### Earth Welcomes Almost One Inch Of Blessed Rain

Earth and the surrounding communities were blessed with almost an inch of rain since Sunday night. As much as five inches fell in some areas of Texas and showers fell throughout the state. The rains were the best to fall in some places in Texas since the drought began seven years ago.

Texas Agricultural Commissioner, John C. White said the rains are "Our most hopeful sign of a possible return to a normal rain cycle since 1950."

The rain fell in the nick of time for wheat, falling slowly in a manner that would allow it to soak into the ground for the best effect. Agricultural experts say it will take a lot more rain to erase the effects of the drought in the dry areas, but they expressed the hope of the dampest February in years.

Close to one inch of rain was reported in the Big Square Community and Mrs. Bonnie Haberger, of the Pleasant Valley Community reported approximately .89 had fallen there. Wet feet and cold noses were ignored by happy citizens of this community as the light rains fell on this area. Small amounts or large, rain or snow, it is certainly welcome.

Everyone is urged to support to their fullest extent to get the swimming pool built by that time.

The pool will be built and turned over to the City of Earth. The revenue from the pool will be used to operate it and finance the upkeep.

### TAX EXEMPT

A letter from the Director of Internal Revenue, Washington, D. C. to Bill Stockard, member of the Recreational Committee stated that any donations made to the pool fund would be tax exempt, as it will be City-owned and a non-profit organization.

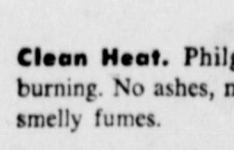

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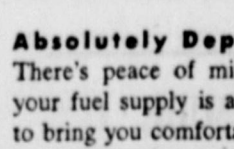

Everyone enjoyed the program very much.

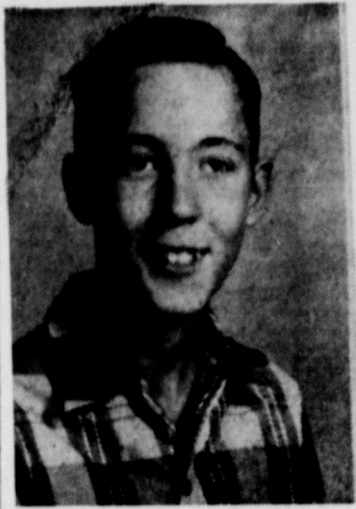

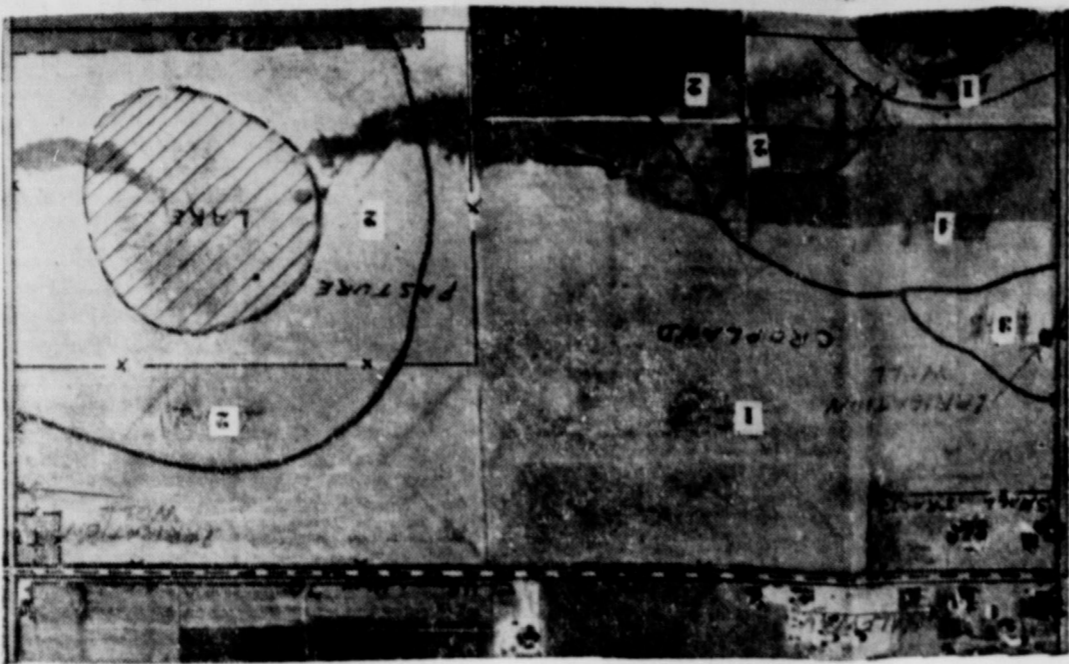
## Aerial Map of High Plains Station at Halfway

The half section is bounded by U. S. Highway 70 on the north, with the cemetery marking its north east corner and the Baptist Church at Halfway, the north west corner.

The west quarter section has been purchased by the Green Machinery Co. and will be re-purchased by the Foundation at the original cost from funds being raised for the High Plains Station. The east quarter section has been purchased by the Harvest Queen Foundation and leased for 25 years at \$1.00 per year to the T. R. F. for the High Plains Station with option to lease for an additional 25 years.

In this picture the station has been divided according to soil characteristics as indicated by the Soil Conservation Service, who supplied the picture. The Key is:

1. This large section of 1 1/2 e farm is deep, fine textured, slowly permeable Pullman clay loam with no to one per cent slope and no to slight erosion.
  2. These two areas of the site are the same as No. 1 except they have one to three per cent slope.
  3. This small area on the west side of the half section, which includes the irrigation well, has deep medium textured, slowly permeable Amarillo Clay loam s o 11 with no to one per cent slope and little or no erosion.
  4. This area is the same as No. 3, except that the slope is one to three per cent.
- Research plots will be located in the area along Highway 70. Signs will indicate type of research being conducted.
- The second irrigation well is to be located just south of the cemetery and it is planned to connect the two wells with underground pipe. Some dry land research will also be conducted.
- A temporary office and a storage shed are located west of the Baptist Church on an acre that has been purchased by T. R. F. Permanent buildings, including an office building, processing and storage building, and a greenhouse are expected to be located just east of the Baptist Church along Highway 70.

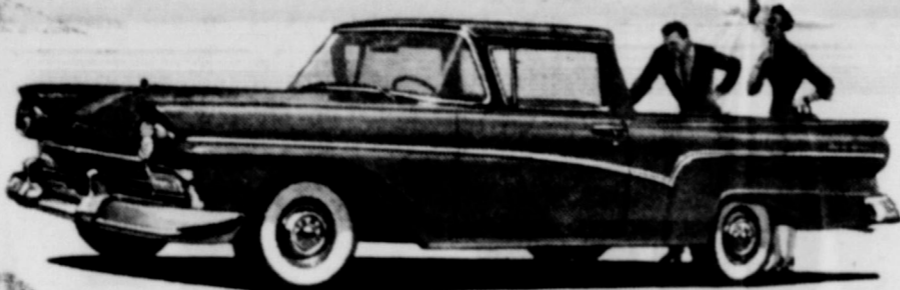

### PAUL'S Recipe of the Week

by Mary Lee Taylor  
Banana Cream Pie

- 1 cup fine graham cracker crumbs
- 1/4 cup melted butter or margarine
- 1-3 cups Pet Evaporated Milk
- 1-2 teaspoons unflavored gelatin
- 1-4 cup cold water
- 1-2 cup boiling water
- 1 pkg. vanilla instant pudding
- 1 ripe banana

Press mixture of crumbs and melted butter in bottom and sides of a 9-in. pie pan. Chill until needed. Chill one-third cup milk in an ice tray until almost frozen around the edges. While milk chills, soften gelatin in the cold water in a one and one-half qt. bowl. Add boiling water to softened gelatin and stir until gelatin dissolves. Then stir in 1 cup of milk. Let stand until needed. Put ice-cold milk into a cold 1-qt. bowl. Whip with cold rotary beater by hand, or with electric beater at high speed, until stiff. Keep chilled. Add pudding to gelatin mixture and beat with rotary beater 1 min., or until well mixed. Fold whipped milk into pudding. Slice banana over the bottom of crumb crust. Pour pudding mixture over banana slices. Chill until firm and ready to serve. At serving time, garnish with a ring of banana slices, if desired.

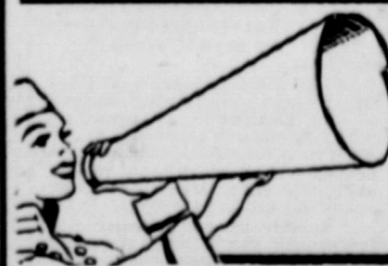

## Scholarship Awards totaling \$3,200 Offered Texas Graduating Seniors

AUSTIN — Cash scholarship awards totaling \$3200 are being offered by Texas labor organizations in this year's Texas State Federation of Labor Scholarship Contest, including a top statewide award of \$500.

The contest, with the winners to be determined through a qualifying essay and a written examination, is open to all graduating seniors of any Texas public, private or parochial high school, including mid-term graduates who may already have enrolled in college. Contestants must have high school scholastic records qualifying them for college entrance or must have passed the National College Entrance examination.

The cash awards are of two types: statewide and local (offered in Austin, Houston, San Antonio, Dallas and Fort Worth areas only.)

Statewide awards include: Texas State Federation of Labor first award, \$500; Federation second award, \$250; Texas State Association of Electrical Workers, \$250; Texas State Pipe Trades Association, 250; Iron Workers' District

Council of Texas, \$200. Local awards being offered by local union organizations in five state areas will be presented to winners in those areas failing to win a state award. These local awards are:

Austin — Austin Trades Council \$100; Typographical Local 138, \$100; Motor Coach Employees Local 1091, \$100; Office Employees Local 298, \$50.

Dallas — Dallas AFL-CIO Council, \$250; Typographical Local 173, \$250.

Fort Worth — Fort Worth Trades Assembly, \$100; Typographical Local 198, \$50; Fire Fighters Local 440, \$50.

Houston — Houston Labor and Trades Council, \$250; Typographical Local 87, \$50; Hod Carriers and Common Laborers Local 18, \$100.

San Antonio — San Antonio Trades Council, \$100.

Complete information about the contest, together with leaflets providing background information for essays, can be obtained from the Texas State Federation of Labor, 214 VFW Building, Austin 1, Tex.

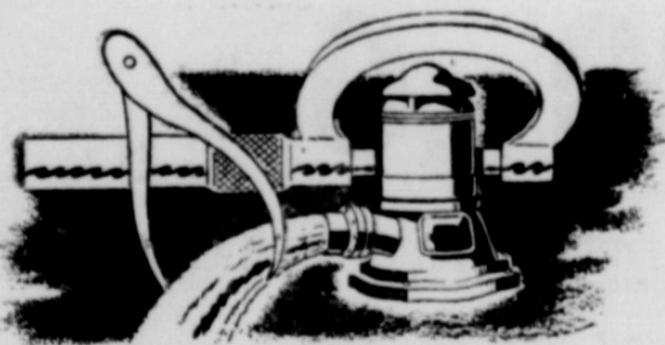

### IT'S THE LAW in TEXAS

JUST THE RELEVANT FACTS, MA'AM

The tests of truth and relevancy which courts apply are stricter than those which we use in daily life. As a rule we don't put a man under oath. We don't cross-examine him if his story fails to hang together. We don't jail or fine him if he lies to us. But we do these things in court.

Why is that? Because we think everything that takes place in a courtroom is important. Your property, your personal or civil rights—even your family's welfare or your life or liberty—may rest upon the truth of testimony in court.

Eager as courts are for facts, their tests fall short of those of science. When a scientist doubts the outcome of an experiment, he need not rely upon somebody else's word. He just repeats the experiment in question.

But not so in court. The acts told of in courts cannot be lived over again, for the court to see first hand. For example, you cannot bring back and ask a dead man whether he signed a will or whether the accused killed a man. We cannot re-do a murder; we can only get the witnesses to tell what they know first hand.

To protect each party, there are a number of safeguards. One of these is that we put the witness under oath on pain of penalties for lying. Another is that we cross-examine the witness.

The relevancy test is still another example. Evidence which does not meet the test may be excluded from consideration in determining the facts of the particular case, upon objection by the opposing attorney.

Evidence is "relevant" only when it legitimately tends to answer some question of fact involved.

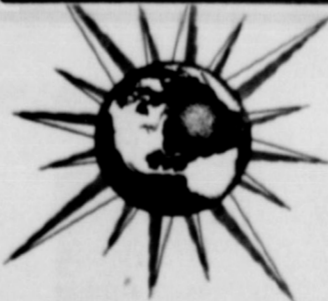

## Bill To Create New District 154 Composed Of Lamb, Bailey, Parmer and Castro Counties

State Representatives Jess M. Osborn of District 96 and State Representative Leroy Saul of District 89 have introduced a bill which will create a new Judicial District. The newly created District will be District 154, and will be composed of Bailey, Lamb, Parmer and Castro Counties with a population of approximately 99,000.

The division will leave in the 64th Judicial District Hale and Swisher Counties with approximately the same population.

As the division now stands, according to Representative Jess Osborn, District Judge A. E. Bills will be the new 154th District and Judge will be appointed for the 64th District of Hale and Swisher. The District Attorney will stay in Swisher and Hale Counties since he lives there and a new attorney will be appointed for the 154th District.

The measure has the backing of the Bar Associations of all counties in the present 64th Judicial District. Osborn stated that the study was started in 1955 due to the excessive load now being carried by Judge Bills with this proposed measure coming out as a result of that study.

Both Osborn and Saul would like to hear from the people of the District regarding this matter.

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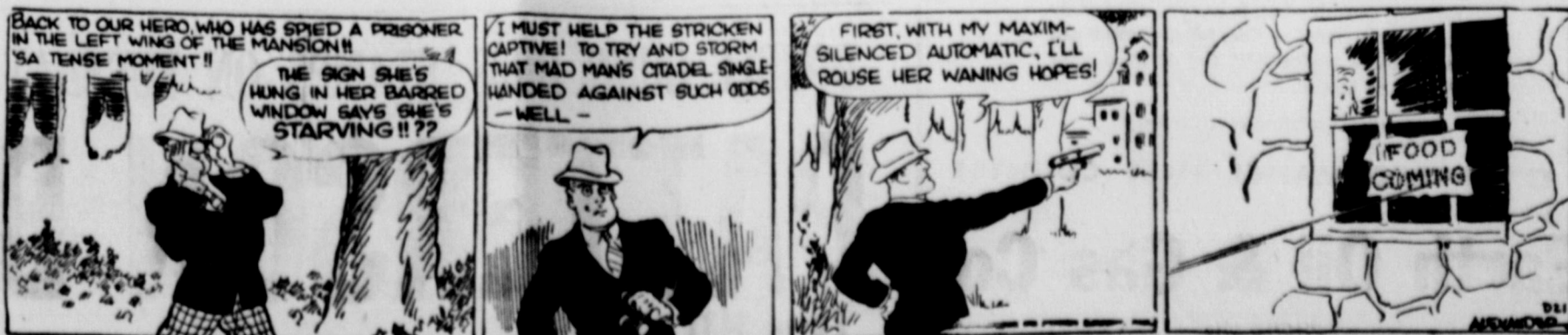

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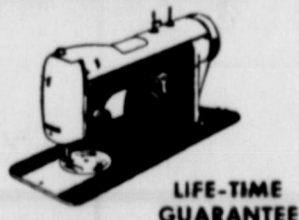
