby Anderson, City Secretary, reported that tags will be on sale at the City Hall beginning, Monday February 3, due to the City Hall's closing on Saturdays.

The new license plates will be black background with white lettering. Lamb County numbers will start with BU and Mrs. Anderson stated that tags in her office will begin with 3400.

Deadline Near On Return Of Census Blanks

Eight days remain before the deadline for the school census blanks to be turned into the Springlake School for all school age children in the Springlake School District.

Mrs. Oleta Sanders, census officer states that all blanks should be filled in and returned to the school by Feb. 1, 1964.

Children that will be six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1964, but will not be 18 or older on or before that date should be counted even though they may not be in school and even though he or she may be married.

The six year olds who start to school next September, are the ones most overlooked in the census.

If you as a parent have not received and filled out a school census blank, you are asked to telephone Supt. Bill Mann, at 257-4321 for a census blank or you may call in person at the school tax office and get a census blank, to be filled out.

Please read the census blank carefully, fill it out completely, and return it to school by your child, or bring it to the school superintendent's office no later than Saturday, Feb. 1.

Poll Tax Sales Zoom

The sale of poll tax receipts has zoomed to a total of 191 receipts sold at city hall through Tuesday.

Deadline for obtaining poll tax receipts is Friday, January 31, just barely one week away. The fee is \$1.75 per person.

This is an election year, with a number of national, state and local elections upcoming. Since Texas voters turned down the proposed amendment on poll taxes in Nov. citizens must have the poll tax receipt to be eligible to vote.

Persons who become 21 years of age anytime during this year, may secure poll tax exemption. In order to secure the free vote, they must file for the exemption at least 30 days prior to casting a ballot. They will be able to purchase their exemption slip at the County tax collectors office in the Littlefield court house, or may submit their information to the city secretary, Ruby Anderson at the city hall.

To be eligible to vote in Texas, a person must have lived in the state for one year, the county for six months, and in the precinct 30 days prior to an election.

Poll tax will be available at the city hall and the Springlake School tax office, to anyone desiring to purchase poll tax receipts through the deadline January 31.

Bill Clayton Designated Interim Committee Chairman

House Speaker Byron Tunnell today designated Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake as Chairman of the Interim Committee on Protection and Development of Soil and Water Resources.

Previously named to the committee along with Representative Clayton, were Representative Menton Murray of Harlingen and Henry Fletcher of Luling.

The five man committee was completed with the announcement of the appointment of Mr. Sam Wohlford of Stratford to represent the Texas Water Pollution Control Board, and Mr. A. F. Leesch of Boerne to represent the Texas Soil Conservation Board.

This committee, authorized in a Resolution authored by Rep. Clayton, is directed to study the problems incurring as a result of the growing shortage of water in the State with the responsibility of offering new methods of protecting the vital natural resources of both water and soil within Texas.

The Interim Study Committee will work with problems primarily concerning conservation and preservation, water and soil resources. The group has called an organizational meeting for February 3 in Austin, at which time, they will consider problems presented by a State Water Pollution Board, State Soil Conservation Board, State Water Commission, High Plains Water District; consider proposals presented by both major farm organizations and will consider water and soil problems that may be presented by individuals. This will be an open meeting to the public and will be a primary basis by which our committee work will assume its study.

On announcing these appointments, Speaker Tunnell commented, "The vital interest of all these men in the problems of conservation will undoubtedly yield an informative study which will serve as an invaluable aid to the next session of the Legislature in formulating constructive legislation in these fields."

County Bale Count Totals 165,628

According to a final tabulation made by the Texas Employment Commission office in Littlefield, the Lamb County bale count for the 1963 cotton crop reached an unofficial 165,628 bales. The total was lower than the estimates made by several area agricultural observers after near perfect weather before the harvest season began. The TED report indicated that most gins in the county had about as much tonnage as in 1962, but the bale production fell far short of that record breaking output. The county climbed to a high of 227,400 bales in 1962 after

rising to a high of 211,000 bales in 1961. Several farmers are still picking up waste cotton off the ground, but the remainder is not expected to add many bales to the 165,628 total. The majority of the gins in the county have shut down for the season, with ginner reporting only a few more bales to be ginned. Most farmers were disappointed in the yield turn out, as the cotton crop did not pan out, to be as good as it appeared to be in the field. County agent Bill Kimbrough attributes this production factor to immature cotton, from the late start, due to rain and hail in April and May.

Teen Town Meet Held Monday

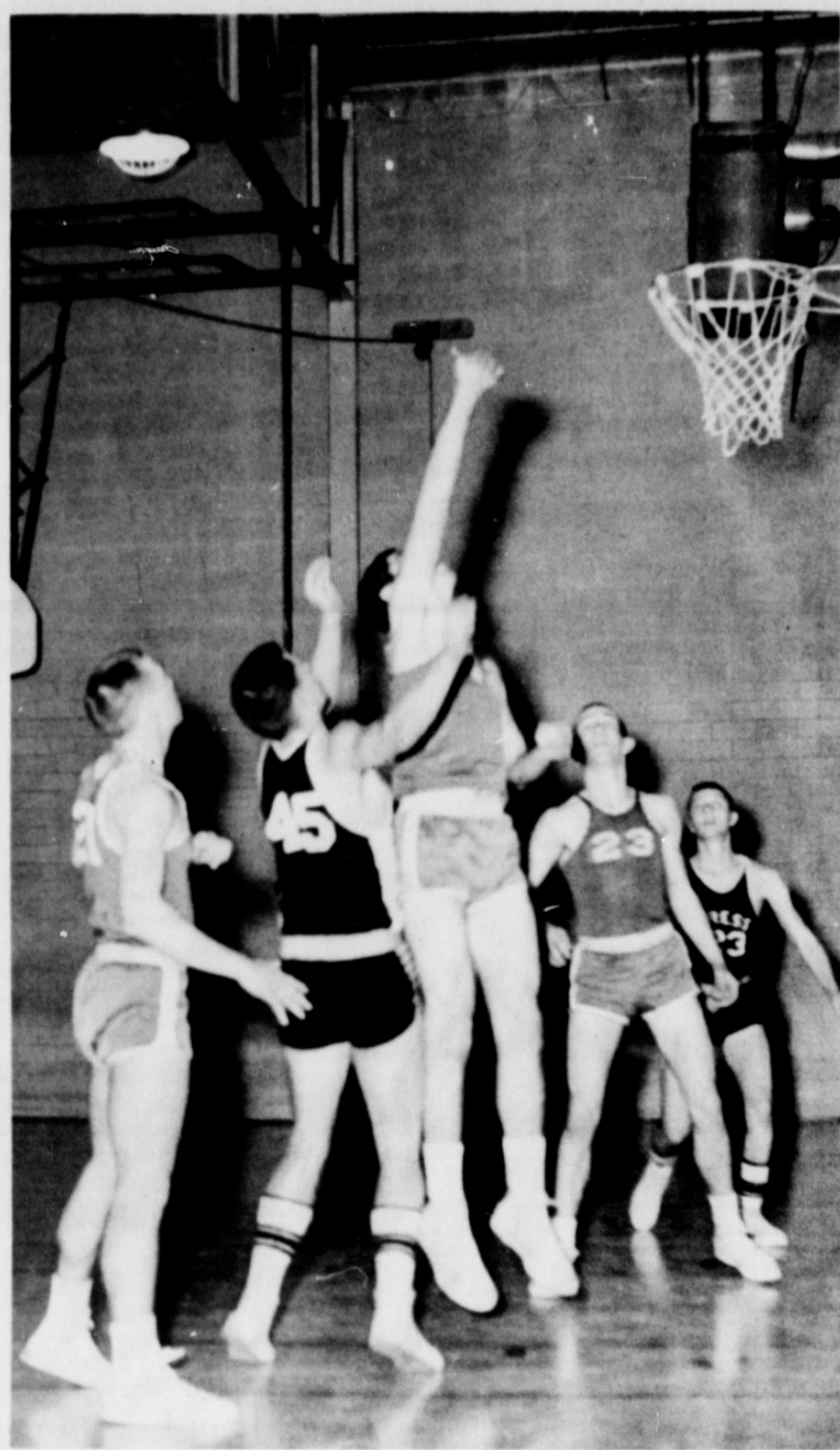
The Earth Teen Town Board met Monday night, January 20 in special session, with Earl Parish, chairman, presiding.

The ACT battery is used in admission by 75 colleges in Texas, by 85% of those in this region and by 829 colleges in the U.S.

Results are used by colleges in admission, placement, granting of scholarships, class sectioning and for other purposes.

ACT compiles scores, high school grades and other predictive data, providing a basis for the student to select a college suited to his educational goals. The non-profit agency reports this and other research information to colleges without charge. Scores are also reported to students and to high schools.

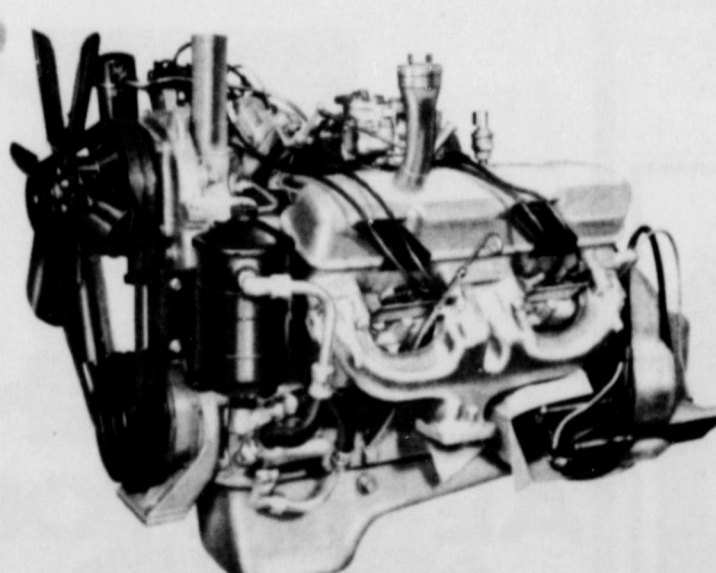

The Kress girls beat the local Wolverettes 39-38, in a nip and tuck game, with the score changing lead in the last three minutes of play.

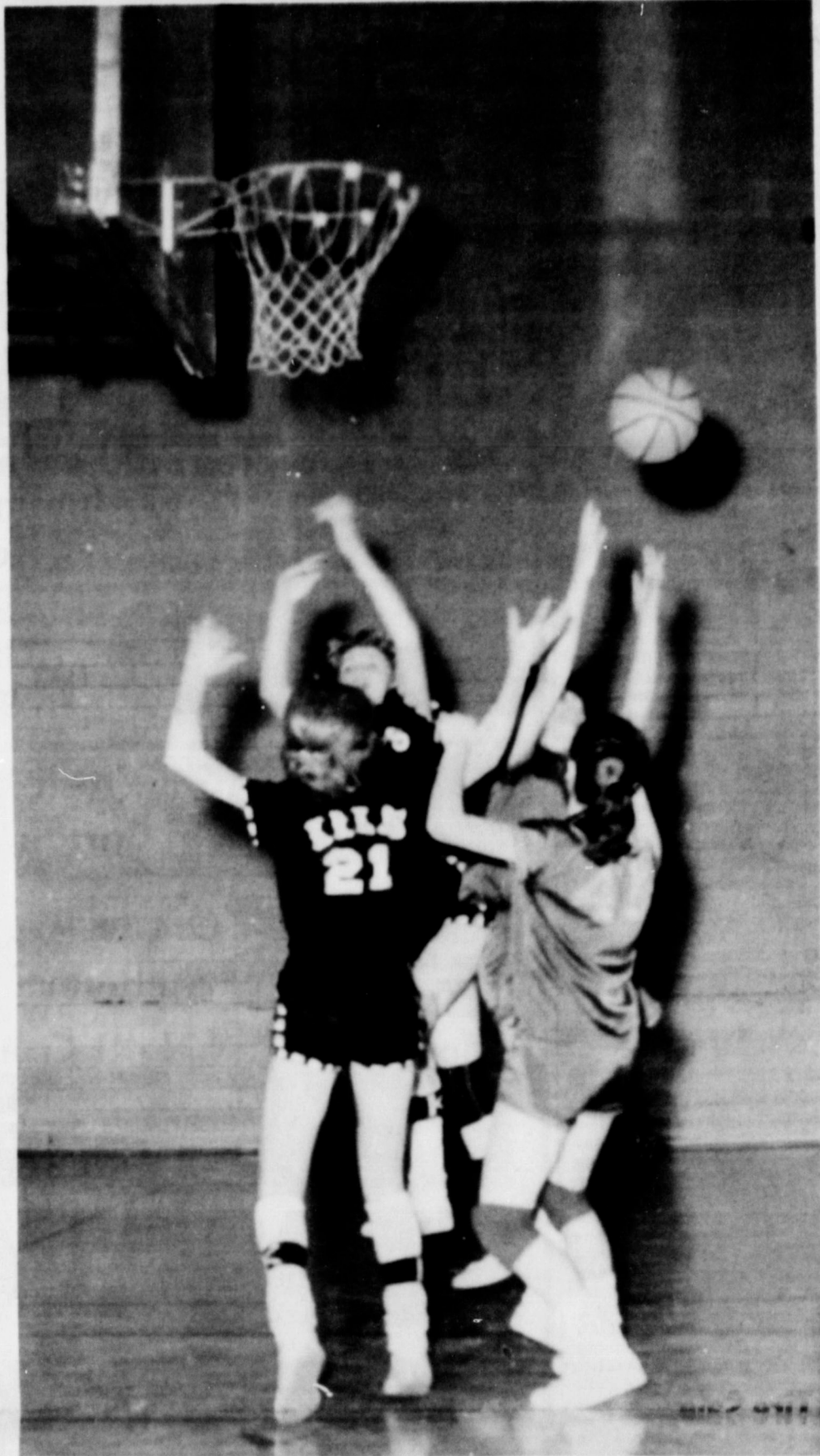
Beth Dent was high scorer with 22 points for Springlake.

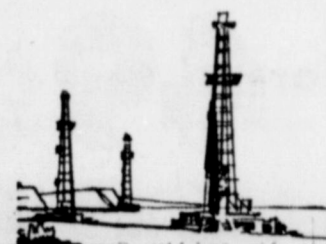

Year's Grain Production Short Of Five Year Average

"Texas 1963 grain production, hampered somewhat by the drought, fell short of the five year average on most kinds with the notable exception of rice," Agriculture Commissioner White said this week.

At mid-summer of 1963, grain stored in Texas registered warehouses totaled some 452, 150, 159 bushels of barley, corn, milo, oats and wheat. Rice storage figures were not available. But with normal dis-

appearance, not too much of a storage increase is expected from the total of 327, 456, 000 bushels produced. Rice, classified separately, yielded some 18, 394, 000 cwt. which tops considerably the five year average of 12, 135, 000 cwt.

A ample storage capacity was available to handle the 1963 crop, after the usual harvest overload. Total capacity of warehouses registered with Commissioner White's office

is 691, 369, 682 bushels and about one-third of this space was ready to receive the 1963 grains at the season's start.

Despite much discussion of surplus grains, Texas warehouses have an average of only about a year's supply of most commodities on hand.

Commissioner John White also pointed out that Texas grain warehouse laws, offering about the best protection in the nation, have prevented any losses by grain growers. "No Texas grain farmer has lost even one bushel's worth of grain through theft or mismanagement in nearly 10 years because of our strict bonding and licensing provisions.

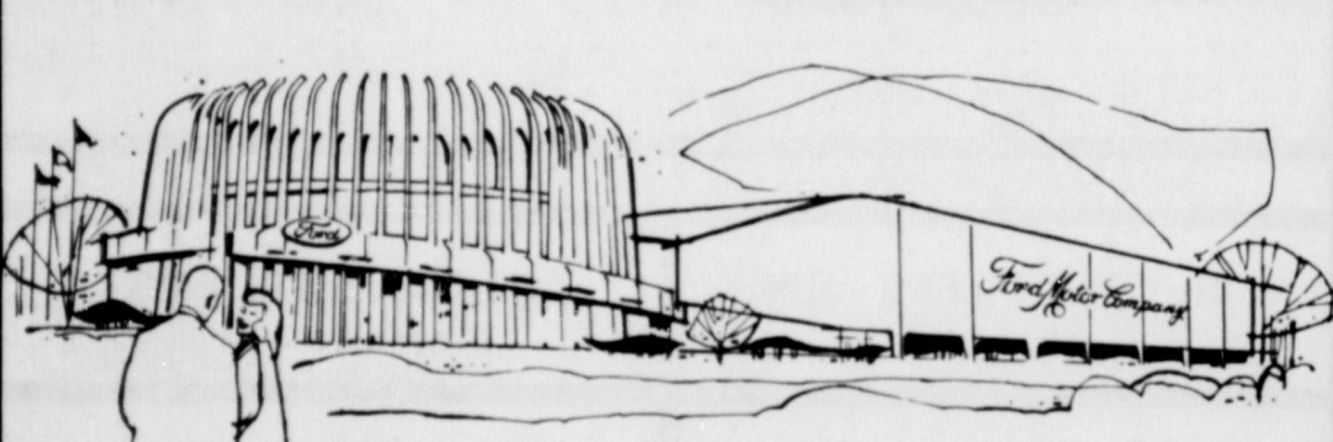

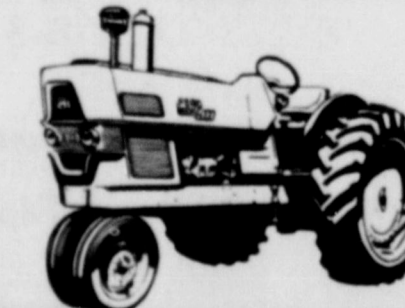
